Political Scientist's Ideas

A revolutionary program which could upset some of our most cherished American traditions is reported by Peter Edson in his Washington column. It seems the American Political Science Association wants to inject a little science into the workings of our political parties.

That is an over-simplified statement of a complicated project. Even so, it can be seen that the APSA's idea is of a magnitude which makes the Hoover Commission's recommendations look like routine Spring housecleaning.

Any attempt to apply political science to party politics will take the scientists into dangerous territory. They will have to contend with pressure and patronage, seniority and sectionalism, tradition and folklore.

They will venture into fields where a pair of red suspenders or a hillbilly band often means more to the voters than the issues at stake. They will have to travel the peaks of public enthusiasm and the valleys of public apathy. They will have to convince the people as well as the politicians that political responsibility is a day-in-day-out task and not an excuse for speeches and fireworks one year in four.

It promises to be a rough journey. We wish the scientists well with their idea which, as Edson explains, "is to make party platforms mean what they say, and to create more discipline within party organizations, so that their political promises will be carried out.'

The scientists would like to see the party policy makers get together more often and with representation from the local to the national government levels. These are not all the suggestions that the political scientists are playing around with, but they indicate the direction of their thought. The tough job of putting this thought into action would be a matter of persuasion rather than of legislation. But since the APSA is the outfit which largely initiated the congressional reorganization of 1946, it should not be written off as supporting a hopeless cause.



WASHINGTON-(A)-The House Un-American Activities Commitbundled a key witness in secrecy Monday in its search for Communist agents. It concentrated on the American Slav Congress and CIO-United Electrical Workers Unon (UE).

The committee took this turn after releasing, over the weekend, copies of documents and sworh testimony that the Polish Embassy here was used for Communist spy-

A committee official said it was necessary to withhold any advance identification of one of three "friendly" witnesses in order to protect him. This witness was said to have turned on the Communist Party after having once been a card-carrying member.

These are the first hearings the committee has staged since the 31st Congress opened for business under Democratic control in January. They were expected to be opened to the public later onmaybe Monday, maybe Tuesday. The first phase is expected to put the emphasis on the Slav Congress and allied organizations. Court Judge Called

The committee called in Judge Blair F. Gunther of the Common Pleas Court of Pittsburgh to give it a hand in investigating the Slav Congress, Gunther was one of its early leaders but dropped out in 1944 after word began getting around that Reds had infiltrated the organization.

Harry A. Sherman, a former lawyer for several UE local unions in Pittsburgh, was listed as the third friendly witness.

Committee publications say the Slav Congress has been cited by Attorney General Clark as sub-Eversive and Communist and that Communists are still in the saddle" in the UE.



Many Weeks Yet To

WASHINGTON-(AP)-The longdelayed debate in Congress on a new labor law starts Tuesday in

After the House finishes, the Senate tackles the problem. So it may be many weeks before we finally have a new labor law. The House faces two problems in

making a decision, and so will the 1. Should the Taft-Hartley Act passed in 1947, be wiped out and replaced by the old Wagner Act passed in 1935, with some slight changes?

The House has two bills before it: 1. The Lesinski bill. This bears the name of Rep. Lesinski, Michigan Democrat, this is the bill favored by President Truman and organized labor.

It would knock out the T-H Act and, with a few changes, restore the old Wagner Act, which was the law from 1935 to 1947.

2. The Wood bill. This is sponsored by Rep. Wood, Georgia Democrat. It is backed by the Republican leaders in the House and a group of Southern Democrats. Many Amendments Due

The Wood bill says it would repeal the T-H Act but it is pretty much like the T-H Act in many ways. Organized labor says it is the T-H Act under another name. Because House members can tack amendments, or changes, on the labor bill right on the floor of the House, no one can predict what the bill, as finally passed by the House, will look like.

House action, although debate is limited in the House, probably will Danger Of Bubonic use up this whole week. Then it may be weeks before the Senate acts. And, since Senate debate is unlimited, it may be more weeks before the Senate finally West Texas Areas decides what kind of labor bill it

So, the bills passed by House and Senate probably will be different. If they are, both Houses will have to agree on a single bill acceptable to both.


