

Court Rejects Vote Hassle — Texas Supreme Court refused to consider a direct appeal from the City of Austin that it order a complete recount of votes in crats will be assuming what is a complete recount of votes in usually a once-in-a-lifetime role a hotly contested urban renewal - that of sponsoring a major election.

Issue has had Austinites in a stew for months. It was origin-ally announced after the elec-tion in December that urban re-newal had carried by a 52-vote margin. Eight property owners contested the election results on grounds that ballots were cast by persons not qualified to vote. After 9 of 18 contested boxes had been opened, District Judge James K. Evetts of Belton de-clared the election void. He said there were so many disqualified voters and improperly marked ballots that it was impossible to determine the election outcome.

Austin's city attorney petition-ed the Supreme Court for a writ of mandamus to compel Judge Evetts to open and examine all the ballot boxes. He contended the qualified voters had a right to have their votes counted. Having lost out on a direct

Advance report forms for the 1960 census population and hous-ing will be distributed by the Post Office this week to all households in this area, District Supervisor Max V. Mossholder announced today. The advance report form is a

The advance report form is a new census-taking device which is designed to speed up the field canvass and provide more accuis designed to speed up the field canvass and provide more accu-rate statistics. Distribution of this form before the start of the house-to-house canvass gives the family a chance to assemble information about each mem-ber in advance of the census tak er's visit. The district supervi-sor urges all residents to fill out the forms and have them ready for the census takers when they start their rounds on April 1. The advance report form con-tains seven questions about every person in the household and six questions about the house-hold's dwelling. The household information asked for is name, address, sex, color or race, month address, sex, color or race, month and year of birth, whether mar-ried or single, and relationship to head of the household. The to head of the household. The information required about the dwelling is the number of rooms cooking facilities, plumbing, if rented or owned. At every fourth household, the


