

#### **Clear Fork Flows Oil** At Flanagan Outpost

Magnolia Petroleum Company No. Flanagan, one location east of the iscovery from the Ellenburger at Shell Oil Company, Inc., No. 1 Hawkins, to open the Flanagan field, in South-Central Gaines County, about 11 miles southwest of Seminole, has proven for flowing oil production from the lower Clear Fork of the Permian, and is to drill ahead to explore the Devonian



WASHINGTON - (P) - Senate - House conferees agreed Monday on a 15-month rent control extension bill requiring a "fair net operating income" for landlords.

The agreement clears the way for House and Senate action on a new rent control law before the present law expires Thursday at midnight.

Senator Lucas of Illinois, the Democratic leader, said the compromise bill will be brought up in the Senate as soon as a draft of the agreement is put in shape.

The provision requiring a "fair net operating income" for landlords is the one the

Senate insisted on for handling possible rent increases. The House conferees rejected it Saturday. That caused a deadlock over the weekend.

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## Ratification Of Pact Is Likely


A preliminary poll of senators indicates the North Atlantic Treaty has a good chance of Senate approval. Of the 93 members questioned, 55 said that they favored the principle of the pact, 37 were undecided, and one was opposed. The 55-nine less than the two-thirds majority needed for approval-included 16 Republicans and 14 senators from the Deep South.

So it seems that the bi-partisan foreign policy is still operating, at least in this particular matter. The Republican-Southern Democratic coalition apparently will confine itself once more to domestic matters.

Approval of principle, however, does not mean that the Senate's OK of the pact will be a perfunctory formality. Nor does it mean that partisan differences will not arise during the treaty debate, even though there is a likelihood that the debate will not be used as an instrument of partisan maneuvering.

There are senators who probably will balk at carrying out the real meaning of Article 3, even though they vote approval of the whole treaty. That is the section in which the parties to the treaty agree that, "by means of continuout and effective self-help and mutual aid, (they) will maintain and develop their individual and collective capacity to resist armed attack."

The self-help that the European signatories can provide will consist mainly of manpower for their armed forces. The mutual aid of those signatories will be confined largely to manpower and, in some cases, air bases. The bulk of armaments for Europe will have to come from the United States.

## Former Employe Of |Plans For Revision U. S. Embassy Faces Treason Indictment

WASHINGTON -(AP)- A federgrand jury Monday indicted Herbert John Burgman, 52. former employe of the U. S. Embassy in Berlin, on treason charges.

He is accused of broadcasting Nazi radio propaganda during the War.

Burgman, a native of Hokah, Minn., was employed 20 years as a clerk and statistician in the Berlin Embassy prior to the outbreak of World War II.

The indictment charges that after Pearl Harbor Burgman -refused to return to the United States with other American diplomatic person-

Instead, it said, he sought and obtained employment with the German government radio service.

The indictment set out 69 separate alleged treasonous acts in connection with his alleged management of the Nazi radio propaganda broadcasting facility known as "Station Debunk, the station of all free Americans."

Burgman is the 25th American to be indicted for treason during World War II-and the 13th to be indicted for assisting in enemy propaganda broadcasting.
