

Neither could be approached directly for information but Prince Aly confirmed last August that the onetime Hollywood queen was an expectant mother.

Rita and Aly were married May 27 on the French Riviera after a courtship that made headlines around the world.

Miss Hayworth has visited Lausanne several times in recent months to consult physicians at the Mont Choisi Clinic. The information service said the

couple would stay in Lausanne until the birth of the baby and then go to Gstaad, a fashfonable Swiss resort. The family is expected to move about December 15 to Ostaad Chalet rented by Aly.





Four original Western paintings of Charles M. Russell are included in a collection which Dr. Carlton "The Winslow Boy," a play which Palmer is displaying in the Schar-

The Russell pictures are unusual, since most of his work is owned by museums or persons who refuse to his paintings have become more and more popular and he is considered a foremost interpreter from direct experience of the exciting life

of the old west. In the Palmer collection, which the public is invited to see, are two watercolors and two pen drawings. They are "The Bucking Broncho," painted in 1898; "Roping Steer," of the same year; "On the Trail," painted in 1899; and an undated painting, "On a Spree."

In 1899 Russell presented these paintings to a friend, F. W. Thayer, a Boston wool dealer who spent much time in Montana where the artist worked. Atomic Bomb Control

President Truman made plain at the dedication of the United Nations headquarters in New York that this country is open-minded on the issue of how to control atomic energy to prevent war.

Under the guidance of Bernard M. Baruch, the United States developed a world control plan founded on UN ownership of all dangerous atomic facilities, outlawing of atomic weapons and rigid inspection to guard against violations by particular countries. With some changes, this plan was adopted by a majority of the UN membership.

But the U.S. now is not insisting that this plan and only this be put into effect. Truman said we are standing on it, to be sure. But he emphasized that the reason we have not abandoned it is that we see no alternative which offers hope of real effectiveness.

It is evident that this nation would be disposed to accept any program which could meet that test. In our espousal of the Baruch plan there is no blind, stubborn clinging to an idea simply because it happens to be ours. We simply want to be shown convincingly that another plan really can do a better job.

The basic Russian suggestion is considered by American leaders to be no plan at all. It would retain national ownership of dangerous atomic facilities, would not allow more than a superficial inspection to detect violations of a proposed ban on atomic weapons, and would rely chiefly on a mere outlawing treaty.

Russian Foreign Minister Vishinsky has indicated that such a treaty might follow the pattern of the agreement them banning the use of poison gas in war. Some columnists have insisted that the United States can hope for no more than this if it really desires agreement with the Soviet Union on the atomic issue. They believe the outlawing treaty will work because of the mutual fear of reprisal in case a violation occurs.


