Chancellor, Slick To Venture In Lubbock

Drilling is to be started before June 15 on a wildcat which is slated to go to about 6,500 feet in North-Central Lubbock County, to test into the lower Permian lime. The venture will be C. W. Chancellor of Midland, Slick Oil Company, et al., No. 1, Floyd Cloud. It is located 600 feet from east and 1,000 feet from south lines of section 22, block D, L&SV survey.

That makes it three-quarters of a mile southwest of the Seaboard Oil Company of Delaware and Standard Oil & Gas Company No. 1 Lula Mae Cravens, small pumping discovery from the lower Permian, which was completed more than two years ago. The No. 1 Cravens is reported to be currently pumping about 28 barrels of oil per day.

The wildcat is 10 miles north and two miles west of Lubbock. It is on a block of approximately 2,350 acres. A one-half interest in the block, and in the well-site, is owned by a group of Midland operators which includes J. C. Williamson, Alvin L. Ataway, George R. Krebs and R. R. Herrall. Contract to drill the project with rotary tools has been awarded to Kirk-Green-Way, Inc., Lubbock drilling contractor.

Outpost To Flanagan Flows Oil In Devonian

Magnolia Petroleum Company No. 1 Flanagan, an outpost east of the Flanagan-Hillenburg field in South-Central Gaines County, has shown for some sort of production from the Devonian, and is now drilling ahead and investigating the Hillenburg.

The Magnolia prospect, located 1,900 feet from north and 600 feet from west lines of section 4, block A-22, psi survey, showed its oil and gas in a drillstem test at 10,350-400 feet. The tool was open three hours and 25 minutes.

A 1,000-foot water blanket was used. Oil started flowing out at the top of the drillpipe in one hour and four minutes. It was flowed to pits for 20 minutes to clean, and was then burned to tanks.

Makes Salt Water
The well flowed 27 barrels of oil, and no water, in one hour. Severity of the petroleum was 33 degrees at 10,400 feet. The water blanket was used.

Operator drilled on down to 10,450 feet and took a one hour and 17 minute drillstem test with the packer at 10,450 feet. A 1,000-foot water blanket was used.

Recovery was the blanket, and 7,500 feet of oil and gas cut salt water, estimated to have been ten per cent oil. The venture has now resumed drilling.

The Magnolia prospect is said to be 50 feet low on the top of the oil stained zone in the Devonian, to the same marker in Shell Oil Company, Inc., No. 1 Hawkins, opener of the Flanagan field.

Thicker Pay Section
Top of the Devonian, in Magnolia No. 1 Flanagan, was picked by some geologists to be at 10,286 feet. Top of the staining was at 10,366 feet. Elevation is 3,381 feet.

Shell No. 1 Hawkins showed a thicker Devonian pay section than has been found in the Magnolia development. The Shell project developed a heavy flowing production from that zone.

It was drilled on to the Hillenburg and found commercial production in that horizon, and was completed there. The Devonian pay, the Clear Fork of the Permian, which also showed for production after being cased off and not being produced.

Magnolia No. 1 Flanagan has also showed for flowing production from the Clear Fork.

Santa Rosa Wildcat Gets Little Clean Oil

A small amount of free oil was recovered on a drillstem test in a formation thought possibly to be upper Ordovician at Santa Rosa, California. The well, No. 1, C. Tress estate, located Ellenburger wildcat in the Santa Rosa area of Northwest Pecon County.

The examination was for 30 minutes at 9,700-9,810 feet, showing a very weak flow of oil. The recovery was two feet of oil and 50 feet of oil cut, salty drilling mud.

Drilling was continuing from 9,919 feet in lime and chert. This venture is 600 feet from north and 350 feet from east lines of the northwest quarter of section 90, block 3, H&GN survey, about seven miles southwest of Grandfalls.

Sinclair Drills Ahead After Borden Show

Deepening after recovering free oil and unloading some fluid on a drillstem test was in process at Sinclair's Prairie Oil Company No. 1, Sterling Williams, deep wildcat in Northwest Borden County, about 11 miles northwest of Gall.

It was under 3,921 feet, penetrating lime. The test was at 9,778-9,788 feet for three hours, recovering 7,500 feet of clean oil kicking out while pulling drillpipe. Information has been released on a drillstem test prior to the above show. The tool was open three hours at 9,850-75 feet. Recovery was 6,500 feet of clean oil and 500 feet of oil and gas cut drilling mud. (Continued on page 13)

Rodeo Greats Arrive

Midland Tuesday became the Mecca of the rodeo world as scores of cowboys, cowgirls, performers, rodeo hands and visitors arrived here in advance of the opening Wednesday of the 15th Annual World Championship Midland Rodeo.

Many of the nation's top rodeo contestants are on hand to compete in the cowboy events at Midland's big annual celebration. It was a colorful sight as the cowboys crowded hotel lobbies, cafes and downtown sidewalks. Rodeo headquarters were established in the Reese Building on South Lorraine Street, across the street from Hotel Scharbauer, with Fred Alvord in charge. Entries in the cowboy events were to close Tuesday afternoon, with a record number of contestants registered in most events.

The spectacular horsemen's parade is at 4 p. m. Wednesday officially will open the 1949 attraction.

Starting Time
The initial rodeo performance in the huge all-steel arena at the fair grounds on East Highway 90 will start at 8 p. m. Wednesday. Other performances will be held at the same hour Thursday, Friday and Saturday nights, with the final show Sunday scheduled at 2:30 p. m.

Ticket booths have been established in the lobby of Hotel Scharbauer and in the Midland Hardware and Furniture Company. Rodeo fans are urged to purchase tickets in advance to avoid the

Nation's Extended Weekend Holiday Death Toll Is 413

At least 413 persons were killed in accidents over the three-day Memorial Day weekend, traditional opening of the summer resort and travel season.

The score: Two hundred fifty-three killed in traffic crashes. Eighty-seven drownings. Seventy-three deaths in fires, falls, airplane mishaps and other accidents.

The period surveyed was from 6 p. m. in all time zones Friday until Monday midnight. The toll on the highways—jammed with some 30,000,000 automobiles over the extended holiday period—exceeded the estimate of 215 deaths by the National Safety Council.

California's 47 violent deaths led the nation. Illinois ranked second with 36 fatalities, while Ohio was third with 26.

Western Allies Plot Strategy To Prevent Big Four Stalemate

PARIS—(AP)—The Western Powers voted Tuesday a Russian proposal to invite a delegation from the Communist-dominated German People's Congress to appear before the Foreign Ministers Council, French sources reported.

PARIS—(AP)—The three Western power foreign ministers held an unannounced meeting Tuesday morning to consider how to meet Russia's rejection of their plan for a political union of East and West Germany.

Official British sources reported the meeting was being held. Secretary of State Ernest Bevin and French Foreign Minister Robert Schuman were accompanied by their top advisors.

The Western ministers presumably want to decide well in advance what to do next if the four-power talks collapse.

Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Vishinsky was reported by sources close to his delegation to have consulted Moscow by telephone Monday night on the terms of the speech he was planning for Tuesday.

The Western ministers remained in session until afternoon. As the eighth meeting of the Big Four council got underway later, Vishinsky was reported winding up for another attack on the joint Western power proposals for political unity, and it was doubtful the Berlin issue could be reached Tuesday.

Texas Swelters In Year's Hottest Day

Tuesday looked like another scorcher in Texas.

Monday was the hottest day of the year.

Over in the Big Bend, the mercury soared to 108 degrees. Laredo, in South Texas, recorded 102 degrees and Childress and Wichita Falls in the Northwest recorded 101. Readings in the high nineties were general.

No rain fell Monday, Tuesday was dry, too—clear to partly cloudy. Early morning temperatures were in the seventies—but were climbing steadily by early afternoon.

B-36 Bomber Centers Hot Controversy

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The House Armed Services Committee voted Tuesday to investigate the nation's air power policies and plane purchases.

It approved unanimously a resolution by Chairman Vinson (D-Ga) for the inquiry and decided to ask the House for a \$50,000 expense fund.

Vinson proposed the investigation by the Armed Services Committee after Rep. Van Zandt (R-Pa) asked the House last week to create a special committee to make such an inquiry.

Van Zandt said he was disturbed by reports linking defense officials with aircraft companies in the past.

Vinson told the committee the investigation "will find out what lies behind these rumors and innuendoes." He said he referred to Van Zandt's statements.

Rep. Short of Missouri, ranking Republican member of the committee, supported Vinson's resolution. He said "This is not a witch hunt. It is only fair to have these matters clarified."

In response to a question from Rep. Cole (R-NY), Vinson said the entire national air policy will be scrutinized, and the investigation will look into procurement of all military aircraft.

"Big issues involved" involves big issues and "deals with the reputation of the entire National Military Establishment. We are going to find out what is going on."

Vinson said the investigation "will cover rumors and gossip" regarding the present or former connections of top defense officials with aircraft interests.

The latest storm over the B-36, the newest and heaviest bomber in the nation's air fleet, came when Rep. Van Zandt (R-Pa) demanded an inquiry into "disturbing reports" about the relations of Secretary of Defense Louis Johnson, Air Secretary Symington, and Floyd Odium, head of the Atlas Corporation.

Van Zandt said he had heard Symington plans to resign soon to become boss of a gigantic aircraft manufacturing combine "under the thumb of Floyd Odium."

He said also that there are "well founded reports" Odium "was very active" in helping Johnson raise money for the Democratic Party last Fall. Johnson, who became secretary of Defense in March, was the party's vice-presidential pick in last year's election campaign.

Symington Denies Charges
Symington said Van Zandt's statements about him are "obviously and demonstrably false," and added that he welcomes a congressional inquiry into the whole subject.

The controversy involves national defense policies on the strategic assignments of the Air Force and the Navy.

The Air Force has claimed the B-36 could deliver atomic bombs almost anywhere in the world and return to bases in this country without danger of effective interception by fighter planes. The Navy has said it has fighters that could shoot down the B-36, and has argued its carrier strength should be built up so Navy bombers could scatter atomic bombs anywhere in the world too.

Soon after he took office, Johnson ordered the Navy to stop work on a giant aircraft carrier that the Navy said could handle large bombers for long-range attacks.

Van Zandt, a reserve Navy officer, said the Air Force has cancelled contracts for other planes in order to buy more B-36's.

'Missing' Veteran Has Two Families Says Former Boss

NEW YORK—(AP)—Anthony V. Martino, an ex-infantryman, presumed by his Command with a combat record in the war, has a second wife and family, his former employer said Tuesday.

Nicholas De Joy, owner of the Eastern Island Taxi Company, said Martino worked for him as a cab driver four and one-half years, but quit his job several weeks ago.

De Joy said Martino has a wife and two children living at Tompkinsville, Staten Island. A woman at that address declined to give her name.

Drive For Housing For Middle-Income Families Develops

WASHINGTON—(P)—A drive of undetermined strength developed Tuesday behind legislation for government encouragement to provide housing for middle-income families.

Rep. Hugh B. Mitchell (D-Wash.) told newsmen 21 House members jointly are supporting a bill that with federal loans, would help this income group to get housing at payments of not over \$56 a month.

"This is the neglected group in the housing picture," Mitchell said. "It comprises over 30 per cent of the population. Housing offered by private builders is beyond their means. The housing bill now being pressed before Congress neglects them, too, as it intends to aid the lowest income groups."

The Administration's housing multi-billion dollar bill, already passed 87 to 1, by the Senate, calls for a vast program of slum clearance, low-rent public housing and farm housing aids.

Democratic leaders were reported to have given the House Rules Committee until Wednesday to clear the bill for House action. That group shelved similar legislation last year. It has had the new measure about two weeks, without acting.

The bill—involving possible total of \$16,000,000,000 to \$19,000,000,000 in federal grants and loans over the next 40 years—has become a target of the House Economy Group. It is being attacked by the opposition also as "socialism." Its backers argue it is vitally needed to assure homes for citizens who cannot get them otherwise.

Yuan Rejects New Nationalist Premier

CANTON—(P)—China's Nationalist Legislative Yuan Tuesday rejected Chu Cheng as premier but will discuss his nomination further.

GEORGETOWN, TEXAS—(P)—Selection of a jury in the trial of Clifton Okra, 25, Dallas negro charged with assault and maiming, continued here Tuesday.

Selection of the jury began Monday after Judge Wesley Rice of Belton overruled a defense motion to quash the indictment of Okra.

Okra is charged with the criminal assault of Mrs. William Slack and with throwing acid in Slack's face while the couple sat in their car in West Dallas last August 17.

The trial was moved to Georgetown after a mistrial last November. The mistrial was ruled when Okra was brought into the Dallas courtroom in wrist chains in the presence of the jury.

Last U. S. Artillery Unit Reported Gone From Korean Republic

SEOUL—(P)—A trustworthy source said Tuesday the last American artillery battalion in Korea had gone home.

It departed, said this source, on May 28—Saturday—aboard the Liberty Ship Antioak. The ship is bound for Hawaii. It is due there in about 10 days.

This battalion's departure has not been confirmed by the Army or by the State Department. A lot of the battalion's equipment reportedly was turned over to the Korean Republic's new army.

Withdrawal of Russian troops, who occupied that part of Korea north of the 38th parallel at war's end, was announced last December by the Communists.

Young Gypsy Bride Is Reported Missing

SHREVEPORT, LA.—(P)—A 16-year-old Gypsy bride has been reported missing, two months after her marriage.

Johnny Adams, brother of Mrs. Katherine Adams Johnson, said his sister had disappeared from a trailer camp in Chattanooga, Tenn. She was staying there with her 21-year-old husband, Pete Johnson, and the husband's father, Louis Johnson.

The girl reportedly is of royal Gypsy blood. Her young husband is a member of one of the world's wealthiest Gypsy families.

Wife Plans Meeting With Soldier Husband Missing Five Years

NEW YORK—(AP)—A Connecticut woman headed here Tuesday hoping to meet her soldier husband who has turned up five years after he was believed killed in combat. A New York taxicab driver has been identified as Anthony V. Martino, formerly of Waterbury, Conn., who was listed as missing in combat in France in 1944. Later, he was listed as presumed dead. Mrs. Mary Martino, who has been living with her two children in Waterbury, could hardly believe the news that the missing soldier had walked into an Army recruiting station here and asked about his status. Martino told Army officers his memory had a blank spot, Col. William B. Force revealed Monday. The wife said at her home Monday night she was happy to hear her husband is alive—but worried because she had not heard directly from him since he walked into the Army office three weeks ago. "We had a little spat before he left for the Army," she said. "But I thought it was all blown over." She said she had "grown used to the idea that he was dead, and now when I found that he was alive it seems so terrible that I couldn't have been with him."

Couple Of Railroad Men Dig Up Relics; Become Authorities

POUGHKEEPSIE, N. Y.—(AP)—A couple of railroad men who dig up Indian relics in their spare time have made themselves authorities on the subject. They are Al Bennaway, an engineer, and Walter Hayward, a brakeman. Their spare-time work has unearthed arrowheads and pottery. Some of them are on loan to Vassar college and a Rochester, N. Y., museum. With the help of professional archaeologists from schools and museums they have been able to learn much about the life of the Indians. They have also found much evidence of trading with colonial settlers. The railroad men have also been able to help the professors. When, for instance, Dr. Mary Butler, Lewis of the University of Pennsylvania made an archaeological survey of the Hudson Valley in the early 1940s, she went first to them. "The men now work together in their hunts. They met when both were hunting relics, not on their railroad jobs. Hayward says he started his digging when he was six years old. That was when he first dug up an arrow head in his back yard. Since then he has ranged up and down the Hudson Valley. Bennaway credits him with locating most of their digging sites. "We'll be walking along and Walt will stop suddenly and start dig-

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



Reds Will Delay Operation Of New People's Council

BERLIN—(AP)—East German Communists threw a cloak of mystery Tuesday about their timetable for Eastern Germany.

"There is no necessity to establish an East German state," Prof. Hermann Kastner, head of the newly chosen People's Council, told a reporter. "Even if there were such an idea it would certainly not be discussed now, while the foreign ministers are meeting in Paris and trying to reach an agreement on the unification of Germany."

The Communist-led People's Congress Monday adopted a Soviet-type constitution claiming to speak for all this country. They chose 400 members of a People's Council to serve as a government, including in the list Gerhart Eisler, Communist fugitive from America who hasn't been here since Nazi days. Kastner was named co-president of the council.

Kastner was the first East German to indicate publicly that the Russians have no set schedule for putting the East Constitution into effect.

Perplexed Tenant Hip Deep In Rice

TOKYO—(AP)—Tenant Isao Kurokawa is almost hip deep in rice. That's a strange way to be in this rice-short country.

It happened this way. Two years ago Isao's landlord started for the country.

"Take care of my rice ration," he said before leaving.

Isao did, faithfully.

Rice poured into his little home at the rate of a pint and a half a day under occupation rationing. Soon the place was full of it. But the landlord didn't come back.

Worried, lest he be taken for a blackmarketeer, Isao went to police.

They were amazed.

"What am I to do?" he asked, almost tearfully.

Police shrugged. The question had never come up before.

They left Isao standing practically up to his hip-pockets in rice, perplexed as ever.

U. S. May Close Mukden Consulate

NANKING—(AP)—The U. S. Consulate in Communist-held Mukden may be closed.

Authoritative sources here Tuesday said the Communist government in Peiping had been advised of this proposed step. The Reds were asked, this source said, to help in evacuating American Consulate personnel from the Manchurian city.

The consulate has been out of communication since November 18—18 days after the Red capture of Mukden.

Bill Holland Wins 500-Mile Classic

INDIANAPOLIS—(AP)—Bill Holland, the veteran speedster from Reading, Pa., Tuesday holds his first Indianapolis Speedway 500-mile classic race title. And it all came about because he was willing to wait for misfortune to overcome the cars he was trailing.

He watched Duke Nalon set a fantastic pace in his Novi Mobil Special for 55 1/2 miles at the start of Monday's grind. Nalon averaged almost 128 miles per hour in breaking a long string of records for the first 25 miles.

Then Nalon's car became a burned wreck on the northwest retaining wall. He suffered second degree burns.

Rex Mays, shooting for his first triumph for the twelfth time, then took over. Holland still waited. Mays' engine conked out at 90 miles.

Then Lee Wallard, a second year driver from Schenectady, N. Y., grabbed the lead, and Holland still played his waiting game. Wallard, driving the late Ted Horn's Maserati, was slowed by clutch trouble and finally dropped out.

This was Holland's cue. He grabbed the lead at the 137 2/3-mile mark and never was headed. He even got a break in the last 20 miles of the race when Mauri Rose, the South Bend, Ind., engineer, who was seeking an unprecedented fourth victory, was halted by engine trouble.

The speedway will pass out about \$185,000 in prize money Tuesday night at a dinner for the drivers.

Holland's share is a matter for speculation, since it depends on his private agreement with Lou Moore, owner of the Blue Crown Special he drove.

Holland didn't make a mistake that shows in the race chart as he set up a new record of 121.377 miles an hour, and an elapsed time of 4:01.15 1/2.

Johnny Parsons, speedway rookie from Van Nuys, Calif., took second money in a Kurtis-Kraft Special. Myron Fohr collected fourth money for his first "500" effort in the Marchesa Special.

George Connor of Los Angeles, veteran of 10 previous Memorial Day races, came in third with the baby brother of the Holland and Rose Blue Crown.

Eight major league batters have hit over 400 since 1900, with Ty Cobb and Rogers Hornsby performing the feat three times each.

Legislature Sends Secret Ballot Bill To Governor's Desk

AUSTIN—(AP)—Legislation relating to elections took up much of the 51st Legislature's time Monday.

A voter registration bill was passed by the House on second reading 97-26 after a long fight over amendments which would have let Republicans vote in Democratic primaries. All such attempts were killed.

A conference committee report on a bill to provide a more secret ballot was approved by the Senate and House and sent to the governor for signature. The measure calls for double numbering of every ballot, the voter detaching a perforated stub where the number is stamped and dropping it in a sealed box separate from the ballot box.

The stub box would remain unopened unless a court ordered the seal broken for checking purposes in an election contest.

Election Regulations
Senate approval also advanced to the governor's desk a bill revising state election regulations.

It requires election officials to report returns within 48 hours after the polls close and to turn in their ballots and ballot boxes as soon as the ballots are counted. Present law allows 72 hours to count votes and 10 days to turn in ballots.

Counties would be required to hold a runoff primary even if no local elections were involved. Electoral college ballots for presidential and vice-presidential candidates would be cast in December instead of January.

The Legislature was only a month away from tying the longest session record of 171 days set by the 47th Legislature in 1941. There was a feeling this session might set a new record if leaders of the Senate and House do not reach agreement soon on what to do about finances.

Two Finance Plans
The state faces a possible deficit of 46 million dollars in the next two years.

House Speaker Durwood Manford favors a short-term omnibus tax—one which would spread a light tax over many items—if new levies are needed. He would earmark the new revenue for the proposed eleemosynary building program which Gov. Beauford H. Jester has said must be initiated.

Gov. Allan Shivers prefers either a one-year appropriation plan or a bond issue by constitutional amendment to finance the buildings for wards of the state.

Though a no-new tax advocate in the past, Jester has said that if a tax is necessary, he favors the omnibus type. However, he has indicated his willingness to receive whatever reasonable solution can be worked out by the Legislature.

Why Commies Seldom Smile

When Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister Gromyko left New York for Europe at the conclusion of the United Nations Assembly meeting the other day, he flabbergasted America by smiling for the reporters and news photographers.

Newspapers published pictures of the smile, and commented on this notable event. America as a whole didn't know Gromyko could smile.

I mention the incident merely because it reminded me that recently a reader of this column asked me to explain "why Communists never smile."

Broadly speaking, it probably is true dyed-in-the-wool Communists don't smile much.

Why? They have one-track minds which are directed towards the objective of world revolution to communise all nations and bring them under the rule of Moscow, the oracle of Bolshevism. It is a project which leaves little room for other thoughts.

I think perhaps a good definition of communism is that it is a way of life. It controls not only the political activities of the individual but rules every other phase of his existence with an iron hand.

Under Red totalitarianism, the individual belongs to the state and the sovereignty of the state in turn rests in Moscow. Thus the individual owes his allegiance to Moscow, even to the extent of turning traitor to his own country in event the latter has trouble with mother Russia.

So in most countries there are Communist parties which are conducting underground operations. Part of the secrecy is to conceal the extent of the Red organization; part is because some of the operations are subversive and are aimed at overthrow of the government.

Obviously there is little humor in the lives of such ideological zealots.

One can add only the observation that perhaps democracy could learn a useful lesson from this ideological training of youth. Far more might be done in our schools, and through legitimate youth organizations.

**Officers Seek Clues
In Georgia Lynching**

IRWINGTON, GA.—(AP)—With no clues or a motive to guide them, investigators searched Tuesday for white men who whisked a negro from jail and shot him to death. "There's nothing to go on," said Sheriff George Hatcher. "At present we don't even have a definite motive."
The negro, 28-year-old Caleb Hill, Jr., was taken from the jail early Monday morning by two white men. His beaten and bullet-pierced body was found near a creek a few hours later.
Hatcher said an agent of the Georgia Bureau of Investigation entered the case Tuesday at his invitation.
The sheriff said he thinks more than two men were involved in Hill's death. "I don't think two men would try to handle something like this by themselves," he explained.
Hill was arrested by the sheriff at a negro roadhouse near this small Middle Georgia town about midnight. While he was making the arrest, Hatcher said, Hill seized the sheriff's pistol and shot at him. Hatcher subdued Hill, took him to jail and returned to look for his pistol, which was lost in the scuffle.
The jail is on the second floor of the sheriff's home. He said he left the house unlocked when he went for his pistol because he didn't want to disturb his wife when he returned.
While he was gone, Hatcher continued, two white men entered the jail and took Hill away. The sheriff's wife and two young daughters were sleeping downstairs.
"When I returned home, I went straight to bed without looking in on Hill. The first thing I knew about his being killed was when I was called to identify a body (Hill's)," Hatcher added.

**Arms-For-Europe
Program Definitely
Postponed To 1950**

WASHINGTON —(AP)— Congress evidently is going to pass up until next year the program for re-arming America's European Allies.
The tip-off on that came Tuesday from the House majority leader, Rep. McCormack (D-Mass.). He omitted it from a list of chores he said the House will get out of the way before Congress quits.
Influential Senate Democrats also have indicated the \$1,130,000,000 arms program for partners in the North Atlantic Alliance won't be pushed.
But the North Atlantic Treaty itself definitely is on the Senate schedule for action this session. The Senate Foreign Relations Committee plans to start work Wednesday on a "good, strong report," Chairman Connally (D-Texas) said.
The House has no say on ratifying the treaty. But the House would have to approve the arms program to back it up.
McCormack predicted the House will put through a labor bill, long-range planning, a measure to let more homeless Europeans come to America, anti-lynching and anti-poll tax bills, and a measure to boost the national minimum wage.

**GOP Fears Loss
Of Midwest Votes**

WASHINGTON —(AP)— Senator Aiken (R-Vt.) expressed fear Tuesday Republicans may lose another crop of Midwestern farm votes they normally expect to harvest. He referred to the at least temporary defeat of an Administration crop storage bill last week.
"Actually Secretary of Agriculture Brannan is responsible for the Senate action," Aiken said in an interview. "But if GOP public relations are as bad as they were in the last campaign, the Republicans will get undeserved blame."
Aiken was talking about the unusual Senate action of rejecting 47 to 33 a Senate-House compromise upon legislation giving the government's farm price-support and loan agency broad authority to lease, buy or even build storage bins, elevators, warehouses and other facilities for storing crops.
That vote sent the bill back to conference again between Senate and House spokesmen. The delay, if it amounts to no more than that, probably means some farmers will not have storage facilities to get price-supporting government loans this year.
