Miss Strong, who has been in Russia most of the time since 1921 writing books and articles which reflected a strongly pro-Soviet viewpoint, is one of the seven American correspondents in Moscow.

The Soviet newspapers disclosed her arrest in the following announcement:

"The well-known intelligence operator, the American woman journalist, A. L. Strong, who got into the USSR as a consequence of the carelessness of certain foreign relations officials, yesterday was arrested by state security organs.

"Miss Strong is accused of espionage and undermining activity against the Soviet Union. They report that in the next few days she will be sent outside the boundaries of the Soviet Union."





Solid Foundation Is Needed

In stating his views on the Administration's labor bill, arthur S. Goldberg, general counsel of the CIO, charged hat the Taft-Hartley Law has "turned the clock back on progress in the field of industrial relations." The inference, of course, is that "progress" means a progress toward petter relations which was being made under the laws that preceded Taft-Hartley.

But is the inference really sound? Progress in the political and sociological fields usually consists of lateral wings as well as forward movement. One group gains special advantages and abuses the gain. Steps are taken to restore equilibrium. Then advantage shifts to the other group and the process is repeated.

Thus, before the Norris-LaGuardia and Wagner Acts, employers had some unfair and one-sided privileges. Under those laws the privileges shifted to labor's side. Several Taft-Hartley provisions restored an equality of rights in industrial relations. They made labor contracts binding on both parties. They made both parties equally liable to charges of unfair labor practices. They restored to employers the right of free speech on labor matters.

The Taft-Hartley Law also granted new powers to the President, largely as a consequence of John L. Lewis' tactics. Before the law was passed the President had been able to cope with Lewis' crippling strikes only by ordering government, under his extraordinary wartime authority, to seize and operate the coal mines. Under Taft-Hartlev the Chief Executive could ask an injunction against any strike which threatened a national emergency without resorting to his broad and loosely-defined wartime powers.

The absence of this provision in the new Administration bill has brought protests from the bill's opponents and created some confusion among its supporters. One of the most obviously confused supporters has been Labor Sec-





West Germany's new place in the industrial hierarchy of Europe is summarized by a few statistics which are rarely given in proper juxta-position. They are the annual production rates of West Germany, France and Britain in early 1949 in four basic industries:


Hard and brown coal: West Germany 162,000,000 tons. France, 48,-000,000 tons (plus 13,800,000 tons from the German Saar). Britain, 198,000,000 tons. Iron And Steel

Pig iron and ferro-alloys: West Germany, 6.200,000 tons. France, 7,200,000 tons (plus 1,300,000 tons from the German Saar). Britain, 9,500,000 tons. Steel ingots: West Germany,

7,600,000 tons. France, 7,800,000 tons (plus 1,400,000 tons from the German Saar). Britain, 15,600,000

Electric power: West Germany, 22,000 million kilowatt hours. France, 27,000 kilowatt hours. Britain, 43,000 million kilowatt hours. If the Saar were reintegrated into West Germany, instead of being absorbed by the French economy, France would be a second-class industrial power in Western Europe West German mines have been exceeding 330,000 tons of hard coal daily-nine months ahead of the target envisioned by ERP-and may exceed 350,000 tons before Decem-

All this is enough to rattle the skeleton of the Morgenthau Plan, which conceived of postwar Germany as a land principally of small farmers and handicrafts, not the busy workshop of Europe it had

Cooperative Oilfield **Development Urged**

AUSTIN —(P)—"Billions of bar-rels" of underground oil never will be recovered unless cooperative development of fields is made legal, the Senate's Oil and Gas Committee was told Monday night.

C. J. Tucker of Wichita Falls, who described himself as an operator of 50 years experience, urged passage for a bill that would permit such cooperative agreements among royalty owners and operators.

Only three proponents of the bill were heard Monday night. Opposition will be heard Tuesday night. The bill by Senator George Moffett of Chillicothe would legalize voluntary pooling agreements where a hearing before the Railroad Commission finds that cooperative development of an oil field is necessary to conservation.

"The only justification for this aw is the purpose of conservation," A. W. Walker, Dallas attorney and former University of Texas professor of petroleum law, told the committee.

No Anti-Trust Violation Walker testified the proposed law would not violate the state's anti-

"The whole purpose of this bill," he said, "is to remove the fear that cooperative development for conservation purposes is an anti-trust vio-

Walker pointed out that present laws permit cooperative development of gas fields but that the laws are silent with respect to oil fields. (Continued From Page One) facilities of the cities involved would be pledged to and controlled by the district. The district would pay the maintenance cost of the producing facilities.

The association president said there are many angles to consider and that citizens should be well informed before committing themselves. He asked the directors to compare the cost with the returns before saddling the city with the additional tax burden.

Hogan pointed out the city's water rates would be about doubled and yet the city would show less profit from its water system. He explained that Midland now has an adequate supply of water and is more fortunate in this respect than are the other cities involved.






