

THURSDAY WAS the 10th anniversary of President John F. Kennedy's assassination.

It hardly seems possible that a full decade has passed since the Kennedy assassination, but

Do you remember what you were doing at the time you first learned of the tragedy? Most people usually can, and I suppose we're no different.

Of course it happened on a Friday ten years ago, rather than Thursday. A Black Friday as far as the state of Texas and city of Dallas were concerned.

And the Kennedy assassination seemed to trigger a wave of violence directed against national figures that continued throughout the next several years.

WE'LL NEVER FORGET that Friday in November. It was truly one of the saddest days we've ever experienced, coupled with the chain reaction that resulted in the capture of Lee Harvey Oswald, and Oswald being killed by Jack Ruby two days later as he was being transferred by Dallas law officers.

It was an unbelievable sequence of events. We couldn't believe it was all taking place here in thoroughly civilized America, right here in our beloved home state.

But the thing that brought the starkness of the situation so vividly to Americans was that it practically happened right before their very eyes. Especially Ruby's shooting of Oswald, which happened on nationwide television.

LIKE MOST TEXANS, we were on our lunch hour at the time of the Kennedy assassina-

When they came on with the bulletin, and identified it from Dallas, we were fearful of what we would hear-sort of like an instant premonition--and our fears were soon confirmed.

The first announcement reported that President Kennedy had been shot during the parade, and that he had been taken to a Dallas hospital.

Like most Americans, we breathed a silent prayer-"Oh, God, don't let him die. Not in

Texas!" But by then, the president most likely was already dead (1 p.m. officially). It was a very painful time for all Americans, and we all still bear the scars of that day ten years ago.

At that time, Plains Publishers, the central printing plant, was flourishing here in Friona, and for the first and only time in the city's history, an Associated Press news wire was feeding news locally.

We returned to the office, and followed the sequence of events leading up to Oswald's capture on the AP news wire at Plains Publishers.

The events left a strange, "scarry" feeling with many people. We had intended to go to Muleshoe that night to watch a bi-district playoff game between Muleshoe and Denver City, but wife Carol persuaded us to stay at home. It was as if she felt there was a danger to being out in public.

We recall that we spent practically the entire weekend watching as the drama unfolded on television, and believe me, it was a very depressing weekend.

SEVERAL AREA folks were enroute to Austin, where the president had been scheduled to speak on Friday night.

But Lee Harvey Oswald had changed the course of history that noon hour in Dallas, shattering the beauty of Indian Summer in Texas, and spoiling what had started out to be a successful good-will mission by the president to our state.

We recall the tremendous "sinking feeling" we got when the news came across of Kennedy's death. It was akin to the feeling you get when you learn of the death of a loved one. Or perhaps when you hear that our country is at war ....

We sincerely pray that our nation never has to experience such a traumatic event again. After ten years, the events of that week are still very vivid to

The commissioners, after considering several plans, approved a \$2,500 yearly subsidy for each fire department in the county.

The decision was made following a lengthy discussion of the situation and is due to control. become effective on Jan. 1

### A large crowd of dignitaries and local residents was on hand

Tuesday morning for the official ground breaking ceremonies in the initial Running Water Draw Watershed Project dam construction at Bovina.

Originally scheduled for the construction site northwest of Bovina, the ceremony was moved to the Bovina Schools auditorium because of inclement weather.

Congressman George Mahon was principal speaker at the event. He was joined on the speaker's platform by A.L. Black of Friona, Parmer County Judge Archie Tarter, Leon Grissom of Bovina, chairman of the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District, and H.H. Calhoun of Plainview, one of the leaders in the 15-year effort to construct the series of floodwater retention dams.

The 10 a.m. program got under way with the Bovina High School Mustang Band, directed by Joe Blatchford, performing several numbers.

The invocation was given by Rev. Howard Marcom, pastor of the First United Methodist Church in Bovina. Black, who served as master

of ceremonies, was a member of the local Soil and Water Conservation District's board of directors for over 20 years and a former state director. He is actively involved in Water, Inc., and a prominent Parmer County farmer-rancher. He introduced H.H. Calhoun who remarked that "....today is a red letter day for most of us after 12 long years of fighting for this project.

"Many of us here today remember when the project was first proposed at a meeting in Dimmitt in 1961," Calhoun proposed after a severe flood in Plainview in 1960. "Running Water Draw will be harnessed now and return to the beauty spot it was in earlier days," he





### Friona Flashbacks

... from the files of the Friona Star

30 YEARS AGO-NOVEMBER 26, 1943

In a conversation with Carl Maurer Tuesday afternoon it was learned that Friona was in line for designation as a public airport, with both Army and Navy approval.



# King Leads Chiefs In Four Categories FHS 2069

Senior Ted King led the 1973 Friona Chieftains in two offensive categories, plus kickoff and punt returning, a compilation of season statistics


King was the team's leading scorer with 15 touchdowns good for 90 points. He also walked off with the individual rushing crown, gaining 1,170 yards in 174 tries, a fine 6.7 yards-per-carry average.

The Chieftain offensive star became the first Friona player since Tony Perea in 1968 to gain over 1,000 yards rushing. Perea, who holds the all-time Friona record in this category, gained 1,761 yards his senior

King also led in kickoff returns, with six for 178 yards, including a longest of 80 yards against Dalhart. He returned five punts for 104 total yards. Actually, younger brother Dee King had the best punt return average, 50 yards, thanks to his 79-scoring jaunt against Morton in the season's final game.

Quarterback Clay Bandy. who was the team's second leading scorer with 36 points, proved to be a more than adequate passer, hitting exactly half of his passes, 45 of 90 attempts, good for 768 vards. including nine touchdowns.

Adding Bandy's 768 yards passing and his 276 yards rushing gives the Chieftain junior a total of 1,044 yards

"We are here today to salute what has been done and look forward to what will be done in the future on this project," he

Pointing out that it took the cooperation of farmers, county officials, state agencies and two states to bring the project to this stage, he said, "Important things don't come easily or quickly. It takes cooperation and patience.

"As soneone once said, big things can be accomplished if no one is concerned with who gets the credit.'

Mahon said the Catfish Draw project is an example of ideas people in this country need to concentrate on in this time. He said the purpose of the project was to conserve water, land, people and resources and to support the economy.

He commented that environmentalists. although meaning well, have hurt some programs in the United States and were responsible to a degree for the shortages the country faces today in fuels and water.

"We cannot, in the name of environment protection, return to the Stone Age. We must combine common sense with concern about the environment to work out the solution to our problems.

"What we are commemorating today is meeting the necessity of protecting our environment and conserving our resources. Generations yet unborn will reap the benefits of what has been launched here today," he concluded.

In explaining some of the technical details of the project, it was pointed out that the project is divided into two portions. The upper Running Water Draw Watershed Project takes in Curry County in New Mexico and Parmer County. Dams will be constructed near Clovis, Bovina and Lazbuddie. In the lower part of the project, dams will be constructed in Castro, Lamb, Hale and Swisher counties. Sites will be near Sunnyside, on the north draw just inside the Hale County line and near Edmondson. Only one or two easements are needed to complete the legal aspects of
