SEVENTEEN YEARS AGO this month, June Floyd went to work for the Friona Star. She had done some community correspondence, but that was about the extent of her newspaper experience.

In the intervening years, June has done just about everything there is to do with publishing a newspaper with the possible exception of running the press.

June has written news, written ads, sold advertising, kept books, addressed papers, put the papers in the mail-like we said, just about everything you can name.

The last few years, her duties have been limited to writing news of interest mainly to the women, plus funeral stories. We made a rough estimate this week and figured that June had helped with 875 weeks of the

The longtime Star employee has written up to an estimated 1,000 weddings, 2,000 birth announcements and approximately as many funeral stories. Some of those who were featured in the birth stories have now been written up in weddings.

After having written some 20,000 stories which add up to over 2,000,000 words, June leaves the Star this week. although she says she will still be doing some writing for us off

We appreciate the type of loyal service that June has given to the Star. We know that her many friends appreciate it too, and like us will miss her at the Star.

(She asked us not to make a "big deal" out of this, but for an employee who has stayed with the same job that length of time, it's kinda hard just to ignore it.)

FROM 1947 to 1973 living costs in the United States of America rose 94 percent; food went up 91 percent, and inflation irritated many people. But on the average over the same period weekly earnings rose from \$45.58 to \$140.23-an

"Fuel shortages in certain areas of Texas have already been reported by agricultural users. With thousands of vacationers soon to be on the highways the situation could become critical," Agriculture Commissioner John C. White

Commissioner White has already informed the federal Office of Oil and Gas that fuel shortages are affecting the larming industry in Texas and urged immediate compliance to federal guidelines that would assure adequate fuel supplies for Texas agriculture this year.

"All of us need to do everything we can to make certain that the vital food industry has the energy it Commissioner White needs," stated.

Consumer Services The Division gave the following advice to drivers-

Unnecessary idling, excessive low or high speeds, and quick starts and stops wastes gasoline. Coasting to a stop when possible and starting at normal or below normal speeds are other fuel savers. Braking a car to a stop from 30 miles an hour wastes two and a half times as much energy as when braking to a stop from 20 mph. From 60 mph the loss is nine times greater.

A steady speed of 50 mph is 25 per cent more economical than varying speeds from 30 to (Continued on Page 2)

Don Ballew, immediately called for assistance at the Friona Police Department, then started blocking the street at Ninth and Washington where the diesel was running like a small creek down the street.

SOME GARDEN VEGETABLES need more nitrogen than is provided by the complete fertilizer recommended for a general garden plot.

Sweet corn, okra, peppers, tomatoes, squash and greens will need additional nitrogen applications.

Any time after corn emerges from the soil, it should be sidedressed with six tablespoons of ammonium sulfate per 10 feet of row. This amount equals about 90 pounds of nitrogen per

Okra should be sidedressed after the first picking with one to two tablespoons of ammonium nitrate or three tablespoons of ammonium sulfate for every 10 feet of row

Peppers and tomatoes need a sidedressing when their first fruits are one inch in diameter. For every two feet of peppers, apply one teaspoon of ammonium nitrate or one-and-a-half teaspoons of ammonium sulfate. Apply the same amount around each tomato plant and repeat applications at three-week intervals during picking.

For squash, apply a half to one teaspoon of ammonium nitrate or two teaspoons of ammonium sulfate around each plant when runners are 12 inches long. Greens need one teaspoon of ammonium nitrate or one-and-a-half teaspoons of ammonium sulfate along every two feet of row

To avoid foliage burns, do not get fertilizer on wet plants while sidedressing.

When buying lawn fertilizer, beware of elaborate wording, labeling and packaging. Instead, check for the actual nutrient content of the fertilizer

Fancy packaging and elaborate wording can lead the homeowner to spend extra for a lawn fertilizer.

The sequence of three figures on the label indicates the percent content of the three primary fertilizer ingredients-nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium, in that order. Thus, a 12-12-12 fertilizer contains 12 percent nitrogen, 12 percent phosphate and 12 percent potassium. It is important to use a complete fertilizer at least once a year, usually in the early spring. After that, a nitrogen fertilizer such as ammonium nitrate, ammonium sulfate or urea will give good results.

When buying a nitrogen fertilizer, determine the cost per pound of nitrogen. A 50-pound bag of fertilizer that has 20 percent nitrogen contains 10 pounds of actual nitrogen (50 x .20). Divide this figure (10) into the total cost of the 50 pounds of fertilizer to obtain the cost per pound of nitrogen.

Lawn grasses need nitrogen at about six-week intervals during the growing season. Usually applying enough fertilizer to supply 2 pounds of actual nitrogen per 1000 square feet per application will give good results. This would be 6 pounds of ammonium nitrate, 10 pounds of ammonium sulfate or 5 pounds of urea. If urea is used, it should be watered immediately after

A major cause for poor lawns is inadequate nitrogen-either too little per application or a lack of repeating applications during the growing season.

WITH RECENT RAINS, water may be standing in some locations on your premises. Such standing water makes an excellent place for raising mosquitoes.

Mosquitoes lay eggs wherever water will collect and stand for a week or longer. Young mosquitoes develop only in water and prefer polluted water for breeding.

If standing water on your premises cannot be eliminated, check it weekly for mosquito larvae. If any are found, apply an insecticide spray. A spray containing 0.5 percent lindane or 0.2 percent malathion may be used as well as kerosene or fuel oil.

To prepare your own spray, mix $3\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoons of a 50 to 57 percent malathion emulsifiable concentrate to enough water, kerosene or fuel oil to make one pint of spray. Or mix 21/4 teaspoons of 20 percent lindane emulsifiable concentrate to make one pint of spray.

Spray one ounce [2 tablespoons] of one of these mixtures to each 100 square feet of water surface.

For kerosene or fuel oil at full strength, use two to four ounces to each 100 square feet of surface. Do not use kerosene

or fuel oil on water containing emergent vegetation. THAT NEXT STEAK you eat may be "rarer" than you think.

A cow produces only one calf in 12 months. The calf is weaned at six months of age and turned to pasture for another four to six months. Then it goes to a feedlot for six months to be fattened on a high grain ration. Finally, at about 1,000 to 1,100

pounds of weight, the animal is sold to a packer for slaughter. Well, at least that's a thousand pounds of beef, you say? Not by a long shot. A lot of weight from the animal is lost in slaughtering and processing. A 1,000-pound animal produces only about 48 pounds of sirloin steaks.

A 1,000-pound steer that grades "choice" will produce about 600 pounds of carcass. Take away the fat, bone and waste and only about 444 pounds of edible beef remains.

Copies of the original New Testament letters were made because the papyrus was fragile writing material. These copies of the originals in Greek were called manuscripts. We have none of the original writings of the New Testament, but many of the manuscripts have been found and are preserved.

There are two main types of manuscripts. The earliest are written in capital letters and are known as uncials. The larger group has a smaller and a running writing-style, and these are called cursives. There are about 4,500 manuscripts in all. Only a few contain the complete New Testament. The vast majority of the manuscripts are cursives, dating from the ninth to the fifteenth century. The uncials number altogether about 300. An example of how the uncial looks, using English letters

The most important uncials are known as the Vatican, the Siniatic, and the Alexandrian manuscripts. The Vatican Manuscript is located in the Vatican Library in Rome. It contains in Greek practically all of the Old and New Testaments. The Sinaitic Manuscript is named Sinaitic because it was discovered at a monastery on Mt. Sinai. It contains all of the New Testament and part of the Old Testament. The Alexandrian Manuscript came originally from Alexandria. It contains the Old and New Testaments with a few leaves missing from each. All three of these have become known since the translation of the King James Bible. Thus, one can see the importance of these manuscripts for our day. Each of the 4,500 manuscripts is an independent witness to our New Testament. NEXT WEEK-Other Manuscripts and New Testament





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
