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**THE MONTH OF** December will be quite a month for the astronomy buff—at least, it will be if several predictions come to pass.

The center of the attraction is to be the new comet Kohoutek, which astronomers predict will become a bright object in the morning sky toward the end of the month.

In fact, early risers might keep their eyes peeled for the comet, which is visible just above the horizon in the due southeast, about an hour before sunrise.

The comet looks like an ordinary star at this time, but as it gets brighter day by day on its path around our sun, the comet's tail should become visible.

After the comet makes a U-turn around the sun, which is projected to happen December 28-January 1, it will become visible in the evening sky, almost due west just after sundown, while the strange visitor makes its exit from the proximity of the earth, and from our solar system.

During the month or so that the comet may be visible, it should be easily visible to the naked eye—one of the few which will have been visible during this century. Few people have actually been "eyewitnesses" to a comet—that's how rare this appearance close to the earth actually is.

Comet Kohoutek may, according to some predictions, be even brighter than was the most famous comet—Halley's Comet, which last visited our environs in 1910.

Some of the optimists have said that Kohoutek (which is named for the Czechoslovak astronomer which discovered it) could be as bright as a full moon. They hedge this statement with one saying that it at least ought to be as bright as Venus, which is the brightest object in the evening sky.

**THE COMET'S TAIL**, according to predictions, might cover one-sixth of the sky during the height of its brightness. The comet should be its brightest early in January, when it will be in the evening sky, about an hour after sundown.

One reason astronomers are excited about Comet K is because it bids to be one of the largest comets yet discovered. Most comets are relatively small objects, as far as space goes, averaging around two miles in diameter.

The new comet, according to early estimations, may be from 15 to 20 miles across. Most comets which are observed can only be seen (with high-powered telescopes) for a month or so before they approach the vicinity of our sun. Comet K was discovered last March, and has been observed by astronomers ever since.

**OUR ORBITING** spacecraft will be able to study the new comet in great detail. The astronauts out there in space will not be bothered by city lights. They will get a front-row seat to this once-in-a-lifetime exhibit.

Scientists say that the passing of this particular comet may be the first time it has ever orbited our sun. Most comets are "predictable" in nature; that is, they have regular orbits. Their return varies from three or four years to 75 years in the case of Halley's, which is due back in 1986.

However, even Halley's comet is a part of our solar system, reaching out past Jupiter in its huge orbit. That gives you an idea of the size of space, realizing that it takes this comet 75 years to "make its rounds," and return to us. And this is just within our own solar system!

Comet Kohoutek supposedly comes from the depths of space, from another solar system, and may never return this way again.

**THE OTHER** event which is happening during December is the photographing of the planet Jupiter by the Pioneer 10 spacecraft, which has already sent back some remarkable pictures from more than 500 million miles away.

**RURAL PROTECTION ASSURED**

**City Accepts County Offer On Fire Calls**

The Friona City Council passed a motion Monday to accept the \$2,500 per year payment from Parmer County as assistance for the Friona Volunteer Fire Department making calls in the county's rural areas.

The action alleviated a situation which was about to arise, under which the city equipment would not have been used outside the city limits after January 1. Rural residents will thus continue to have fire protection.

The annual payment is not what the city officials had asked for—the city had requested a straight \$100 per rural call, with no "guaranteed" amount.

Based on figures compiled over the past 12 years, this would have approximated \$3300 per year, in comparison with the \$2500 which was accepted.

"This was not exactly what we wanted. We objected to every fire department in the county getting the same amount of money regardless of how many rural fires they fight, but at least it's an improvement

over what we had before," commented Mayor R.L. Fleming.

The new agreement is to be in the form of an annual 12-month contract, according to the motion passed Monday night.

In other business, the council approved the annual audit of the City's books by Harvey, Messenger & Co.

Prior to the meeting, Mayor R.L. Fleming presented the KVII-TV Pro News "Good Guy" Award to nine-year-old Terry Jesko, whose quick thinking saved the life of his father following an accident last summer on the family farm near Lazbuddie.

The council voted to make the annual payment to finance the Board of City Development, which is appointed by the Chamber of Commerce, in the amount of \$2,691.00, or one per cent of the city's general fund.

Approval was granted for city employees to work a schedule from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. with 30 minutes off for lunch

when Daylight Savings Time is resumed.

"We don't feel that it is necessary for city employees to report to work before daylight," City Manager Jake Outland told the council.

A motion was passed approving the purchase of 332 feet of cyclone fence to fence off the dump ground, in preparation for instigating charges for dumping.

Outland told the council that he will check on the operation of the Teen Center.

Considerable time was spent on the subject of additional land for use as a sanitary landfill for the city, a project which the city has been pursuing for a number of months.

The city is attempting to buy additional land, since the present landfill has been used to almost its full potential. Also, the State Health Department has said that the city must abstain from burning its trash by January 1, 1974; thus city officials are attempting to find

land and work out an alternate system for disposal of its trash.

City Attorney Richard Colard recommended that the mayor and city manager go to Lubbock to confer with the regional representative of the State Health Department, to find out what avenues might be acceptable to the state agency, and also to find out if the city might be granted any additional time to comply with the trash burning requirement.

**JCs Schedule Trap Shoot**

The Friona Jaycees are sponsoring a trap shoot, Sunday, December 16, beginning at 1 p.m. The trap shoot will be located at the Friona Gun Club trap house on Highway 60 east.

Prizes consisting of turkeys and hams will be awarded to the winners.

**Terry Jesko Accepts TV Good Guy Award**

Terry Jesko, whose action was credited with saving the life of his father, Lee Jesko, last summer, was presented the KVII-TV "Good Guy" Award prior to the regular meeting of the Friona City Council Monday of this week.

Mayor R.L. Fleming presented a plaque to the nine-year-old youth, on behalf of the television station, and read a citation prepared by the station.

John McPherson represented Channel 7 at the meeting, and made a sound-on-film report which was shown on the late edition of "Pro News" Monday evening.

The citation prepared by the Channel 7 news staff read as follows—

"Nine year old TERRY JESKO was nominated for the KVII-TV GOOD GUY AWARD for his quick actions that saved the life of his father last summer on the family farm.

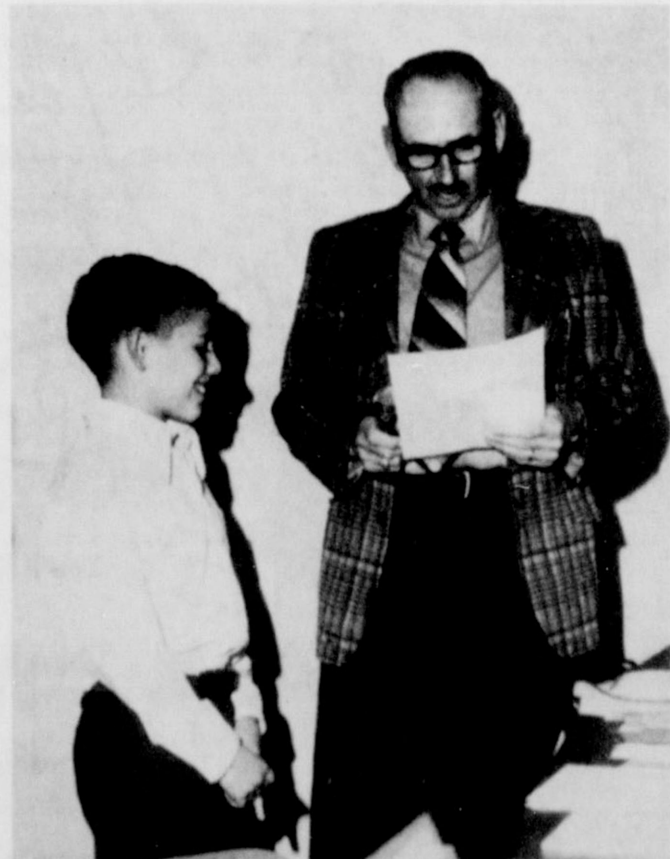
TERRY was nominated by Mrs. James Ball and Mickey Harrelson, both of Friona. Information in their letters stated, "The youth was driving a tractor at a slow rate of speed when his father, thirty-four year old Lee Jesko, got off the tractor to check the seed in the drill. When he started to get back on the tractor, his foot got caught under a wheel, pulled him under the tractor. Both the tractor and the rod weeder ran over him."

It was about 9 o'clock in the evening when the mishap occurred. TERRY managed to stop the tractor and raise the plow before he ran to the end of the field and then drove the pickup approximately one and a half miles to the family home where he called the telephone operator. The operator in turn called an ambulance to the Jesko farm.

Mr. Jesko suffered multiple fractures and internal injuries. He said, "If it wasn't for his son's quick actions, I would not be here today."

**Rep. Clayton Sets Visit Here Friday**

The day and time of Representative Bill Clayton's visit to Friona to discuss the proposed constitutional revision was changed, according to an announcement from Clayton's office this week.

Originally scheduled for Monday, December 17, the time has been changed to Friday, December 21, at the Friona High School Auditorium, from 9-11 a.m.

People of the area are invited to drop by at their convenience during the time listed, to ask any questions or make any suggestions on the constitutional revision.

Discussion will be centered around the Texas Constitution of 1876 under which the state is now operating, the proposed document submitted by the Constitutional Revision Commission, and any other matters the voters would like to see incorporated into a new constitution.

Recommendations will be considered early next year by the Constitutional Convention.

The discussion will be informal, Clayton says, and he and his staff are looking forward to meeting the citizens and having their participation, according to a spokesman at his Austin office.

Rep. Clayton will make three other visits to Parmer County prior to his scheduled discussion in Friona. The representative will be at Lazbuddie Tuesday, December 18 at the High School Cafeteria from 3:15 to 4:15 p.m.

**Showbarn Gifts Are Good Tax Deduction**

It was announced this week that the Community Center-Showbarn fund drive could still use about \$15,000, to complete the project.

"If a person or business needs a tax deduction for 1973, this would be a good opportunity for them, and a worthy project to donate to," said Jerry Hinkle of Friona State Bank.

A goal of \$75,000 was established for the project, and Hinkle said that with the money currently on deposit, plus that which had been pledged, the fund should have \$60,000 to \$63,000.

Construction on the Community Center-Showbarn was in full swing this week, with a full crew from Lewellen Construction Company working at the project site.

All of the steel for the building was delivered some two weeks ago. The steel had been delayed, but was finally received.

The building frame was erected over a week ago, and the siding is currently going up. Lewellen says the structure should be completed in time for the Parmer County Junior Livestock Show in February without any trouble.

### 30 YEARS AGO—DECEMBER 17, 1943

It appears that the feed situation locally, is critical, especially so far as the high protein feeds such as cottonseed meal or cake and soybean meal are concerned. Only limited quantities of these feeds can be secured here, making the shipments so small that it must be doled out in small quantities to those who are in the most urgent need of the feed.

Of the approximately 1200 applications for payment under the 1943 farm program received at the Deaf Smith County AAA office, 400 are now ready for submission. The remainder of the applications are in the process of being made up, though there are a few farms on which no performance report has as yet been received.

### 25 YEARS AGO—DECEMBER 17, 1948

All children are urged to be in Friona, Friday afternoon, Dec. 24, at three o'clock to talk with Old Santa Claus, giving him your last minute requests for gifts and to receive the full sack that he will have for each of you. After the kiddies receive their gifts, Old Santa will present a Frigidaire automatic washer to some older person.

Something very unusual happened here when one of our local elevators, the Friona Wheat Growers, received a truck load of kaffir that had been hauled over 300 miles from Colorado.

### 20 YEARS AGO—DECEMBER 17, 1953

Friona took second place honors in the statewide competition by the Farm Demonstration team of the local Future Farmers of America. Brownfield won first place. Attending from Friona were Morris Bruns, Cotton Renner, Bill Dennis, Donald Petty and Danny Baiman.

Bob Wear, minister of the Church of Christ in Hereford, was guest speaker at the Thursday night meeting of the Lions Club. There were 31 members and two guests present for the program and chicken supper.

### 15 YEARS AGO—DECEMBER 18, 1958

A pilot died as the result of the crash of an Air Force B-52 bomber 26 miles northwest of Bootleg Corner about 2 p.m. Tuesday afternoon. Two other crew members parachuted to safety. The pilot, Major Richard D. Smith of Fort Worth, died when his parachute failed to function. His body was found near a windmill still in the ejection seat.

Billowing smoke and flames destroyed a small stucco house in northeast Friona about 9 a.m. Wednesday morning putting 15 members of the Rando Santos family out in the cold. Practically all the family's clothing and belongings were either destroyed or seriously damaged in the fire. All donations for this family will be accepted at City Hall.

### 10 YEARS AGO—DECEMBER 19, 1963

George Taylor, of Taylor Construction Company in Friona, announced that he would build a six-unit apartment project for the city, which would be at least a partial answer to Friona's housing needs. The apartments will consist of two tri-plexes, and will be located on land purchased from Parmer County Community Hospital and Dr. Loyd Shackelford. They will be built immediately west of Dr. Shackelford's newly-constructed dentist office.

The Friona United Fund drive was approaching the halfway mark, with still over half of the chairman unreported, according to Bill Sheehan, chairman of the drive. Over \$3,000 of this year's goal of \$7,000 had been raised as of Tuesday.

### 5 YEARS AGO—DECEMBER 19, 1968

A group of 13 Parmer and Deaf Smith County farmer-stockmen announced plans to build a 20,000-capacity feedlot near Summerfield in Parmer County. It will be an investment of approximately \$1 million. To be known as Cattle Town, Inc., the new feedlot will be located just south of the Santa Fe Railway about a mile west of Summerfield.

# Chiefs Even Score With Estacado With 71-64 Win

After Monday night's game against Lubbock Estacado in Lubbock, the Friona Chieftains must have been able to walk a little taller.

The Chieftains avenged a loss to the class AAA Matadors in the finals of the Friona tournament, and they did it on Estacado's home court, and by a 71-64 margin.

Thus, Friona has lost only two games to Estacado, one of which was to class AAAA power Pampa.

As usual, the Matadors employed the press from the start, but save for the opening moments, it didn't faze Friona at all and the Chieftains went on to a 71-64 victory at the Matador gym, gaining revenge for an earlier 62-60 loss to Estacado.

At first, it appeared that Estacado had Friona thoroughly rattled. The Matadors caused

the winners to turn the ball over four times in the first two minutes and raced to a 7-0 lead.

But Friona refused to crack and came back with a 10-2 spurt to assume a 10-9 lead and the contest was quite close for the rest of the half.

The Chieftains outscored the Matadors 6-2 at the end of the half on three baskets by Gene Strickland, who had 20 points, and eight rebounds for the night, to take a 37-32 lead at intermission.

In the second half, Friona continued to battle well inside offensively and also pretty well shut off Estacado's inside game. The winners maintained a three-to-five point lead for most of the third period, which ended 51-48, Friona.

Then Friona blew the game open with eight straight points to open the final quarter.

Strickland hit a 12-foot turn-Dale Parsons hit a 20-footer from the left baseline.

Strickland came back with a short bank and then Dale

Cleveland, who had 23 points and topped all rebounders with 13, got a fast-break layup off of a steal to give the Chiefs a 59-48 advantage.

The teams then traded baskets for a while until Estacado, now 8-3, made one belated charge about midway through the final period.

With Friona leading 67-54, Ronnie Tatum, the game's leading scorer with 27 points, hit a 24-footer from the right. Then Ronnie Phenix sank a 14-footer from the left and Don Humphrey hit one of two free shots.

Then Tatum came back with a 13-footer off the right baseline with 2:55 left to bring the Matadors within six at 67-61.

But Cleveland got a fast-break layup and then Strickland hit a free throw for a

nine-point lead and that wrapped up the game.

Friona outshot the Matadors from the floor, hitting 32 of 65 shots for 48.5 per cent, while Estacado was only 26 of 71 for 38.0 per cent. Friona did a good job of forcing the Matadors outside—a big reason for Estacado's low shooting percentage.

Another big factor was rebounding. Estacado has had rebounding problems all season and this time was out-rebounded by the shorter Chieftains 42-41.

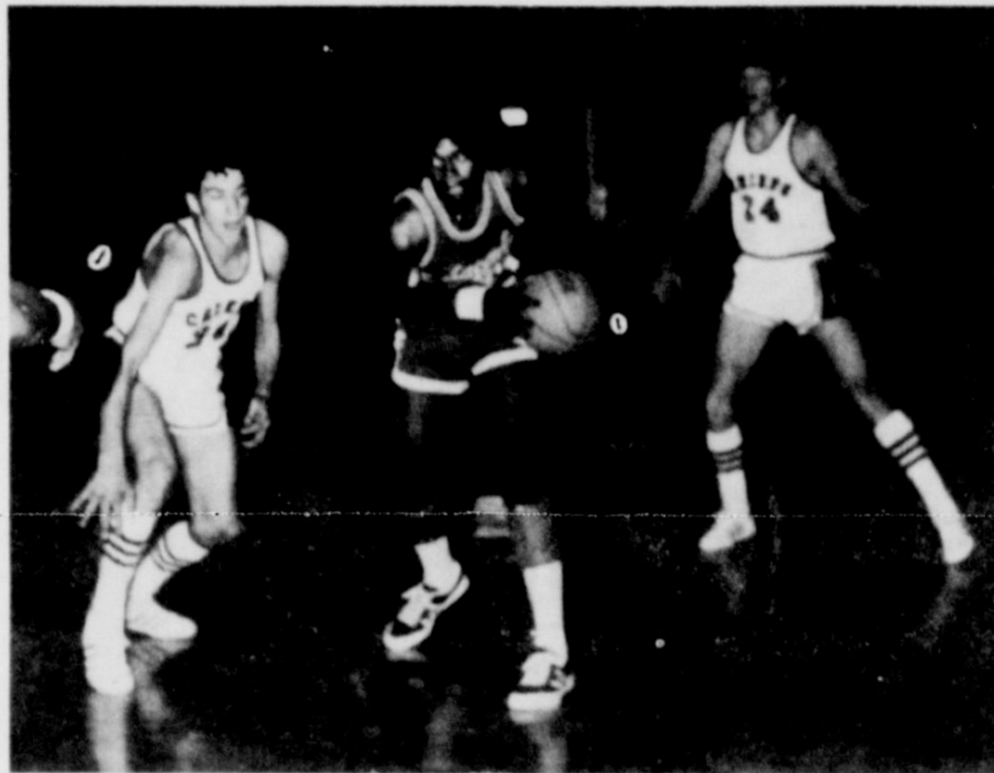
## Don Carthel Picked For All-District

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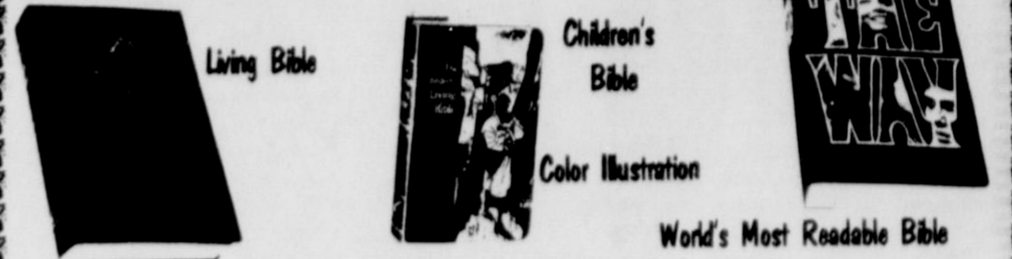

limits. The reduced limits would become effective with the posting of new 55 m.p.h. speed limit signs.

The Highway Department also was directed to proceed with replacement of speed limit signs in the "most feasible and economical manner."

## Highway Commission Reduces Speed Limit

The Texas Highway Commission today set a maximum 55 m.p.h. speed limit for all highway routes in Texas, both rural and urban.

The reduced speed limit will apply to all classes of traffic, buses, trucks and passenger cars. The action was taken after careful study by the Commission and Highway Department personnel.

Earlier, House Speaker Price Daniel, Jr., requested an attorney general's ruling on the speed limit reduction. Commission Member Charles E. Simons said that the Commission's action will have something upon which to base his ruling.

Commission Chairman Reagan Houston noted that many Texas drivers have already voluntarily reduced speed. At the same time, however, others still are traveling at higher speeds.

Houston asked State Highway Engineer B.L. DeBerry if such a situation creates hazardous conditions. DeBerry said the differentials in speed create safety problems both on two-lane roads and on multi-lane divided highways.

Commission Member D.C. Greer said there is a state of indecision with regard to the speed limit not only in Texas but throughout the nation. He said he feels it is up to some agency of government to try to erase this indecision.

The action is in response to the request by the President to State Governors to reduce maximum speeds during the current fuel shortage. Governor Briscoe asked the Highway Commission to reduce speed limits on all highways under its jurisdiction.

Today's action fixes the reasonable and safe maximum speed limits at 55 on all highway routes in the state, both inside and outside city

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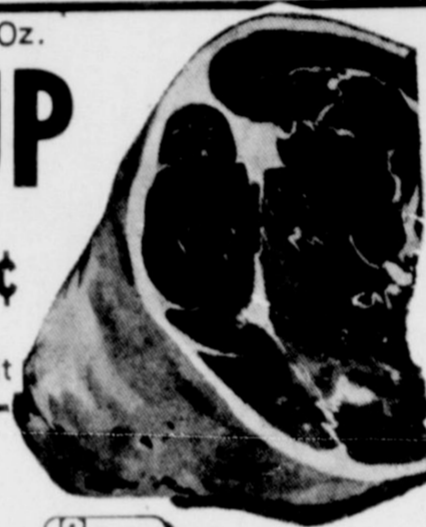
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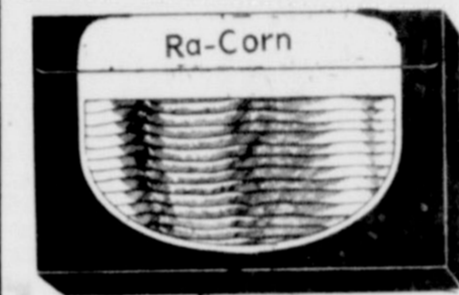

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### Claims Must Be Filed By December 31

December 31 is the deadline for filing medicare claims on charges for medical treatment received before October 1, 1972.

Gerald Schlaepfi, social security field representative, is reminding area Medicare beneficiaries of the deadline because Medicare payments may be forfeited if claims are not submitted on time.

The deadline does not pertain to inpatient hospital bills. It does apply to expenses covered under Part B of Medicare, primarily doctor bills.

Schlaepfi also reminds area residents that a general enrollment period for Medicare Part B will begin January 1 and continue through March 31, 1974. Anyone who could have enrolled previously for this part of Medicare, but did not, may enroll during the general enrollment period.

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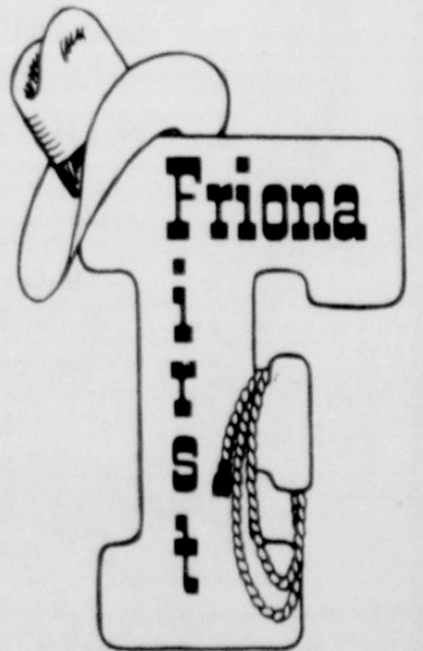

Everyone remembers from childhood some book or some story that he particularly likes. McCalls lists books that have been and will continue to be favorites of children the world over as books that every child should read sometime during his growing up years. All these can give a child an absorbing and rewarding experience. The stories may be read at any age. But some will appeal more to younger children and some to older children. For younger children the McCalls pamphlet suggests:

**AWAY GOES SALLY** by Coatsworth is the story of a little girl of the 1800's traveling from Massachusetts to Maine in a house on runners, drawn by twelve oxen.

**CALL IT COURAGE** by Sperry is the tale of a boy of the South Seas who conquers his fear of the seas, to adapt to the life of his people.

**HANS BRINKER; OR, THE SILVER SKATES** by Dodge is the classic children's story of life in Holland, a favorite here and abroad for almost a century.

**HEIDI** by Spyri is another classic children's story of Switzerland, beloved by generations of little girls.

**LITTLE HOUSE IN THE BIG WOODS** by Wilder is the first of seven stories based on the author's life in the pioneer days in Wisconsin.

**EMIL AND THE DETECTIVES** by Kastner is a mystery story for children set in Berlin before the last war. The story is notable for its humor and portrayal of child behavior and thought.

**FIVE BOYS IN A CAVE** by Church is an adventure in cave exploration. The boys encounter difficulties.

**THE MOFFATS** by Estes is the story of American family life unsurpassed for its warmth, humor and naturalness. Children who read and like this book will enjoy others in the series.

Stories for older boys and girls, the in-between age, are often hard to select. Books must begin to have fewer pictures and more plot. But the plots and characters must not be so complex as to lose the interest of young readers. Suggested are the following for this age group:

**THE JUNGLE BOOK** by Kipling has wonderful stories, brilliantly told, of the animals of the Indian jungle. This classic is familiar to all.

**LITTLE WOMEN; OR, MEG, JO, BETH, AND AMY** by Alcott is a book all mothers expect their daughters to like. It is a perennial favorite with girls the world over.

**NATIONAL VELVET** by Bagnold is well known because Elizabeth Taylor made one of her first movie appearances in a movie of the same name which is often shown on television. Children who like horses will enjoy this story of a girl and her horse.

**TREASURE ISLAND** by Stevenson is the classic pirate story and if your child likes this adventure, he'll surely enjoy **KIDNAPPED** and **THE BLACK ARROW** which are favorites also.

**TWENTY THOUSAND LEAGUES UNDER THE SEA** by Verne is about the exploits of Captain Nemo in his submarine and will enthrall science readers. This book also became a classic movie.

**THE TWENTY-ONE BALLOONS** by du Bois is a highly original story about a professor who flies around the world in a homemade balloon.

**SMOKY, THE COW HORSE** by James is the tale of a cow pony, written in the language of the cowboy. Drawings are as lively as the text.
