STATEMENT OF NON-DISCRIMINATION

"West Texas Rural Telephone Co-op. Inc. has filed with the Federal Government a Compliance Assurance in which it assures the Rural Electrification Administration that it will comply fully with all requirements of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and the Rules and Regulations of the Department of Agriculture issued thereunder, to the end that no person in the United States shall, on the ground of race, color, or national origin, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination in the conduct of its program and the operation of its facilities.

Under this Assurance, this organization is committed not to discriminate against any person on the ground of race, color or national origin in its policies and practices relating to applications for service or any other policies and practices relating to treatment of beneficiaries and participants including rates, conditions and extension of service, use of any of its facilities, attendance at and participation in any meetings of beneficiaries and participants or the exercise of any rights of such beneficiaries and participants in the conduct of the operations of this organization.

"Any person who believes himself, or any specific class of individuals, to be subjected by this organization to discrimination prohibited by Title VI of the Act and the Rules and Regulations issued thereunder may, by himself or a representative, file with the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250, or the Rural Electrification Administration, Washington, D.C. 20250, or this organization, or all, a written complaint. Such complaint must be filed not later than 90 days after the alleged discrimination, or by such later date to which the Secretary of Agriculture or the Rural Electrification Administration extends the time for filing. Identity of complainants will be kept confidential except to the extent necessary to carry out the purposes of the Rules and Regulations."

45 YEARS AGO—JANUARY 27, 1928

The members of the Friona School Board met at the school building last Saturday, with a number of architects from various cities, to consider plans and methods of enlarging the space for sheltering our school. As we understand it, the plan will provide an eight-room addition adjoining the west of the auditorium wing of the present building, forming a "T".

35 YEARS AGO—JANUARY 28, 1938

G.B. (Pete) Buske, proprietor of Buske Chevrolet and The Friona Feed & Produce, had a narrow escape from probable serious injury Wednesday, when he was charged by a "gentle" Jersey bull. In addition to his other extensive business, Mr. Buske handles a considerable amount of livestock, feeding at his feed lots at the east side of town.

30 YEARS AGO—JANUARY 22, 1943

Pvt. Guy Latta, who is stationed at Camp Beale, Calif., spent a few days here last week with his many Friona friends while enjoying a furlough.

A.W. Wood, local section foreman for the Santa Fe Railroad, and his men, were called out about 2 o'clock Monday morning, when the temperature was hovering around the zero mark, to replace a broken rail on the track. The nearest spare rail was about four miles west of town, and the broken rail about three miles east, necessitating a trip of some 14 miles in the cold morning temperatures.

25 YEARS AGO—JANUARY 23, 1948

Plans are being made now by the American Crystal Sugar Company of Rocky Ford, Colorado, to handle the yield of between six and seven thousand acres of sugar beets in the Hereford area this year. Loading dumps will be erected on the Santa Fe at Summerfield, Dawn and Umbarger, in addition to the dump at Hereford.

20 YEARS AGO—JANUARY 22, 1953

Bus schedules were resumed Wednesday morning to serve Friona for the first time in 45 days, the drivers of the New Mexico Transportation Company having gone on strike December 8.

Poles were being distributed this week along the route of the Rural Telephone Cooperative lines to be built in Parmer County, with construction now going full speed ahead to provide rural telephone service to the area around June 1.

10 YEARS AGO—JANUARY 24, 1963

Parmer County farmers and businessmen were delighted this week to learn of the final "go-ahead" for the sugar mill in Hereford. Holly Sugar Corporation of Colorado Springs announced Monday that it would begin construction of the \$18 million mill to be built three miles west of Hereford, immediately. The mill is to be completed by September 1, 1964.

Cattle Manure Termed Opportunity For Future

We hear all the time that we are in the middle of a growing cattle industry. Farmer, Deaf Smith and Castro Counties have the capacity to feed 600,000 head of cattle at one time. This is the highest concentration of cattle in the world, according to Herb Evans, SCS, Friona.

With this number of cattle in feedlots, manure presents a problem at present but an opportunity for the future, Evans says.

600,000 head of cattle will produce 1,250,000 tons of manure annually. In the three county area 450,000 acres of grain sorghum is grown annually.

When these figures are put together you will find that there is only enough manure to cover the grain sorghum land once every fourth year at the rate of ten tons per acre.

At the USDA Southwest

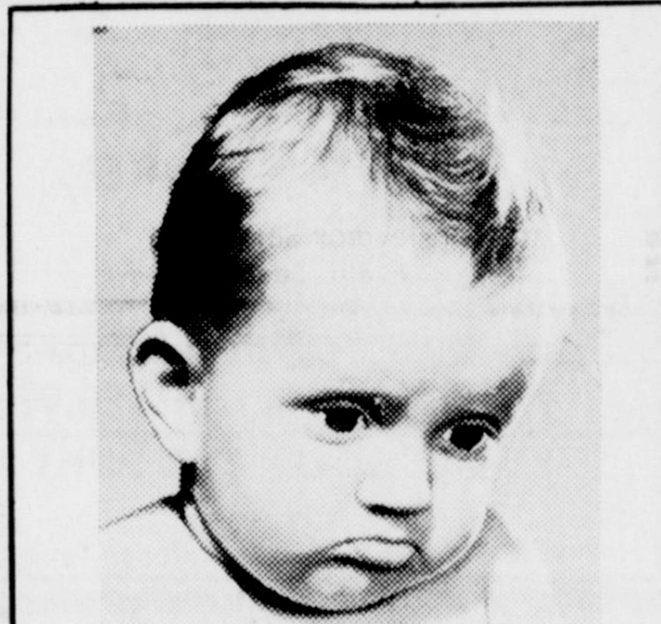
Great Plains Research Center at Bushland last week, researchers brought out the fact that ten tons of manure annually is a very satisfactory application rate.

"So you see rather than being a problem," says Evans, "The fact of having only a quarter enough manure to go around is the prospect for the near future."
