



Cotton and Peanut Producers, Please Read This! The following information is very important to you as a cotton or peanut producer, and should be understood ducer, and should be understood thoroughly. The law pertaining to allotment history credit for 1960 has been changed. For this year, you should either plant at least 75% of your allotment or release your acreage in order to protect your 1961 allotment. By doing one of the two above, you will receive complete protection. will receive complete protection. Failure to either plant or re-lease will automatically cut the 1961 allotment to approximately one-half of your present allot-ment. Please do not be one of those farmers who fail to do those farmers who fail to do and get his allotment of the Royaley of the Royaley

to release or plant your allot-ment, provided the amount of acreage in the Soll Bank is equal to at least 75% of your

grasses. A cost share payment grasses. A cost share payment will be made for carrying out this practice in 1961 provided the acreage to be planted rep-resent an increase over the resent an increase over the acreage seeded in prior years. In other words, no Federal cost share can be made for seeding the same acreage that was seeded in the past. In order to be eligible for assistance in carry-ing out this practice, you must purchase your grass seed and submit the receipt to this office prior to beginning of the plant-ing operation.

You are required to file your sales documents on shorn wool and unshorn lambs sold between April 1, 1959 and March 31, 1960. The sales documents must be filed at this office not later than April 30, 1960, to be eligible for incentive payment.

We wish to call your attention to a recent change in marketing quota regulation pertaining to the required size and shape of plowed-up acreage. In order to receive credit for disposing of excess acreage, the plot must be at least 13 ft. and 2 in. wide, or at least 13 ft. and 2 in. wide, or tain at least 1/10 of an acre to be eligible for a deduction. Ad-justment credit shall be given only for areas of regular shape with not more than four sides. 

A recent outbreak of trichino-is southwest of Austin points out the need for increased attention to this disease among pork loving Texans.

Several persons experienced symptoms of trichinosis, includ-ing fever, swelling of the eyes, muscle pains and tenderness, and eosinophilia (the presence of cer-tain cells in the blood.)

After careful questioning to determine whether the victims had eaten pork, plus intensive laboratory analyses of specimens, trichinosis was identified as the cause.

Trichinosis is difficult to diag-nose since it resembles other physical disorders such as ty-phold fever, meningitis, influen-za and heart trouble.

Studies indicate that many people are infested with trichinae (the ainy worms that cause the disease), but never know it. Laboratory tests of blood specimens taken during illness or convelescence may confirm elinonvalescence may confirm clinical diagnosis.

The principal way that the di-sease is transmitted to man is by eating insufficiently cooked meat, mainly pork.

Hogs ordinarily get the para-sites from eating raw garbage containing trichinae - infested pork scraps or occasionally by

All garbage fed to hogs should be thoroughly cooked and intensive rat eradication programs carried on in hog production areas. However, complete control among hogs seems difficult to

sease in humans is to carefully cook all pork products - - this in-cludes hams, sausages, and bacon which are not pre-cooked.

A safe rule-of-thumb for pre-paring pork is to cook it until you cannot see any pink meat. Cook all pork and pork products thoroughly, until the meat is white clear through.

Althought not often fatal, trichinosis can seriously debilitate a mature adult and ruin the general health of children or infants.

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
