ONE COULD PROBABLY say that March came in like a Lion, judging by the weather of this week, or perhaps like a Zephyr, to be more correct.

The windstorm in this area Thursday was one of the worst experienced in quite a while, and reminded some oldtimers of the "Dust Bowl" days of the 1930s.

Quite a bit of real estate was changing hands during the day, although no deeds were drawn up in the process.

If the area does not get some type of relief from the drouth, in the near future, we can probably expect some repeat performances of Thursday's "Big Blow."

Hazel Appling of 812 Virginia, a nurse's aide at Parmer County Community Hospital, observed her 14th Leap Year birthday last Sunday. Mrs. Appling has been a resident of Friona for about four years, but it was her first time to observe a "29th" birthday since moving here from Clovis.

A new baby at the hospital, Lalanya Modesta Sorensen, came within 20 hours of having an every four year birthday, but arrived at 4:25 a.m. on the 28th. The hospital, which had recorded only two February 29th births in the last five leap years, narrowly missed another.

FRIONA MAY LOSE its Parent-Teachers Organization (P-T.O.), we learned this week, unless some interest to save the organization is shown by Friona area parents.

Paula O'Brian, slated to be president of the organization for 1976-77, says that participation in the P-T.O. has dwindled to the group's officers, and not even always all of them.

Wiseman, a standout student and athlete while at Friona, is said to be capable of throwing the javelin 200 feet. This is his specialty in college. He also can throw the discus around 140 feet, and he puts the shot for the Pioneers as well.

We also noticed in the brochure that another ex-Friona athlete, and an ex-Wayland star, Danny Murphree, still holds some school track records at the Plainview college. Murphree holds school records in the 220-yard dash (21.2), 440-yard dash (47.2) and 400-meter dash (1:14.4).

Although track records have not been documented at FHS through its history, we would assume that Murphree's marks in the sprints while running for the Chieftains are school bests.

BACK ON THE SUBJECT of leap year, we noted that former Frionan Clyde Hays was one of seven men featured by the Amarillo Globe-News in its Sunday edition in a special feature on "eligible bachelors."

Hays, 39, is a Friona High School graduate (class of '53). He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Clyde Hays of 601 Arrah. The younger Hays is an attorney in Amarillo.

Finalists Named In REC Contest

The Rural Electric Youth Tour contest sponsored by the Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative were announced this week by James Hull, Manager of the Cooperative.

The seven juniors were selected from a group of high school juniors who gave speeches on "Rural Electric Coops-Good For All Americans." The finalists are: Lisa Edelman, Friona; Margie Wilhelm, Nazareth; Dorothy Gugemos, Nazareth; Carolyn Meeks, Farwell; Rose Valdez, Hereford; Phillip Hand, Friona; Dale Acker, Nazareth.

These seven young people will give their speeches on March 9 to a panel of three judges. From the group of finalists a boy and girl will be selected as winners of an

Youth Tour trip to Washington, D.C. the week of June 10.

Final judging of the contestants is to be based on the following: (1) knowledge of cooperative rural electrification, including a written test-40 per cent, (2) speaking ability-30 per cent; (3) poise-10 per cent; (4) personality-10 per cent, and (5) appearance-10 per cent.

The youth group will travel to and from Washington, D.C. by bus. Participants will be chaperoned by three adult couples.

During the four day stay in the Nation's capital, these young people will see the United States government in action, visit with their Congressmen and Senators and visit various government agencies and sites of historical significance.

Parched Area Raked By Gale Force Wind

The Friona area, entertaining hopes for some much-needed moisture, instead was buffeted by gale-like winds on Thursday of this week. The southwest wind also kicked up sand which made outdoor activities unbearable, and added housekeeping chores for homes and offices.

Clouds rolled into the area Wednesday, giving farmers hopes of some relief from the prolonged drouth which has gripped the area. Snow flurries or freezing drizzle had been predicted for Wednesday night or Thursday morning.

Only a trace of moisture was received in Friona early Thursday, although early risers were greeted with a fog cover.

The fog and clouds soon gave way to the gusting wind, however, and the wind buffeted the area for the entire day.

It marked the second time during the week for high winds, as Tuesday was also a windy day, though not quite as windy as Thursday.

Official records compiled by the City of Friona revealed this week that the area has received only 2.69

Announcing the last week were George Frye and Teddy Fangman. Previously announced were Floyd S. Reeve, Joe Allen, Gary Snead, M.C. Osborn, Gaylord Maurer and Dr. Jon Mack Roden.

The eight candidates will be seeking spots on the board currently being held by Reeve, Doyle Elliott and Floyd Schueler. Holdover members of the board are Wesley Barnett, Ronald Smiley, David Grimsley and Jerry Hinkle.

The election April 3 will be held at the Friona Fire Station, and will be held in conjunction with the City Council election the same day.

Absentee voting for the school board race will begin March 15 and run through March 30, in the Superintendent's office at Friona High School.

Barnett Tops Chief Scoring

Senior David Barnett was the scoring leader for the 1975-76 Chieftains with 401 points and a 13.8 average per game.

Junior Mark Neill was runnerup with 293 points and a 10.1 average.

The Chiefs' scoring average of 52 points per game was 21 per game below that of the 1974-75 team, which had set all of the scoring records at FHS.

Statistics released this week by Coach Larry Dyess showed that Neill was the top field goal shooter, with 119 goals in 270 attempts, 44.1 per cent. Two other starters hit over 40 per cent, Keith Martin at 40.9 and Barnett at 40.4.

Martin had the best free throw mark on the team with a sizzling 86.1 per cent on 31 of 36 attempts. However, he and senior Roy Smith were the only ones over 60 per cent, as the rest of the team's free throw shooting was below par.

Terri Patterson Has Great Scoring Year

Season scoring statistics showed that Friona Squaw forward Terri Patterson had one of the best individual scoring seasons in recent girls basketball history at Friona High School, during the season just past.

Miss Patterson scored 714 points in 29 games. Her per-game scoring average of 24.6 is the best average that could be found among available records for the past 20 seasons at FHS.

Only three players have scored more points in a single season than Miss Patterson's 714 total for 1975-76.

Higher point totals were by Teto Jennings, with 723 in 1964-65; Cindy Ingram with 742 points in 1966-67 and Hazel Fallwell in 1968-69. In two of those cases, Squaw teams played several more games than this year's team, and the scoring leader's average was not as high as Terri's.

Terri got her totals on 221 field goals and 272 free shots. She made an even 40 per cent of her free throw attempts, and 67.5 per cent of her free throw attempts.

Miss Patterson's three-year totals show 1,791 points scored (416 as a sophomore and 661 as a junior), for a 20.1 scoring average

for three years. She is one of only a few to carry a three-year average of 20 points or better.

Another senior, Myrna Phipps, had the best shooting percentage on the team for field goals, hitting 42.7 per cent of her shots.

Two sophomores, Cindy Cleveland and Rhonda Parsons, had the best free throw percentages. Miss Cleveland hit 72.9 per cent, 27 of 37 attempts, while Miss Parsons had 70.8 per cent, 68 of 96.

Sherri Thorn was the team's leading rebounder with 143. Lucinda Aguirre had 97.

The statistics were released by Squaw coach Al Lemons.

Tennis Team Opens Season

The Friona High School tennis team hosted Muleshoe last Saturday from 1-6 p.m. The confrontation marked the opening match of the year for the FHS netters, who will compete in district play on April 6 at Morton.

Muleshoe won the overall meet three matches to two. Playing number singles for Friona was Mark Neill, who lost by a score of 6-4, 4-6, 3-6. After taking the first set with a strong service, Neill's game began to falter a bit and the Muleshoe player began to slowly gain a slight advantage. The match was very close even to the final point. In number 2 singles, Friona's Clint Mears was defeated by a Muleshoe player 4-6, 1-6.

In doubles action, Friona's number 1 team of Hal Blackburn and Don Maynard split sets with Muleshoe's number 1 team, before taking a third set 6 games to 3, and taking the match by a final score of 4-6, 6-4, 6-3. Number 2 doubles action saw Friona's Joe Lafuente and Keith Martin lose a close match by a score of 6-1, 5-7, 3-6.

A freshman team composed of Leslie White and Mike Hutson downed a Muleshoe team in straight sets 6-2, 7-5.

"Helping Your Diabetic Child" by Dr. John M. Court is a story about an understanding parent and how the parent's aid is vital to the child afflicted with diabetes.

Dr. Court takes some of the mystery surrounding the disease and argues that simple precautions make it possible for the diabetic to live a perfectly normal life.

He maintains the parent's supportive attitude enables a child to keep up his usual activities and consequently eases the burden of the disease for the child. The author is in charge of the Diabetic Clinic at the Melbourne Royal Children's Hospital.

A portrait of Martin Parmer, which was done by Friona's Bobby Wied, hangs in the center of the display. He was born in 1778 and died in 1850 and was one of the signers of the Texas Declaration of Independence.

He is the statesman for whom Parmer County was named.

Then another very interesting object is a corporate seal of the Parmerton Townsite Company, a Texas corporation of 1907. This seal was found by Joe McLellan near the railroad bridge just west of Friona in 1950 and has been loaned to the Parmer County Historical Society.

Another old seal on display is that of the office of Collector of Taxes, County of Parmer, 1908.

Other things on display include old coins, which were found on the courthouse lawn, a single tree and some leg irons.
