IF YOU HAVE done any driving to speak of since the "big freeze" of a couple of weeks ago, you know how badly some of our streets and roads have been damaged by the weather.

Many streets within the city of Friona have been seriously damaged-especially at busy intersections and in low areas where the moisture was able to

Highway 60, which received a seal-coat last summer, fared pretty well, but Highway 214, which already was an obstacle course at best, now is a real health hazard.

'The sides of this road, which were crumbling and making the road more narrow all the time, now have taken a real beating.

It always has been difficult to pass cars on this highway, and now it is more than ever. About the only safe vehicles would be two motorcycles passing each other on 214.

Perhaps the city of Friona should erect a sign where the road leads south from its city limits, saying, "Danger: Travel 214 at Your Own Risk," or something similar.

I believe it was the Jaycees at Muleshoe several years ago who were instrumental in erecting a sign on that city's western edge, introducing travellers to "Killer 84." That was before the rough strip of highway between Muleshoe and Farwell was widened into a tour-lane facility. The road was responsible for many traffic deaths prior to its improvement.

The sign remained up until the road was improved. Something like this might not speed the project up any, since it is awaiting funding from the federal government, but it might make motorists who are not familiar with the road be on their toes, and perhaps prevent a serious accident.

WITHIN THE space of a month's time, the nation has lost two giants in the world of politics. And suddenly, the United States has no living ex-president.

We mourn the passing of Lyndon B. Johnson. He only had a few years to enjoy his retirement, and being just 64, should have had several more useful years.

There are those who really didn't expect LBJ to stay retired from politics. But his untimely death on Monday ended this sort of speculation.

We did not agree with all of LBJ's welfare and other "Great Society" programs, but we had to admire his tenacity in getting things done. History will probably show that he achieved more of his programs than most presidents, whether

they were good or bad. Johnson was president during one of the most trying times in our nation's history. The weight of the office bore heavy on his physical appearance. It was no doubt a wise choice for him personally to not run again in 1968. The stress might have brought the end sooner.

It is a shame that President Johnson was not permitted to live to see the end of the Vietnam conflict, which probably was the biggest regret of his political life-his inability to end the war.

LBJ was the only president or ex-president that we ever saw in person. We were about 30 yards from him a couple of years or so ago at a Texas Tech football game.

A few years earlier, we had an opportunity to visit the LBJ Ranch, through the Texas Press Association, but due to family matters, did not get to

make the weekend trip. So now he's gone-and all of those LBJ jokes are forgotten. For only the fourth time in history, our nation has no living former president.

FRIONA RESIDENTS get the rare opportunity to see some good basketball, and some really great basketball comedy Thursday night, when the Harlem Jokers visit for an

exhibition game. It's a tribute to Friona to be able to host such a group, and we hope all fun-loving people will take advantage by attending the game. Proceeds also go to a worthy cause.

With this number of cattle in feedlots, manure presents a problem at present but an opportunity for the future, Evans says.

600,000 head of cattle will produce 1,250,000 tons of manure annually. In the three county area 450,000 acres of grain sorghum is grown annually.

When these figures are put together you will find that there is only enough manure to cover the grain sorghum land once every fourth year at the rate of ten tons per acre. At the USDA Southwest





Proper use and care of appliances insures their greatest

Detailing general rules of thumb for small electrical appliances, the following is suggested--

*Always use the appliance's own electrical cord;

*Connect cord to appliance before plugging into wall;

*Don't use extension cords;

*Unplug immediately after use; *Clean after each use;

*Don't use scouring pads or cleaners on non-stick coatings; *Don't put cold water on hot griddles, saucepans or fry pans. It could cause warping;

*Store appliances under cover or keep free of dust. Other small appliances require special care tactics. These

include blenders, can openers, coffee makers, toasters and For blenders, do not overfill the jar, clean by filling with

warm detergent water and running on low speed or by removing the blades. Can openers-wipe with damp cloth, remove cutter wheel

assembly and clean occasionally. Coffee makers-empty, wash interior thoroughly, use brush for spout.

Toasters-empty crumb tray frequently, never use fork to

Waffle iron-brush grids with pastry brush; they don't require washing (the brown film helps prevent sticking). If sticking is a problem, recondition by covering grids with unsalted vegetable oil and letting them heat for about 10 minutes.

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PCA Loans Hit Record During '72

Amount of money loaned for in short and intermediate term agricultural production climbed in the area served by Plainview Production Credit Association in 1972, according to Dale L. Cary, manager of the PCA's Friona office.

Cary said his association loaned more than \$187 million to farmers and ranchers in an eight county area, an increase of almost 17 percent over the \$160 million recorded by the PCA in 1971.

Plainview PCA is one of 33 similar Texas associations which collectively in 1972 extended more than \$1 billion

credit to more than 16,500 stockholders. This was the first time in PCAs' 40-year history that the associations surpassed the \$1 billion figure in one year, Cary pointed out.

Plainview PCA makes loans in Bailey, Briscoe, Castro, Floyd, Hale, Lamb, Parmer and Swisher Counties. The organization is owned and operated by local farmers and ranchers who are memberstockholders.

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


