

OVER \$50,000 PLEDGED

Fund Drive Now Stands \$43,635

Contributions to the Community Center-Showbarn slowed down considerably during the past week, after the initial "big push."

According to a tabulation late Tuesday by Jerry Hinkle of Friona State Bank, the total amount on deposit for the fund stood at \$43,635.15.

This was up by only \$2,035.00 over the amount reported last week. The total on deposit amounts to 58.5 per cent of the drive goal of \$75,000.00.

Hinkle indicated that there was an additional \$7,000 in solid pledges, that would be eventually received. The pledge amount, if added to the actual amount on deposit, would boost the fund past the \$50,000-mark, to \$50,635.15. Among the checks received during the past week was one for \$1,000 from the Friona (Evening) Lions Club.

CAN BUILD

It was estimated that with the amount already on deposit plus that which has been pledged, the actual building of the 100x150 foot structure can be accomplished. However, it is felt that the remainder of the \$5,000 will be needed to build the community center-showbarn like it needs to be, plus provide some paving and landscaping.

Hinkle said he had heard that the Farwell group had raised around \$3,000 of its established goal of \$5,000, but that the report was not official.

Carrol Gatlin and Redge Priest, co-chairmen of the fund-raising drive, said they were still optimistic that the drive would reach the projected goal.

"We are proceeding with the idea that we will make the goal," Gatlin said. He indicated that within the next week to ten days the organization should be in a position to ask for bids on the project.

The officials say they welcome any and all ideas residents have in regard to the building, and will consider all suggestions that are made.

Clayton Warns Of Future Water Crisis

Texas and the Texas Legislature are beginning to get prepared to make better use of land and water, Representative Bill Clayton told more than 80 persons attending the 11th annual West Texas Water Conference meeting in Lubbock last Friday.

Clayton was luncheon speaker at the closing session of the meeting sponsored by the West Texas Water Institute, a group of more than 30 organizations interested in water.

Clayton also told the meeting of current water and water conservation bills before the Legislature and projected bills for the future.

"We're going to have one of the biggest usable water shortages the country has ever faced...one which will make the energy crisis seem like a baby," said Clayton. "We must make people aware of this possibility and work to prevent or lessen it," he said.

The luncheon was highlighted by the presentation of a plaque of appreciation to Mrs. Ann Miller, widow of Dr. William D. Miller, chairman of the West Texas Water Institute at the time of his death, and the election of Institute officers for 1973.

Dr. J. Rex Johnston of the Agricultural Research Service of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, Bushland, presented the plaque to Mrs. Miller. Johnston called the plaque a "tribute to a friend and colleague." It was presented in appreciation for the leadership and service to Dr. Miller in furthering goals of the

Institute.
 At the time of his death, Miller was also chairman of the Department of Geosciences at Texas Tech University. Miller held bachelor and master of science degrees from Texas Tech and a doctorate from the University of Missouri.

Institute officers for 1973 elected were—Dr. Anson R. Bertrand, dean of the College of Agricultural Sciences at Texas Tech, chairman; Dr. George McBee, director of the Texas A&M University Research and Extension Center at Lubbock, co-chairman; Dr. Bob Stewart, director of the Southwestern Great Plains Research Center at Bushland, vice president for research; and Dr. Charles Smallwood, dean of agriculture at West Texas State University, vice president for education.

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New Travel Map To Benefit Tourists

To help nomadic vacationers, as well as other Texas motorists, the Texas Highway Department will begin distribution of one million copies of the 1973 Official Texas Highway Travel Map in incremental stages beginning in late February. The map is free. Urban dwellers particularly are hitting the road for traveling vacations and three day weekends. People in campers, tent trailers and mobile homes are in search of quiet and an unspoiled spot of nature.

Camping vacationers will find this new map a treasury of information for their travels. In addition to helping with route selection, the map has charts that indicate specific distances between various major areas in the State and the location of the 69 State parks.

The State parks listing includes specific information of importance to campers planning a vacation itinerary. The parks are indexed to describe recreational, scenic or historic sites, with additional indexing for those parks equipped for overnight stops.

3 NEW LAKES

New information available on the 1973 map includes the location of three new lakes. Lake Kiowa in Cooke County near the Red River, Lake Conroe between Houston and Huntsville, and Lake Anahuac near the Gulf Coast between Houston and Beaumont, all should be of interest to vacationers.

And, for those travelers attempting to cover many miles in one stretch, the new map pinpoints an additional 26 new safety rest areas and six new comfort stations to offer a welcome reprieve from tedious driving.

Also, 79 miles of new Interstate and 96 miles of new State and U.S. divided-highways have been added to the map, making it easier for travelers to plan the most convenient routes.

For instance, IH 10 now is open from the East Texas border in Orange, through Houston and San Antonio into the Hill Country near Kerrville. The beautiful Texas Hill

Country, always a major tourist attraction, is expected to attract a larger share of campers and other travelers as they visit the birthplace and the family cemetery where the late President Lyndon B. Johnson is buried.

LBJ RANCH

The location of the famous LBJ Ranch is highlighted to help those travelers specifically interested in seeing the homestead of the late President.

For those tourists interested in going into Mexico, the map also outlines various toll bridges and free crossings. To help those tourists coming into Texas from Mexico there is a handy table for converting kilometers to miles and liters to gallons.

And for those tourists who wish more help in planning their travels in Texas, the map pinpoints the Highway Department's tourist information bureaus and the Judge Roy Bean Visitor Center near Langtry.

Copies of the free map can be obtained at these information bureaus and the visitor center as well as at the visitor center located in the State Capitol in Austin.

More conveniently, the maps can be ordered by the use of post cards available at county tax offices during the 1973 motor vehicle registration season.

The map also may be ordered directly by sending name, address, and ZIP code to the Texas Highway Department, Travel and Information Division, P.O. Box 5064, Austin, Texas 78763.

ANSWER: No, since Al is probably strictly a cash basis taxpayer he must report his income in the year received and take his deductions in the year paid. It would probably be a simple matter for him to amend his 1971 return by filing a form 1040X, claim his additional deduction and receive a greater refund. He has three years in which to do this.

"Outdoor Classrooms" Offer New Perspective

If you see students planting trees on a school campus or catching frogs from a miniature pond, don't panic.

They are probably studying nature in an outdoor classroom-a new concept in environmental education.

"At last count, we had helped plan and install some 343 outdoor learning areas in Texas," said Edward E. Thomas of Temple, state conservationist for the U.S. Soil Conservation Service. "And the number grows every week, especially in the larger cities."

Thomas said SCS assistance includes soil and plant adaptation guidelines, planning erosion control measures, laying out nature trails, identifying plants, designing small water holding areas for aquatic studies, and other technical help.

A recent survey revealed that nearly 900 individual schools plus 48 school districts are using the 343 outdoor classrooms. Some 1,700 other groups from Boy Scouts to adult organizations to convalescent hospital patients also use the areas.

Learning features used in outdoor classrooms include soil and water conservation examples, plant and animal identification, historical studies, and aquatic life. Some areas also double as outdoor laboratories.

A total of 728 groups and organizations are helping schools install and maintain learning areas in Texas. These range from the American Association of University Women to parent-teacher organizations to a radio station.

Thomas said SCS first became involved in outdoor learning areas by helping schools cure campus erosion problems. Then someone suggested that letting students help install some of the

conservation measures would be an excellent learning experience. From that came the idea that trees, grass, and shrubbery could be added to beautify the conservation measures or to attract wildlife. Eventually, the idea of installing complete outdoor environmental learning areas evolved.

Students enjoy planning and installing the classrooms themselves over a period of months or years, Thomas said. This also enhances the learning experience, helping students gain a deep appreciation of the interrelationship between man, plants, soil, water, animals and sunshine.

Uses of outdoor classrooms varies, depending upon the ingenuity of the teacher. Some biology classes study microscopic growth in tiny ponds built on the school campus; chemistry classes conduct soil and water related experiments; math classes compute slope and elevation or estimate tree heights; and language art classes write articles or poems based on outdoor sounds or observations.

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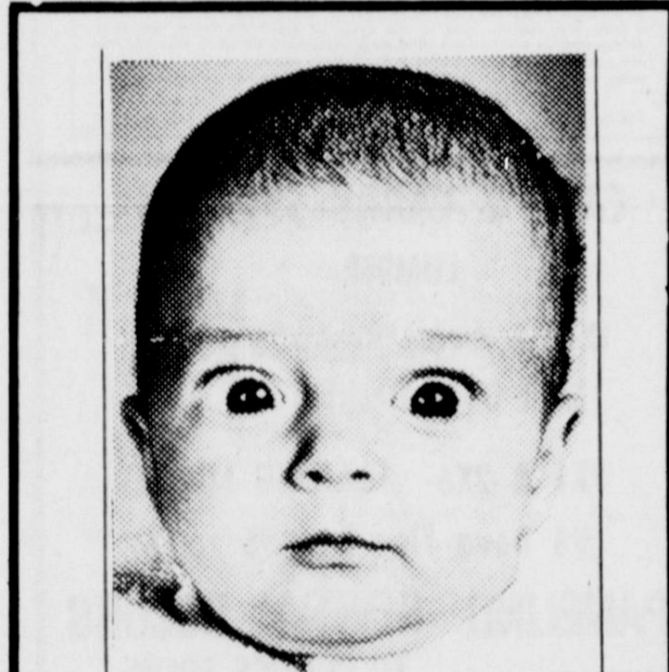

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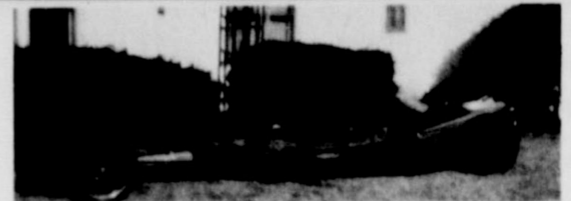

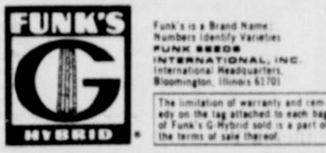

Controversial Bills To Be Debated In Austin

The true liberal-conservative split will probably surface in the House of Representatives this week, State Representative Bill Clayton stated today. Representative Clayton said that bills will likely be up for debate which will show the

"philosophical indication," or the difference in the way the two elements of the House think about certain issues.

The so-called "reform" bills have brought differences of opinion, Clayton said, but added that some legislators were committed to reform regardless of whether or not they were workable or in the best interest of the citizenry.

Clayton, who spoke to both the West Texas Water Institute in Lubbock and the Texas and Southwest Cattle Raisers Association in San Antonio last week, noted that the legislative calendar was crowded, with controversial issues beginning to surface this week.

Clayton's bill to provide Texas with a "truth in lending" section to the consumer credit act is due to be debated in the House this week, along with his resolution requesting the Commissioner of Agriculture to make a study of our present branding laws and those of our neighboring states.

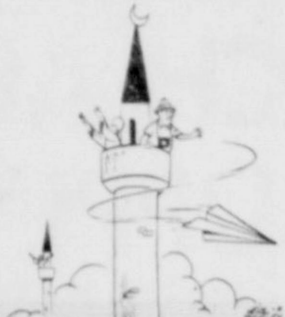

As with all new jobs, it takes time to learn the ropes. After several years of watching the performance of elected officials, we have come to the conclusion that those that exercise the most restraint at the beginning of their terms have been most effective in the long run."

ARE CATTLE FEEDLOTS a major contributor to America's growing pollution problem?

The answer is an emphatic "NO" in the opinions of Dr. Myron Paine and Dr. John Sweeten, who both have a good understanding of the situation.

Paine is located at Oklahoma State University and is a regional Extension Service feedlot waste management specialist serving a six-state area of the Southern Great Plains. Sweeten is an agricultural engineer in animal waste management for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University.

With some 25.5-million cattle fed in lots across the nation annually, and each animal producing about a ton of manure, the potential for waste management problems is there. But one very real reason why a mammoth problem has not been created is simply good public relations on the part of the operators.

Most operators keep the manure moved out as a matter of animal health. After they move out a load of cattle, they clean the pen. However, this soon results in a huge pile of manure, and here is the problem.

According to the specialists, most feedlot operators have solved this problem by developing close working relationships with local farmers.

They have convinced farmers to take the manure on the basis that it is valuable fertilizer. Some farmers are even paying as much as \$2 a ton. But in areas where the farmers are not convinced of the fertilizer value, private deals to move the manure have been worked out in many ways.

Another reason the pollution potential of feedlots has not been reached and unlikely ever will is that only a small percentage—research shows only about 2 percent—of the solids reach a stream.

If that total of 25.5-million tons produced annually went directly into a sewage system—as do human wastes—the effect would be devastating.

Actually, one human contributes 10 times as much toward water pollution as one feedlot animal.

The specialists feel conflicting and misleading statements have posed an out-of-focus view of feedlots in the overall ecology picture.

If all the animal wastes from one animal fell directly into a stream, that one animal would equal 16 persons in pollution contribution. But the actual fact is that manure falls on land and it's 85 percent water. This evaporates and the only way the manure gets into the public water stream is in case of a rainfall in excess of one inch. Then, we might get runoff into the stream.

Most of the Southern Great Plains states now have laws requiring feedlots to have a system of runoff retention structures. About 90 percent of the cattle fed in Oklahoma are in lots that are in compliance with this law, and 95 percent of Texas feedlots with a capacity of 1,000 head or more are in compliance or moving toward compliance.

On the federal level, guidelines are being established by the Environmental Protection Agency relating to feedlot pollution protection. A new federal water quality law will prohibit the discharge of pollutants into water courses by 1985.

All in all, Paine and Sweeten feel the feedlot operators of the Great Plains are doing a good job of housekeeping. "They're producing beef, not pollution."

IT'S TORNADO TIME IN TEXAS...

Recent tornadoes in various areas of the state attest to the grim fact that tornado season is here once again.

And virtually every county is a potential target for the devastating "twisters" that can develop rapidly with the "right" weather conditions. That's why everyone should be familiar with safety precautions for tornadic conditions. Prompt action can mean the difference between life and death....

Thunderstorm clouds often signal tornadic conditions. Tornadoes generally move from a westerly direction, traveling from 25 to 40 miles an hour. Most tornadoes occur between 3 and 7 p.m. but have occurred at all hours.

If turbulent weather conditions prevail, keep tuned to a local radio or television station to receive the latest weather information. Do not call the Weather Bureau except to report a tornado.

Once a tornado warning is sounded, seek shelter as soon as possible. A cellar, basement, or underground excavation provides the best protection from a tornado. The most dangerous places during a tornado are near windows in or near

Conservationists Study Blowing Sand Problem

Sand doesn't blow in town because most of the area is paved. Wait a minute—anybody that has been in town when the wind was blowing during the last few months knows better than that.

There has been a lot of sand blowing in town lately. Where does it come from—neighboring fields? Not likely—most farmers are aware of the hazards of blowing soil and are equipped to prevent this from happening. The blowing sand has to come from town itself.

Bare lawns, vacant lots, and building sites are the culprits. These areas are not hopeless. They can be protected and at the same time be made more attractive.

Grass is a tremendous weapon against traveling soil, but grass is only one answer. There are many solutions. Friona and Bovina in Parmer County have recognized this problem and have requested assistance from the local environmental specialist, the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District.

Individuals in town and in the country are also encouraged to contact the District through the Soil Conservation Service in Friona for assistance in controlling wind erosion.

parked cars, and in auditoriums, gymnasiums, house trailers and tall office buildings.

If driving in a car, move at right angles to the path of the storm. If there is no time to escape and no underground shelter is available, lie flat in the nearest depression, such as a ditch or ravine.

If you're in a home or other building without a cellar or basement, seek cover under heavy furniture against inside walls. Open doors and windows on the sides of the building away from the tornado to help equalize air pressure and reduce damage to the building.

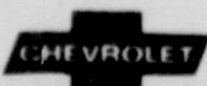

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region #5 for February, 1973 shows a total of 380 accidents, resulting in ten persons killed and 173 persons injured, as compared to February, 1972 with 478 accidents, resulting in 15 persons killed and 233 persons injured. This was 98 less accidents, five less fatalities, and 60 less injuries in 1973 at the same period of time.

Everywhere he casts his eye he'll see a job to do; a plant to stake, a weed to pull, a bed to plan anew.

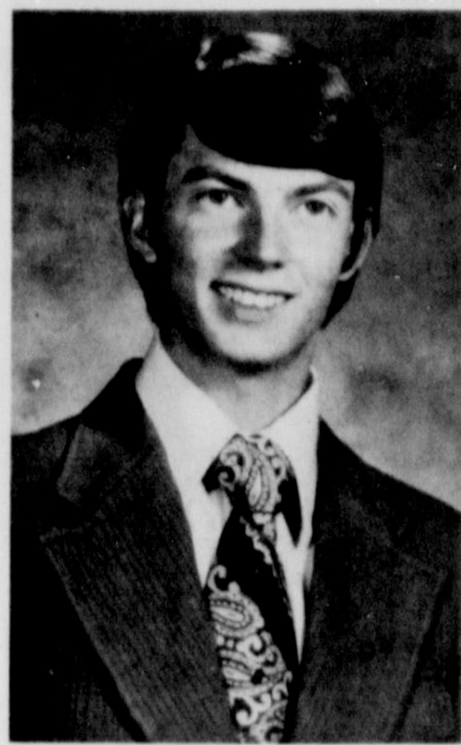
Next year's garden to design in colors bright and bold. A dream to dream when winter comes, a lovely hope to hold.

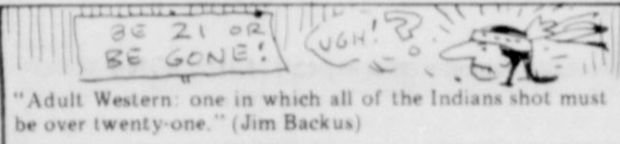

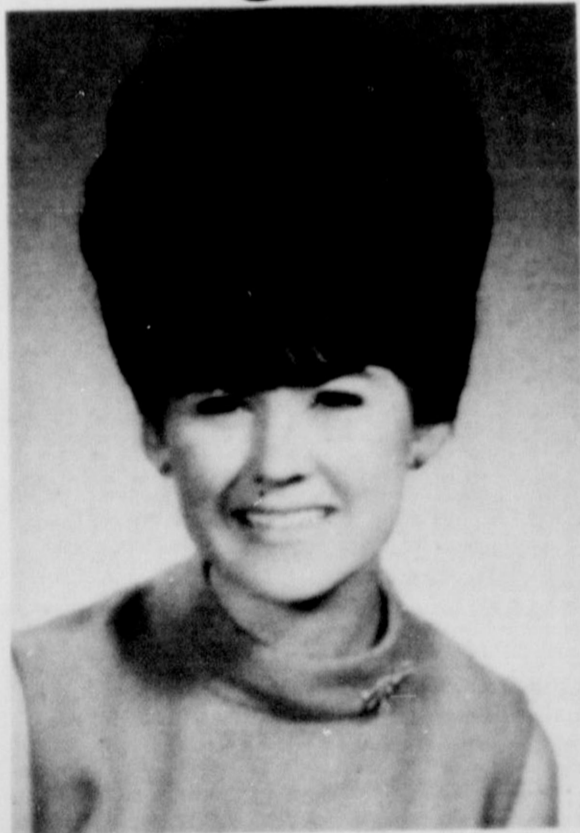

Our reason for meeting together is to remember his sacrifice on Calvary. This is most vividly accomplished by observing the Lord's Supper.

Lutherans believe in and place great emphasis on the two sacraments, Holy Baptism and the Lord's Supper. A sacrament-1) is a sacred or holy act which God instituted for us in the Scriptures, 2) has God's Word connected with it to show us we are sinners and to bring us to faith in Jesus, 3) has something which can be seen, for example, water, 4) is one of God's ways of giving us the forgiveness of sins and power to life His life.

WHY IS HOLY BAPTISM SO IMPORTANT? Psalm 51 and John 3 state clearly that every human being is born as a sinner-one who is separated from God. Baptism FORGIVES us our sins-Acts 2, "Repent and be baptized, everyone of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of sins." Baptism also GIVES FAITH and unites us with Christ-Galathians 3, "You are all children of God by faith in Christ Jesus. For as many of you as have been baptized into Christ have put on Christ." Baptism SAVES us from sin and gives us LIFE with God forever-I Peter 3, "Baptism does also now save us."

ROMANS 6. When Jesus died we died to sin with Him, when He was buried so were we, and when He rose from the grave we were given the new life with God-because we are united into Christ's death and resurrection in baptism.

INFANTS. We baptize infants because they are part of the "all nations" of Matthew 28 and because baptism is not dependent on faith-rather in baptism the Holy Spirit gives faith according to Acts 2.

HOW? That's not important and God gives us no specific directive. "Baptize" in the Greek language means to wash; so baptism is a washing away of our sins (Acts 22:16).

WE ARE GOD'S CHILDREN. In baptism God puts His brand on us and claims us as His own. That means we get the benefit of all that God has done for us.

Friday Deadline For 1973 Auto Registrations

Townsley said many county tax officers had expressed concern that the pace of registration this year has slowed markedly. "It looks as if a great many vehicle owners are putting registration off to the last minute," he said.

Even though the easy, computerized registration system has speeded the registration process in the last few years, if too many owners wait until the last minute, long waits in long lines at county tax offices and substations seem inevitable.
