# Upton Strike Oil Companies Face Anti-Trust Suit Flows Oil In Ellenburger

Magnolia Petroleum Company has proven for flowing production from the Ellenburger at its No. 1-A TXL, wildcat in North-Central Upton County, 30 miles south and a little west of Midland, and about onequarter of a mile south of the Midland County line.

This important development flowed 231.75 barrels of 53 gravity oil in 18 hours, through a onequarter-inch choke during a production test which started late Sun-

day. Early Monday morning it was flowing at the rate of 14.2 barrels of oil per hour.



drillstem test in the Canyon at 649-70 feet, gas reached the surface in five minutes and oil in 54 minutes.

It flowed through a 5/8-inch bottom hole choke and a one-inch top choke for 26 minutes, producing 35 barrels of oil per hour. Gravity of the petroleum was 41 degrees. Gasoil ratio was 310-1.

The venture has now drilled ahead to 6,680 feet and was to run another drillstem test, then attempt to complete as the opener of a new field. Nearest production is at Lion Oil

Company No. 2 McLaughlin, also a Canyon discovery, four miles to the north.


Blue Monday weather prevailed

over most of Texas Monday. Light misty rains fell in widely scattered sections of the state during the night and ground was damp



### Ellenburger in Crane **Develops Oil And Gas** For Humble Wildcat

A small amount of free oil was developed from the Ellenburger at Humble Oil & Refining Company No. 1 Jax Cowden, Central-East Crane County deep wildcat, six and one-half miles west of Crane.

The prospector took a three-hour drillstem test at 10,795-905 feet. Recovery was 25 stands of gas, 30 feet of 42-gravity oil, 150 feet of heavily oil and gas cut drilling mud, and the 980-foot water blanket.

There were no signs of formation water. The venture drilled deeper to 10,925 feet, and is now taking another drillstem test.

Operator has not released the official call on the top of the Ellenburger. Some sources picked it to be at approximately 10,500 feet. The "oil and gas signs developed on the recent drillstem test were the first indications of petroleum which the project has logged since it entered the Ellenburger.

Location is 660 feet from south and east lines of section 58, block X. CCSD&RGNG survey.

### **Upton Deep Strike Continues Flowing**

Magnolia Petroleum Company No. 1-A TXL, North-Central Upton County Ellenburger discovery, continues to flow clean oil from the section at 12,780,820 feet.

In the first full 24-hour flowing test, the well produced 306.5 barrels of 53.6 gravity oil, plus one per cent drilling mud and acid water, flowing through a one-quarter inch tubing choke.

Gas-oil ratio was 1,300-1, and flowing tubing pressure was around 1,300 pounds.

During the next 18 hours, still flowing through a one-quarter Senate inch choke, the section produced harrels of oil. That was at the







For almost three-quarters of his life George Washing- ton was the subject of a British crown which still granted considerable power to its monarchs. He was a soldier in the service of those monarchs. And even when he as- sumed the leadership of the new self-governing republic in America, it was in a world where absolutism was still the accepted and usual form of government. It would have been easy for Washington, had he been a lesser man, to perpetuate himself in office. He was not only the first President of the United States, but the only one chosen unanimously. Though bitter political differ- ences developed among those around him, his place in the public esteem was high and secure. The spirit of independence in Washington's America	Strutt

today was not unanimous. Considering the environment and education and habits of Americans so recently British, it scarcely could have been. Further, there was no constitutional limit put upon the President's tenure of office.

So Washington might have made himself dictator or even king. But with a wisdom prophetic in its depth of vision, he did not. At the end of two terms he retired from office. In doing so he renounced the theory of the indispensable man. In doing so he proclaimed his faith in the principle of self-government.
