

ACCIDENT AT SHAMROCK

Friona Youth Killed, Three Are Injured

Funeral services are pending at Parsons-Ellis Funeral Home for Agapito Alvarez Jr., 19, who lost his life following a one car accident near Shamrock early Sunday morning.

Three other Friona youths were in the vehicle which rolled several times after going out of control on a service road of Interstate 40.

Two of the four youths in the vehicle were released from hospitals Monday. Released were Alfred Alfredo Pedroza, 14 who was released from Shamrock General Hospital and Rodolfo Moreno Corella, 19, released from High Plains Baptist Hospital in Amarillo.

Listed in fair condition in Shamrock General Hospital is Steve Raymond Jr., 17, who was the driver of the vehicle

which went out of control four miles east of Shamrock. Raymond is being treated for head and chest injuries. He had been thrown approximately 10 feet from the car which was found one-eighth of a mile out in a field after rolling several times.

MISSSES CURVE

DPS investigating officers who initially discovered the accident around 5 a.m. Sunday said the Raymond car failed to negotiate a curve on the eastbound service road of Interstate 40. The car had apparently struck a soft spot in an open field and overturned. Officers found skid marks and a fence torn down where the accident occurred. They discovered Corella and Pedroza

near the road in a state of shock. Alvarez was lying approxi-

mately 100 feet from the auto where he had been thrown from (Continued on Page 7)

Two-Day Rains Total .98 - More Is Expected

Rainfall during the past two days has brought the total moisture for the year in Friona to 5.80, which is 5.65 above the amount recorded through April 1972.

For the month of April to date, 2.20 has been recorded by weatherman Jake Outland, as compared to only a trace in 1972.

The high temperature was April 24, when the high mark

was 77 with a low for the month of 16 on April 8 when a blizzard sneaked into the area.

January's amount was .69 this year, compared to .06 last year, with February's total also being .69, compared to 0 at the same time last year. March of this year was a good month for moisture with 2.22 being recorded as compared to .09 during March last year.

Continued rain through the weekend has been predicted by the National Weather Service.

For the same time period in 1972, the city had measured less than an inch officially.

Vandalism Lead Fizzles

Friona Police Chief Bill Denney said the initial lead in last Monday night's extensive vandalism of Friona High School has 'fizzled out' and 'we have to start over.'

The chief said intensive investigation has proven fruitless but local officers are spending extra time working on the vandalism case which has been termed 'vicious and thoroughly malicious.'

He expressed optimism in clearing the vandalism which left Friona High School offices a shambles to be found by janitors early Tuesday, April 17.

School superintendent Alton Farr said Monday that there was no estimate as yet as to how much the damage will cost to repair. At this time, workmen are replacing broken glass and five doors have been ordered to replace broken office doors. Parts for the vault door in his office have been ordered and are expected to be replaced as soon as possible.

Also, three chairs and a couch will have to be re-upholstered to repair slashed covers during the vandals' rampage.

"This is the first time a school has been damaged in Friona since I have been here to the extent Friona High School has been damaged during the past week," commented the superintendent.

Both the police chief and the superintendent were puzzled as to the intent of the vandals in taking the two American flags and the Texas flag.

Investigation is continuing this week by the Friona Police Department and the Parmer County Sheriff's office into the extensive vandalism of the high school last week.

REC Annual Meet Slated Thursday

The 35th annual meeting of the Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative, Inc., patrons and their families is scheduled for Thursday of this week, April 26, at Hereford's Bull Barn.

Deaf Smith REC serves the rural areas of Parmer, Deaf Smith, Castro and Oldham counties.

A free barbecue meal will be one of the highlights of the yearly session with serving to begin at noon, according to James Hull, manager of the cooperative.

Registration begins at 11

a.m. Prizes will be awarded at a drawing that afternoon.

Election of members of the board of directors will be during the afternoon business session. Sloan Osborn of Friona is running for re-election as Parmer County's representative.

Osborn is currently president of the association. Melvin Sachs is the other nominee for Parmer County. Running for a position as Castro County's representative are Noel Gollehon and Al Gibbs. Tom Draper is the nominee from Deaf Smith County.

Wind Damage Heavy In Thursday Storm

A whistling cold front slammed through the Friona area Thursday bringing with it wind to 75 miles per hour, dust-laden sky and widespread damage.

Many homes received roof damage when the hard, straight wind lifted shingles, especially asphalt shingled roofs. A common sight Friday were repairmen spotted on roofs throughout the area replacing and nailing down loose shingles.

Receiving the most damage in Friona during the storm was a metal and wood elevator near the railroad tracks on Highway 214. Thursday morning a portion of the elevator toppled spreading debris across the railroad right of way and completely blocking the elevator sidetrack.

Splintered lumber, twisted metal and pipes were blown down the elevator property and scattered in a large area.

The elevator, which was formerly Continental Grain, then Goodpasture Elevator is now under contract to purchase by the Friona Wheat Growers and is across the highway from the larger elevator.

Arthur Drake, manager of Friona Wheat Growers, said the elevator was scheduled for demolition as soon as the contract was fulfilled, as it has been leaning precariously since a June 11, 1971 storm.

The former Continental Grain is one of the oldest elevators in Parmer County and was long considered a landmark in the area.

At least one mobile home was knocked off its blocks by the high winds. The home, which is located in a trailer park, shifted during the high wind and although it did not overturn, blew off the concrete tile blocks levelling it and leaned precariously for some time.

National Postal Week Observation Scheduled

Friona Postmaster Wright Williams announced plans for "Postal Week" to be celebrated here April 29 through May 5.

"On April 30, the Friona Post Office will highlight this observance with activities that dramatize the important roles performed by postal people as they move the mails," commented the postmaster.

On Monday, April 23, Friona Mayor Raymond Fleming signed a proclamation, designating the special week to honor employees of the Postal Service.

Postmaster General E.T. Klassen said the Postal Week observances are "an appropriate occasion for recognition of the vital responsibilities assigned to the mail service and a valid time to take stock of the challenges which must be jointly met by postal people and by the millions of citizens throughout America who depend upon the mail as an essential part of their personal and business lives."

As part of the observance, the Friona Post Office will join with the nation's 31,000 other post offices in issuing 10 special stamps honoring postal employees.

The Friona Post Office will mark the occasion with a special First-Day-of-Issue observance, simultaneous with similar ceremonies to be held in Washington by Postmaster General Klassen.

Ten new Postal People stamps will be placed on sale here in conjunction with the local observance.

Postmaster Williams also said that customers attending the Friona "Postal People Day" observance at the local post office on April 30 will be given free souvenir envelopes.

The souvenir envelopes, to be available on a limited quantity 'first come' basis at the post office, will be imprinted or 'cacheted.'

In addition the Postmaster said a quantity of cacheted envelopes will be prepared in advance bearing all 10 Postal People Stamps. These 'first day' covers, as they are known to collectors, will be post-marked by hand with the local post office postmark and will be sold for only the actual charge for the ten stamps, or 80 cents, as long as they last.

Spring Forward - Get Up An Hour Earlier!

Congratulations! All you lucky people can 'Spring Forward' and get up an hour earlier to enjoy the early morning sunrise as of Sunday, April 29 at 2 a.m.

That is the time designated to turn your clocks forward one hour to begin Daylight Savings Time for the summer.

Since most people have no desire to be fumbling around with clocks at 2 in the morning, it has become a standing practice to change the clocks

before retiring for the night on Saturday before the time change.

A highly controversial issue, which delights farmers and is the despair of drive-in theatre operators, almost all states now conform to the twice-a-year time change.

The next time change will be the last Sunday in October when once again, clocks will revert to Central Standard Time and you can 'Fall Back' into an extra hour of sleep.

Farwell Little Dribblers Sweep Tournament Win

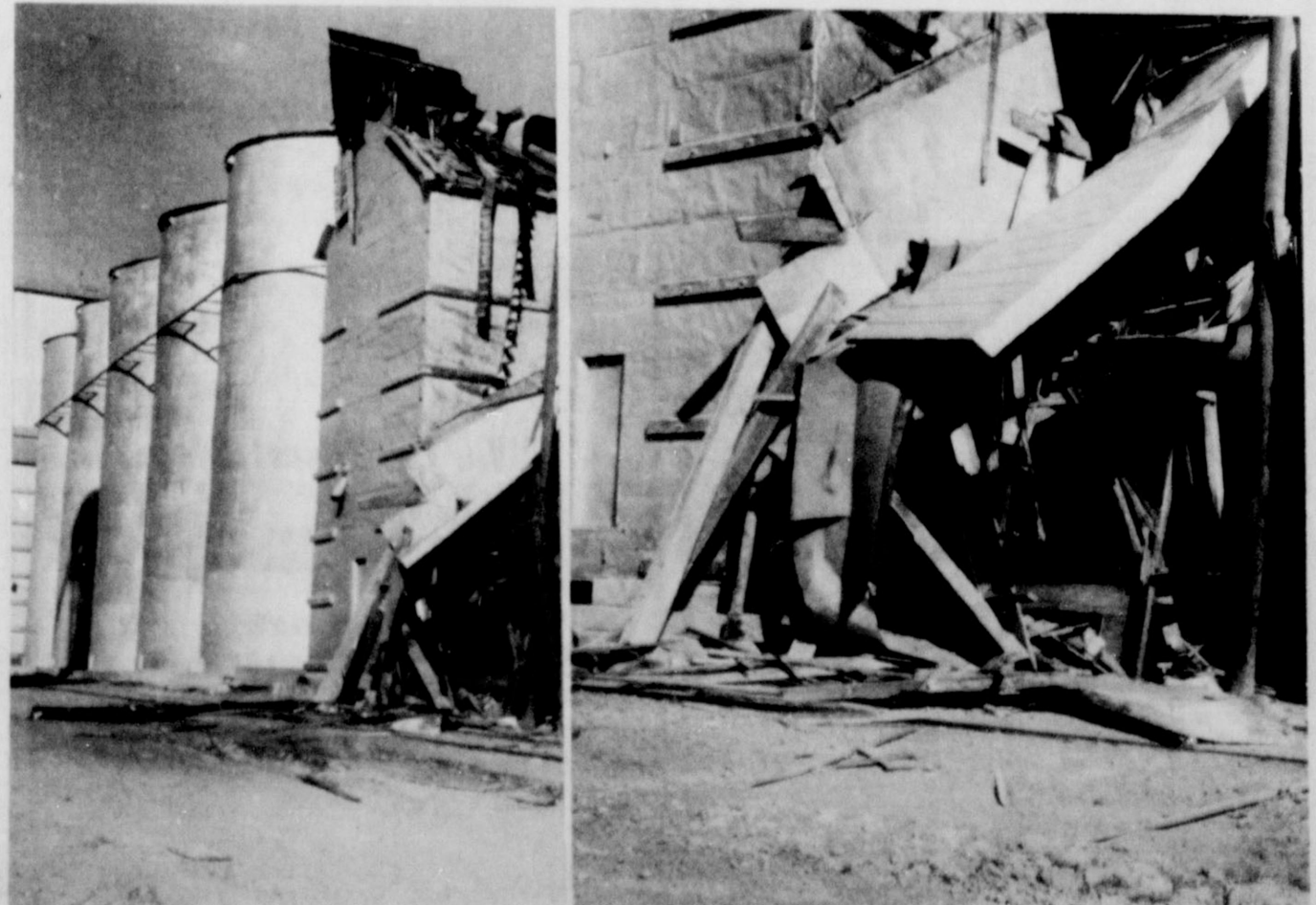

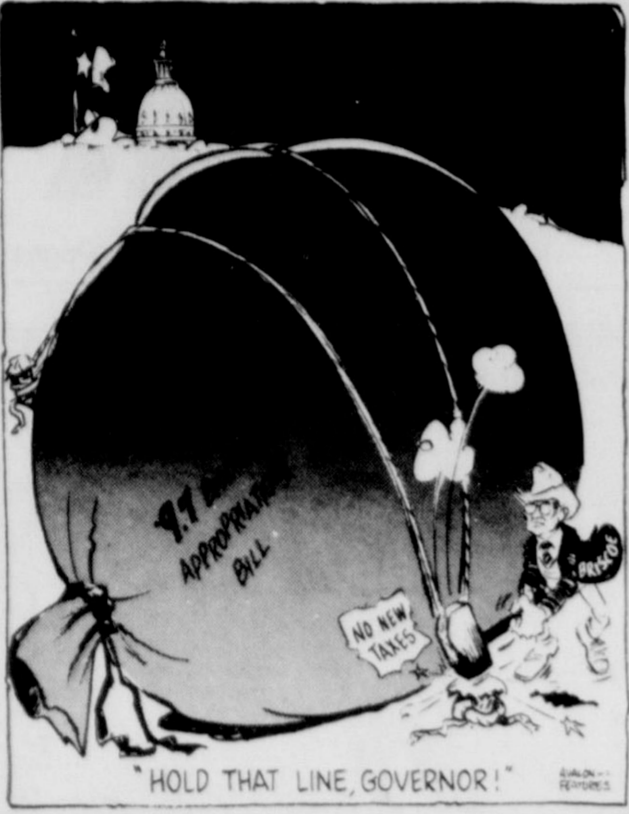
The National Tournament will be held in Levelland this week.

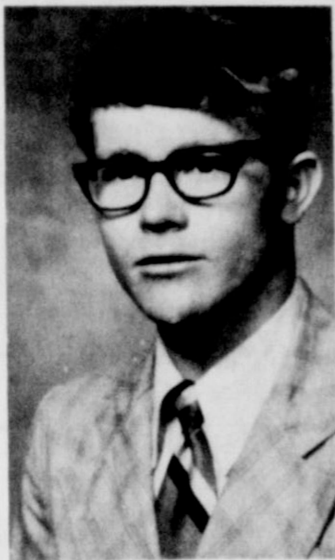
Hamiltons Purchase Resturant


A called meeting of the Parmer County Planned Parenthood Committee has been slated for 7:30 p.m. Tuesday at the Bovina Neighborhood Center.

STEADY DATING—whether it's wise or otherwise—depends on the maturity of the couple involved.

Although there's no universally accepted definition, 'going steady' is considered an understanding between boy and girl to date one another regularly and exclusively.

A generation gap between parents and teens may exist when it comes to steady dating—mainly due to the differing views.

Contemporary steady dating—a new type of dating relationship—is an invention of the modern era. It no longer corresponds to the marriage-oriented going steady pattern of earlier decades, and yet it's not random dating either. It combines two types of relationships—casual involvement in nonmarriage-oriented steady dating with other partners taboo.

Parents sometimes have difficulty grasping one-to-one

steady dating since random dating was preferred by their generation. At that time a teen's popularity was largely based on number of boy or girl friends, with some qualifications, of course.

Parents should also realize that steady dating doesn't necessarily lead to marriage.

Whereas engagement usually leads to marriage, steady dating isn't supposed to lead to anything—it's an end in itself. Although some steady relations do eventuate in matrimony, most begin without marriage in mind.

According to an Extension Family Life specialist, chief motivators for going steady are a sense of insecurity and escape from competition or pressures from society.

On the other hand, a steady relationship has its limitations. It limits the variety of friendships while it narrows the choice of a marriage partner. In addition, it may lead to marriage by default—that is, the couple is expected to marry because they went steady so long.

Steady dating also may limit social activities—and cause the couple to become so involved with each other that little else matters.

Other hazards involve partners being "taken for granted," too much intimacy or too early marriage.

Bug Meeting Set Tonight At Bovina

The regularly scheduled meeting of Senior Citizens of Friona will be held in Union Congregational Church Friday.

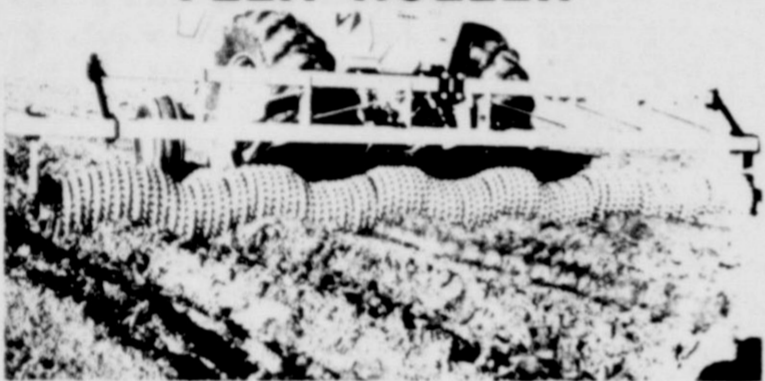

Tornado Tips Given

With the advent of tornado season in the area, Friona Fire Chief Ralph Shirley, who also coordinates weather watches in the area, along with the Friona Police Department, has issued a few tornado tips.

These tips are being passed along to the general public along with the tornado warning system for the City of Friona.

TORNADO SIGNAL

The tornado warning signal in Friona is one long, continuous blast on the siren. The long blast will be repeated as long and as much as necessary in the event a tornado is spotted approaching the city. In the event of such a long blast, the fire chief suggests that you seek immediate shelter in a pre-determined location, and as near your home as possible. In most instances, there is no time to be looking too far for shelter, added the fire chief.

An all-clear signal is a series of short interval blasts on the siren.

WEATHER SIGNS

Tornado weather signs include a hot, sticky day, with southerly winds, and a dark, threatening sky. The thunderstorm clouds appear topsy-turvy, bulging down instead of up. Such days frequently appear without tornadoes. The

'twister' itself is easily recognized by the funnel-shaped cloud, spinning rapidly and extending toward the earth from the base of a thundercloud.

Generally, an approaching tornado can be detected partially by its sound; a noise similar to a giant blowtorch, which can be heard up to 25 miles away. Close up, it roars like a jet aircraft.

SAFETY RULES

General safety rules are as follows—

I-If you are near a tornado cellar—

When time permits, go to a tornado cellar, cave or underground excavation which should have an air outlet to help equalize the air pressure. It should be kept fit for use free from water, gas or debris; and preferably equipped with pick and shovel. There is no universal protection against tornadoes except underground excavations.

II-If you are in the open country—

(1)-Move at right angles to the tornadoes' path. Tornadoes usually move forward at about 25 to 40 miles per hour.

(2)-If there is no time to escape, lie flat in the nearest depression such as a ditch or ravine.

III-If in a city or town—

(1)-Seek inside shelter, preferably in a strongly reinforced building. Stay away from windows. There are probably more injuries from flying glass during tornadoes than from any other cause.

(2)-In homes—The corner of the basement toward the tornado usually offers greatest safety, particularly in frame houses. People in houses without basements can sometimes be protected by taking cover under heavy furniture against inside walls. Doors and windows on the sides of the house away from the tornado may be opened to reduce damage to the building.

(3)-Standing against the inside wall on a lower floor of an office building offers some protection.

SCHOOL SAFETY

IV-If in schools—

(1)-In city areas—If school building is of strongly reinforced construction, stay inside, away from windows, remain near an inside wall on the lower floors when possible. Avoid auditoriums and gymnasiums with large, poorly-supported roofs.

(2)-In rural schools that do not have strongly reinforced construction, remove children and teachers to a ravine or

ditch if storm shelter is not available.

V-If in factories and industrial plants—

On receiving tornado warning, a lookout should be posted to keep safety officials advised of the tornado's approach. Advance preparation should be made for moving workers to sections of the plant offering the greatest protection.

VI-Keep calm. It will not help to get excited. People have been killed by running out into the streets and by turning back into the path of a tornado. Even though a warning is issued, chances of a tornado striking one's home or location are very slight. Tornadoes cover such a small zone, as a rule, that relatively, only a few places in a warned area are directly affected. You should know about tornadoes though, just in case.

VII-Keep tuned to your radio or television station for latest information. Do not call the Weather Bureau or your local police department except to report a tornado, as your individual request may be tying up telephone lines urgently needed to receive special reports or to relay advisories to radio and television stations for dissemination to thousands in the critical area.

Does hell really exist? Or, is hell simply a place which preachers have created to frighten people? The real existence of hell is irrefutably taught in scripture. It is both a place for the wicked dead and a condition of punishment for unredeemed man.

The nature of hell is indicated by the repeated reference to everlasting punishment [Matt. 25:46]; everlasting fire [Matt. 18:8]; everlasting chains [II Thess. 1:8]; the eternal fire [Jude 7]; the pit of the abyss [Rev. 9:2, 11]; outer darkness [Matt. 8:12]; second death [Rev. 21:8]; and eternal destruction from the face of God [II Thess. 1:9].

The duration of hell is indicated in the word "everlasting." Our present age is always contrasted with the age to come. This world is temporal, while the future age is endless. In every reference in which "everlasting" applies to the future punishment of the wicked, it indisputably denotes endless duration.

Hell is, therefore, a condition of punishment, and a place in which that punishment occurs. Hell represents an absence of righteousness, a separation from God, and judgment against man's sinful nature.

Thus, hell is no fantasy created by preachers to scare people. It is a reality for those who die in their sins. Hell is not a very pleasant place to think about--but all of us better think about it.

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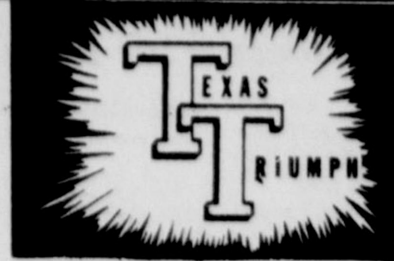
