

Fourth, a Mexican oil loan is unsettled. The State Department and Export-Import Bank are opposed to lending Mexico any money for oil development. But a few days after the U.S. and Mexico 'suspended" talks about the loan, President Truman told them he wanted Mexico to have her money. There's little economic sense in lending Mexico money, since American companies are ready to go in and develop the oil, but this issue deeply is involved in politics. Sixth, gasoline and fuel oil prices of the industry are under criticism, but there's been no final report from the Senate Banking and Currency Committee under Chairman Burnet R. Maybank (D-SC). A report may be forthcoming in December or January. It will criticize the price structure, as this column has revealed. But the prospects are Senator Maybank will keep criticizing oil prices all next year. After all, 1950 is an election year.



Election Can Backfire

Yugoslavia's election to the UN Security Council is admittedly a victory for the United States over the Soviet Union. But there is some question just how wildly the event should be hailed.

The decision is of course valuable as a rebuff to Russia in her attempt to dictate to the General Assembly on council membership. Had the principle been established that Russia could control the choice of any Eastern European nation for council duty, the UN's freedom of selection would have been gone.

The result also is a new blow to Soviet domination of Eastern Europe. By further strengthening the hand of Marshal Tito, it cuts deeper into falling Russian prestige in that sector. It was this prospect that led Soviet Foreign Minister Vishinsky to scream so loudly against Yugoslavia's candidacy.

Certainly the non-Communist world is happy at any outcome which reduces the menace of Russian power, either in some geographic sphere or within the UN. And that probably is true even when, as in the present case, the nation serving as a lever against the Soviet Union is itself Communist in character.

Yet in supporting Yugoslavia so staunchly the United States may have involved its own future more deeply in Eastern Europe than seems wise at this time. Should Russia decide to use force to crush Tito, this country would be pressed to remain aloof from the battle if it were heavily committed both politically and economically.

So far most of our aid to Tito has been economic. It still looks early to throw him substantial political backing. Too little is known about what kind of war a Russian-Yugoslav conflict would be.

Within the UN, Russia may decide to stir up new trouble when the Security Council begins meeting in January. Two main possibilities appear.

Sub-Launched Loon Test Is Successful

ABOARD USS SPANGLER OFF HAWAII —(AP)— A submarinelaunched buzz-bomb zoomed over a long line of 35 Navy ships Monday and apparently escaped a hit from anti-aircraft guns.

The missile was assisted by rocket in its takeoff from the deck of the submarine Carbonero. Known in Navy parlance as a loon, the missile was lunched 20 miles behind 35 ships strung out over a 21-mile course. It sped 400-500 miles an hour over its controlled course and plunged into the sea 80 miles from where it was launched.

A close look at the loon launching showed the Navy's missile development has reached a stage where submarines can carry a number of jet weapons in normal underseas operations. Loon wings are detachable and the missile and its jet engine, when broken down, probably would occupy the same space area n a submarme as three torpedoes The missile launching ramps are made of light steel framework easily taken down and stowed.

The most impressive thing in Monday's demonstration was the scant launching ramp required to get the bomb into the air with a



Members of Stalin's immediate entourage have long been cautiously maneuvering for a place in anticipation of his death. The late Andrei Zhdanov generally had been regarded as a possible successor. But now Zhdanov is dead and Molotov apparently is in eclipse. The two leading actors in this unfolding Soviet drama are Beria and Georgi M. Malenkov, one of the younger and more able members of the Polithuro.
