# **To Kent Ellenburger**

The Ohlo Oil Company is to start operations soon at its No. 1 Emery Trust, which is slated to be an 8,100-foot wildcat to explore into the Ellenburger in Northwest Kent County. The venture is to be 1,980 feet

from north and 819 feet from east lines of section 39, block 2, H&GN survey. That makes it about 20 miles southwest of Spur, which is in Southwest Dickens County.

Drilling will be with rotary tools. Ohio has a large spread of acreage surrounding the drillsite.

#### Upton Discovery To **Test In Higher Zone**

Magnolia Petroleum Company is preparing to perforate and test in a higher section of the Ellenburger at its No. I-A TXL, North-Central Upton County flowing discovery 30 niles south of Midland.

This new field opener, located 660 feet from north and west lines of section 31, block 40, TP survey, T-4-8, had flowed at the average rate of slightly more than 11 barrels of new oil per hour from perforated section at 12,780-820 feet. That nterval had been washed with 1,000 sallons of acid and then treated with 2,000 gallons of regular acid. The flowing had been through a one-quarter inch tubing choke. Gasoil ration had been slightly more than 1.400-1.

No formation water has developed from that horizon. **Probably** Acidized

The section at 12,700-760 feet is to be perforated and tested. It probably will be acidized. A packer will be set between 12,760 feet and 12,780 feet, so that the production from the lower section of perforations can be kept out of the testing to be undertaken in the higher formation.

This wildcat is due to produce oil all the way up to 12,530 feet, the top of the Ellenburger. Operator tatives have not revealed

# Vocational Bigotry

afraid .--- Mark 5:15.

The denial of Florida's Senator Claude Pepper that he meant to reflect on the patriotism of any class in charging that manufacturers' sons "stayed home" during the last war can hardly undo the damage wrought by the senator's original intolerant statement.

"I made a generalization," Pepper pleads. "I distinctly remember saying, 'I do not impugn the patriotism of any class'."

But it is precisely on such generalizations that intolerance thrives.

Efforts to banish prejudice from American life are directed almost exclusively toward feelings about race and religion. But there is another form of intolerance that needs some educational spadework. It is what may be called vocational bigotry.

The vocational bigot is the person who tells you that all union organizers are Communists, or that all corporation executives are Fascists.

It is possible to be a vocational bigot and at the same time be a liberal, as that elastic word is usually defined. Senator Pepper dares to take a stand against racial and religious intolerance, though he comes from a part of the country where such a stand can amount to political suicide. Yet he has proven that he can be as intolerant as Rep. John Rankin or the most hidebound anti-unionist in the National Association of Manufacturers. The personal target of Senator Pepper's ill-starred remarks was Ira Mosher, who was speaking for the NAM before a Senate committee on the new labor relations bill. Pepper wound up by pounding on a desk and shouting, "It was the workers' sons who died on the battlefields and the manufacturers' sons by and large who stayed home and made the profits out of the war.' Such a statement, of course, was undignified, ungenerous and untrue. It would have been all that even if, Mosher had not replied by informing the senator that he had lost three of his family in the war.

# Cabbage Key **Boasts Most** Social Hermit

By HAL BOYLE ST. PETERSHURG, FLA.-(P)--You can't get away from life. And the "Hermit of Cabbage Key" has quit trying. He's becoming a haby sitter. The hermit is 68-year old Silas

Dent, who has lived some 40 years on Cabbage Key, a 2,000-acre subtropical island 12 miles southwest of here. Much of that time he has spent alone in a palm-thatched

But now "Uncle Silas" is the most modernized hermit in history. Civilization caught up with him after two young honeymoon-ing couples moved to the island and adopted him. Lots of Attention

"I'll bet there isn't a hermit anywhere that gets the attention he does," said Mrs. Barbara Simmons. "And he loves it," laughed her friend, Mrs. Eva McCall. The two girls, married to young shrimp fishermen, live in palm-thatched huts which the old hermit helped build. I walked down a hundred yards

of sandy trail. And there sat the "Hermit of Cabbage Key" in the doorway of his palm hut, looking like Santa Claus in overalls. "Seems to me like I see somebody

coming," he said. And he went right on at his task, threading apart palm leaves with an ice pick. It takes him a whole day to make a palm leaf mosquito swatter in this manner. And the swatter sells for

only one dollar. "Uncle Silas" was too shy to admit he was making the grass skirts as presents for the two young wives.


















# House Panel Moves **Slowly On Proposed** Levy On Natural Gas

By DAVE CHEAVENS AUSTIN-(P)-The House Com-mittee on Revenue and Taxation is not going to hurry any new moneyraising measures to the 51st Legislature's calendar.

That became obvious Monday night when the committee sent the session's first important tax bill to subcommittee for three weeks study. It was the bill by Rep. Deno Tufares of Wichita Falls, putting a levy of one and one-half cents per 1,000 cubic feet of natural gas. The committee's action in inviting Comptroller Robert S. Calvert to appear before it March 9 to report on the state's financial condi-tion also was a tip-off on the com-

Public Hearings Set The committee also set for pub lic hearing at 7:30 p. m. March 21 a bill by Rep. Davis Clifton of Farmersville to repeal the four-cents per gallon sales tax on gasoline and replace it with a one-cent per gallon processing tax on all combustible fuels.

Next Monday night it will hear testimony on Bep. C. S. McClellan's bill levying a tax of one cent per 1,000 cubic feet of natural gas. Tufares described his bill as

levy on the privilege of engaging in the natural gas-business."

Opponents said much of the cost would be passed on to household and other users here in Texas, that the bill was unfair in singling out one industry, that it would be confiscatory for some small producers that might be defined as gas gatherers, that the gas industry already is paying six different kinds of taxes and now is paying more taxes than any other natural resource but

### **Conflicting Testimony**

Proponents told the committee that only in a few cases would household consumers be required to foot the final bill, that a tax is needed on the "billions of cubic feet of gas" being exported from Texas; that the money is needed for improving the state hospitals, rural roads and schools.


