

Hit-And-Run Storm Strikes Gainesville As Rains Continue

The only damage to Gainesville itself was from the 3.15-inch rain, about running through them all, but the North Texas city's aiport was damaged by winds up to 65 miles an hour. Ten planes were wrecked; that loss alone was estimated at \$25,000. Ardmore, Okla., which is just

across the Red River from Gainesville, had 3.68 inches of rain. Elsewhere in Texas rains were lighter. Light showers hit the South Plains shortly before 10 p.m. Sunday and continued until 2:30 a.m. Monday. Lubbeck's rainfall totaled .34 inch, bringing the 1949 total to 18.77 inches - compared with the normal annual total of



An Old Question

The election of Franklin D. Roosevelt, Jr., to Congress by a whopping margin promptly stirred talk that he might some day try to follow in his father's footsteps

by seeking the presidency. There was a quick rejoinder. It was said the Constitution bars him from that office because he was born on foreign soil, at his family's Summer place on an island off the coast of Canada.

Now on one knows, of course, whether young Roosevelt would ever get a crack at the presidency or whether he would want it. But reporters fishing in Supreme Court files have raised doubts that he or anyone in similar circumstances would necessarily be barred.

Let's see first what the Constitution says. To be eligible for the presidency, a person must be at least 35 years of age, must have lived in this country 14 years or more and must be a "natural born citizen."

It does not explain what "natural born" means. But the view has grown through the years that the term includes children of American parentage who are born on foreign soil.

The Supreme Court never has expressed itself on the issue as it relates to the presidency. In 1898, however, Justice Horace Gray handed down a decision noting that three distinct nationality laws declare that foreignborn children of U. S. parents "shall be considered as natural born children.'

Practically all of the different kinds of high blood pressure as well as hardening of the arteries tend to increase in the later years of life. It has been stated recently that every person over the age of 45 has a 50/50 chance of dying from high blood pressure, apoplexy, a heart attack, or some similar condition related to high blood

One organization, the American Foundation for High Blood Pressure, located in the Marion Building in Cleveland, is collecting funds, principally from generous businessmen, to attack the problems of hypertension and allied
