Canals Proposed For Midland

Federal Agents Grab \$100,000 In Counterfeit Bills

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Secret Service agents Monday seized almost \$100,000 in counterfeit bills in a raid on a half dozen blocks from the White House and Secret Service Headquarters.

The money was being made, the Treasury said, in an office suite in the same block with World Bank headquarters.

Four men and a woman were arrested.

A formal statement by the Treasury said charges of manufacturing and passing counterfeit currency were placed against Eugene Hammon Creighton, 25; Walter Wilbur Kidwell, 30; William F. Hughes, 28, and his wife, Josephine, 25; and Arthur M. Bebar, 35. All gave Washington addresses.

The Treasury said Creighton and Kidwell admitted manufacturing the counterfeit bills in their business office suite.

The notes were manufactured in early April and immediately afterward there was an "air tour of the country" to pass them. But, the Treasury said, it was "only meagerly successful."

Approximately \$2,000 in counterfeit bills were passed on a tour that included St. Louis, Kansas City, Omaha, Memphis, Dallas, Fort Worth, Atlanta, Richmond, Baltimore, and back to Washington.

Tickets for the gigantic spectacle are on sale at a booth in the Midland Hardware and Furniture Company. A cash discount is allowed for tickets purchased in advance.

Feature Attraction

"Frontiers of Progress" is the feature attraction of Midland Trail Days Celebration, which opens Friday afternoon with an Old Settlers reception at 3 p. m. and a mammoth parade at 4 p. m.

Other special events of the three-day celebration include "Trail Days Queen" contest, children's contests, fiddlers contest, square dances exhibition, fireworks displays, hole-in-one contest, double header baseball game, beard shaving contest and "42" tournament.

Leaders said entertainment will be provided for each and every member of the family. It will be Midland's first Fourth of July celebration in years.

Pioneer Woman Dies At Home Of Daughter

Mrs. Catherine Bleiker, 90, pioneer Midland woman, died Sunday at the home of her daughter, Mrs. John Williams, 1206 South Marienth Street.

She had been ill and confined to her bed for almost a year after suffering a broken hip in a fall.

Funeral services are scheduled at 3 p. m. Tuesday at the Northside Church of Christ (educational building) with Woodie Holden, pastor, officiating. Interment will be in Fairview Cemetery.

Mrs. Bleiker and her husband, the late John Bleiker, who died here June 2, 1941, were natives of Switzerland and came to the United States in 1901. They settled South of Midland along the Midland-Upton Counties line in 1916. She would have been 91 years of age July 12.

Survivors include: two daughters, Mrs. Williams of Midland and Mrs. Katie Butler of Mountain View, Okla.; a son, Lewis Bleiker of Texline; 16 grandchildren and six great grandchildren.

New Phase Started In Wichita Falls' Fight Against Polio

WICHITA FALLS—(AP)—Another phase in Wichita Falls' clean-up campaign to fight polio started Monday.

Sunday two B-26 bombers swooped low over the city to lay a cloud of DDT against flies and mosquitoes. Monday a fogging machine and hand sprayers were used in alleys.

Tuesday, the city gets another aerial DDT spraying and also holds a big clean-up drive. From Sixth Street to Eleventh Streets and from Labor Street to the railway station, the city will get a scrubbing. About 1,200 persons have enlisted in scrubbing brigades.



The polio figure for the year in Wichita Falls is 23. There has been one death. Fourteen cases have come from within the city.

The B-26 planes were from the Texas Air National Guard.

All stores will close Tuesday morning until a fire siren gives a signal the town is cleaned up.

Saturday night residents raised more than \$10,000 to finance the anti-polio campaign. Money was pitched into washtubs placed down town and pledges of money were phoned to the city's three radio stations. Newspapers and radio stations plugged the drive.

'Trail Days Queen' Candidates

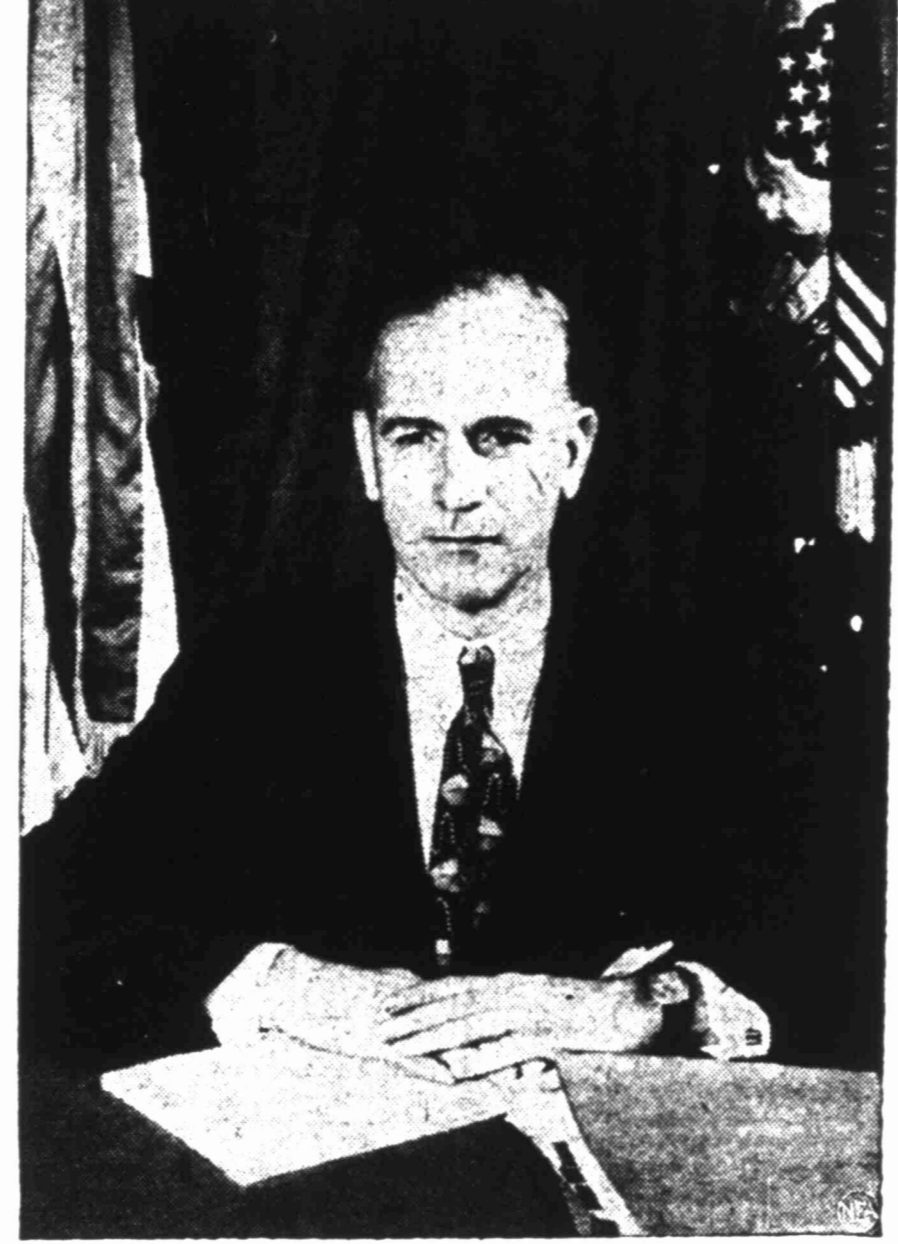

State's Death Toll For Weekend Is 17

A strange bus accident in Dallas County accounted for two of the 17 violent deaths in Texas over the weekend.

A Continental Southern Trailways bus slithered along the concrete railing of a 109-foot bridge near Garland Sunday. Besides the two killed, there were four hurt seriously.

Killed in the bus wreck were a 12-year-old boy, Billy Mack Ham, and an East Texas State College coed, Norma Charlene Floyd, 20, of Corsicana.

The woman's body was found in the waters of Rowlett Creek, the boat severed.

Part of the boy's body was found inside the bus and part on the bridge.

Sheriff Bill Decker of Dallas County said the bus driver, Wayne Dawson of Dallas, told him the bus hit a soft shoulder on the highway, the crash into Floyd of Corsicana.

Other accidents

Traffic accidents including the bus wreck, killed ten persons. Two drowned, one died of shotgun wounds, one was killed by lightning and another was killed in an airplane accident.

Mrs. Rosa Belle Rawlins, 43, of Madisonville, was killed Sunday in a two-car crash near Texas City.

John Hardin, 73, was killed Sunday night when struck by a car in Corsicana.

Three persons died as a result of a three-vehicle accident on a Salt Fork River bridge near Wellington Saturday. Billy Everett Lawson, 20, and Bonham C. Lawson, 29, both of Pilot Point, were killed almost instantly. Lloyd Leo Evans of Solomon, Kan., died in a Wellington hospital.

"Marie dell Floyd of Wellington died in a Shamrock hospital Sunday.

While Crossing Street

Frank Tigar, 50, Amarillo fisherman, was run down and killed by a truck as he crossed a street Saturday night.

Lloyd Henry Arrington, 23, who lived near Dallas, was fatally injured when an automobile hit his car.

Sally Scally, 15, of Denison drowned in Lake Texoma.

E. L. Henson, 33, of Crutcher, was killed by a bolt of lightning on a San Antonio golf course. He was Earl W. McFall, 53, of San Antonio, vice president of the Creighton Oil Company.

B. L. Henson, 25, Wichita Falls oil field worker, was crushed to death when a spinning cathead line caught and entangled him.

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Guadalupe Braco, 24, was shot and stabbed in the abdomen and shoulder. Both died Sunday.

Hiss Maintains Innocence At Trial

NEW YORK—(AP)—The government opened its cross-examination of Alger Hiss Monday after the former State Department official concluded defense questioning with the statement: "I am not guilty."

The prosecution began interrogating Hiss shortly after he returned to the stand for the third day. Hiss is accused of perjury.

Catholics Claim Reds Seize Offices

PRAGUE, CZECHOSLOVAKIA—(AP)—Roman Catholic sources charged Monday Communists have seized virtually all church administrative offices in Czechoslovakia and arrested priests who resisted.

The informants said reports from various parts of the country showed repression measures against the church are increasing. Some priests reported police charged them with "inciting unrest" after they had read from the pulpit Sunday the Catholic hierarchy's accusations of deceit, fraud, kidnapping and robbery against the Communist government.

The denunciation, in the form of a pastoral letter, was a virtual white book catalogue of alleged anti-church actions by the government, which it accused of aiming at the "extermination of the Church of Christ." The letter told Catholic communicants their "hour of trial" may be at hand.

Priests Warned

Priests have reported they were warned in night police visits against reading pastoral letters, the means for the hierarchy to tell its side of the church-state fight since the Catholic press was shut down by the government.

Churchmen said the government took over nearly all administrative offices in the archdiocese and the diocese of the country and installed, instead, officials of the Communist-sponsored Catholic action, an organization which the archbishop has denounced as a tool of the state.

S&Q Clothiers Store Burglarized

An undetermined amount of clothing was taken from S&Q Clothiers in a burglary Sunday night.

Entrance to the building was gained by removing an overhead fan from the top of the building.

Several suits, sport jackets, shoes and possibly other articles were taken. A complete check of stock had not been completed Monday noon.

Officers said the store was ransacked, with clothing being thrown about considerably. The intruders departed through the back door.

Police and the Sheriff's Department are conducting the investigation.

Officers said no cash was taken.

Market Gets Lift

NEW YORK—(AP)—Small buying orders gave the stock market a modest lift Monday. A wide variety of issues remained, at least weeks' closing levels but where changes did occur, they were usually upward.

Lawmakers May Quit This Week

AUSTIN—(AP)—The House Monday adopted a conference committee report appropriating \$5,000,000 for soil conservation during the next two years.

The vote was 106-13. The Senate had tried to raise the total to \$10,000,000, but put the amendment on the wrong bill, making the change ineffective.

Swift concurrence by the House in this and other conference reports indicated the House was in a mood to wheel out the bills and end the session this week.

Big money bills conference finished their work over the weekend. Leaders of both houses figured the session could wind up with an amended budget by Saturday, but that a special session later on tax matters is almost certain.

Governor Gets Gas Bill

The natural gas measurement bill was sent to the governor when the House agreed to a conference committee report already approved by the Senate.

Another major measure made progress. It was the bill revamping the state's plan for handling juvenile delinquents. A conference committee finished work on it and sent it to both houses.

Appropriation conference reports call for \$131,829,856 out of general revenue for higher education, elementary institutions, judiciary and departments. That's \$120,000,000 more than the state comptroller estimates is left for spending.

But legislative leaders point out that his estimate was 30 per cent too low two years ago and that he might be 5 per cent too low this time. Senate Finance Chief James Taylor also saw the possibility of that much of this year's allocated revenue being left unspent at fiscal year end August 31 and reverting to the general fund as additional "savings" to apply onto the next biennial expenditure.

Engineer Suggests Big Project For Irrigation And Navigation Here

A program to spread waters of the Mississippi Basin by contour canals and which proposes water for both irrigation and navigation in the Permian Basin area, of which Midland is the capital, has been advanced in Washington by a Virginia engineer, Charles Bhi Sexton.

This long-range and far-reaching proposal would cost millions of dollars but would have aroused considerable interest.

Sexton, who has given long study to his plan, asserted it will mean "Greening lands to the North and West to abate sandstorms and tornadoes."

"Cheaper freight rates."

"Raised water table, from seepage."

"Moistening of the air from initial evaporation."

"Development of some forests such as occurred around Lake Meade in Arizona, above Hoover Dam."

"Springs and steady flowing creeks from a stable water table."

"A huge influx of settlers with consequent gains in wealth and political power."

"Diversified farming, providing almost all foods locally and cheaper."

"Isn't it worth working for?" He asks in a communication to The Reporter-Telegram.

Use Water From Rockies

The proposed system of contour canals would follow the foothills of the Rocky Mountains. Sexton asserts these canals would send floods in the Mississippi River Valley.

"No region stands to benefit more from this plan than does West Texas," Sexton declared. "It does not have the water in its own mountains. It must bring snow-meltage from the Northern Rockies to have any effect on the Llano and tableland south to the Pecos River, as well as the Panhandle. By joining the more northerly dry-belt citizens in a plan calculated to benefit all, the Texans can get their water along with navigation and incidental benefits such as recreation, game, fowl flightsways."

Last February the Washington Times-Herald first proposed a diversion of the waters of the Mississippi River to prevent floods which lay against levees, and to irrigate the dry prairies of the Southwest.

Reaction in the nation's capital was sharp and sharply divided.

"Some people said we were nuts," the Times-Herald recently reported editorially. "Some people also said the Wright Brothers and Henry Ford and the atom scientists were nuts for tackling 'impossible' problems. Other people showed great interest in the project. Among these were members of the Interior Department, officials, congressmen and a great many private citizens. We received many suggestions as to how to do the job."

Among the ideas was that of Sexton, a Missourian who has farmed, surveyed, built ships and sounded the Mississippi for the Army Engineers.

Sexton lived in Kansas as a child. He knows dust, drought, blizzards and grasshoppers. Later he lived on arid ranches in Arizona and he has seen the need.

Strikers won two of their three major demands.

All salaries will be paid in West marks. This currency has a purchasing power four to six times as great as the Soviet-sponsored East mark.

The Russian-controlled railway management has given assurances there will be no retaliation against strikers.

Berlin Rail Strike Will End Tuesday

BERLIN—(AP)—The five-week rail strike which has blocked Berlin almost as effectively as did the Russians is scheduled to end Tuesday morning.

The executive board of the Anti-Communist Railway Union bowed to the orders of the Western Allies and ordered members back to work on the Soviet-controlled railways.

The British, American and French commanders in Berlin had warned that if the strike were not called off by Tuesday, the West Berlin city government would quit relief payments to the strikers.

They said the strike no longer could be justified because it was seriously damaging Berlin economy, was blocking the Paris Four-Power agreements to revive a East-West trade rift, laying a big burden on the Western Powers in maintaining the airlift.

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Trail Days Tour Scheduled Tuesday

The Rev. Clyde Lindsley, president of the Midland Lions Club, and Chamber of Commerce Manager Delbert Downing Tuesday will visit Stanton, Lamesa, Seminole and Andrews to invite residents of those cities to attend Midland's Trail Days Celebration, July 1, 2 and 4. Literature and placards will be distributed in the cities visited.

Mr. Lindsley, with his month's growth of beard and dressed in the costume of an early day minister, will drive a 1918 model Dodge touring car on the trip. Downing will fix the flats and open the gates.

Another trip will be made Wednesday to cities south and west of Midland.

Buenos Aires—(AP)—Britain and Argentina signed a five-year trade agreement Monday, ignoring United States objections to the pact. American businessmen believe the two-way pact will cut off one of their important South American markets.

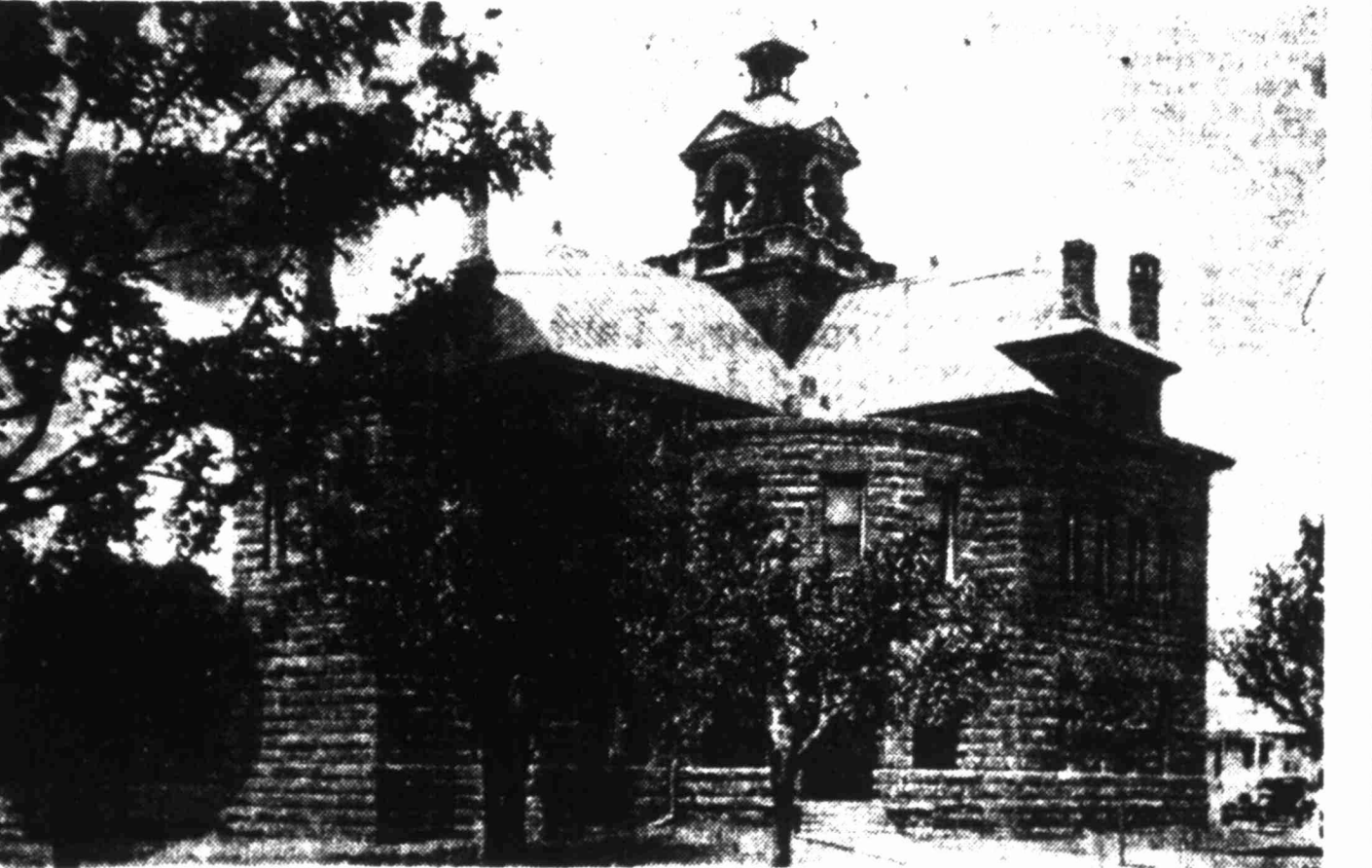

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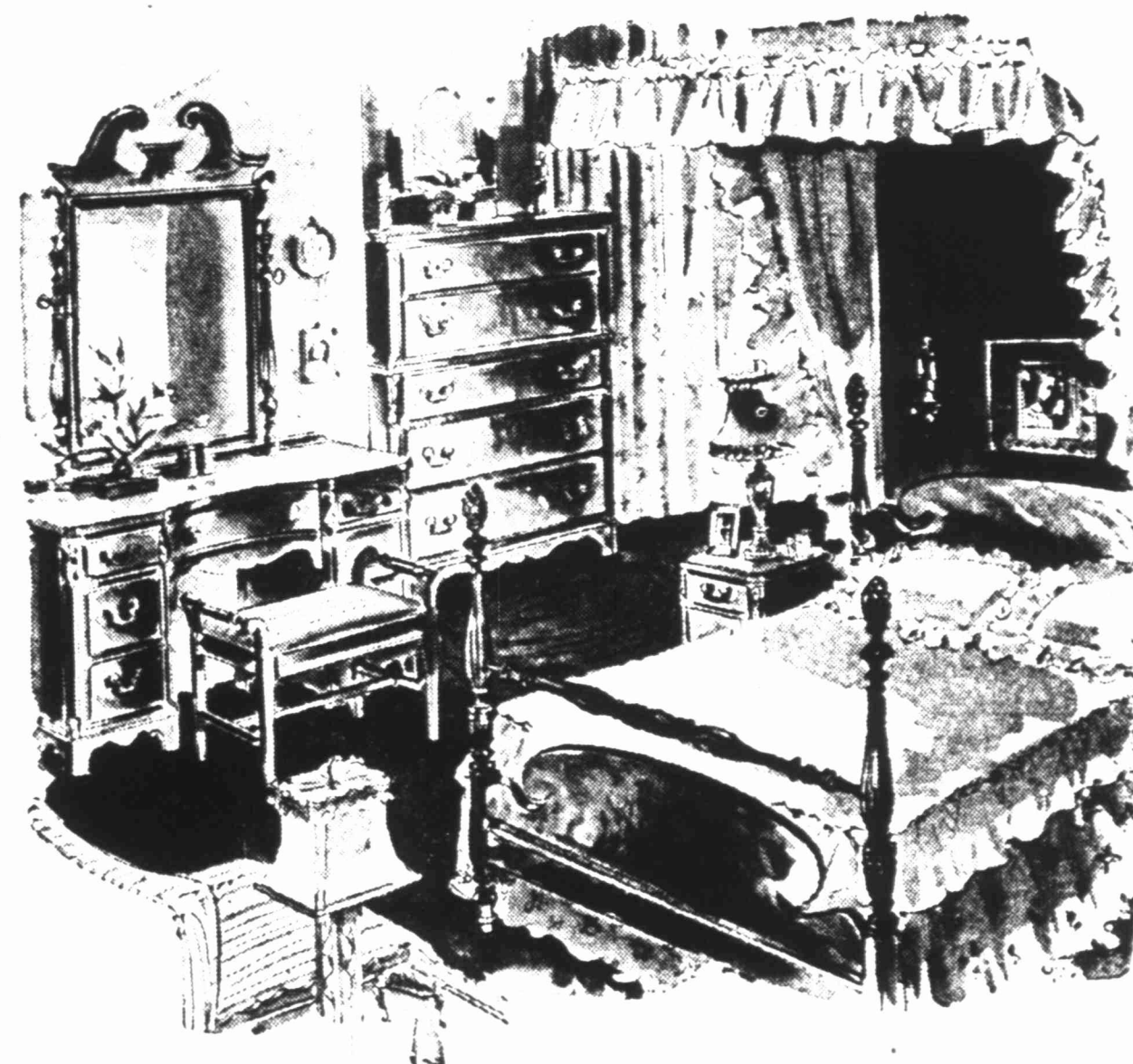

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Mercury Above 100 At Several Points

Vicious weekend thunderstorms tapered off into widely scattered showers Monday.

The Weather Bureau predicted partly cloudy skies for most of Texas during the day. Overnight showers fell at numerous points.

Temperatures climbed about the 100 mark at several places in Southwest Texas Sunday. Presidio was the hottest with 104 degrees. Wink was close behind with 103 degrees. A heavy thunderstorm whipped San Antonio Saturday night. Rains estimated at three to ten inches fell. Streets and underpasses were flooded and several persons were stranded in southern Bexar County when Salado Creek overflowed. Two persons were rescued as they clung to debris at a flooded intersection.

Shadow Of Lash Hangs Heavy Over States In Dixie

ATLANTA—(AP)—The shadow of the lash and burning cross hangs heavy over Dixie.

Out of three states since February—Alabama, Tennessee and Georgia—have come 31 grim stories of a lynching, floggings, cross burnings, bombings and intimidations. Though men and women have been beaten, their homes invaded by masked men and their lives threatened, the law has yet to record a single conviction.

This latest pattern of violence began developing around Chattanooga, Tenn. There in three months 21 men were beaten by hooded gangs. In each of these cases the victims said they were whipped for reasons of race, religion or morals, drinking mostly.

Then out of the coal, iron ore and limestone valleys around Birmingham, Ala., came stories of racial tension.

Houses Are Bombed
Three negro families bought and sought to occupy homes in a white section. Their houses were bombed. The negroes retreated.

Other stories of violence followed rapidly. U. S. Attorney General Tom Clark in Washington ordered the Federal Bureau of Investigation to report on the Birmingham situation. A congressional subcommittee announced a probe to open Wednesday in Washington.

Although many of the victims described their torturers as Ku Klux Klansmen, the Klan consistently has denied any connection with the beatings.

The head of the KKK in Alabama ordered klansmen to discard their masks in public. His act has prompted some klansmen to threaten revolt.

Outposts Set For Two Scurry Pools

Location has been made for two Canyon - Pennsylvanian explorations as outposts to fields producing from that formation in Scurry County.

Flanking the Sharon Ridge-Canyon pool of Southwest Scurry County, Humble Oil & Refining Company staked its No. 2 R. Bishop, et al, 680 feet from west and 1,980 feet from south lines of section 164, block 97, H&TC survey.

It is to be a 6,800-foot rotary tool venture, starting at once.

Bert Fields of Dallas, is beginning immediately on his No. 1 P. T. Harmon as an outpost to the Kelly field, of Central Scurry County, four miles west of Snyder.

It will be 680 feet from south and east lines of the northeast quarter of section 210, block 97, H&TC survey.

The Canyon is expected above 7,000 feet. Drilling will be with rotary tools.

Humble Will Venture Near Runnels Strike

A wildcat test into the Strawn-Pennsylvanian of Northwest Runnels County is to be started at once as Humble Oil & Refining Company No. 2 Sallee Odom, et al.

The drillsite is 650 feet from southwest and 8,248 feet from southeast lines of Felix Sosa survey. It is two and three quarter miles northwest of Humble No. 1 Odom, recently-completed Strawn discovery, and one and one-quarter miles east of Barnsdall Oil Company No. 1 Davenport, drilling wildcat.

Projected depth is 5,000 feet with rotary tools.

Location Made For Good Field Flanker

Another outpost to the Good field of South-Central Borden County is slated by Seaboard Oil Company of Delaware and Pan American Production Company.

It will be the concerns' No. 5 T. J. Good, staked 660 feet from west and 660.5 feet from south lines of the northwest quarter of section 37, block 33, T-4-N, TP survey, about six miles north of the Vealmoor pool in North-Central Howard County.

With rotary tools, the venture is starting immediately toward 8,100 feet to attempt production in the Canyon line of the Pennsylvanian.

Wildcat Staked To Crockett Deep Zone

An 8,000-foot wildcat to test into the Ellenburger one and one-half miles south of the shallow Vaughn field in Northeast Crockett County has been staked by Ted Weiner, et al, and James H. Snowden of Fort Worth.

It will be their No. 1-E Isabel Vaughn. The drillsite is 650 feet from west and 1,980 feet from north lines of section 28, O.P. G&SF survey, about one and one-half miles southwest of Weiner, et al, No. 1 Vaughn, dry hole in the Ellenburger on 7,785 feet.

Snowden holds a one-quarter interest in the venture and in 400 acres around it. Bottom hole money is being contributed by The Pure Oil Company and Malco Refineries of Roswell, N. M.

Rotary contract has been awarded to Standard-Fryer Company of Dallas. Operations are starting shortly.

Beddo Pool Venture Discovers New Pay

Discovery of a new pay in the Beddo pool of Central Runnels County was proven as Chapman & McFarlin No. 1 W. B. Dankworth, exploration on the north-side of the field, flowed at a rate estimated as 15 to 20 barrels of oil per hour from a Pennsylvanian sandy lime formation believed to be Fry or Jennings.

The show was on a drillstem test at 3,729-40 feet, making gas at the surface in four minutes and oil in 17 minutes. The well flowed to tips 30 minutes before the tool was closed. On last report, preparations were being made to pull drillpipe.

The oil formation, which is above the Gardner sand pay of the pool.

Winkler Devonian Yields Salt Water

The Devonian has made water for Richardson & Bass and Southland Royalty Company No. 1 Wallace, et al, wildcat one and one-quarter miles south of the Flying W field in Northeast Winkler, where production is from the Devonian.

The venture drillstem tested for two hours at 9,820-81 feet and recovered 1,200-foot water blanket and 4,830 feet of salt water slightly cut with gas. It was preparing to drill ahead.

Location is 1,980 feet from north and west lines of section 88, Barbara Hill survey, about 13 and one-half miles northeast of Kermit.
