The Ladies of St. Teresa's served refreshments following the service.

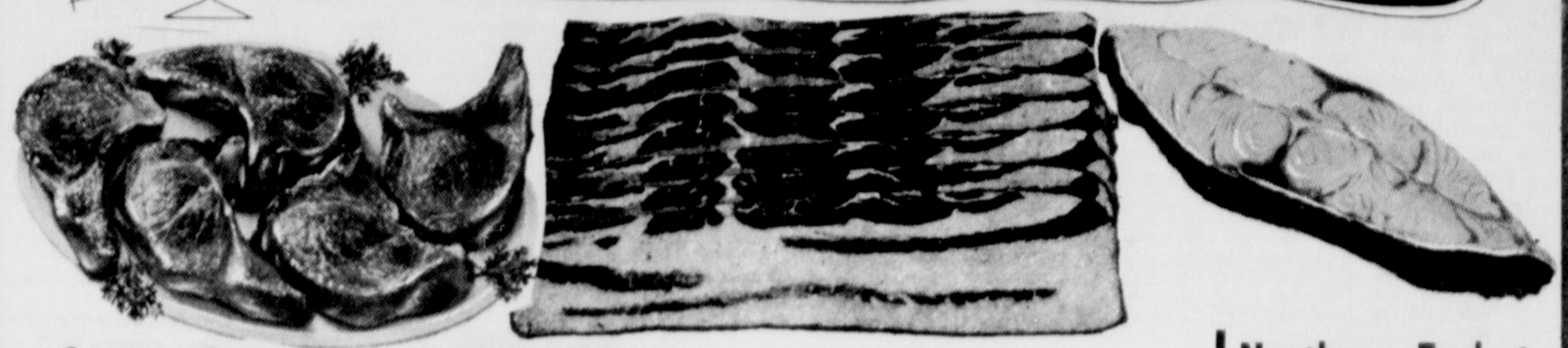
The offering taken during the service and to be used by the Ministerial Alliance during the year for various activities amounted to \$314.00, for which the Alliance is very grateful.

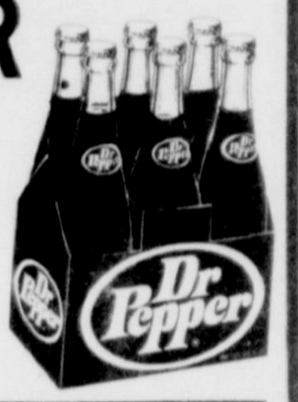



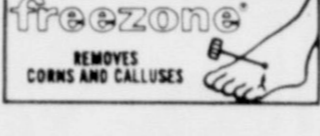

## 30 YEARS AGO—NOVEMBER 26, 1943

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

# King Leads Chiefs In Four Categories

Senior Ted King led the 1973 Friona Chieftains in two offensive categories, plus kick-off and punt returning, a compilation of season statistics reveals.

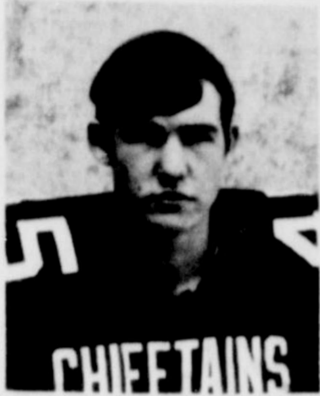
King was the team's leading scorer with 15 touchdowns good for 90 points. He also walked off with the individual rushing crown, gaining 1,170 yards in 174 tries, a fine 6.7 yards-per-carry average.

The Chieftain offensive star became the first Friona player since Tony Perea in 1968 to gain over 1,000 yards rushing. Perea, who holds the all-time Friona record in this category, gained 1,761 yards his senior year.

King also led in kickoff returns, with six for 178 yards, including a longest of 80 yards against Dalhart. He returned five punts for 104 total yards. Actually, younger brother Dee King had the best punt return average, 50 yards, thanks to his 79-scoring jaunt against Morton in the season's final game.

Quarterback Clay Bandy, who was the team's second leading scorer with 36 points, proved to be a more than adequate passer, hitting exactly half of his passes, 45 of 90 attempts, good for 768 yards, including nine touchdowns.

Adding Bandy's 768 yards passing and his 276 yards rushing gives the Chieftain junior a total of 1,044 yards

total offense—two players cracking the 1,000-yard mark the same season.

Adding Dee King and Dale Parsons' passing totals, the 1973 Chieftains passed for a total of 920 yards and 11 touchdowns. This was the best passing record compiled by a Friona team in at least the past 12 years.

Another junior, end Dale Cleveland, was the team's leading receiver with 17 catches good for 284 yards, an average of 16.7 yards a catch. Included in Cleveland's catches were two which went for touchdowns, plus non-scoring plays of 52 and 40 yards.

Actually, Gene Strickland, yet another junior on the team, scored the most touchdowns on passes—four. Dale Parsons, a former split end moved into the

backfield this year, scored three times on passes, and also threw a scoring pass [a 44-yarder to Strickland].

Parsons was the second leading receiver with 15 catches good for 232 yards. Parsons was also the rushing department's runner-up to King with 373 yards, giving him 605 yards for his year's work.

In the department of interceptions, Dee King was the team's leader, with four. However, David Hutson got the most for his interceptions, with two which both resulted in touchdowns. Hutson's 65-yard return against Springlake was the longest interception return.

Ted King also had the longest run from scrimmage, which must rank somewhere in the Friona school record book, a 93-yard scamper against Springlake.

Bandy averaged 38.1 yards per punt on 30 punts for the season.

The 1973 Chieftains were a high-scoring team. Their 255 points rank them third in the record book behind only the 1951 District champs who scored 273 points in nine games, and the 1968 Tony Perea-led team which scored 284 points.

Actually, the 1973 Chiefs scored the same number of touchdowns as did the 1968 eleven, which edged them in conversion points, 30-21

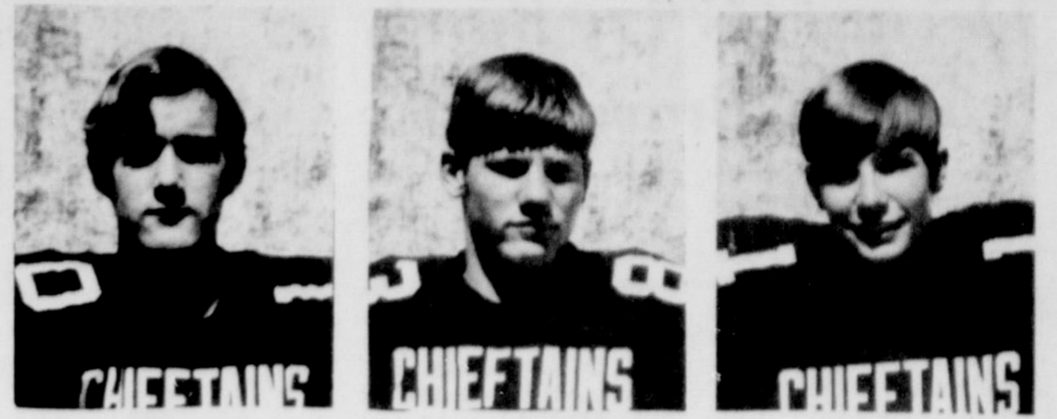

The Squaws, who dropped an 80-71 game to Stratford in their season opener here Saturday, rebounded for a 55-29 win over Farwell's girls Tuesday.

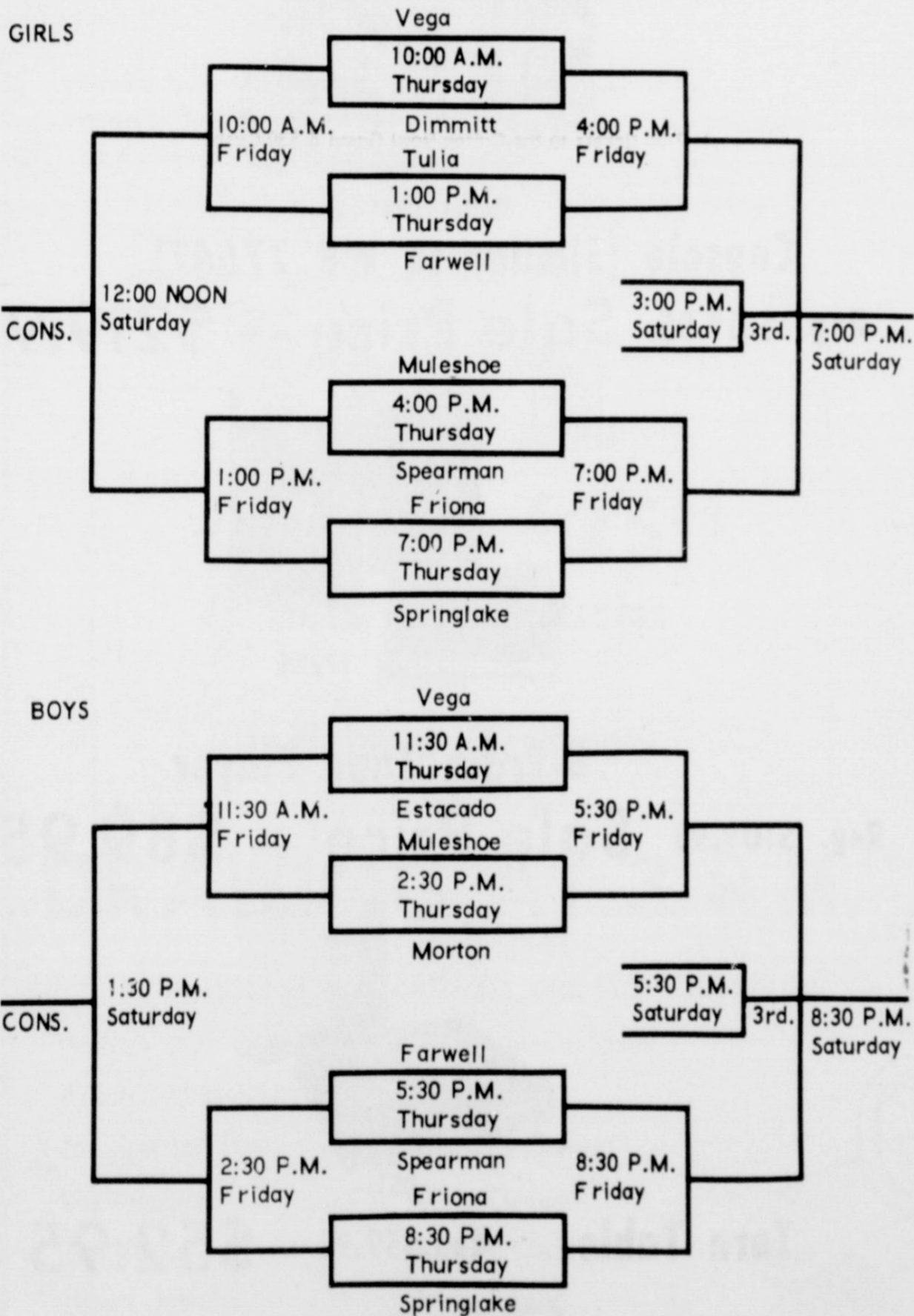

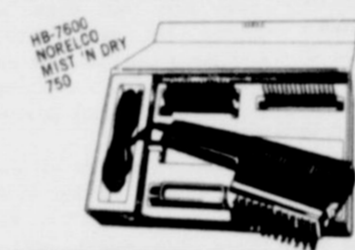

Friona was leading at the time, 8-0, but a touchdown and a two-point conversion in the last quarter by the visitors brought about the tie.

Both teams had some good defensive plays.

Those attending the meet are invited to eat with the Boosters and benefit the fund drive.

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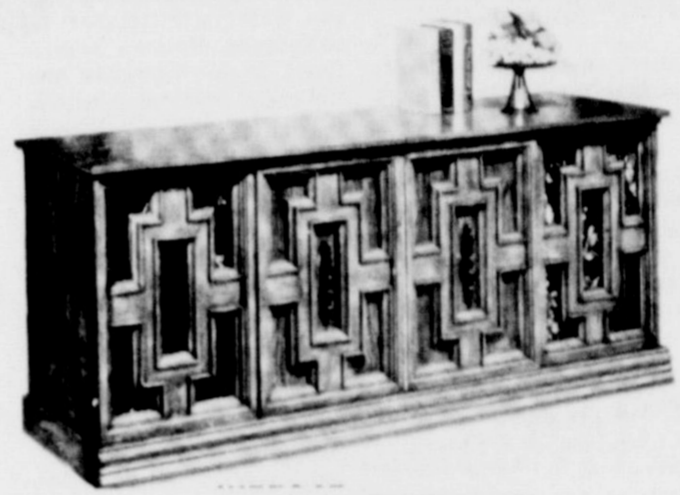
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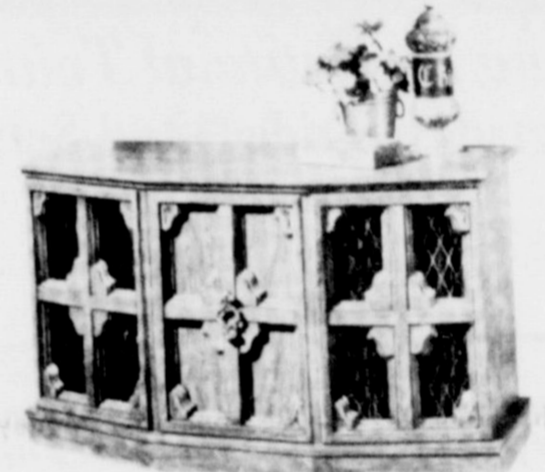
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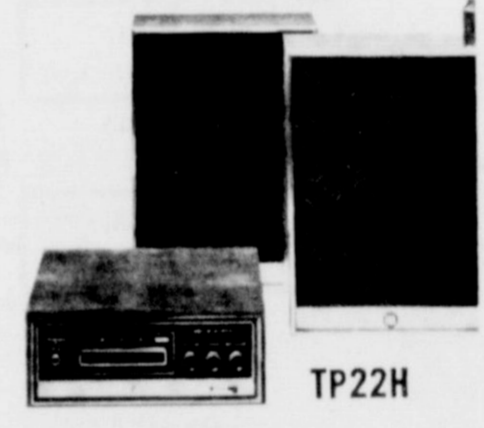

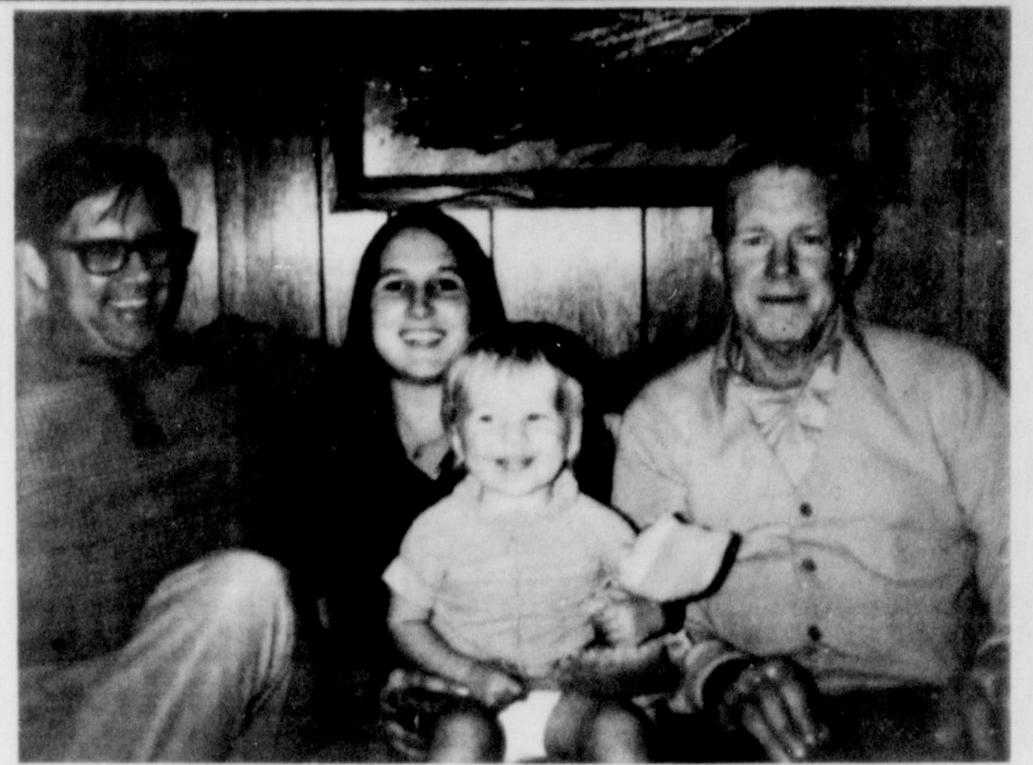

**YOU COME TOO** by Frost is an excellent introduction to the work of a fine American poet. The child moves in a world of imagination which is too soon

 "We are here today to salute what has been done and look forward to what will be done in the future on this project," he said.

Pointing out that it took the cooperation of farmers, county officials, state agencies and two states to bring the project to this stage, he said, "Important things don't come easily or quickly. It takes cooperation and patience."

"As someone once said, big things can be accomplished if no one is concerned with who gets the credit."

Mahon said the Catfish Draw project is an example of ideas people in this country need to concentrate on in this time. He said the purpose of the project was to conserve water, land, people and resources and to support the economy.

He commented that environmentalists, although meaning well, have hurt some programs in the United States and were responsible to a degree for the shortages the country faces today in fuels and water.

"We cannot, in the name of environment protection, return to the Stone Age. We must combine common sense with concern about the environment to work out the solution to our problems."

"What we are commemorating today is meeting the necessity of protecting our environment and conserving our resources. Generations yet unborn will reap the benefits of what has been launched here today," he concluded.

In explaining some of the technical details of the project, it was pointed out that the project is divided into two portions. The upper Running Water Draw Watershed Project takes in Curry County in New Mexico and Parmer County, Dams will be constructed near Clovis, Bovina and Lazbuddie. In the lower part of the project, dams will be constructed in Castro, Lamb, Hale and Swisher counties. Sites will be near Sunnyside, on the north draw just inside the Hale County line and near Edmondson. Only one or two easements are needed to complete the legal aspects of the entire project.

Tarter and Grissom each turned a shovel of Catfish Draw soil to conclude the ceremonies.

Representatives from television and radio stations and newspapers in Clovis, Amarillo, Lubbock, Dimmitt, Friona, Farwell and Bovina were present.

Herb Evans, district conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service, released these statistics about the dam here: the drainage area will cover some 18,714 acres, the emergency spillway will be 400 feet wide, the dam will be 23 feet high and 3,900 feet long, surface area at top of principal spillway will be 130 acres, water storage will be 793 acre feet and cubic yards of earth fill will be 112,100.
