

Wildcat Makes New
Discovery in Borden
Pennsylvanian Lime

Seaboard Oil Company of Delaware and Pap-American Production Company have discovered a new oil field from the Canyon line of the Pennsylvanian at their No. 1 T. J. Good, in Southwest Borden County, six miles northwest of the nearest production in the Vealmoor field of North-Central Howard County.

The oil was found in a drillstem test at 7,220-40 feet. The tool was open one hour and 40 minutes. A one-half inch bottom hole choke was used.

Gas showed at the surface in three minutes. Drilling mud started flowing out at the top in 38 minutes. Oil began flowing to tanks in 42 minutes.

It flowed for the remaining 58 minutes of the test at the rate of 22 barrels of oil per hour. No water developed. Operator is preparing to run casing, make production tests and try to complete the new discovery.

It is located 1,985 feet from south and 2,004 feet from west lines of section 27, block 33, TP survey, T-4-N.

The first oil in this new field opened was developed during a 70-minute drillstem test at 7,910-20 feet.

Gas showed at the surface in 19 minutes. Recovery was 450 feet of clean oil and 20 feet of oil and gas out drilling mud. Open flowing bottom hole pressure during that test was zero. Shut-in bottom hole pressure, after 15 minutes was 3,100 pounds. The zone at 7,920-40 feet, drilled extra soft.

Location Staked For
Flanker To Benedum

Drilling is to be started at once on a southward flanker to the Ellenburger production in the Benedum field of East-Central Upson County, about 15 miles northeast of Rankin.

The new venture will be owned by Wright of Chicago, and Miami, Fla., No. 1 O. W. Wright, Jr. is located 680 feet from north and east lines of the south half of the east half of section 5, A. W. Daugherty survey, and on the W. H. Dixon ranch.

The prospector is to dig to around 12,500 feet to explore into the Ellenburger. Helmrich & Payne, Inc., has the rotary contract and will start operations at once.

W. H. Dixon and others own the royalty under the lease. C. W. Chancellor of Midland, had the lease on the acreage. He is located in Wright to drill, making the deal with L. T. Lohman of Dallas, Wright's representative in the southwest.

Chancellor retained one-half of the seven-eighths working interest as an overriding royalty. The new exploration is a diagonal southwest outpost to Slick Urchel Oil Company No. 1 Dixon, an Ellenburger producer.

Yarborough & Allen
Outpost Flows Oil

An extension to the Ellenburger production in the Yarborough & Allen field of Southwest Ector County has been made by Magnolia Petroleum Company No. 3 Anderson, 680 feet from south and west lines of section 13, block 14, ps survey.

The prospector drillstem tested the Ellenburger for two hours and 12 minutes, to 10,595-65 feet, using a 3/8-inch bottom hole choke. Gas reached the surface in seven minutes, mud in 59 minutes and oil in 58 minutes.

The well flowed to the pits to clean for 14 minutes. It was then turned to tanks and gauged for 36.6 barrels of oil in one hour. Gravity of the petroleum was 42.2 degrees. Gas-oil ratio was 586-1. There was no water.

The prospector is drilling ahead for a deeper investigation of the current horizon.

Collins Taking DST
At Scurry Wildcat

An unidentified sand and shale formation above the Canyon-Pennsylvanian was being drillstem tested at J. L. Collins, et al. No. 1 G. E. Parks, wildcat in North-Central Scurry County, eight miles north of Snyder and 1,980 feet from north, 330 feet from west lines of section 442, block 97, H&TC survey.

The strata was cored from 6,202 feet to 6,222 feet, recovering 11 feet of sand with shale streaks, showing good oil prospects, and four feet of shale with sand streaks. The test now being taken is to the bottom of the core hole.

Shallow Wildcat Is
Set For Crockett

A shallow wildcat is to be started at once in South-Central Crockett County by W. T. Loffland and J. M. Loffland, Jr., of Fort Worth.

It will be their No. 1 L. B. Cox, staked 330 feet from north and east lines of the southwest quarter of section 25, block 2, I&GN survey, about 25 miles southwest of the town of Oona.

The venture is projected to 1,900 feet with cable tools. It is on a farm-out from Honolith Oil Corporation and Signal Oil & Gas Company.

Stock Prices Soar To New Highs

Johnson Sets
Out To Unify
Armed Forces

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Defense Secretary Johnson set out Tuesday to unify the three Armed Forces completely and quickly.

As the first step of this crack-down, he told a news conference he is ordering the Army, Navy and Air Force to move at once to the Pentagon. Some agencies of those departments are scattered throughout the city.

They already were under orders to move to the Pentagon, but the approved moving schedule stretched out over two and one-half years. Johnson has told them to scrap the schedule and move now.

Johnson said he also intends to abolish many of the 800 boards and agencies set up by the Army, Navy and Air Force over a period of years.

"There are too damned many for efficiency's sake and we're going to abolish and coordinate some of them."

It probably will be possible to abolish 30 or 40 right at the start, he said.

A reporter asked Johnson if he has made up his mind what the "respective roles" of the Air Force and Navy should be.

The two services have quarreled over what bombing duties each should have in event of war.

Johnson replied: "I do have a pretty fair conviction. The three services are going to have a chance to argue me out of that conclusion in the next couple of days."

He said he plans to go to Key West, Fla., with the commanders of the three Armed Forces within the next week to confer with Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, the temporary chairman of the joint chiefs of staff. Eisenhower went to Key West Monday to recuperate from an illness.

Presumably, the talks there will concern the roles of the services under unification.

Italian Minister Is
First Arrival For
Pact Signing Event

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Italy's foreign minister headed for the State Acheson Tuesday afternoon to join the other Western Democracies in an alliance against Russian expansion.

The Italian official, Count Carlo Sforza, had a date to see Secretary of State Acheson Wednesday afternoon.

The bearded diplomat reached here late Monday night, well ahead of the procession of nine—and possibly 10—other foreign ministers converging on the United States to sign the North Atlantic Defense Treaty April 4.

Sforza's first words on arrival were to hail the pact, which the Communists have denounced as "aggressive" as an instrument aimed at keeping the peace.

Discussion of Colonies
His decision to call promptly on Acheson raised speculation that he planned to devote part of the meeting to discussion of Italy's request for trusteeship control over her three former colonies in Africa.

The United Nations Assembly is to decide the future of the colonies in New York April 5. The United States at last report still was undecided about its policy toward two of the colonies—Fritrea and Tripolitania.

Assistant Secretary of State Dean Rusk said at a news conference Monday that this country favors returning the third colony, Somaliland, to Italy under a trusteeship arrangement.

Three Bodies Found
In Crashed Bomber

CAMP McNAIR, JAPAN—(AP)—Only three bodies were found Tuesday by U. S. Army men who reached the wreckage of an American bomber on the snow-covered slopes of Fujiyama.

Four men had been reported aboard the light bomber by the Far Eastern Air Forces. Headquarters said all aboard were killed in the crash Sunday.

Kaiser-Frazer Cuts
Auto Prices Deeply

DETROIT—(AP)—Kaiser-Frazer Corporation slashed its car prices Tuesday—the auto industry's second price cut within a month's time.

Simultaneously, Kaiser-Frazer announced a change in top management.

The price cuts ranged from \$198 up to \$383 on K-F's various models, by far the largest of any cuts in the industry since the end of the war.

The company said in a statement it was "entering a broader mass market" and was "offering the public the lowest priced big cars in the world."

Coupled with the price cut was the elevation of Edgar F. Kaiser to the presidency of Kaiser-Frazer.

Kaiser, son of Board Chairman Henry J. Kaiser, succeeds Joseph W. Frazer, who becomes vice chairman of the board, a newly created post.

The younger Kaiser formerly was vice president and general manager. His father and Frazer founded the auto company in 1945.

The changes were described in trade circles as the outgrowth of differences in policy.

K-F still a relative newcomer in the highly competitive auto industry, cut its prices a month after General Motors reduced prices.

GM, largest of the car producers, reduced its passenger car prices \$10 to \$40 and its trucks up to \$150.

K-F said its prices averaged in excess of 19 1/2 per cent.

Two years ago Ford cut prices but subsequent increases were more than wiped this out.

However, Monday President Henry Ford II said in Boston Ford might again reduce prices. He said material costs were coming down "somewhat."

Yugoslav-Guerrilla

ROME—(AP)—The Italian news agency Astra, quoting the Italian Committee of National Liberation at Trieste, said Tuesday Yugoslav Army troops and guerrillas fought a gun battle near the Italian border Sunday night.

The report was not confirmed.

Tempers Flare As
House Starts New
Stampede On Reds

AUSTIN—(AP)—The House started a new stampede against Communism Tuesday.

But the uproar ran head-on into a bloc of members who wanted more study on a bill designed to throw Communists out of state colleges. The cautious won out, and the House agreed unanimously to postpone further debate until Thursday morning.

"I yield to no one on my loyalty to my country," said 80-year-old Rep. S. J. Isaacks of El Paso. "But I don't want this House to take up something as important as this without due consideration."

The bill had swirled through the House Tuesday morning in an outburst of oratory. Author Sam Hanna of Dallas got unanimous consent to introduce it. The Education Committee met immediately and approved it. Within 15 minutes the House had given unanimous consent for the bill to be brought up for debate.

Hanna's bill would require every teacher, student or employe of any state college to sign an affidavit of his loyalty to the Constitution and swear he was not a member of any subversive organization.

"This is gonna be nothing but a stampede," said one member.

Margin Cuts
Set Off Big
Buying Spree

NEW YORK—(AP)—Buying orders poured into Wall Street Tuesday in response to news that more credit could be used in securities trading. Stock quotations advanced a few cents to around \$2 a share.

The opening of the market was one of the fastest of the last year or so. Demand was so rapid the high-speed ticker tape fell behind recording actual transactions on the floor of the exchange by as much as three minutes. It was the first time since Jan. 3, 1948, the tape has been unable to keep up with the market. The tape caught up after a lag of about 20 minutes.

Late Monday the Federal Reserve Board, guardian of the nation's credit, announced that securities could be bought for 50 per cent in cash instead of 75 per cent. The new ruling goes into effect Wednesday.

The announcement caught Wall Street off guard. Lower margin requirements long has been expected but most financial men had guessed nothing would be done for at least a few weeks.

Several stocks sold at the highest prices of the year, including Montgomery Ward, Low's, Spearheading the drive ahead were such issues as U. S. Steel, Republic Steel, General Motors, Chrysler, U. S. Rubber, Sears Roebuck, Glenn Martin, American Telephone, Phelps Dodge, General Electric, Allied Chemical, International Paper, Santa Fe, N. Y. Central, Southern Pacific, Chesapeake & Ohio, Illinois Central, Standard Oil (N. J.), Plymouth Oil, United Airlines, and Twentieth Century-Fox.

Shortly after the board's announcement, Board Member Madison S. Eccles said the action indicated a "recognition that a deflation is certainly more imminent." Eccles spoke on a television broadcast.

He said a certain amount of deflation is a "healthy thing for the country."

The board's order was issued in the wake of a flow of government reports showing employment, production, prices, bank loans and sales of many goods pouring down together in early 1949.

Not in four years—since the approaching end of the war made the board in 1945 fearful of an inflationary boom spreading out of the stock markets—had the board made securities-buying credit so liberal.

The board's action was underlined by the fact that easier "stock margin requirements" were authorized on the heels of consumer credit control relaxation March 3.

In the earlier move, installment buyers were given time to finish paying off, thus lengthening payment time by three to six months for various goods and, consequently, making each month's installment smaller.

The cash down payment on all goods but autos was cut from 25 per cent from the previous 30 per cent level, although down payments on cars were held at 33 per cent.

Soldiers Not Spies
Says Army Spokesman

FRANKFURT, GERMANY—(AP)—U. S. Army Headquarters declared Tuesday that two American soldiers convicted in Prague of espionage "definitely were not spies."

"They were not on any mission but were absent without leave when they went into Czechoslovakia," an official Army spokesman said.

The Army spokesman declined to comment on speculation among Americans here that the soldiers' conviction might be in retaliation against the U. S. Army's recent spy trials in Munich.

Seventeen Europeans—several of them Czechs—were convicted in the Munich trials of spying on U. S. Forces in Germany for the Czech Intelligence Service.

Weatherford Man
Slashes Wife, Then
Turns Knife On Self

WEATHERFORD—(AP)—Jen Akers, 45, auto mechanic and his estranged wife, Marnie, 40, were in a hospital Tuesday in a serious condition from knife wounds.

Attendants said they probably would recover.

They said Mrs. Akers' body was a mass of stab wounds, three of which were inflicted about the face and neck. Akers' most serious wound was a five-inch gash that barely missed the jugular vein.

The stabbing occurred Monday night at the home of City Treasurer C. E. Canafax, in whose home Akers was renting a room.

Canafax told officers Akers came into his home with Mrs. Akers shortly before 10 p. m. He said the couple talked about 20 minutes, then Mrs. Akers screamed.

Canafax said the woman ran into a hall, blood streaming from several wounds. He said he intercepted Akers at the door and grabbed his arm.

"I pleaded with him to stop," Canafax told police.

He then put in a call for the police. Four officers rushed to the home to find Mrs. Akers lying in a pool of blood. They said Akers was nearby plunging a paring knife into his own chest.

A relative said the couple had been separated several months.

Instead, reports of conduct and progress will be incorporated in a report of earnings, which veterans now file and which they will continue to submit to VA every four months.

This eliminates that familiar blue form called monthly report of training.

Action Is Needed

Retiring Defense Secretary Forrestal has made a belated move to give "unification" of the armed forces a more practical meaning.

Previously a member of the House had criticized the Air Force for releasing to the press a list of some 70 targets in Russia that could be reached by non-stop bombers carrying atomic explosives.

"Unification," as administered, has intensified rather than diminished inter-service rivalry.

The new Air Force Department, justifiably proud of its war record, set out to convince the country that it could win another war almost single-handed.

Both these departments—and the Army too, of course—put in some highly disunified budget requests with Congress.

All this cannot be dismissed as die-hard pettiness. It is an effort to nullify the law which created what was meant to be, and what can be, a more efficient instrument of national defense.

When the Air Force flies a bomber non-stop around the world it is not simply showing off the efficiency of our aircraft and the skill of their crews.

The world flight and the bomb targets were meant, we trust, to be examples of defensive action.

WASHINGTON COLUMN Signatory Powers Are Own Judges In Pact Promises

By PETER EDSON NEA Washington Correspondent

WASHINGTON—Secretary of State Dean Acheson got right down to basic English when he unveiled the text of the proposed North Atlantic Pact.

The secretary drew a homely parallel. Suppose a man makes a contract to buy a cow for \$100, he began.

Decent people carry out their contracts without going to court, the secretary went on.

Fact Is A Contract

In this North Atlantic Pact, the United States, Canada, Britain, Belgium, France, Luxembourg and the Netherlands have proposed a legal contract to do certain things.

If there is any doubt about whether any incident is a threat to the peace—if it is just a border flare-up or an entirely internal political matter—the pact need be interpreted what shall be considered an armed attack. (Art. 6.)

Q—For what is Steve Brodie famous? A—Steve Brodie, a Bowery saloonkeeper of the early eighties, gained fame by leaping from the Brooklyn Bridge into the East River and surviving the feat.

Q—Did the body of Christopher Columbus ever rest in Haiti? A—Yes, the body of Christopher Columbus rested in the cathedral at Seville until removed to Santo Domingo, Haiti, about 1841. In 1795, on the transfer of Haiti to France, a coffin containing the remains of Columbus was taken to Havana, Cuba. This was again taken Spain. There are reasons for believing that an error was made; if so, the remains of the great explorer still rest in Haiti.

Q—Who is the reputed inventor of letters? A—Cadmus, in Greek mythology, founder of the city of Thebes. He worked out the system of the 14 letters of the Phoenician alphabet.

Q—Where is the most northerly group of coral islands in the world? A—The Bermuda Islands, in the West Indies, which consist of over 150 small coral islands.

Q—When was the Grand Army of the Republic founded? A—The first post of the grand Army of the Republic was established at Decatur, Illinois, April 6, 1866.

Coach Tugboat Jones arrived here shortly after the first of the year—new to the school, new to the boys and the boys are new to him. If we still had Spring training, he would get a chance to look them over—now. Now is the time he needs to know. Now is the time to start winning those football games which will be played next Fall.

In a winning football combination there is no guess work. The coach has to know what his individual players are capable of doing and on the other hand, the players must know what the coach is going to expect.

Cage Rules Changed To Halt Late-Game Roughing, Stalling

SEATTLE—(AP)—Two regulations designed to lessen stalling and prevent late-game rough-house play were announced Monday by the National Basketball Committee of the United States and Canada.

The new rule figuring to curb fouling applies to the last two minutes of play.

It provides that on each foul committed in the final 120 seconds, a personal foul will be charged against the offending player, but it will be treated as a technical foul.

That is, the player fouled will be given a free throw, but the ball will be put out of play. After the toss, the ball will be given on an out-of-bounds to the team which was fouled.

Held-Ball Ruling Under the old rule, such fouls were treated as personals and the team against which the offense was committed was given the option of taking the free throw or taking the ball out-of-bounds. In most cases, the team in possession—generally ahead on points—would take the ball out-of-bounds rather than jeopardize possession. Feeling it had no points to lose, the trailing team often fouled heavily in an effort to get the ball.

The second major change was aimed at stalling by the team in possession.

The new rule makes it mandatory for an official to call a held ball when a "closely guarded" player withholds the ball from play in front court for five seconds without an apparent effort to dribble, pass or shoot.







Texas League, At Post-War Peak, May Have Tough Time Beating 1947 Offense Marks

DALLAS —(P)— The Texas League admittedly will be at its post-war playing peak this year but can it erase the offensive highs set into the Class AA history of the circuit? Is there another Al Rosen tuning his batting eye for a super year? Is there another Jack Cassini getting his legs in shape for a season of base path riot?

Those questions take shape as Texas League clubs move toward the April 13 openers. And they spotlight the 1947 season of the Lone Star circuit's "ultra-modern" (since the war) era as productive of the best individual offensive show since the TL reactivated. It is the marks set up in 1947's super-heated race that will be under fire, and only the home run total looks immediately vulnerable.

Individual Records
Here are the individual offensive highs of the post-war era:
Average — Al Rosen, Oklahoma City, 349 (1947); Home runs—Nick Gregory, Shreveport, 28 (1947); stolen bases—Jack Cassini, Tulsa, 52 (1947); runs batted in—Al Rosen, Oklahoma City, 141 (1947).

Last year the potent Tulsa Oilers scored a sweep of these four departments, with Tommy Tatum leading the hitters with 333, and the base stealers with 37, and burly Russell Burns topped the home run list with 26 and the RBI bracket with 113. But none of these figures, with the exception of Burns' 26 homers, mildly threatened the 1947 individual offensive accomplishments.

Burns is back with the Oilers, and along with Dallas' Jerry Witte will bring Gregory's post-war high of 28 four-masters under extreme peril. There are those competent baseball men who believe Witte could be good for 40 homers against Texas League pitching, and Burns no doubt would have entered the 30-class last season had he not broken

his hand three weeks before the season's close.
If some hitter comes along to top Rosen's 349 or 141 runs batted in he will place himself solidly in the forefront of the "player of the year" balloting. Early camp games have not uncovered anyone, veteran or rookie, with a 350 hitting potential against the tough TL pitching. But it is well to remember that Rosen, now with the Cleveland Indians, came into the Lone Star wheel out of Class C obscurity, and it is well-established fact that the best collection of young ball players yet to be seen in post-war Texas League camps now are going through their paces.

Rosen's 349 was the best TL hitting mark since Homer Peel's 370 for Fort Worth in 1937, and Peel's effort represents the top individual batting average in the league's "modern" history spanning 1933-48.
Cassini's remarkable base running for the Oilers of 1947 also sets up a lofty target, but it would seem more vulnerable than the Rosen hitting feats. De Fondy, currently on the Fort Worth roster, has the potential to surpass it if the conditions are right. Beaumont has a great young speedster in 22-year old Bob Marquis.

Committee Vetoes Effort To Loosen Texas Labor Laws

AUSTIN —(AP)—A bill representing labor's only hope for weakening restrictive Texas labor laws will reach the House on a minority report from the Labor Committee.
 A majority of the panel Monday recommended that the House not pass the bill by Rep. Blake Timmons of Amarillo repealing 11 laws and wrapping up modified versions in a single act.
 It also would create a mediation and conciliation service and allow arbitration of disputes by mutual agreement of management and labor.
 The committee vote was 14 to 5. The five dissenting votes gave Rep. Otis Lee of Fort Arthur the exact amount of strength needed to secure a minority report from the 21-man committee.
 Lee, leader of House labor forces, gave immediate notice he would follow this course of action.
 Needing favorable consideration by the House and then by a Senate committee, the Senate and finally the governor, Timmons' bill appeared unlikely to make the grade this late in the season.

House Panel Okays Measures To Assist Municipal Financing

AUSTIN —(AP)—Texas cities pleading they are in desperate financial condition because of limited tax resources were given some measure of hope Monday night by a House committee.
 The House panel on revenue and taxation recommended passage of one bill urged by spokesmen for the cities, sent another to subcommittee for one week of further study, and asked the attorney general for an opinion of constitutionality of another.
 Recommended outright for passage was a measure exempting gasoline used by fire trucks, police cars and other municipal equipment from payment of the four-cents-a-gallon state sales tax on gasoline.
 Sent to subcommittee was another requiring that property taxes be paid on automobiles before their owners can get license plates. Sent to the attorney general was the bill providing for remission to the cities of three-fourths of the gasoline taxes paid by bus and taxicab companies operating under franchise or permits issued by municipalities.

Remission Measure Valuable

The remission measure was the one estimated to be worth most in dollars to city treasuries.
 City Attorney Will Sears of Houston said it would bring Houston about \$325,000 annually there and that other cities would benefit proportionately.
 "Texas cities are being constantly pressed for extensions of services and the money just isn't there," Sears said. "The cities are in a desperate situation and additional revenue sources must be found, or present services curtailed."
 Joining in the plea were City Manager Steve Matthews of Lubbock and City Commissioner Crawford Atkinson of Pampa.
 Sears told the committee Houston paid out \$40,000 last year in gasoline taxes for equipment that never moved outside the city limits.

Cities Cite Tax Payments

R. B. Allen, city engineer of Highland Park, said it paid out \$1,885 and University Park paid \$3,000. Dick Pepin, Pampa city manager, said that city paid \$2,500 last year. Alton King, Palestine city manager, said Palestine was paying out between \$160 and \$175 a month.
 They all protested it was not a good principle for the state to tax any subdivision.
 King and H. P. Kucera, city attorney of Dallas, urged passage of the bill designed to step up collection of property taxes on automobiles. They said many automobile owners owned no other taxable property, they used city streets and their children went to the public schools, but they paid nothing for the services.



Life Expectancy Has Gone Up But So Has Medical Expense

By EDWIN P. JORDAN, M. D. Written for NEA Service

The average child who was born in the United States 100 years ago could expect to live to the age of 46. Actually this meant that many children died in infancy and in early childhood; some lived well beyond the age of 40. Fifty years ago a child at birth could expect to live on the average for 48 years. The improvement continued, until in 1947 life expectancy had risen to 67. However, it costs more to live longer. As was pointed out by an eminent physician some time ago when appendicitis was treated by applying poultices and administering pills, the cost of medical care was low. Of course, a high proportion of those stricken with appendicitis died. Now the inflamed appendix generally is removed but the cost of the hospital and the surgery is much higher. But most patients get well. This is only one example. It is not only the number of deaths which is a measure of medical progress, however. The medical profession aims not only to prevent deaths but also to relieve suffering. Diseases Are Replaced. Typhoid fever, diphtheria, pneumonia, tuberculosis and many other diseases have become far less important as causes both of illness and death than they used to be. How-

Some people, however, seem to have puffiness below the eyes unrelated to any disease condition and perhaps in such cases it is merely a family tendency to deposits of fat in this area.

ever, there are more people living to older years and thus becoming candidates for high blood pressure, hardening of the arteries, certain types of heart diseases, cancer and similar conditions which have always taken their toll of older people. With this change in the importance of disease, there has come a change in emphasis on the diseases subjected to medical research. Some of those mentioned may eventually be partially or completely conquered, but no matter how much money is spent the time will probably never come when people will live forever.

Soviet Composer Reads Apologies For 'Good' Music

By JAMES MARLOW WASHINGTON —(P)— A thin, sensitive, 43-year-old genius traveled all the way from Russia to the United States and apologized for his work.

Dmitri Shostakovich, who has written some of the finest music of our time, said he was sorry. He had made a mistake in his music. His music didn't fit the Communist Party line in Russia, where the line extends to telling musicians what to compose. He came here with six other Russians for the "Cultural and Scientific Conference for World Peace" at Madison Square Garden.

What he had to say was read for him, although no one in this country knows whether he wrote it himself or had it written for him. It doesn't matter much, judging from his past experience. He had made the same apology before and he wouldn't say anything that would cause him more trouble in Russia.

There, some time ago, he was slapped down by the Central Committee of the Communist Party which has stamped down with equal fervor other musicians, writers, scientists and economists, one after another.

Speaks Piece Over Again When that happened to him, Shostakovich, who seems to want to continue writing music, said he was sorry for being a bad boy and wouldn't do it any more.

Since that Central Committee tells Russians what to think and do, if they want to stay out of trouble, it could be expected he'd come here and speak his piece over again. So he recanted the "bougeois formalism" of some of his work. At the same time he condemned the "cosmopolitanism" of the West.

The dictionary defines "cosmopolitanism" as "belonging to all the world; not restricted to any locality; field of activity or sphere of thought." In other words, internationalism.

Ironically, Shostakovich was given a scroll signed by 42 prominent representatives of the music world here. It said: "Music is an international language and your visit will serve to symbolize the bond which music can create among all peoples."


Texas Farm Income Continues To Skid

Spirit Of Briand May Guide Europe Into Powerful Union

Hope of generations of great idealists for creation of a United States of Europe are moving closer to fruition—closer to peace. Diplomatic representatives of ten nations are meeting in London to complete details for the establishment of a Parliament of Europe. These ten are Britain, France, Belgium, The Netherlands, Norway, Sweden, Denmark, Italy, Luxembourg and Bire. It is hoped to see this parliament in session by the coming Summer, probably in Strasbourg, France.

When this congress opens it will represent a brave beginning of the United States of Europe for which famous statesmen have labored so earnestly and so long. Prominent among these was France's famous Aristide Briand—Premier, Nobel Peace Prize winner and player of

an important part in bringing about the Kellogg Pact to outlaw war.

As one of the old timers I had the privilege of knowing the humanitarian Briand. I'm sure his spirit, with his old-time genial smile, will be standing beside the presiding official when the gavel falls to signal the opening of the first session of that parliament.

'Balance of Power' Falls There was a lot of talk about a United States of Europe in the last century as a means of fostering peace. At that time the so-called "balance of power" was depended on to prevent conflict.

World War I demonstrated that the balance of power was out-modified and must be replaced. The result was the League of Nations. However, it quickly became apparent the league was too heterogeneous in structure to function well. There was too great divergence of race and customs among the world-wide membership. The same regulations wouldn't fit all cases.

This week's gave a fillip to the idea of a United States of Europe. It was recognized that Europe was the greatest danger spot as a breeder of world wars.

Well, the plan didn't jell quickly enough and another world war blazed out from the continent. Now the project is being revived and spurred by the anxiety to do all possible to prevent the development of a third global catastrophe.

OZONA —(P)— Two brothers charged with kidnaping were scheduled to arrive here Tuesday from Pueblo, Colo., in the custody of officers.

They are G. K. and Horace Beeman, who are charged with kidnaping G. K. Beeman's wife and son.

They were arrested 10 miles south of Pueblo Sunday. Mrs. Beeman and her two-year-old son left Pueblo Monday with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Harry Joslin. They were coming back here.

Mrs. Beeman is suing her husband for divorce. Sheriff V. O. Earnest said the final decree will give her custody of the child. The divorce hearing is scheduled here Monday.

Mrs. Beeman and the child were with the brothers when they were arrested. District Attorney O'Neal Dandy of San Angelo said G. K. Beeman also faces charges of passing worthless checks in Paint Rock, Concho County.

Sheriff Earnest and Deputy Sheriff H. R. Laws went to Colorado to take custody of the Beeman brothers. Carroll, who came to Dallas from Waco in 1913, died Monday.

Schedule Exams For Positions In State Health Department

The Merit System Council, which serves as a "clearing house" for positions in the State Department of Public Welfare and the Texas Employment Commission, will hold open competitive examinations on May 7, 1948, for a number of positions now open in those agencies, according to Charles S. Gardner, director of the Merit System Council.

There is an increasing need for workers in the State Department of Public Welfare and the Texas Employment Commission. The immediate need for professional workers consists of field worker, with the public assistance program; child welfare worker and senior child welfare worker, with the child welfare program; and interviewer III with the Texas Employment Commission.

Stenographic and clerical needs consist of stenographer II, junior stenographer, clerk-typist, clerk IV, apprentice clerk, and key punch operator. The council points out that applications for these examinations must be made out on an official application blank which may be obtained from local agency offices or by writing to the Merit System Council, 808 Tribune Building, Austin.

The closing date for submission of applications is April 16.

Buchanan, general manager for the Western Lines at Amarillo; G. C. Vincent, traffic manager at Amarillo; H. O. Wagner, Slaton division superintendent; R. D. Bisbee, division engineer at Slaton, and J. A. Noble, division engineer for the Western Lines at Amarillo.

Early laying of the rails on the spur will facilitate moving to the field of materials and equipment for the erection of two plants which will extract gasoline and other products from gas produced with oil.

Some Material On Ground Some already are on the ground for Plymouth Oil Company's plant. Construction will be started within 30 days by the Hudson Engineering Company of Houston. Slick-Urschel Oil Company of San Antonio will build the other plant. The Texas National Gasoline Corporation of San Antonio has the contract. Slick-Urschel and Plymouth jointly opened the Benedum field late in 1947.

Each gasoline plant will have a daily capacity of 80 to 85 million cubic feet of gas, which in the early wells yielded around two gallons of gasoline to 1,000 cubic feet. The cost of each plant will be around \$6,000,000.







New Council Is Step Toward Europe's Unity House Committee Slashes Funds For State Institutions AUSTIN (AP)—The House Appropriations Committee Monday night slashed an emergency appropriation bill for state eleemosynary institutions from \$90,000 to \$80,000 before recommending house passage. The money is to be used for support and maintenance of the institutions the remainder of this fiscal year, ending August 31. More than \$100,000 of the original amount requested was marked for building purposes and therefore was not considered emergency in nature. Rep. W. H. Rippy of Winters told the subcommittee on eleemosynary appropriations. The Senate already has approved the measure. Also approved by the committee was a bill to boost salaries of appellate judges \$2,000 a year. This would give justices of civil appeals courts \$10,000 and justices of the Supreme Court and Court of Criminal Appeals \$12,000. An amendment cut out a proposed \$1,000 raise for district judges, who were granted an increase by the last Legislature. Stevenson is charged with holding lighted cigarettes to various parts of the child's body. Dies Offers Truth As Best Weapon To Resist Communism HOUSTON (AP)—Truth is the most effective weapon against Communism, believes former Congressman Martin Dies. "While Communists work tirelessly with the zeal of early Christians, most of us are absorbed in making money and chasing pleasure," Dies said Monday in an address before the Houston Lions Club. "Since Communism is an idea—a diabolical idea—it cannot be exploded by shells," he said. "It must be combated with truth." He continued, England has been trying to fight communism with "the Communist weapons of socialism; America with a lukewarm and ineffective mixture of socialism and capitalism." 

Senator Lucas: "In view of the fact that the senator (Baldwin) comes from the nutmeg state of Connecticut I can understand how a nutmeg question of that kind would be asked." (Laughter.)



Committees Speed Hearings To Clear Crowded Calendars

AUSTIN—(AP)—With House and Senate calendars already becoming heavily laden, committee action was speeded up as a flock of bills received attention Monday.

Another of the major, must money bills was wheeled out for Senate attention. The Finance Committee recommended that \$69,587,900 be spent to run state colleges and universities the next two years.

Heads of the schools have asked for a lot more—94 million dollars. The committee-approved total is 53 per cent more than higher education got for the present two-year period, but the increase is only half as much as the increase asked by school presidents and boards of regents.

Anti-Communist Bill

An anti-Communist bill requiring state employes to sign an affidavit that they are not members of Communist or other subversive organizations was given House State Affairs Committee approval.

A measure to reduce unemployment compensation taxes and to increase benefits was recommended for House passage by the Committee on Revenue and Taxation. The total of tax payments is much larger than the amount paid out in compensation, the group was informed.

The tax would be cut from five-tenths of one per cent to three-tenths of one per cent on wages paid, and maximum benefits would be upped to \$20 a week. The duration of payments would be increased to 24 weeks.

Motor Traffic Measures

A bill approved by the House Motor Traffic Committee would increase the limit on lengths of coupled vehicles so disabled buses could be towed to town for repairs. Another measure also favorably recommended to the House would require registration and payment of the registration fee for vehicles operating under a highway commission permit to carry special loads exceeding legal limits.

The House Public Health Committee, after a three-hour hearing, killed a bill to allow licensing of pharmacists without an examination if they have been licensed in another state but lived in Texas the last six years.

A resolution calling for investigation of the State Board of Optometry was approved by the committee.

"There have been some question whether the examinations given by the board are fair to applicants for licenses," Rep. Miller Walker of Beaumont said.

Hubby's Hat-Hating Wins Actress Divorce

LOS ANGELES—(AP)—Coleen Gray, 24-year-old up and coming screen actress, testified her husband didn't like her hats and won her divorce.

She added Monday before Superior Judge Wilbur C. Curtis that Rodney Amateau, her writer-husband, often made her discard hats which she thought particularly smart.

The court approved a property settlement, and ordered Amateau to contribute five per cent of his earnings above \$30 a week to the support of their two and one-half-year-old daughter.

Buyers' Chill May Uncover Some Real Postwar Gadgets

PITTSBURGH—(NEA)—Now that the consumer has satisfied his most pressing wants—and taken some of the pressure off manufacturers—we are going to begin seeing some really "postwar" gadgets.

Television, of course, has come along since the war. But it can hardly be called "post-war." There is nothing radically different between TV sets now on the market and those that the industry could have made in 1940 or 1941.

All that has happened, really, is that the pre-war television has had a bit of face-lifting—millions have been invested in telecasting facilities and in deficit operation—receivers have been mass-produced, and sold to a war-prosperous public, at lowered cost and more attractive prices.

Automobiles, within the past few months, have reacted to the fast-approaching buyers' market. That is why, for the first time, it is possible to get from old-line manufacturers a car that is really new—a car that is not merely the 1941 model with a new dress.

In the household accessory field, likewise, up to now there has been nothing really new. Stores have featured things you couldn't get in 1941 or 1942, but they had actually been perfected then.

Suddenly, however, the pipelines have become filled with consumer goods. The mad rush to buy at any price has slowed down.

Any Day Now

So any day now, out of the most secret laboratories of the manufacturers you will begin to get genuinely new gadgets—things that weren't more than dreams or hopes in 1941-42—improvements, sometimes, and often actually brand new departures.

The nation's electric power leaders were given a preview of some of these things at an off-the-record Power Forum sponsored by a new one can be opened up.

sored by the Westinghouse Electric Corporation.

J. H. Ashbaugh, vice president, described some of the gadgets his company, second largest producer of household appliances, is perfecting "in the room with the 'Keep Out' sign on the door."

The session was closed, and nothing was given out from it. Speaking more freely under such circumstances Ashbaugh told the power men:

"Tomorrow the American housewife will be offered a refrigerator that is completely automatic—which will automatically defrost when the frost builds up to a predetermined amount, and do it so fast it won't even melt the ice cubes in the process."

"Tomorrow we may have a refrigerator so designed and controlled that it will hold fresh vegetables from three to six months."

"Tomorrow the housewife will be offered an electric range that will out-perform anything she ever dreamed of. This year, we can make biscuits in any part of the oven—an unheard-of thing. We have already built and successfully operated ranges with automatic surface cooking. You merely set the pan and contents on the range, and the range automatically controls the heat to do the cooking properly."

"And we have built ranges that cook with infra-red and high frequency."

"Surface elements will be made so fast that they will come up to red heat four times as fast as today's elements."

Convenience, automatic operation and glamour are the three things that the industry keeps in front of its eyes, Ashbaugh said. By improving on these, every time it seems as though the market for an appliance was sold out, a new one can be opened up.
