### "LIKE A lustrous pearl, set amid a cluster of emeralds, lies the little city of Friona, in Parmer County, in the Texas Panhandle.

So goes the opening line of a Friona Chamber of Commerce brochure, published in 1929. . Our predecessor, the original editor of the Friona Star, J.W.

White, was responsible for the glowing attributes to Friona. Many of the statements, although written over 44 years ago, still make good Chamber of Commerce copy.

"It is located on the main line of the Santa Fe Railroad, extending between Chicago and Los Angeles. Friona is the natural and logical commercial center of that part of the Panhandle in which it is located, and also of a large portion of Curry County, New Mexico," the narrative contin-

We continue with excerpts from the old brochure-

"Friona is abundantly supplied with highways, both state and county, which enable shippers and shoppers to easily get their products and wares to and from town. While as yet we have no paved roads, our highways are unsurpassed by any dirt roads in the land."

"The atmosphere of the Friona country is light and dry, and therefore invigorating and healthful. It is especially beneficial for lung and throat trouble.

"The altitude, which is about 4,000 feet, places it above the malaria germ and there is, therefore, no malaria or kindred diseases. It also frees us from the almost torrid heat of the lower altitudes and affords cool nights, even in the warmest parts of the year, and thus assures a good night's rest after the labors of the day.

"The climate is mild in winter and cool in summer, with usually sufficient rainfall to insure good production, and total crop failure is a thing unknown here.

"Water, which is cool, clear and 99 per cent pure, and therefore well suited for drinking and domestic purposes is obtained through wells, from stratum of water-bearing sand or gravel, lying at a depth of from 150 to 250 feet below the surface. No country has any better water than is found here.

"In addition to what has been said concerning the town itself. it is surrounded by a vast expanse of level prairie land, having a deep, rich soil, fully adapted to the production of all the grains, fruits and vegetables (which were then mentioned).

"This expanse extends in all directions far beyond the described school district, even over into the bounds of our sister state of New Mexico, forming a large trade territory for Friona. At least 95 per cent of this land is tillable, and at this writing, not more than 40 per cent of it is in cultivation.


# **Fund Drive Climbs** To 55% Of Goal

Contrary to advertisements, there's little foundation forclaiming Vitamin E a miracle cure-all.

"Although this nutrient is essential for good health, it isn't everything it's promoted as being," Karen Kreipke, foods and nutrition specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University, contended.

"Studies and clinical trials fail to link Vitamin E with 'curing' heart disease, cystic fibrosis, blood disorders, leg ulcers, diabetes and miscarriages," she emphasized.

"Actually, very little is known about the vitamin.

"It functions in the body as an antioxident and helps red blood cells live as long as they should.

"Small amounts of the vitamin are stored in various body organs, muscle and fat tissues.

"A fat-soluble vitamin, it requires presence of fat and bile salts for absorption.

"There's little chance that a person eating a well-balanced diet will lack Vitamin E since most common foods contain modest amounts," Miss Kreipke added.

"Estimated adult daily requirement is 25-30 International Units-the average U.S. diet furnishes 2-66 I.U. daily.

"Best food sources are leafy vegetables, whole-grain food products and fats-especially vegetable oils," the specialist




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# Chieftain Track Team Takes Twin-City Title



WITH THE ARRIVAL of warmer weather and rapid wheat growth, bloat may become a problem in your cattle.

Bloat is basically caused by the failure of gas to escape from the rumen (stomach) of an animal through normal and regular

Cattlemen should observe cattle closely for signs of bloat whenever animals are turned in on fresh pastures. There are many and varied causes of bloat and many forms of prevention. Ranchers should become familiar with preventive measures and first-aid treatments that can be applied until veterinary

Five measures that can help prevent bloat are-1. Keep good quality hay in portable racks where cattle are

assistance can be obtained.

grazing. The dry feed encourages belching. 2. Avoid turning cattle in on wet plants the first day after a rain. More water means more fermentation and results in more

gas formation. 3. Be sure cattle are extremely hungry when turned on pastures. Feed them with good quality roughage first.

4. Change onto pastures gradually. Allow access to pastures for increasing time periods until cattle have full access to

5. Keep salt and minerals available for animals at all times to help prevent bloat through better digestion.

Another measure for bloat control is the use of poloxalene where cattle have had problems on certain pastures. Limited trials conducted by the California Extension Service indicate that frothy bloat in animals was effectively controlled when

adequate amounts of poloxalene were consumed. Five first-aid measures that ranchers can practice until

veterinary assistance is obtained include-1. A "gag" can be inserted in the animal's mouth. A stick about the size of a broomstick or shovel handle can be tied crossways in the animal's mouth. This encourages chewing and

movements of the tongue to cause belching. 2. Some drenches are recommended but must be used with care to avoid getting liquid in the animal's lungs. Drenches can be obtained from your veterinarian and kept for emergency

Try to keep animals on their feet and walking.

Knead left flank vigorously with fists to force out gas 5. In extreme emergencies to prevent death, it may be necessary to puncture the animal's side so the gas will escape. This should be done only as a last resort since the resulting wound usually becomes infected and is difficult to heal.

The proper place to "tap" an animal is high on the left flank about halfway between the hip bone and last rib. Veterinarians generally prepare the area properly, time permitting, and use a trocar and canula made especially for the job.







worship on the first day of the week. If we want to be like Jesus' church, we will try to worship like the early Christians

Finally on March 13, 1973, an indictment was issued by the State of New York against IBP and one of its officers, alleging a bribery conspiracy in New York City. A similar indictment has been returned against the officer and others in the Federal Court there. The company and its officers have described the indictment as "unjustified and unwarranted

In their announcement, the two companies stated that all of the events which had happened since the negotiations began had changed the status of the discussions to such an extent that they were compelled to reassess their positions on the merger, and that events had made the time within which merger could be completed indefinite.

Both companies stated that it "....an unfortunate consequence that all of these events had affected the proposed merger and the potential benefits that would have resulted to the American consumer in terms of lower beef prices."

IBP further stated that its first priority would now be the rigorous defense of the charges of the indictments.
