





U.S. Must Keep Europe Free

The Senate opened debate on the North Atlantic alliance by rediscovering a familiar provision of the Constituion. That provision reserves to Congress the right to declare war. In doing so it rules out any treaty which would pledge this country in advance to an automatic declaration.

But this has been so from the Monroe Doctrine of 1820 to the Western Hemisphere Defense Treaty of 1947. It is scarcely a fresh discovery. Yet a number of influential senators have rushed to take refuge behind it.

Chairman Connally of the Foreign Relations Commitee has declared that "we are not responsible for the disagreements that might grow up in the countries of Europe." He has said he does not favor "assuming obligations which we do not intend to fulfill." He and others have spoken up strongly against any "moral commitment" to go to war.

These arguments raise some questions that are left manswered. Does our lack of responsibility for Europe's disagreements mean that we can avoid becoming involved in their consequences? Does our refusal to fulfill obligations mean that they will never be forced upon us? What precise meaning, if any, is attached to a "moral commitment" to declare war?

We do not mean to cast doubt on the sincerity of the men who raised these questions. The senators want to avoid war. They want to preserve both liberty and peace. But how does their hesitant attitude square with our postwar foreign policy, which is directed toward the same goal?

Despite its ups and downs, that policy has been shaped with certain unmistakable facts in view: Russia cannot hope to achieve world revolution without conquering the United States. And the United States cannot hope to preserve its freedom—except perhaps by unparallaled sacrifice—unless it helps preserve the freedom and independence of non-Communist Europe.







flammation or bursitis is a single severe injury or small repeated injuries. Kneeling for a long time may affect a bursa just above the knee. In "tennis elbow" a bursa around the elbow is involved.

Bursitis can come on suddenly and in such cases the involved cavity is likely to be swollen and to contain a fluid, the nature of which depends on the cause. Acute or subacute bursitis brings tenderness and pain. In the more chronic conditions in which the fluid develops gradually and lasts for a long time, discomfort may be entirely absent. Payment to the foreign government is made in the currency of England, francs in France, lira in Italy. These are the counterpart have no counterpart funds.

Under the ECA law and the treaties between the United States and the Marshall Plan countries, the U.S. government is given control over how these funds are spent. What this amounts to is giving the United States double value for the money it spends on European re-

covery. Same Scheme By UNRRA

There is nothing particularly new about the counterpart fund idea. To a limited extent it was used by UNRRA in its postwar relief program. Local currencies received from UNRRA supplies that were sold -as distinguished from those given away-were used to build hospitals, schools and similar relief work
