



### Paring Government Spending

The cry for greater economy in federal spending is swelling steadily. Groups in and out of Congress are wondering just how deep the United States can dig into its sock without endangering its own and the world's future.

Since the end of World War II, this country has served virtually as storehouse and treasury for democracy every-where. Now it is being asked to act in peacetime—as it did in war—as the arsenal of democracy. On top of these unusual burdens, the enactment of new social legislation covering health, security and education is sought by Presi-

The worry felt in Congress over the increasing drain the nation's resources is expressed in a move planned by Senator Russell of Georgia and other Democratic members of the Senate Appropriations Committee. Russell and his committee colleagues want to trim about \$3,000,000,-000 off federal funds for the year starting July 1.

This plan may give the economy drive the big spark it has lacked up to now. Heretofore, efforts by Republicans and some Democrats to curtail government spending have had slender success. Republican senators did manage to bottle up one appropriation bill, but the final round is yet to be fought on that measure.

Russell says he and his supporters won't go along with the GOP in its announced intention to snip five per cent from each money bill as it comes up.

He thinks a better approach will be to wait until most of the appropriations bills are approved and then, when to offer a proposal ordering all government agencies to pects of the congressional furor save enough to bring outlays down \$3,000,000,000.

## How Hoover Committee Would Streamline Uncle Sam's 'Sloppy' Housekeeping



In its final sum-up report, last in a series of 19 submitted to Congress, The Hoover Commission on the Organization of the Executive Branch of the Government recommends cutting out 22 agencies reporting to the President. It absorbed them and their functions into various cabinet departments, boards and bureaus, so there would be only 30 instead of 52 different agencies reporting directly to the Chief Executive (chart at left). In addition, the commission proposes establishment of a new cabinet department, Department for Social Security and Education, and two non-cabinet agencies, United Medical Administration and Office of General Services. The new cabinet department would abolish the present Federal Security Agency, absorb Indian affairs, and supervise the various social security and educational services within the government. The United Medical Administration would handle the hospital and medical functions of Veterans' Administration; Army, Navy and Air Force general hospitals; the Public Health Service and drug inspection. The Office of General Services would be responsible for supply; administration and operation of all

public buildings; and the national archives. The chart at right is an example of the overlapping of activities in water development alone. For example, irrigation is undertaken by the Interior Department, Agriculture Department and the Army Corps of Engineers. At the same time, Army engineers have their fingers in research, pollution control, power and flood control-all subjects of at least one other government agency. ## Tidelands Delegates Confer Wednesday

WASHINGTON -(A)-Ownership of the wealthy tidelands was the issue Wednesday in a full-dress conference between the federal government and coastal states, including Texas.

An "area of agreement" was the goal as representatives of Texas. Louisiana and California sat down at noon with Attorney General Tom Clark, Secretary of the Interior Krug and Senator O'Mahoney (D-

Late Tuesday, Attorneys General Price Daniel of Texas, Fred Howser of California, and Bolivar Kemp of Louisiana met in the cap-

But the preliminary session, called by Speaker Rayburn of Texas. was fruitless. Rayburn said agreement was reached. Hall Hammond, Maryland attor-

ney general, and Walter Johnson. former Nebraska attorney general, supported the three attorneys. Other advisors also were present.

Compact Not Discussed The state ownership advocates discussed a "written piece of paper" outlining a legislative proposal to settle the controversy, Rayburn said. 





### **Postal Fleet Gets** Super Roadwagon

Newest and largest addition to the U. S. Post Office Department's rapidly expanding fleet of rolling post offices is a giant super-twin truck, above. It measures 45 feet from bumper to bumper and its roomy interior, left, carriers 30 per cent more mail than the conventional railway · post offices. Used to serve cities and towns no longer supplied by rail connec-tions, the truck has a crew consisting of a driver and three mail clerks. Equipped with automatic transmissions that eliminate gearshifting, the mobile PO is pow-ered by dual engines with a total of 360 horsepower, which are housed beneath the floor amid-
