

FOR A FAIRLY small town (population 3875-Bill Ellis estimate, 1973), Friona will be a bustling place come this weekend.

No less than three major activities are scheduled for the upcoming end of the week, and all of them have the potential of bringing even more people into our midst.

THE FRIONA JUNIOR Rodeo will kick off the activities, with a parade down the city's Main Street Friday afternoon preceding the first performance Friday night.

Over 100 participants are guaranteed in the junior rodeo, which has drawn entrants from all across this section of the state, as well as from a number of New Mexico towns.

The Friona Riding Club is to be commended upon the work it has done the last few years. The Club purchased the rodeo arena from the old Jaycee organization, and has put in a ton of man-hours working on the arena, and getting it back in shape.

Now, after an absence of a few years, youngsters from across the area will once again have the opportunity of competing against their peers in the junior rodeo.

Friends and parents of the participants will undoubtedly swell the city's population well above the 4,000-mark for this weekend. Motels, restaurants and grocery stores should benefit from the extra traffic.

NEXT ON THE agenda will be the annual Partnership tournament at Friona Country Club. Golf Pro Cotton Renner says over 128 golfers are expected to enter the tournament, from as far away as Oklahoma City.

Golfers will be on the Friona links from Texas, New Mexico and Oklahoma for the Saturday and Sunday event.

If visiting golfers aren't careful, the host pro may use the occasion to describe his first-ever hole-in-one, which he got recently on old "Number 1."

"I've hit a boxcar full of golf balls in my life, but that's the first hole-in-one I've ever got," Renner said this week. Not only was it his first ace, but it was the first time the first hole had been made in the magic shot locally.

Third event is the baccalaureate sermon Sunday night, when 69 Friona High School Seniors begin the graduation week activities.

LESS THAN A WEEK after the start of the 1973 Little League baseball season, several people have complained to us about the practice of several youngsters who drive up and down past the Lions' Little League Park during the senior and major league games.

Fans attending the games at this park have to resign themselves to come home with about a quarter-inch of dust all over their cars, hats, dermis, etc.

To complicate things, one of the callers pointed out that sometimes the players on the infield actually have trouble seeing the ball when a wave of dust fogs across the infield.

**Ninth Annual Tourney Attracts Personalities**

With 128 players entered in eight flights, the ninth annual Friona Partnership Golf Tournament is expected to take one of the top "spotlights" in the Friona area this weekend, according to Friona Golf Pro Cotton Renner.

**TOP PLAYERS**

Among the top players expected for the competition will be Dean Kelly, sportscaster for KFDA-TV, Amarillo and two year All-American from San Angelo State College, Ronnie Broadwick.

Renner said they are only two of the area's outstanding golfers who will be featured in the championship flight.

Attempting to hold their title gained last year will be James Avery and Sam Ray of Lubbock, who are defending champions.

**AREA REPRESENTED**

Golfers from as far away as Oklahoma City have registered to play in the tournament which will get underway in a shotgun start at 9 a.m. Saturday, May 19.

First place and championship flights will get underway at 1:30 p.m. but all other flights begin at 9 in the morning.

Two days of play will be featured before the conclusion on Sunday afternoon.

**HOLE-IN-ONE**

"It took two box car loads of golf balls, but I finally hit one," commented Cotton Renner, Friona golf pro, regarding his recent hole-in-one.

Renner said it was on the first hole at 263 yards on a par four and was the first and only Double Eagle on the Friona Golf Course.

He was understandably proud of his accomplishment which is not among common events in the golfing world.

In addition to Oklahoma City and Friona, golfers will be in Friona from Pampa, Portales, Borger, San Angelo, Dimmitt, Clovis, Littlefield, Muleshoe, Lubbock, Canyon, Amarillo, Hereford, Levelland, Abertathy, Bovina and Farwell.

**LOW HANDICAP**

The Friona golf pro said golfers are being scheduled according to their low handicap and there will be no qualifying. He added that the presidential flight will be played the second day (Sunday) and there will be 36 holes medal play.

Prizes will be awarded in all flights.

Renner invited anyone interested to join the gallery for the two days of play and emphasized that the competition will be stiff due to the outstanding golfers expected for the tournament.

Competitors will be feted with a barbecue following Saturday's play at the home of the Friona Pro, Cotton Renner.

**Rain, Damp Weather Slows Farm Activity**

Slow, intermittent rain which began dripping Saturday morning from grey water laden skies failed to leave significant amounts of moisture in the area although farming operations were hampered. Only .59 in moisture was recorded in Friona, although some of the area reported above an inch received during

the three day slow rains. From 91 degrees recorded last Thursday, the high temperature Monday hovered on the 52 degree mark.

Lows during the past week ranged from 37 Tuesday morning to 55 last Friday morning.

Farmers, who have eyed adverse weather throughout the winter and spring, once again found they were unable to get into fields, at least temporarily, to do work normally done months ago.

Bright sunshine greeted the area Tuesday and Wednesday, and spring-like temperature again sent hopeful farmers into the fields at planting time.

City Manager Jake Outland said the Friona Dive-In Swimming Pool opened Tuesday, May 15, and will be open until August 15.

**Hi-Pro Feeds Adds To Friona Progress**

Construction will begin shortly on a new general office building at Hi-Pro Feeds Inc. at the east edge of Friona on Highway 60, according to Ron Davenport, general manager.

Dirt work is underway with forms in place for the foundation of the new and modern brick building which will be constructed by Lewellen Construction Co. of Friona.

Davenport said the new offices will house the book-keeping and computer systems and offices which are scattered in the area will be consolidated in the larger building to be constructed.

The existing office building will become animal health offices when the firm moves into their new offices, although a tentative completion date could not be given by Davenport at the present time.

The general manager said no immediate increase in office personnel is anticipated at the present time, he did not rule out the possibility of an increase with the move into the new building.

Hi-Pro Feeds Inc. is engaged predominantly in the production of feed lot food supplements, along with veterinarian and animal health supplies.

**Grain-Cattle Co-op Sets Thursday Meet**

A meeting of interest to grain and cattle producers will be held Thursday night (May 17) at the Hub Community Center. The meeting begins at 8 p.m.

"We want to show farmers how they can market their own grain through their own cattle without any additional investment, and at the same time share in the elevator and feedlot profits," said Gerald McCathern of Hereford, one of the instrumental parties in Thursday's meeting.

The meeting is sponsored by American Grain & Cattle, Inc., a cattle and grain cooperative which is gaining nationwide stature, especially across the grain belt and reaching to the West Coast.

"This is the greatest breakthrough ever in agricultural cooperative marketing," said McCathern, who urged all maize farmers in the area to attend.

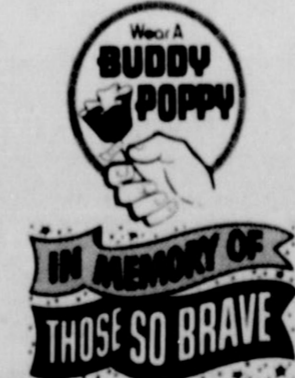

**BCD Is Considering Area Market Survey**

Friona's Board of City Development met with a representative of West Texas State University Monday, to discuss the possibility of the university conducting an extensive survey of the Friona trade area's marketing habits.

Bill Semmelbeck, assistant professor in the school of business, WTSU, discussed with the board various ways of conducting such a survey.

"We particularly want to find out where people are shopping for various things, and why they are shopping where they are especially if it is not in Friona," chairman Dale Cary told Semmelbeck during the course of the discussion.

The WTSU group has conducted several surveys for Amarillo's Board of City Development, it was pointed out.

The Friona BCD committee is to meet again in the near future and decide if they want the WTSU group to do the survey locally.

Members of the local BCD indicated they felt the main responsibility was to develop what the city already has, in terms of business and industry.

Now, I know you gals won't be too happy over this but Mother's Day was last Sunday, so let me build up the man's ego, since we are approaching Father's Day now.

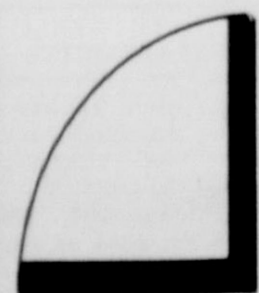

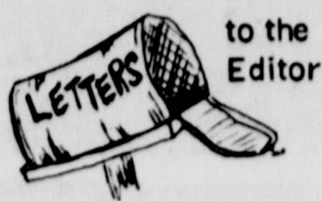
Throughout the ages, men have offered humble thanks to their Creator for the priceless gifts of air, soil, water, and sunshine which make all living things possible.

The custom of setting aside special days-Rogation Days-for this purpose began more than 1,500 years ago in the neighborhood of Vienne, France. Bad weather and earthquakes had brought crop failures and widespread hunger. The Bishop of Vienne called for prayer and penance on the three days preceding Ascension Day. The people responded and implored God for help in their suffering and privation.

Word of what had happened in Vienne spread throughout France-and then to other countries. The supplication filled a need in the hearts and minds of the people, and as the years went by Rogation Days were widely observed as an annual custom. By the end of the eighth century, the Church formally adopted the custom. Now, the world over, people on Rogation Days beg the mercy of God and ask that He spare His children the evils of soul and body-and give good increase to the plants of the field.

Dear Bill,

I was somewhat disappointed to hear the views expressed by the Star concerning the Watergate affair. It is true that it is a shame that our national leaders have been forced to spend so much time with Watergate, and it is also true that there are many other things which require urgent attention. But to merely dismiss Watergate as a "useless scandal" is to shirk a responsibility we Americans have been shirking too long. It is only natural for people to become frustrated and attempt to ignore something which disrupts their faith and ideals, and in this case ultimately reflects upon the American people themselves. To ignore a problem will not make it go away. One particular situation may pass, but the problem still remains.

The whole thing seems rather paradoxical. On the one hand we want to be informed about what our politicians are doing. On the other, when we hear something we do not like to hear, we want it shut off and put away. We want more voice in government and more benefits from its administration, yet how many people take an active part in the government they ask so much from? The voter turnout in Friona is a perfect example of the answer to that question.

I do not wish to place the blame for Watergate on any particular persons, parties, or organizations. I merely feel that something is very wrong and that it should and must be

corrected. Our type of democratic government is based on the idea of an informed public. If we choose to "turn off" that information then we are just as responsible for the shortcomings of our government as the people we elect as leaders.

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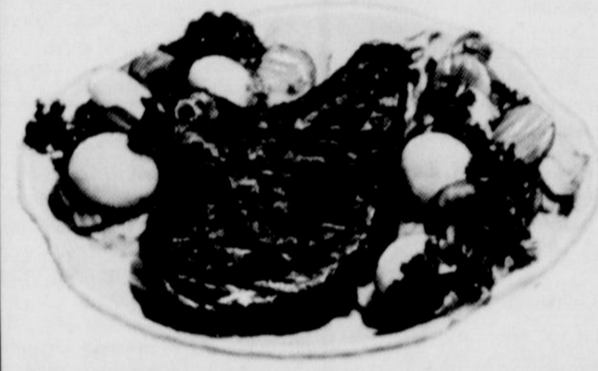

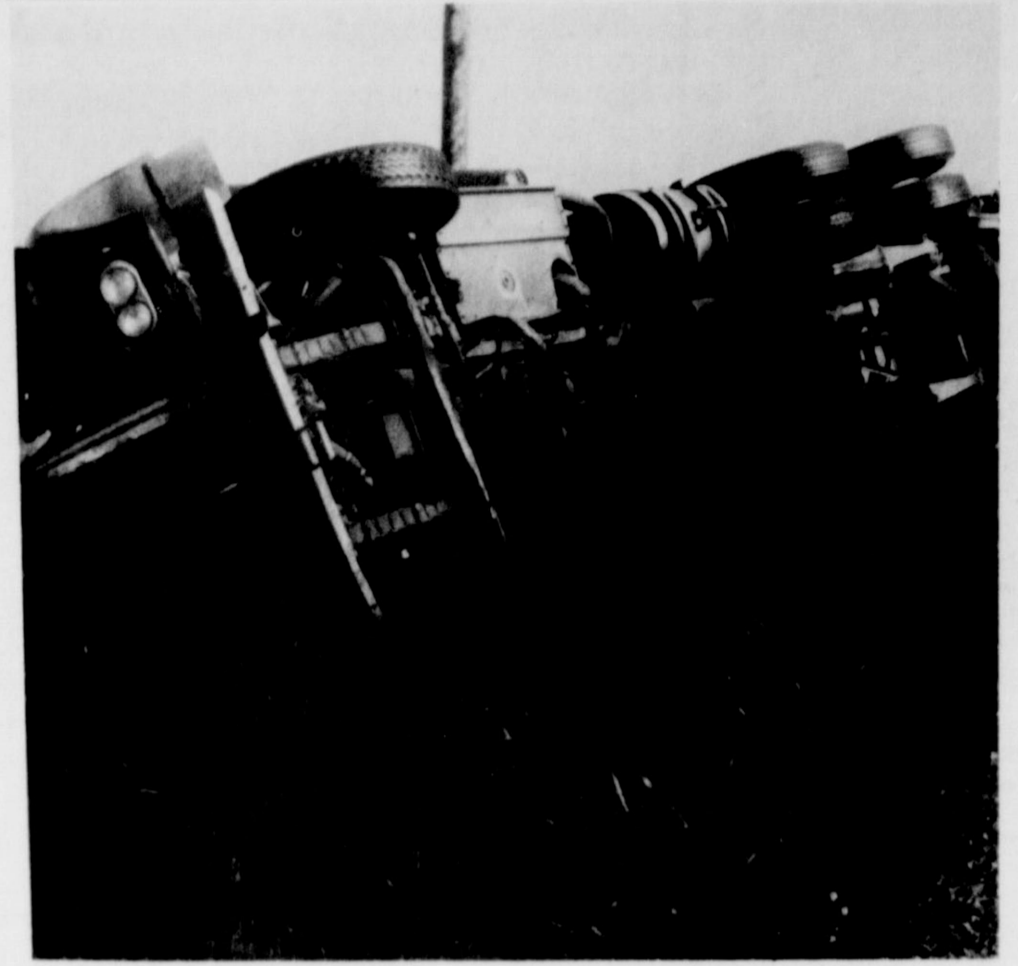

Also injured and treated and released at the hospital was Troy Young.






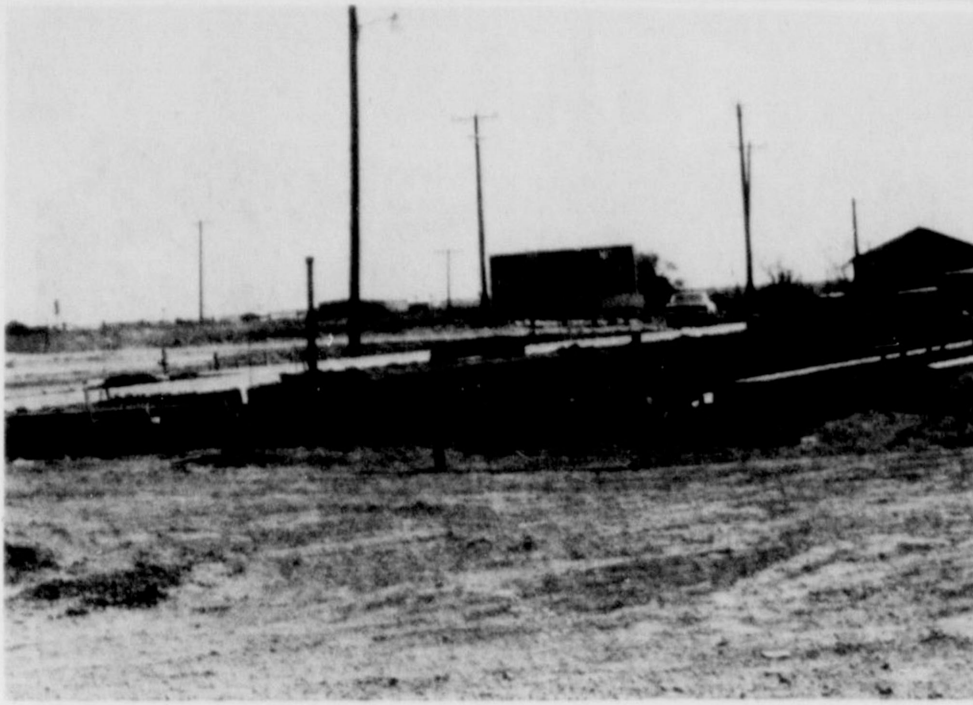

**Board Approves Grade System Change**

During the regular monthly meeting of the Friona Independent School District School Board Monday night, the school board, on recommendation of Superintendent Alton Farr, absolved substitute bus driver Ricky Rector of being at fault in a bus accident last month.

**BUS TRIP**

The Friona youth was driving one of five buses enroute to Floydada for a band festival when the accident occurred approximately one-half mile east of Plainview. The accident was on Saturday, April 28.

According to the report the bus driven by Rector hit the rear of a pickup which had stopped at the site of another accident which had just happened. The driver Thomas Newton Browning of Plainview was reportedly driving by when he noticed the accident and realized one of the vehicles involved in the first accident was driven by his wife.

There were no injuries in the rear end collision and Superintendent Farr noted that the damage to the fender of the bus was being repaired by the Friona bus mechanic.

**DRIVER COMPLIMENTED**

Board member Mrs. Cliff Porter commented, "I would like to compliment Ricky Rector. Even after the accident and the bus had started returning to Friona, he broke down south of Friona. I happened to be in one of the cars which drove out to where the bus was stopped."

"When we got to the bus, all the children were on the bus, the door was closed and Ricky was apparently calm. He seemed to have everything under complete control."

Superintendent Farr added, "I can see where we cannot blame Ricky for the accident. Who knows what any one of us would have done if we were placed in the same circumstances?"

**NEW TEACHERS**

Employment of six new teachers was approved by the board following discussion with the superintendent on qualifications.

For special education, two new teachers are Juannah Nance of Silverton, a graduate of WTSU and Jamie Washington of Springlake, also a graduate of WTSU. Both will be first year teachers. They will initiate a new program in the school which will be funded by the state and work with students who are slow starters.

Employed as a fifth grade teacher was Mrs. Paul Ross of Friona, who is a graduate of Wayland College and has three years teaching experience.

Mrs. Tom Jarboe, who recently graduated from WTSU was approved as a kindergarten teacher and Mrs. Bill Teel was hired as reading teacher for sixth grade. It was noted that the Teels had originally planned to move from Friona but had changed their plans. Mrs. Sandra Awtrey who has taught in Bovina for the past three years was named high school English teacher.

One resignation, that of Don Reeve, teacher of CVAE Mechanical Skills, was accepted following reading of a letter by the superintendent. He thanked the school board for giving him the opportunity to teach in Friona, but did not give his future plans.

**GRADING SYSTEM**

Also approved was changing the grading system in the school. Kindergarten through third grade will continue in the same grading system as the past, but fourth through twelfth grades will change to the numerical system.

The system is being initiated with the new Quarter Plan, which goes into effect in the next school year.

Satisfactory and Unsatisfactory, designated by an 'S' and a 'U' will still be used for art, music and physical education, added the superintendent.

A number of factors will come into consideration in the new grading system, and at the teacher's discretion, no more than one-half of the report card grade will be determined through testing.

**BUILDING PROGRAM**

A building program looms just around the corner, according to Superintendent Farr, with the additional state programs being instituted, which could increase the Friona School teaching staff by more than 20 teachers.

**OTHER ACTION**

In other action during the three and one-half hour meeting, the board heard

Wendell Gresham of Ethridge-Spring Agency, explain insurance policies along with advantages and disadvantages of policies under consideration; read a letter of appreciation from Rev. Charles Broadhurst of the First Baptist Church for use of the high school building; approved the Regional Media Services for the next year; approved continuing in the National School Lunch program; read the Legislative Bill enacted into law relating to the requirement that meetings of governmental bodies be open to the public and heard a report on the progress of kindergarten and special education programs.

They also approved transfer of the children of two families for the Friona school district; paid April bills; heard reports on various funds in the school; opened a bid on a bus for sale by the school and heard a report by Porter Roberts concerning the tax status.

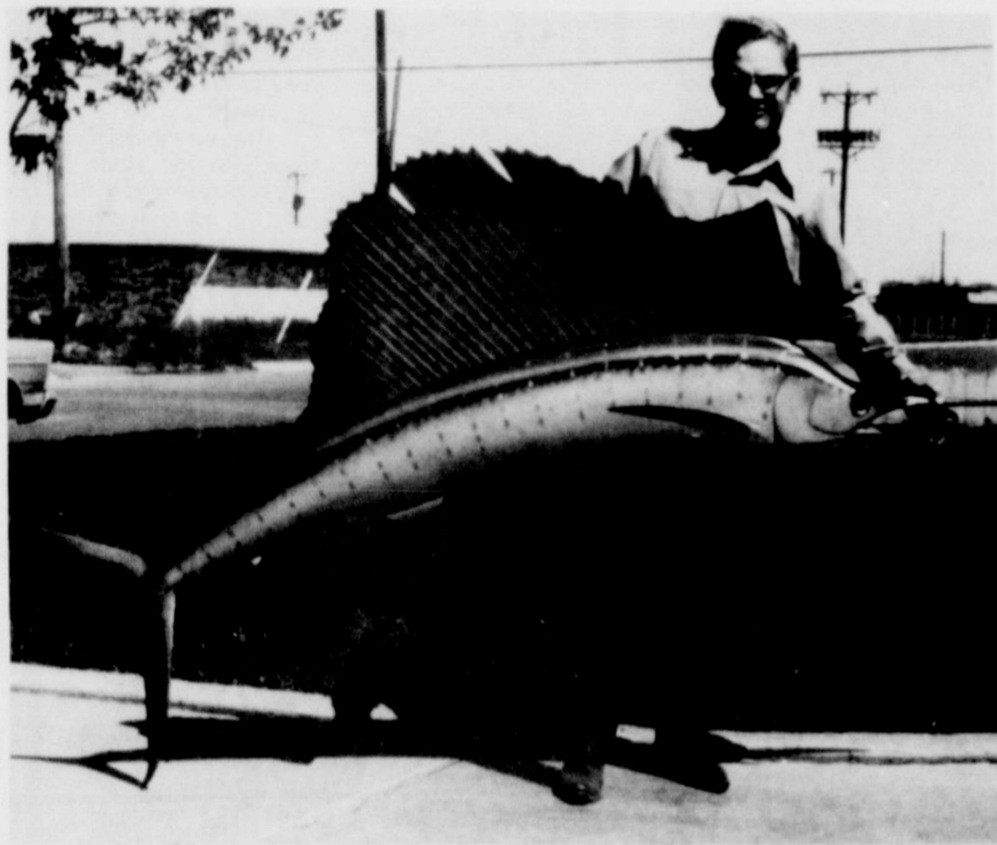

**The Truth Will Make You Free**

Writing was being practiced hundreds of years before the time of Moses. Skeptical Bible critics formerly held that writing was unknown in the day of Moses. Therefore, they assumed that Moses could not have been the author of the first five books of the Bible. This can no longer be assumed because of recent discoveries.

Many materials were used for writing purposes. Stone, clay, and wood are some of the oldest writing materials. All of these are mentioned in the Old Testament for writing purposes. However, other materials have been more prominent in the history of the Bible.

Leather was the principal material employed by Hebrews. Thus, animal skins played a significant role in the writing of the Old Testament. A material called papyrus was the most important writing material for the New Testament authors. Sheets of papyrus were made from the papyrus plant, found in abundance along the river Nile. These sheets were joined together to make rolls about 30 feet long and 10 inches high. These rolls were later replaced by codex form or books of papyrus. The sheets were joined in book form rather than side by side in a roll.

When an improved process in treating skins was perfected, vellum or parchment (animal skins) were used to make copies of the New Testament. These materials are beautiful in appearance, and it was necessary because of an eventual shortage of papyrus. Of course, with the discovery of paper, it became the most important material upon which Bibles were written.

Since we live in a day when books are printed by thousands, we may overlook the fascinating drama which lies behind our Bible.
