#### Soviet Explanations

Soviet propagandists, who have laid claim to all those inventions on behalf of their countrymen, have at last invented something themselves. It is an explanation of why so many discoveries have been credited to non-Russians like Edison and the Wright brothers. The Navy publication Red Fleet explains it thus:

"The struggle for priority in capitalist countries merges into a struggle to ascribe as many scientific discoveries as possible to the scholars of one's own nationality and race at the expense of other nationalities and races. The more rapacious and piratic the imperialism of the given country, the more insolent and crude is the 'spiritual expansion' of its historians of science.'

There you have it, neat as a mathematical formula. False claims of achievement for a country's scientists are in direct proportion to the imperialistic ambitions of a country's government.

Silly as that sounds, the propagandists must have thought it necessary to come up with some story. For a lot of Russians probably have wondered how it was, even if their propagandists spoke the truth, that this wrong impression about electric lights and airplanes and such had been so persistent for so many years.

Now it's all clear. The discrepancy fits right in with the west's pattern of "imperialism." Further, the western countries had been telling these imperialistic lies for a couple of hundred years.

But it may be that a few of the more logical-minded Russians are still wondering as they read the honor roll of their unsung inventors. There was the remarkable Lomonossov, for instance. 



Here's How Brannan Plans To Raise Per Capita Farm Income

Primary objective of the Brannan plan is to raise the average per capita farm income. For 1948, this average was \$909. The first question is, how much is it to be raised and how do you figure how much to raise it for the year 1950? Here you have to delve into a few

statistics. You begin with Bureau issue. of Agricultural Economics figures on cash receipts from farm marketings over the last 10-year period. They varied from \$8,000,000,000 in 1939 to \$21,000,000,000 in 1948. The 10-year average is \$21,000,000,000.

The purchasing power of the dollar was not the same throughout this 10-year period, however. In terms of real purchasing power of the farmer's dollar, this 10-year, 1939-1948 average farm income is calculated to be \$18,200,000,000. Never mind how this calculation is made. It's too complicated.

Basis For Calculations This \$18,200,000,000 is considered the base below which the farmer's income should not be allowed to fall. This is the stabilizing factor of the Brannan plan. It must now be translated into terms of 1949 or 1950 dollars, to reflect how much the farmer's costs have gone up over the last 10 years.

To do this, the base income figure is multiplied by the "parity index" figure. This parity index is stated as a percentage of prices paid by farmers for their cost of living and

WASHINGTON -(P)- Congress has been asked to do something about making "radar cooking" available to farmers' wives. The suggestion came from Cla


T. McWhorter, president of the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association, who testified before a Senate subcommittee.

#### Mid-Atlantic One Of Oldest Class C Loops In Baseball

AP Newsfeatures BUTLER, PA .- A baseball league which has survived many ailments is celebrating its 25th birthday this

It's the Middle-Atlantic League, a Class C circuit. It now operates almost exclusively in Pennsylvania. The Youngstown, Ohio, entry is the only exception.

But during the years it has reached into Maryland and West Virginia in its constant fight for survival. It has embraced as many as 12 teams, and as few as five.
