BILL CLAYTON has been in Friona more during the past week than some of the residents, unless we miss our guess. One thing for sure, he hasn't shirked an opportunity to be of service.

The Speaker of the House has been here three times during the past week, and had four official programs in the process.

It started off last Saturday, with Clayton acting as parade marshal for the Malze Days parade. Then at noon prior to the barbecue, Clayton presented cash gifts to Boys Ranch and Girlstown officials. The gifts were those which had been given to the Speaker, which in turn were given by Clayton to the two area homes for children.

On Wednesday evening, Clayton brought a discussion of the proposed new state constitution to a small group at Friona High School. He said that by Saturday, he would have held the constitutional discussion in 19 communities in his district.

Then on Thursday afternoon, Clayton addressed the Friona Student Body. However, in between his Wednesday evening and Thursday afternoon sessions, he had flown to Fort Worth and back, since he had an appearance early Thursday morning at a state Soil Conservation meeting.

So you can readily see that our Speaker of the House isn't letting any grass grow under his feet these days. In fact, we'd hate to try to keep up with him.

THE PROPOSED CONSTITUTION has drawn opposition from several corners, but all things considered, it might be a good thing. Clayton pointed out here Tuesday that the proposed constitution has some good features for rural areas. If this constitution isn't approved and another one is proposed at a later date, rural Texans might not fare as well, Clayton pointed out.

We will be attempting, between now and November, to present as much information as possible about the proposed new constitution, so that when you go to vote on November 4 you'll know a little bit about the proposals.

## Overpass Opened After Ceremonies

"This project actually had its beginning back in the 1920s, when people living to the south of Friona had problems crossing the draw at times when they needed to come to Friona," said mayor R.L. Fleming during his remarks at dedication ceremonies at the new overpass into the city Tuesday.

"The Railroad built a dike back in the 1940s, and this took care of the problem from their standpoint, but the flooding on the highway was still a problem for motorists," Fleming continued.

"It's a real blessing that in all this time a train hasn't hit a school bus at the railroad crossing, but we have been spared that tragedy," Fleming said.

Also speaking on the program was George C. Wall, Jr., district engineer for the highway department's Lubbock district.

Friona City Manager called the program to order. A podium was placed in the center and near the summit of the new bridge. At the conclusion of the remarks, a ribbon-cutting ceremony was held, with Mayor Fleming doing the honors. Holding the ribbon were former Parmer County Judge Archie Tarter and former district engineer O.L. Crain of Lubbock.

Other officials were introduced, including Sam Pinson, executive vice president of Austin Bridge Company; J.O. Boswell of Boswell-Crafton Construction Company, contractors for the road portion of the Highway 214 project; Weldon Moody, county maintenance fore-

man, Texas Highway Department; Rhea Bradley, resident engineer, highway department, Littlefield, and other highway department officials.

Also attending were Parmer County Judge Paul Fortenberry, commissioners Tom Lewellen, Jimmie Briggs and Cecil Atchley, City councilmen Troy Young, Glenn E. Reeve, Sr., Jerry Loflin and Patrick Pace.

Tulia's Hornets, rated sixth in the state by Texas AA teams this past week by United Press International, certainly proved to the Friona Chieftains and their fans Friday night at Tulia that they are a top-notch football team.

The Hornets, frustrated for the better part of two quarters by penalties and a gritty bunch of outmanned Chieftains, grew stronger as the game went on, and finally overpowered Friona, 37-0.

The game might have been closer than the score indicated, after checking the game statistics. The potent Tulia team only outgained Friona by 137 total yards for the contest, 330-193.

Friona allowed Tulia less total yardage than the Muleshoe Mules had gained in the team's previous game.

The Chieftains, aided by some timely penalties against the Hornets during the first quarter, kept the explosive Tulia team from scoring for the first 16 minutes of clock time.

Friona had to recover from the brink of disaster in the game's opening minutes, after holding Tulia and forcing a punt. Rolando Caballero fielded the punt, and faked a handoff to Roy Smith. To their horror, the ball popped loose, and squirted right in the middle of about four Tulia players, and the Hornets recovered at the Friona 24.

However, the team survived this catastrophe when on the next play Tulia fumbled the handoff and Ram Randolph hopped on the ball.

A 40-yard pass play to the Hornets' big star Raymond Williams (33) was erased by a Tulia offsides late in the period. The play had gone inside the

Friona ten, but thanks to the penalty, the first quarter came to a close with goose-eggs on both sides of the scoreboard.

Glen London gave the visiting fans something to cheer about on the first play of the second quarter when he broke through the line and charged for 30 yards to the Tulia 44 before being ridden down from behind.

However, two plays lost yardage as the team seemed to mis-fire, and Friona had to punt.

On Tulia's fourth possession, Williams, a true all-state candidate, took the pitchout and headed around right end. He turned on the speed at the sideline and there was no catching the big (6-3, 195) tailback. It was a 48-yard scoring play.

Monty Cannon's kick gave the Hornets the lead at 7-0 with 4:17 left in the half.

Friona looked like it might get going again, when Keith Martin kept

for a first down at the team's 46. But a fumble turned the ball over at midfield. Before the game was over, the Chiefs were to lose five fumbles, as the team stopped themselves at every turn.

Only once in the game was Friona able to put as many as two first downs together in a row, and that was late in the contest.

It looked like the halftime score would be 7-0, but with four seconds left on the clock John Seright got his feet tangled with the Tulia

# Stork Doesn't Wait; Baby Born In Car

"I was thinking the other day that if we traded off our car it would sure break my heart," laughed Melody Drake, wife of Owen Drake, whose baby was born in the back seat of the family car shortly after three a.m. Saturday, September 13.

"I don't remember fright at all....It was all happening so fast," she recalled. "I was pretty thrilled and relieved...both ways...after it

"Owen later told me he was going about 90 mph until she was born, but it seemed like two mph....I thought he was creeping....it just seemed like forever," Mrs. Drake said of the eventful trip to the hospital.

The Drakes live on the J.T. Guinn Ranch 16 miles northwest of Friona just off Highway 214. The shortest route to town is 10 miles of dirt road. That night, because of recent rain, they had to take the long route which only had three miles of dirt road. That three-mile dirt road took the longest because they could only go 20 mph on the muddy road.

"We lacked about eight miles before town when Misty Jayne was born," said Mrs. Drake. "She was born while we were between the E.G. Phipps and the Lillard place in between the two big curves on 214."

That route was later timed according to the speed, and the dirt road section took ten minutes at 20

mph, and Misty must have been born within the next five minutes, which is how long it took to get from the dirt road to the Lillard place with the vehicle traveling approximately 85 mph. The entire trip to the hospital took 23 minutes.

"I began having pains about 1:30 a.m. and got up and started packing my suitcase," Mrs. Drake related. "It must have been 2:45 a.m. when I called Dorothy (Blankenship), the nurse on duty, and told her, but she told me to wait since my pains were

"Owen was asleep until 3 a.m. when I woke him up to call the doctor and woke Wes, our two-and-a-half year old son. I didn't think I'd make it then," she said.

"Owen called his mother and the nurse and then we got in the car. I was in the back seat, and Wes was in the front seat standing up beside his dad," she said. "I was so proud of Wes because he didn't cry or act scared from my hollering while we were in the car."

"When the baby was born, the first thing I said was, 'The baby's here! The baby's here!'" she said. "Wes heard her cry and said, 'Baby! Baby!' I just looked at her," she laughed. "I didn't know what to do or whether I should pick her up or not....I think I was in shock."

"Owen turned on the light and told me how to take care of her," she explained. "I told Owen, 'It's a girl! It's a girl!'"

"Owen wanted a boy and I wanted a girl. I really don't care as long as they're healthy, but I'm really very pleased," she added. "I always thought it would be neat to have a boy first and a girl second."

"Owen just kept asking me if she looked like Wes," she recalled. "Mostly we just listened to her cry, and I think we were all just amazed that it happened right there."

"We got to the hospital and

room the night of September 13 when Misty Jayne was born. The Drakes live 20 miles from Friona, and the stork beat them to the hospital when their baby daughter was born.

Dorothy finished the delivery and wrapped the baby and gave her to an aide while I was taken to the delivery room where Dr. Paul and Dorothy took care of me," she said.

"Dorothy kept apologizing to me when I got there, and I kept apologizing to her...for what reason I don't know....I guess for being so much trouble. I did feel like I was a lot of trouble to them," she said. "They are a bunch of good people at the hospital. I like my doctor and the nurses....I guess you get a deeper feeling of love when you're with you with your children," Mrs. Drake added.

"Some people wanted to know why I didn't leave home earlier, but I thought I was doing everything as best as I possibly could. She was born in just two hours, which isn't very much time."

Babies being born in cars isn't new for the hospital staff at Parmer County Community Hospital. Dorothy Blankenship told the Friona Star, "We've fished 'em out of cars several times," and she related a story about a local farm hand's wife, who had her baby several years ago in the back of his brand new car while her husband was asleep in the front seat during the trip to the hospital.

Mrs. Blankenship then told that Owen Drake had called her shortly after she had talked to his wife and had said, "She's gonna have that baby before I get there! What'll I

do? What'll I do?" She said she told him to first calm down and then get a thick blanket in the car and bring her in."

"It was a real muddy, nasty night," she explained, "so I called the cops to make sure they didn't get in a ditch, but they beat the cops into town."

"When they got to the hospital Melody kept patting me and trying to keep me from getting excited. She was the calmest individual you ever saw, and then she got excited when it was all over," Mrs. Blankenship said.

"And I don't know WHERE all those grandparents come from!" she exclaimed. "All of a sudden the hall was full of grandparents....they were coming out of the woodwork!"

Then she added with a laugh, "You know how parents tell their kids about the stork....we told Owen he'd never be able to sell his kid on the stork bit after that...."

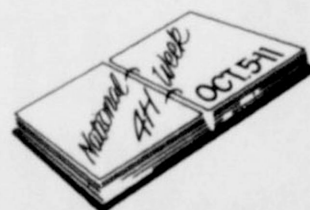

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# Post Office Wants To Know Mail Woes

Beginning October 1, the U.S. Postal Service will introduce a program at the Friona Post Office and other offices across the nation to encourage mail users to register problems they may have with their mail service.

At the core of the program is a consumer service card, through which problems are identified and which postal managers attempt expeditiously resolve.

The Consumer Service Program reflects Postmaster General Benjamin F. Bailar's determination that mail service to the public will be "friendly," courteous and efficient, as well as speedy and reliable.

"Good service is a far broader concept than just fast mail handling, as important as that is," the Postmaster General says. "It is also built of employee courtesy, our responsiveness to customer needs, the sympathy and understanding we bring to your own expectations of what good postal service is all about."

Postmaster Williams urged customers in Friona to bring their inquiries and complaints to the attention of postal managers. And if

people feel their problems have not been properly handled, the postmaster said, they should see him personally.

To make it easier for a customer to make a suggestion or complaint about postal service, the new service card will be available from letter carriers and at post offices.

According to Postmaster Williams, the card is two postal cards with carbon paper between them. "One copy goes to me or a station superintendent so work can begin on the problem," he said.

"The other copy goes to postal headquarters in Washington for cataloging and analysis. The card will help management spot problem areas and trends and take corrective action if necessary.

The Consumer Service Program was tested earlier this year in Illinois, Massachusetts, Arizona and Rhode Island. Postal customers in the test found the cards easy to complete and most complaints were resolved to the customer's satisfaction.

The card should take no more than two minutes to fill out. The postmaster also said that he and his staff are willing to discuss any problems, including lack of courtesy, irregularities in deliveries or collections, collection box convenience and postal office hours.

"We want you to come to us with your problems," concluded Postmaster Williams. "The whole point of this service program is to bring your problems and gripes out into the open where we can attempt to resolve them."

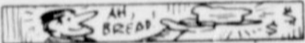

## Clayton Discusses Proposed Document

House Speaker Bill Clayton of Springlake appeared in Friona Wednesday evening, during one of a series of local meetings to help explain the proposed constitution to be voted upon by state voters November 4.

The proposed constitution was salvaged from the work of the 1974 state constitutional convention, Clayton pointed out, which adjourned after spending seven months and \$4½ million dollars without submitting a new state charter to the voters.

Clayton said that as Speaker of the House, he helped form a committee to formulate a proposed constitution to be submitted to Texas voters in November.

Basically, the new document would give Texans the same form of government they now have, but would streamline the some portions of the government. Also, it would cut down on the cumbersome constitution first written in 1876, and containing over 63,000 words. The present constitution has been amended 220 times.

One of the changes proposed by the new state document is a provision for annual sessions of the state legislature rather than semi-annual sessions. Clayton thinks this would be a big improvement.

"At the present time we have to appropriate funds for a two year basis, beginning some nine months before the two-year state fiscal year is to begin. As a result, we have padding of the budget requests by many state agencies, who, like the legislature, can't look down the road that far and tell what they are going to need."

"It's impossible to budget that far in advance, and know, for instance, how much your budget will be affected by inflation," Clayton says.

Clayton, speaking to a group composed predominately of school teachers and personnel, said in remarks apart from the constitutional discussion that he felt that the current school financing bill, a two-year program, would have to be further refined.

"In the rural areas, the ad valorem tax accounts for about 85 per cent of the wealth of the school district. We're having to pay too high a percentage in our area," the Springlake legislator said.

Other new provisions in the proposed constitution include limiting the governor to two consecutive terms; requiring a uniform appraisal of property for ad valorem tax purposes, to be used by all local governmental units; and allows county voters to create new offices or combine duties to eliminate certain offices.

"This could save the taxpayers of Texas millions of dollars a year," Clayton stated.

The proposed document lowers the required population for home-rule cities from 5,000 to 1,500. It prohibits retail sales tax on agricultural machinery, parts, fertilizer, feeds or seeds.

"Overall, I feel that it's a good document. It has some things for the rural areas that voters should seize upon. These provisions might not be included if a proposed constitution should be submitted at another time," Clayton said.

He indicated that with all of the compromises that had been effected, he felt it was a constitution that would serve the people of Texas.

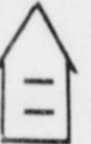
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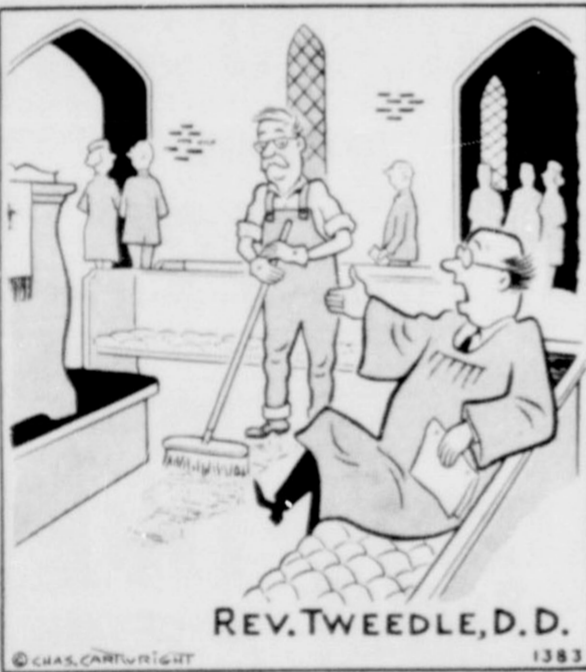

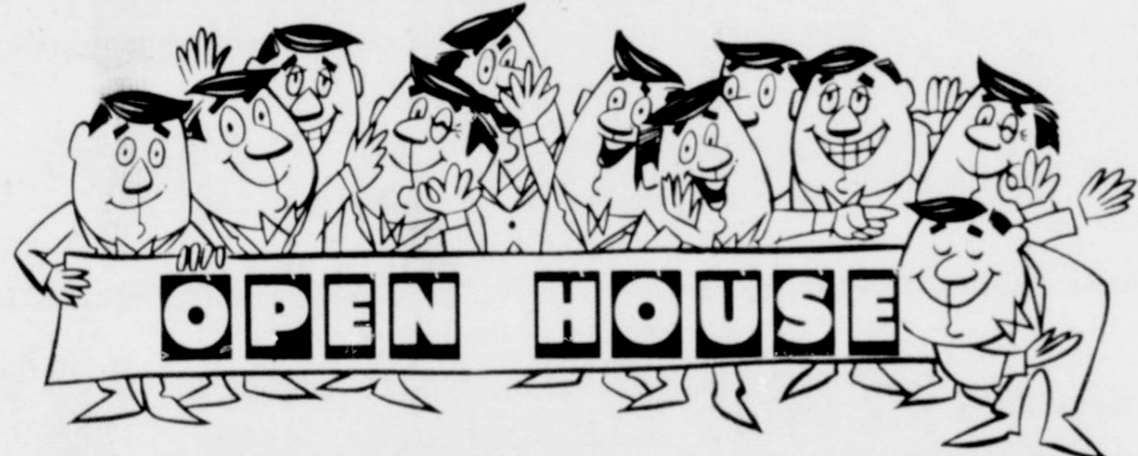
for two points as Friona's lead became 32-0.

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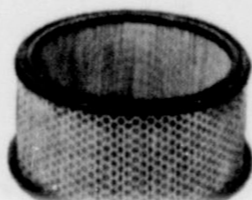

We're happy to see the new overpass opened up, but our happiness would be much increased if we could know that the middle portion of the Highway 214 widening project would have funds when it

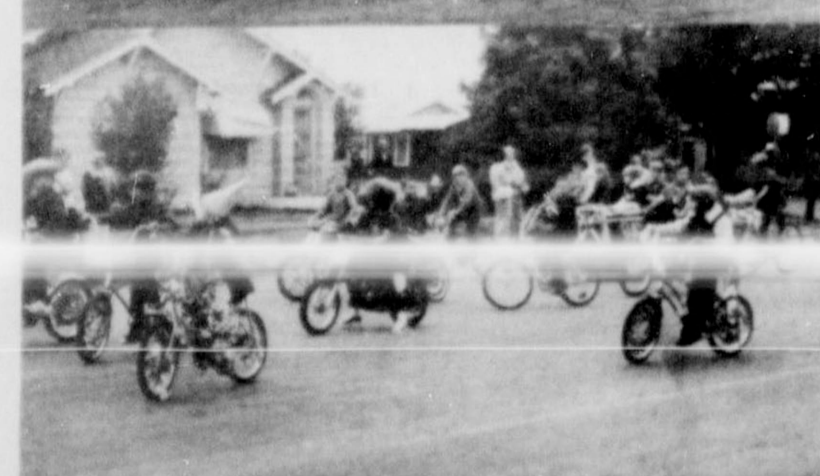
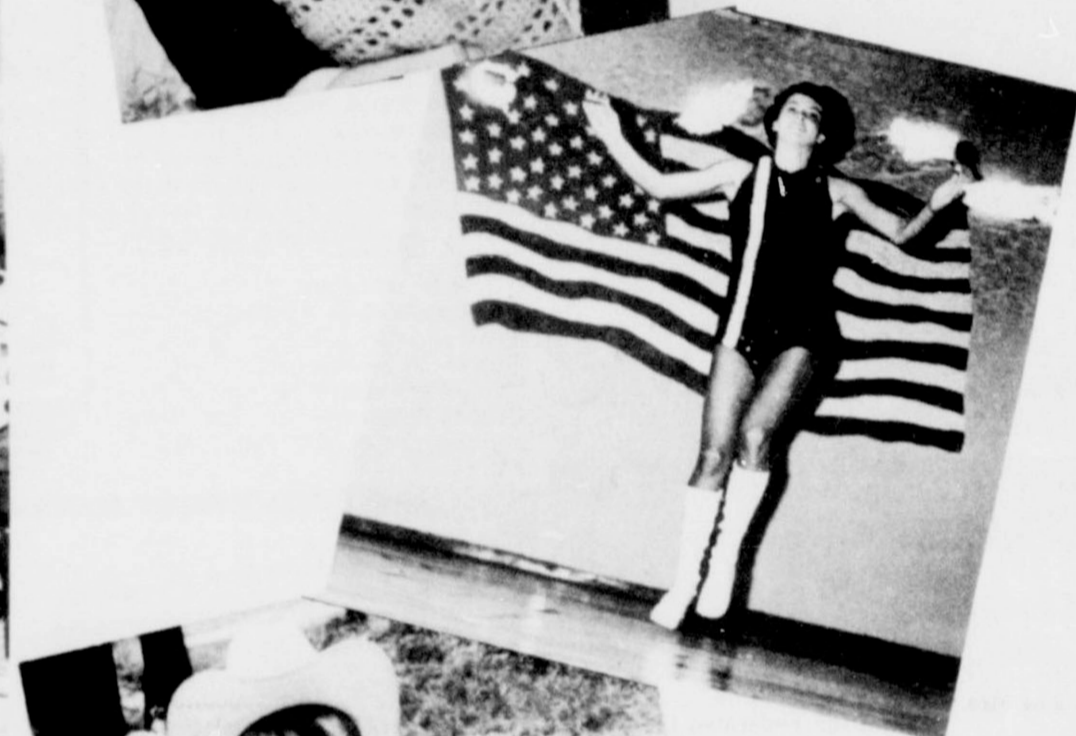
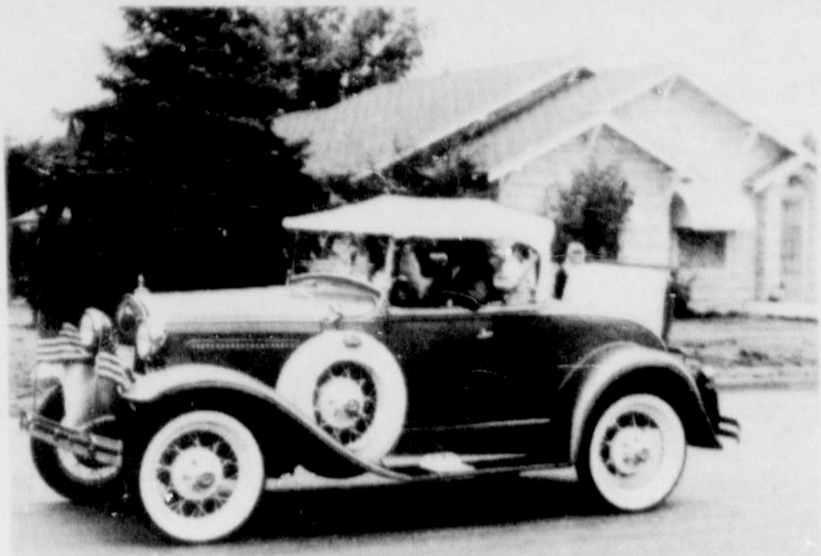
is a shame to get both ends of the road widened, and have the middle part still narrow and inadequate.

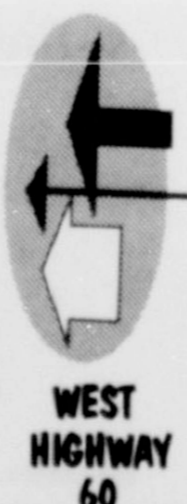

# Chevrolet Unveils Its Most Efficient Models

Chevrolet today unveiled its 1976 passenger cars described as the "most fuel efficient cars in many years."

Robert D. Lund, Chevrolet general manager and General Motors vice president, said the 1976 cars highlighted by the new Chevette, represent a major commitment by the automaker toward meeting the national energy goals.

"With two new engines and lighter vehicles, Chevrolet has committed its resources to meeting our national goals...and has made what we believe is the most important progress in the industry to date...and in record time," he declared.

For 1976, Chevrolet will offer 45 models—one fewer than last year—in nine distinct lines.

Lund said the industry sales leader will show approximately a nine percent sales weighted passenger car improvement in fuel consumption over 1975. The gain comes from the improved efficiency of the division's engines, the introduction of the Chevette, and a new 305 cubic inch V-8 engine for Camaro, Nova, Chevelle and Monte Carlo.

All this improvement comes on top of a 25 percent sales weighted fuel economy gain in 1975, or an average gain of 38 percent over 1974 models.

Reviewing the 1976 lineup for newsmen here, Lund said, "With our optimistic outlook for 1976, we see a major trend for Chevrolet in the near future. The new Chevette is the turning point for our industry in this decade. For the first time in our history, fifty percent of our sales will be small cars—Camaro, Nova, Monza, Vega and Chevette.

"We expect our passenger car volume to recover to a level of 2,295,000 units in the new model year...a 34 percent improvement over 1975. Chevrolet is also hopeful of truck sales in the area of 925,000 units for the 1976 year for a

combined total of 3,220,000 cars and trucks, which would give our dealers their second best model year sales in history."

For the 1975 model year, which ends September 30, Chevrolet dealers will deliver in the area of 1,715,000 passenger cars and about 796,000 trucks.

Lund said Chevrolet is forecasting total industry sales for the '76 model year, including imports, of ten million cars. With projected Chevrolet sales of 2,295,000 units, Chevrolet hopes to increase its share of the total U.S. market from 21.1 percent in 1975 to 22.9 percent in the 1976 model year.

Lund said there were three good reasons which prompted Chevrolet to hold its preview in Washington.

"First...during the past decade, the Congress and administration in Washington have been playing an increasing role in the lives of all of us in the automobile industry...with laws and regulations that affect our business more and more every year.

"Second...the name of the game in our business today is...gasoline! The nation's concern for the conservation and the cost of gasoline is focused here in Washington. We share that concern and have elected this forum to show how we are meeting this issue.

"Third...1976 is the Bicentennial year so we thought it appropriate to introduce our 1976 products here."

Discussing the Chevette, Lund said "we are offering two models of the Chevette, a four passenger hatchback coupe and a two

passenger special purpose model called the 'Scooter.' Our marketing objectives for the Chevette are twofold...to offer our customers a clear alternative to the imports, and to offer as much fuel efficiency in this size vehicle as possible."

The Chevette is the first European design concept built completely in the United States, Lund said. It delivers the best gas mileage of any U.S. built car—rated up to 30 miles per gallon on the EPA city schedule with the optional engine, and up to 40 miles per gallon on the EPA highway schedule with the base engine.

"Our market analysts expect the Chevette will bring at least 225,000 to 230,000 additional units to Chevrolet," Lund said. "Personally, I feel that is too low and that we should sell as many as 270,000 to 275,000 during the first model year."

Chevrolet expects that approximately 65 percent of Chevette sales, or up to 180,000 will be made to prospects who would probably buy a foreign made car if Chevette had not been introduced this year.

"Chevette is the lightest U.S. built car at just under 2,000 pounds and is 17 inches shorter than any other Chevrolet in recent history. It is the first U.S. built metric car, has the shortest turning circle of any U.S. car, and has the most comprehensive piece-by-piece corrosion protection we are aware of," Lund added.

Details on Chevrolet's other eight car lines were released earlier.

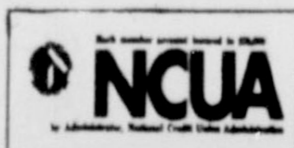

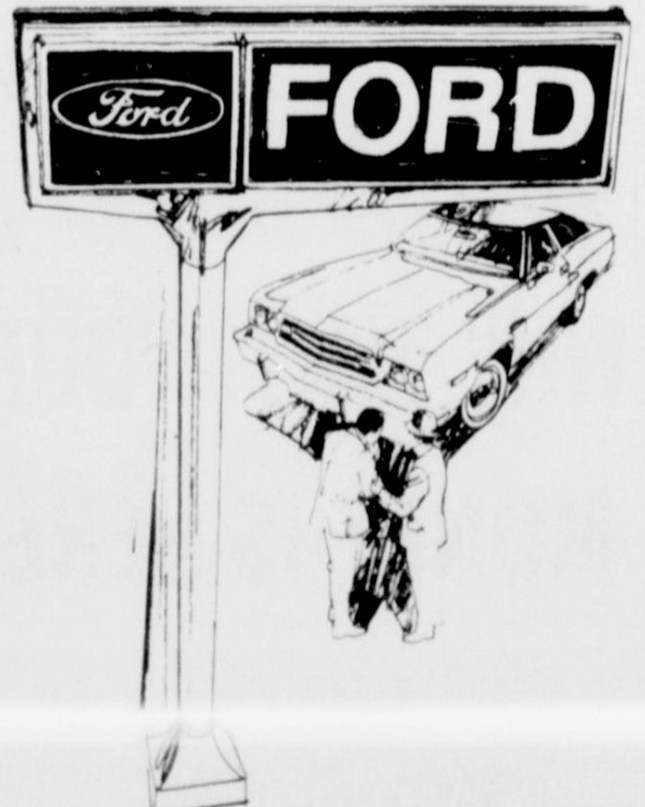

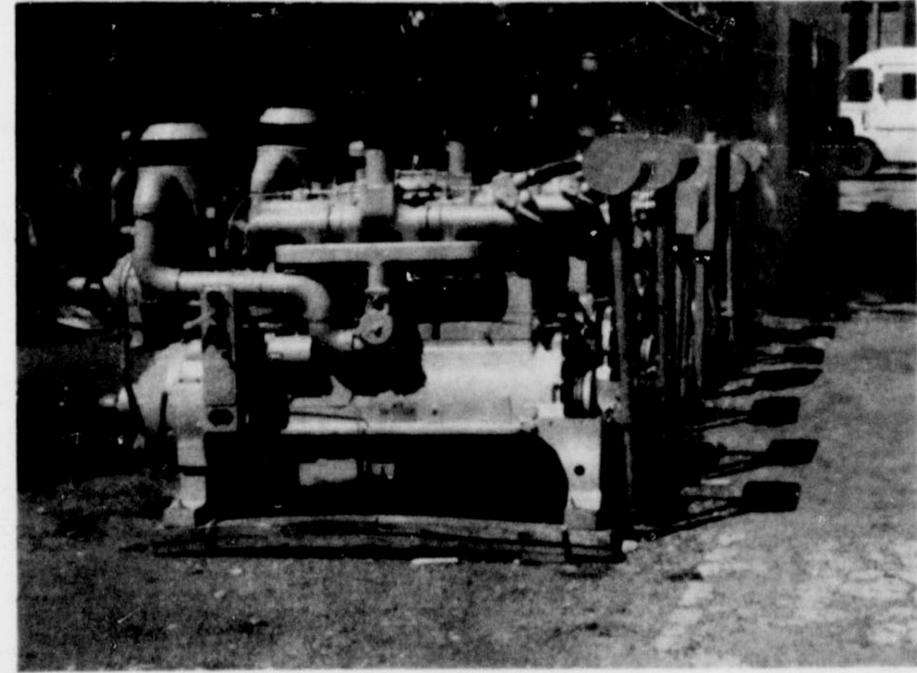

Silly-look wrap knits and interlock knits++ top fabric choices for men's sportshirts this fall.

And patterns will be neat "engineered prints" on dark or dusty backgrounds.

Solid color leisure shirts in heavier weight knits are getting "perfect" forecasts for fall's cooler weather.

The newest fabric for jeans is plain-weave calico. And traditional jeans now come in "pre-washed" fabrics such as faded denim and corduroy or with brushed surfaces.

Frontrunners for the outerwear will be wool with brightly colored blanket plaids and olive green army fatigues or in glazed fake leather looks.

+++INTERLOCK KNITS--one of today's newest fabrics--help create the popular soft men's or feminine lightweight fashions, but they require several precautions for success in sewing, according to an Extension clothing specialist.

Homesewers can find interlock knits in a wide range of solids and brightly colored heat transfer prints, and they often cost less than similar quality traditional double knits, because the knitting method is mechanically fast, efficient and easy.

To identify an interlock knit, look at the cut edge along the width of the fabric. An interlock knit looks the same on both sides, with a back loop opposite each front loop, producing parallel vertical rows of loops.

Most pattern styles suitable for soft, lightweight fabrics are appropriate for

interlock knits, too. But avoid styles with many small pattern pieces such as yokes or insets.

To sew on interlocks, the specialist recommends using the same general techniques that apply to lightweight double knits--with a few additional safeguards.

These are necessary because interlocks will run (like nylon hosiery) along the vertical loops in one direction only.
