FUNDS RELEASED

Highway Project May Get Start Nod

Federal Highway funds have become available following a two-year logjam as President Nixon signed the three-year \$20 billion act.

Rhea Bradley, district engineer for the Texas Highway Department at Littlefield, said no 'concrete' information had come in to their office as of Thursday.

However, he was confident that signing the highway bill meant that construction on the railroad overpass and widening of Highway 214, could begin in the fall as tentatively scheduled.

The engineer will release information concerning the proposed paving project as it is released to his office.

State Highway Engineer Luther DeBerry said the compromise bill was the result of hours of hard work led by Texas' own Senator Lloyd Bentsen and Representative Jim Wright in the 10-week Senate-House conference committee sessions.

"Passage of the act means we can go forward with dozens of highway projects throughout the state which have been pigeonholed," DeBerry said. He

pointed out there will remain a backlog of vitally needed projects.

DeBerry said, "One provision, sponsored by Senators Tower and Bentsen, freed the state to complete the San Antonio North Expressway with state funds. Twice the project has been caught by changes in Federal aid and procedures as a Federal aid project and for some years the resulting impasse has denied the needed roadway to the people of San Antonio. This legislation should greatly shorten the time required to complete the project."

The new highway act, which for the first time contains funds for mass transit, also contains more than \$2 billion for safety during the three years, DeBerry said. High on the list of such projects in Texas are replacement of narrow bridges and elimination of hazardous intersections and rail crossings. This is in addition to the increased safety benefits accruing from construction of modern highway facilities with more built-in safety features.

"This act does not solve all our money problems," the state

highway engineer said, "But, even though it is not everything we need here in Texas, it is a good act."

For FY 1974 the Highway Trust Fund revenues stay the same as in the past; beginning in FY 1975 urban funds can be used either for roads or purchase of buses, up to \$200 million. In FY 1976 all or a part of urban funds may be used for highway buses or fixed rail transit with State Highway Department concurrence.

DeBerry said the act will now allow Texas to proceed with vital highway projects. The State Highway Department

cancelled the July highway lettings due to the lack of federal funds.

State highway agencies across the nation have been without new authorizations of funds for months. Texas has been financing some badly needed projects using leftover funds authorized in previous highway acts and 100 per cent state monies.

The Highway Trust Fund revenues are derived from federal taxes on gasoline and specified vehicle accessories. Texas is one of the "donor" states, sending more to the

Following a meeting of all school principals with Superintendent Alton Farr, a slightly revised registration schedule has been released.

Grades three and four will now report to the junior high school auditorium until the grade school is ready for occupancy following the recent fire at the school.

Superintendent Farr said, "It is hoped that the third grade wing will be ready by August 27."

"Workmen have been cleaning desks all week and the general contractor, Wiley Hicks Construction Co. of Amarillo began general repair work on Friday, August 17."

A faculty meeting for all teachers and teacher aides will be held at the high school cafeteria at 9 a.m. on August 20. Following this meeting, added the superintendent, teachers will be working in their buildings through August 24 in readiness for school opening on August 27.

Pupils who will attend Friona Schools for the first time (exclusive of kindergarten and first grade pupils) should enroll with the principal prior to the opening of school if possible. J.T. Gee, primary building, grades 2-4; Tom Jarboe, junior high building, grades 5-8; and John R. Cook, high school, grades 9-12.

Kindergarten attendance is now compulsory.

federal government than is returned in funding.

Interstate highway construction continues to be funded with 90 per cent trust fund money and other highway construction receives 70 per cent Federal trust fund money under the new act.

The new highway act also contains provisions, permitting states to use federal aid funds for bicycle trails, and providing planning funds for metropolitan transportation studies.

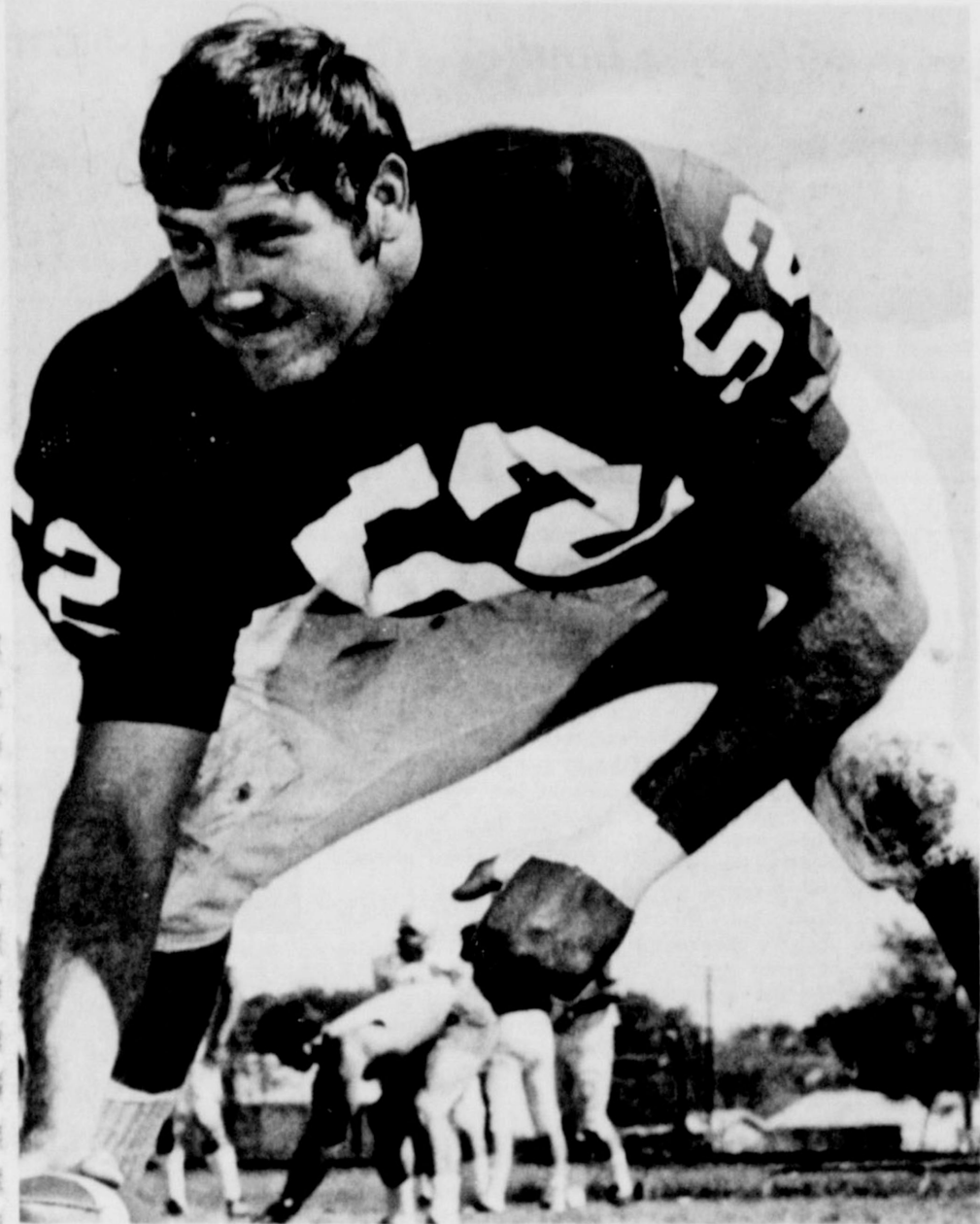

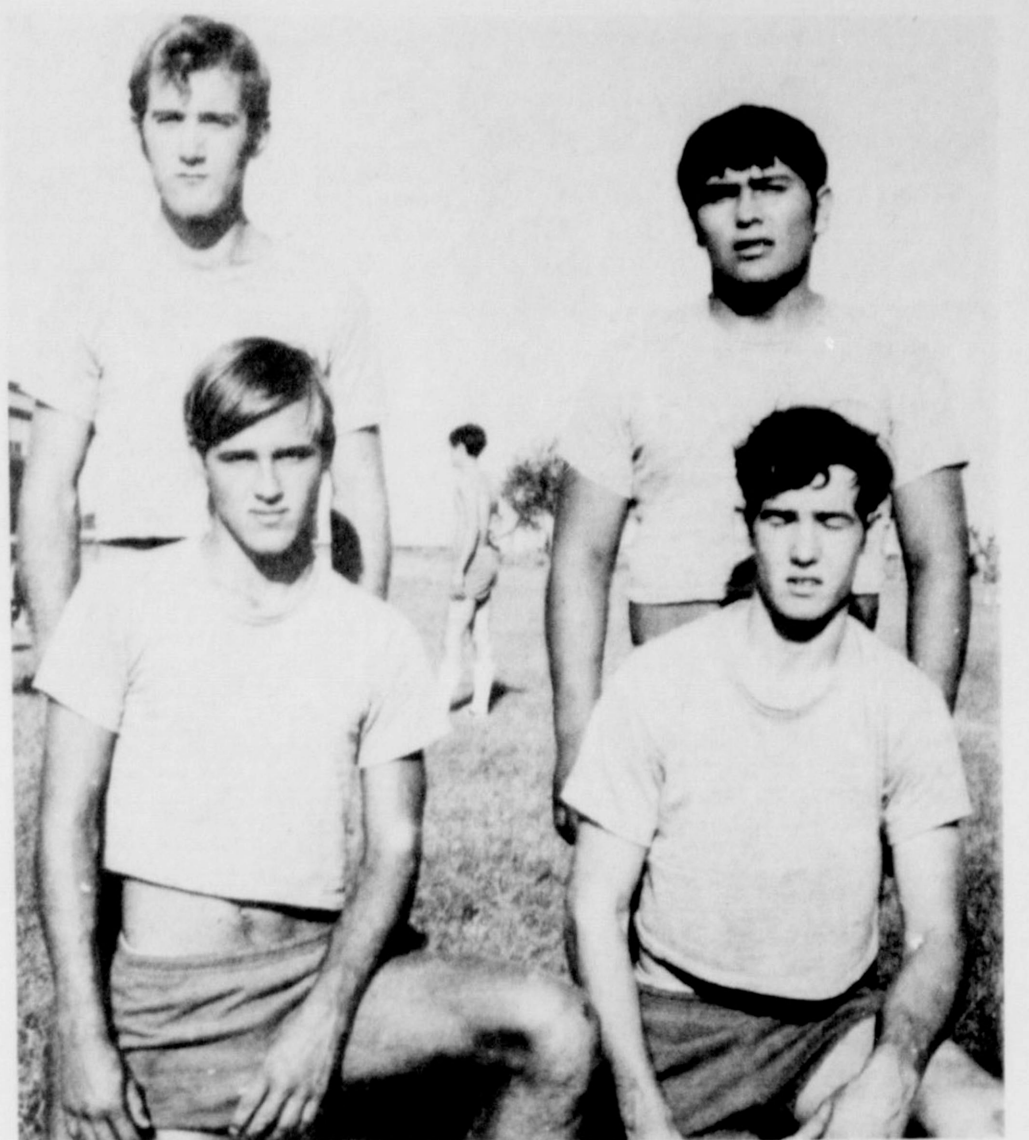

# Pioneer Gas Reports Earnings Figure Down

AMARILLO...At their quarterly meeting held Tuesday, August 7, the board of directors of Pioneer Natural Gas Company declared a regular quarterly dividend of 21 cents per share to be paid September 5 to stockholders of record on August 23, 1973.

Consolidated net income for Pioneer and subsidiaries for the second quarter amounted to \$1,841,792. For the first six months of 1973, the consolidated net income was \$5,970,399 compared to \$5,817,647 for 1972.

Earnings per share for the second quarter amounted to 25 cents on the 7,470,190 average number of shares outstanding during the period. For the same

period last year, earnings per share amounted to 34 cents on the 7,468,132 average shares outstanding during the same period. For the first six months of 1973, earnings per share are 80 cents compared to 78 cents

## Clayton Honored By National Organization

The annual meeting of the National Legislative Conference hosted more than 1200 legislative leaders and staff from the 50 states. The meeting stressed the relationships of the legislatures with the Executive Branch of government, with the news media, with special interest groups and with the public. The Conference was highlighted by speeches by Governor Dan Walker of Illinois; John Love, Director of Energy Policy, Executive Office of the President; Congressman Gerald Ford, U.S. House Minority Leader; Senator Hubert Humphrey; Dan Rather, CBS News White House Correspondent; and Melvin Laird, Counsel to the President for Domestic Affairs.

Representative Clayton's election places him on the Executive Committee of both the Southern Legislative Conference and the National Legislative Conference.

## Santa Fe Loads 89% More Grain In July

Santa Fe Railway loaded about 89% more grain on its line in July 1973 than in July 1972. John S. Reed, chairman and chief executive officer, announced in Chicago.

This July the railroad loaded 23,766 cars, equivalent to about 62 million bushels, compared with 12,563, or approximately 33 million bushels in the same month last year. For the twelve months ending July 31, 1973, Santa Fe handled just under 200,000 carloads, or about 540 million bushels of grain, counting both cars originated on Santa Fe lines and those received from connections,

Reed noted.

"A unique factor this year has been the continuation of grain shipments direct to Gulf ports for export rather than to inland terminal elevators for storage," Reed said. "This has adversely affected our ability to furnish cars because of the longer haul and the greater turn-around time for our freight equipment. The export movement is continuing at a fast pace and while we are still very tight on cars, there is every indication that this will be a record year for the volume of grain transported on the Santa Fe."

They have done a good job of representing the local interests over the years.

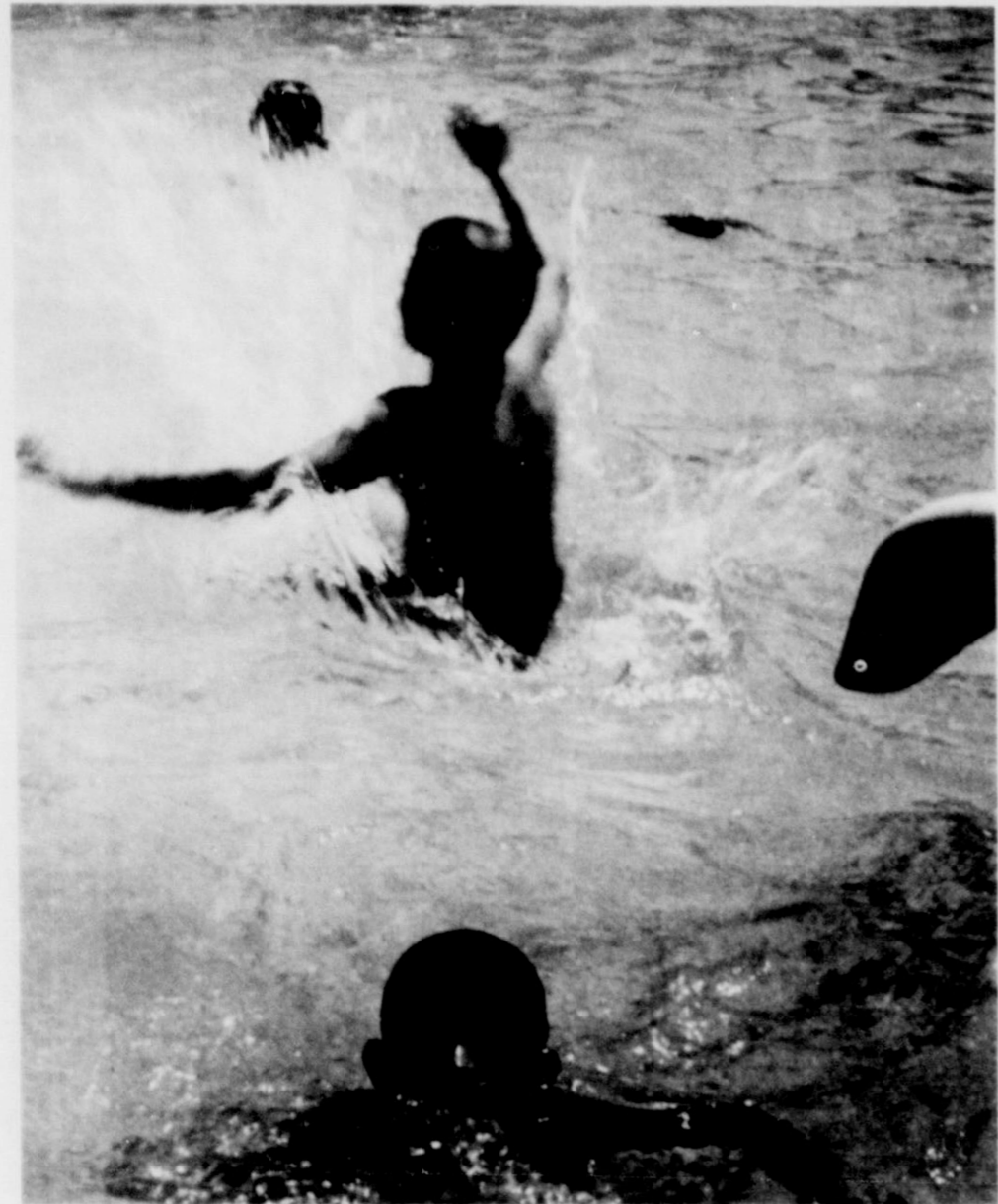
Recently they cleared all land rights needed for construction. This is a land mark event, because some watersheds take a much longer time to do this.

**CATTLE PRODUCERS** in Parmer County are urged to attend a meeting in Amarillo on August 21st regarding upcoming new regulations on brucellosis testing.

The meeting will be in City Commission Room, 3rd. floor, Municipal Bldg. at 8 p.m.

A Veterinarian with the Texas Animal Health Commission will be on hand to inform producers of pending changes in the present brucellosis regulations. Comments and feedback are being invited from producers and a statewide hearing on the new regulations will be held in Austin on September 18.

The new brucellosis testing program is expected to begin October 1 and is designed to eliminate the cattle disease from Texas, thus allowing the state to be cleared Certified Brucellosis Free.

For all cattle producers to benefit from the new testing program, it is important that they become familiar with the new regulations. Thus the upcoming meeting on August 21 will provide an opportunity for producers to learn about the plans for brucellosis testing.

The same type meeting will be held on August 28 in the Agricultural Center Building in Plainview starting at 8 p.m.

**HOW WILL PHASE IV** affect farmers when the new inflation fighting program begins on August 12?

According to Dr. William Vastine of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, agricultural producers will be most directly affected in the short run by the following—(1) the beef price freeze that continues until Sept. 12, (2) only dollar for dollar price increases on commodities not frozen may be passed on by processors, wholesalers and retailers, (3) decreases in raw agricultural costs must be passed on to consumers, (4) beef price increases after the proposed freeze termination must be on a dollar for dollar basis.

Several other aspects of Phase IV are of interest. The Tariff Commission has been asked to review temporary suspension of import quotas on non-fat dry milk. Also, an 80 million pound increase for non-fat milk has been ordered on an emergency basis.

Another provision includes bringing back into production all remaining set-aside acres by 1974. Limitations on soybean and related product exports will be continued for the remainder of the crop year.

In addition, a request has been made of Congress to speed up anti-inflation legislation, including authority for export controls and selective tariff reductions, disposal of excess materials from the National Stockpile, and authority for construction of the Alaska Pipeline. The pipeline fight has already resurfaced.

Perhaps of most concern to producers, is the request for farm legislation to permit farmers to earn higher incomes through greater production rather than higher prices. Educational efforts have been directed at dissipating this idea for years, and it should be approached cautiously by producers.

Due to the nature of the demand for agricultural products, relatively small changes in supply can evoke relatively large changes in prices. Thus flooding the market with products would reduce prices to consumers, but producers may find themselves in the position of the fellow who said he was losing 5 cents per bushel on his crop but hoped to make it up by producing a larger volume.

**HAVE GOOD**, fresh-tasting vegetables next winter—by freezing them now.

Almost any vegetable can be frozen, from asparagus to zucchini. And it doesn't take much time or a lot of equipment.

All you really need is a big kettle of hot water for blanching, a wire basket, cold water for cooling and packaging containers.

Despite the simplicity, some people have problems with frozen food being of poor quality. To resolve this, there are four simple steps essential to excellent quality.

First use young and tender vegetables. Then freeze them immediately. Leaving them in the garden even a day too long can mean the difference between tough and tender condition next winter.

After washing and preparing the vegetables comes blanching—the most important step. This brief plunge into boiling water is the big secret to successful home freezing.

It's whole purpose is to stop the action of enzymes. Needed for the living plant's growth, these enzymes continue to work—even in the freezer—unless stopped by blanching. Their action results in off-flavor, toughness or mushiness and off-colors.

Fortunately, blanching is easy. All that's needed is a gallon of rapidly boiling water in a kettle, about a pint of vegetables and a wire basket. Put the vegetables in the wire basket and plunge them into the water. Cover the kettle and start timing immediately.

Exact timing is important. Too much or too little will hamper the quality. For recommended times on each vegetable, consult a cookbook or freezing manual.

The third key to successful freezing is quick cooling. A pan of ice water or even cold running water will do the job. Check a cookbook or freezing manual for exact times. But generally it takes about as long

or longer to cool as it does to blanch.

Next, drain the vegetables and pack in airtight containers. Milk, ice cream or cottage cheese cartons can be used only if the vegetables are first sealed in plastic freezer bags.

Then, quickly set the containers in the freezer, making sure it is set at zero degrees F. or lower to maintain quality.

Follow these four main steps and use recommended blanching and cooling times for better quality vegetables.

## Charles Allen Gets Certificate

### Employment Survey Set

During the week of August 20-24, the U.S. Bureau of the Census will conduct its regular monthly survey in this area on employment and unemployment, according to Percy R. Millard, Director of the Bureau's Data Collection Center in Dallas.

Local households in the survey are part of the 50,000 across the country that have been scientifically selected to represent a cross section of all households.

The survey is taken by the Bureau for the U.S. Department of Labor. It provides monthly information on conditions in the labor force, a prime indicator of the economic health of the Nation. For example, results of the June survey showed the unemployment rate to be 4.8 percent, the first time in three years that it has been below 5 percent. Employment rose substantially (by 650,000) to a seasonally adjusted level of 84.7 million. Nationally, over the past year, employment has risen by 2.9 million.

Information supplied by individuals participating in the survey is confidential and results are used only to compile statistical totals.

The plant completed a "near normal" week on Friday, continuing its custom slaughter operations for the second straight week.

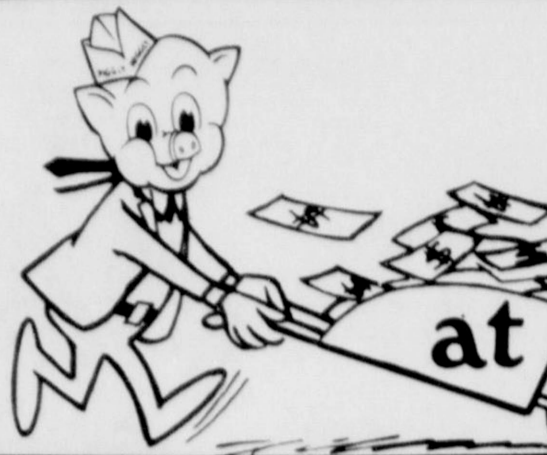
