Gift Homes For Astronauts Under Study

WASHINGTON (AP)—Government officials said today the National Aeronautics and Space Administration is looking into acceptance of furnished \$24,000 homes by the seven Mercury astronauts. The homes were offered by the Houston Home Builders Association and the astronauts' business adviser announced acceptance.

One government official, asking not to be quoted by name, said the matter is entirely in the hands of NASA, and that the White House has not been consulted or taken any initiative in the case. NASA presumably is inquiring into the propriety and legality of the acceptance of the homes.

The New York Times reported today that the White House had begun an inquiry. The National Aeronautics and Space Administration, a Washington dispatch to the Times added, had earlier given its tacit consent to the astronauts' accepting the houses.

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP)—A ground-air clash of Syrian armed forces was reported today at rebel-held Aleppo and the Damascus junta resumed radio attacks on the mutineers, indicating a deadlock in negotiations to end the pro-Nasser uprising.

The crew of a passenger plane said on arriving here from Aleppo, in northern Syria, that ground troops there fired from the airport on Russian-built MIGs of the Syrian air force.

NEW ORLEANS, La. (AP)—It's almost a foregone conclusion to nearly everyone but Republican Ross Buckley that Mayor Victor H. Schiro, a Democrat, will win a full four-year term in today's general election.

Three Damage Suits Filed

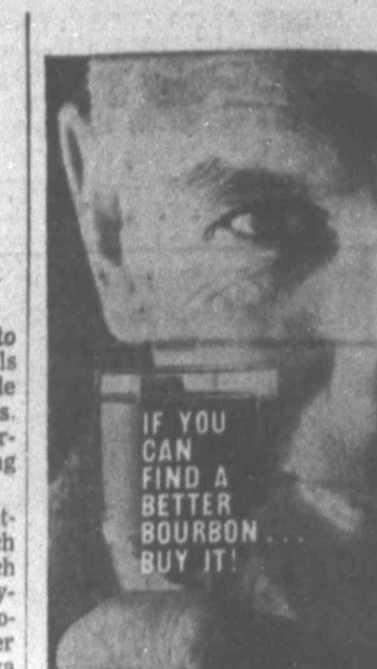

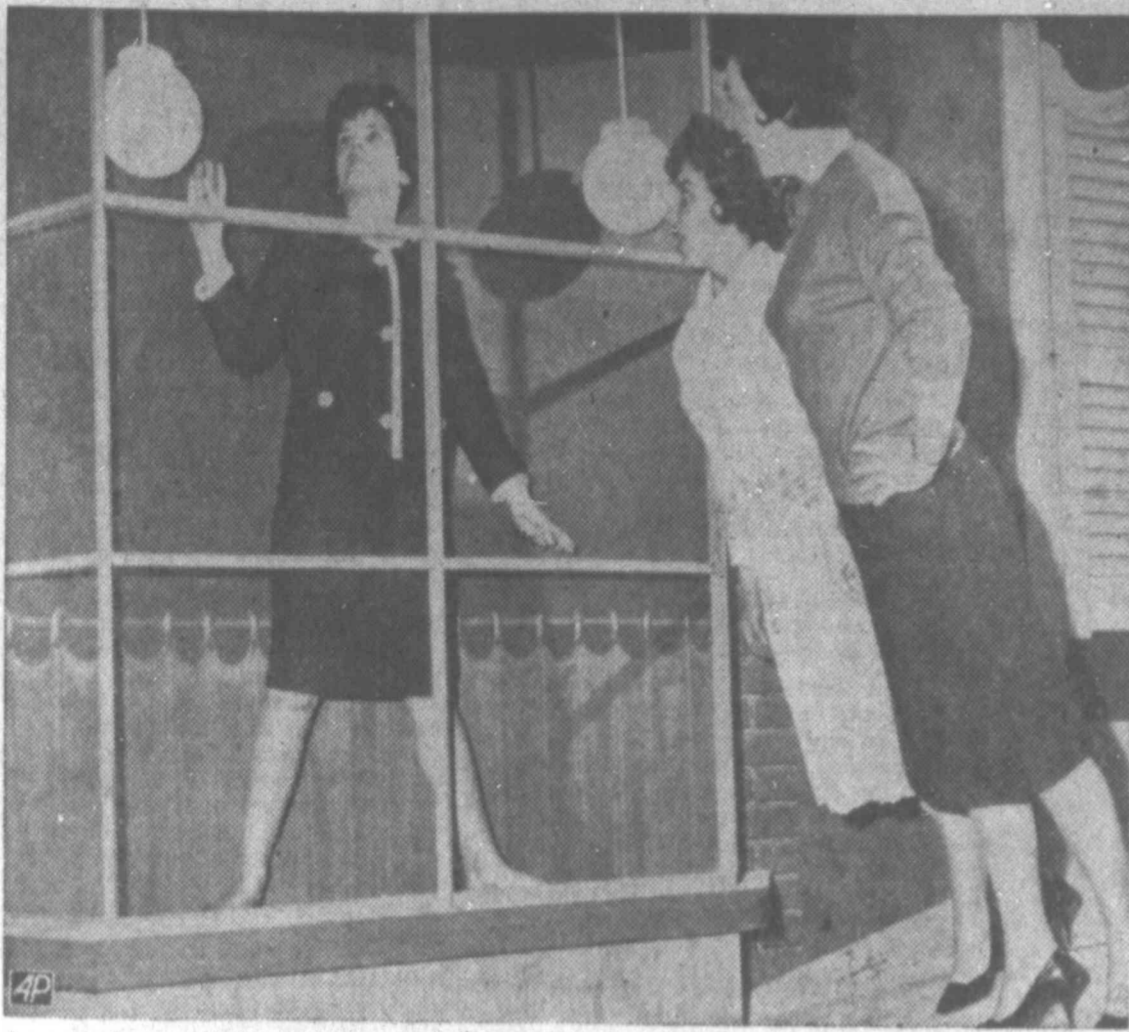

More Tax Probes Due

WASHINGTON (AP)—There probably will be more intensive surveys of small areas by the Internal Revenue Service similar to the one which netted \$50,000 in additional taxes in Fordyce, Ark.

Mortimer Caplin, director of the service, reported more of the surveys probably will be held, but he added that more advance notice and publicity will be given. And, he said, there are no immediate plans for a new one.

The survey, which drew bitter protests from the Fordyce Chamber of Commerce, included checks on 948 persons. Caplin said on a television program that agents found 300 delinquent returns. In many cases, he said, the persons had tax refunds coming.

Caplin said the Treasury Department has estimated taxpayers fail to declare \$24.9 billion in income every year, depriving the federal government of \$4.9 billion in tax revenues. He said he believes much of this is due to ignorance plus the assumption by many persons that interest on savings and investments does not have to be counted as income.

DANGEROUS IDEAS

Another witness said English grammar texts used in sophomore and senior classes at Alamo Heights High School here are planting "dangerous ideas in the minds of students."

Mrs. Roy Adkins said one book constitutes invasion of the principles taught by home and church. She said a young person who does not dance is placed in the light of being an odd ball or a square. Mrs. Adkins also said a grammatical exercise in a senior book asks: "How can a girl refuse to kiss without seeming prudish?"

LESS POLITICAL

President H. S. Brown of the State AFL-CIO also appeared with a long list of suggestions.

Brown said he spoke for 400,000 Texans in advocating disclosure to the press of all complaints about textbooks, less secrecy on the part of the Texas Education Agency, addition of two university professors to the committee, repeal of a law which he said forces school children to use antiquated textbooks, and addition of information about organized labor to current textbooks.

A San Antonio physician, Dr. Karl Aijian, said "too many precious gems of our country's history have been omitted." He said the description of Valley Forge events is "not adequate to inspire students" and "not enough emphasis is placed on our heroes." Other witnesses said they were concerned over the small amount of space given such figures as Thomas Jefferson, Thomas Paine, Benjamin Franklin and George Washington in history books. Elton Cude, commander of the 20th District of the American Legion, said the committee should recommend to the legislature that "local boards have more to say about books to be used in their schools."

FILM ARGUED

The hearing was slowed by disagreements and discussions over participation of witnesses seeking public office and over the showing of a film on alleged lack of patriotism of U.S. troops during the Korean conflict.

The committee denied a motion by Rep. John Alaniz of San Antonio to bar testimony of anyone seeking office, but approved an Alaniz motion to hear only those people who have read books currently in use in Texas schools or up for adoption by the State Board of Education.

Fish Must Be Off Limits

ALEXANDRIA, La. (AP)—A landowner wants a certain fish declared off limits to military personnel.

Clarence Lent, in charge of getting leases on 500,000 acres for coming military maneuvers, said this restriction was attached to a lease agreement received by his office. "There is in Kistachie Bayou, which runs through the northwest corner of my land, a catfish estimated to weigh 30 pounds. The hole in which he stays has got to be placed off-limits to military personnel. When that catfish is caught I expect to be on the other end of the line."

Another landowner stipulated the military must steer clear of a certain spring, which he said has "clear cold water that is especially good for the operation of a still."

Dynamite Plot

MEXICO CITY (AP)—Cuban exiles said today that dynamite has been planted around a political prison on the Isle of Pines and it will be set off if Fidel Castro's regime is overthrown.

False Alert Never Reached Top Stage, Sources Report

WASHINGTON (AP)—The alert touched off last fall by a false signal indicating a possible attack against the United States at the height of the Berlin crisis never reached the point that a danger signal was flashed to President Kennedy, informed sources said today.

Gen. Thomas S. Power, chief of the Strategic Air Command, ordered hundreds of nuclear bombers to be prepared to take off. But it was understood that at the time he did not inform Kennedy, Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara or the Joint Chiefs of Staff.

Nor, said the sources, did he give an alert order to crews of

34 Atlas intercontinental ballistic missiles arrayed in five bases. "It never reached the point where it was necessary to launch the ground alert force," the sources said.

Had it reached that point, they added, Power would have contacted Kennedy as well as his defense superiors.

One Air Force authority said that "if Power was really scared, he'd have called in higher headquarters."

In event of an alarm indicating serious trouble, the SAC commander normally would notify the President and the top command promptly. This would permit consultation on steps that could mean a difference between peace and

war. If necessary, it would allow the nation's key military and civilian leaders to move swiftly to sheltered command posts.

Since the United States can expect only about 15 minutes warning of a missile assault, time is of the essence in preparing for a counterblow and for making decisions on whether to launch one.

In this case, sources said, Power reacted to a suspected difficulty in the communications system linking SAC headquarters near Omaha, Neb., with the two giant radar stations along the Ballistic Missile Early Warning System — BMEWS — in the far north and with Air Defense Command headquarters in Colorado Springs, Colo.

Regardless of whether Power was "really scared" or not, there were indications some Pentagon officials felt he should have informed Washington.

The incident occurred before dawn one day last fall.

Officers on duty in SAC's underground command post were startled by signal lights indicating trouble at the BMEWS station aimed toward the polar cap over which the Soviet Union would be expected to send its missiles in event of a surprise attack.

When officers tried to reach the Air Defense Command in Colorado, they found the lines were dead.

Power then ordered bombers at bases around the world to get set to take off with their hydrogen bomb loads.

SAC headquarters said Sunday the doubt lasted only a matter of seconds, but a Pentagon spokesman insisted it was closer to four minutes, as pictured by published reports.

The spokesman said a SAC plane was in the air over Greenland at the time and reported back to headquarters that the BMEWS station had not been hit. After communications were restored, SAC allowed the bombers to finish moving to the runways. Within 12½ minutes, half of the bombers were in position to take off—about 2½ minutes less than the ground alert target time.

The trouble in the communications system has been straightened out and measures taken to assure that it doesn't happen again.

Young Demos Lower Age Limit

SAN ANTONIO (AP)—Young Democrats of Texas have lowered the age limit for members from 40 to 35.

Delegates left the minimum age for membership at 16. The organization elected Henry Gonzalez Jr., son of the San Antonio congressman, state committeeman and re-elected Mrs. E. B. Duarte state committeewoman.

Miss Paula Weaver, president and Ken Lusk of North Texas University at Denton, vice president.

The convention voted down a resolution to repudiate the candidacy of Edwin Walker for governor, another urging this country to suspend nuclear tests and a third proposing to take away powers of juries to fix sentences.

HOLLYWOOD — The Danes are noted for their large portions and healthy appetites, and every time Osa Massen returns to her native Denmark she puts on weight.
"But I really don't worry about it, because I have a way of losing seven pounds in three days. When they told me I had to start a 'Perry Mason' show a week after I arrived back here, I went on my diet immediately."
"That's almost two pounds a day, and so I wanted to know if Osa felt weak with such an extreme routine."
"I am on it now," she said smiling, sipping a cup of hot tea. "This is my third and last day."
I had to admit she looked the picture of health with clear skin and bright eyes.

"The first day is really the hardest, because you are contrasting it with three normal meals. But I think how much I'll enjoy getting back to my normal weight, and I keep busy so my mind will not dwell on food."
The diet goes like this. For breakfast there are two eggs any way that they can be cooked without butter or oil, half a grapefruit, tea or coffee sweetened with a teaspoonful of honey and a tablespoonful of whole milk, if desired.

"The menu is the same for all three meals," Osa said, "except for lunch and dinner you substitute tomatoes for grapefruit. If you beat water in with your eggs, they go farther, and I can make a very nice dish of scrambled eggs and tomatoes. For extra flavor, grind up a bit of fresh parsley and sprinkle it on top."
"Chopped hard-boiled eggs and diced tomatoes make a tasty salad, and again you can use a bit of parsley for flavor. During the day you are allowed six cups of coffee or tea, and you may proportion these any way you wish."

"I've found that the honey in my tea or coffee leaves a nice taste after a meal. It's an energy booster and seems to quell any feeling of nervousness from the change of diet."
"My husband has tried this diet, and he has the same reaction I do—a little rough going the first day, and after that he finds eggs, tomatoes and honey quite satisfying. But since this diet is not a cure for anything except overweight, it should not be tried unless you are in otherwise good health or have first consulted a doctor."

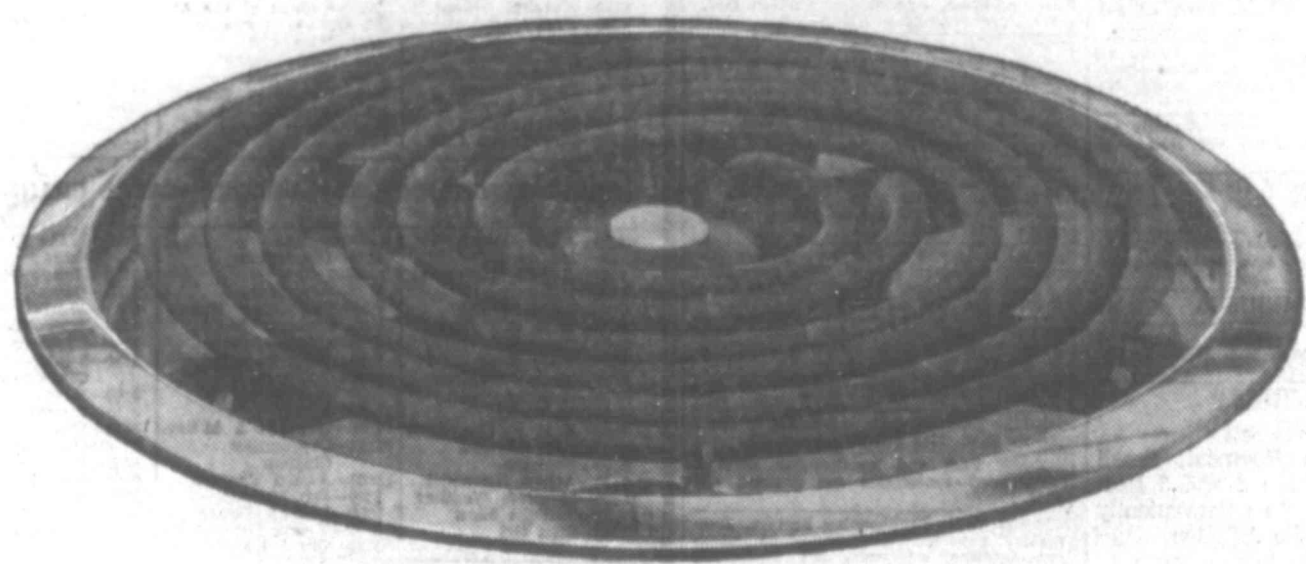

They weren't included as part of regular mail deliveries. Interested persons had to pick them up at the post offices.

Weakness Gets Blame

WASHINGTON (AP)—Senate investigators say a lack of sufficient strength in a Texas Tower inextricably led to its collapse early last year off the New Jersey coast.

Twenty-eight men were killed when the tower crumbled in a raging Atlantic storm.

A report made by Sen. John Stennis, D-Miss., chairman of a watchdog defense investigating group said "none of the principal agencies involved in this tragic episode were entirely free from fault."

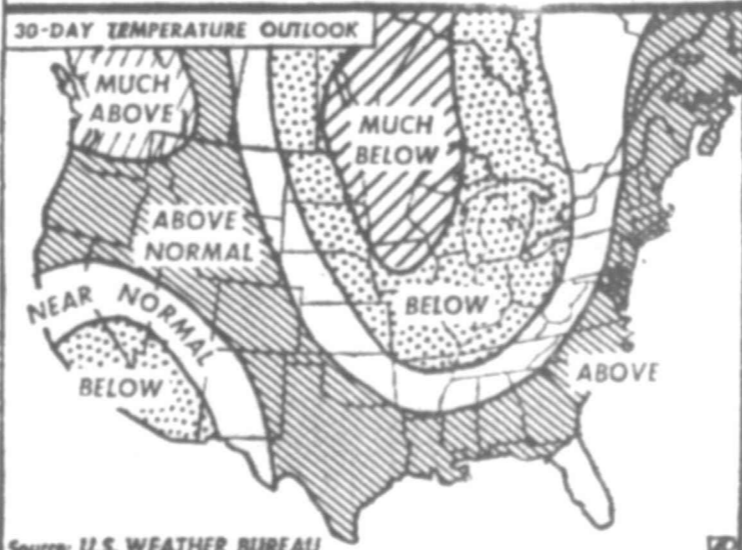
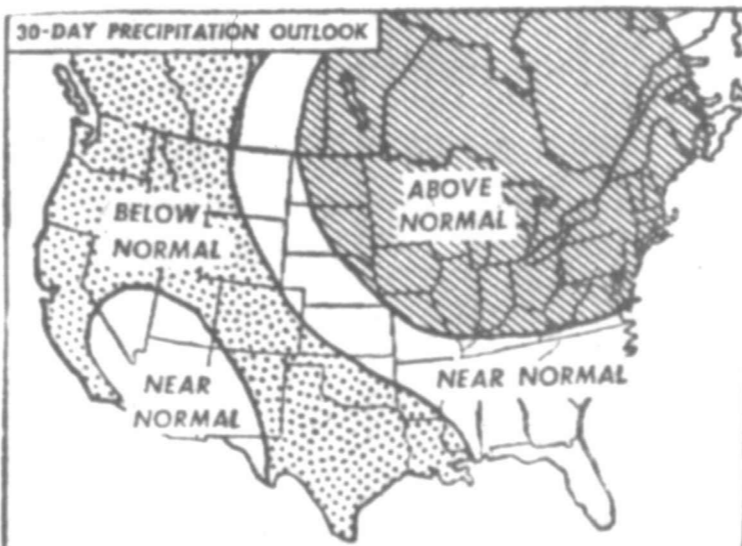
These included the designing engineers, the building contractor, the Navy, which supervised construction and repair, and the Air Force, which used the huge metal tower as part of its radar system.

The heaviest criticism was given the designing engineers, Moran, Proctor, Mueser & Rutledge, of New York, and Theodore M. Kuss, an engineer-inventor employee.

In New York, Kuss and Rutledge declined comment, saying they had not studied the report.

Owens Brings Campaign To Howard Co. Monday

Jesse Owens, Amarillo, brought his campaign for associate justice of the Texas Supreme Court to Howard County Monday.

He was starting a swing through this section with stops booked at Midland, Qdessa, Andrews and other points. He planned a swing on to the South Plains, including Levelland, where a son, Lewis Owens, is Hockley County judge.

This campaign is a repetition of others Owens has staged, he said. "It's a hamburger campaign," he added. "I don't have any money so I have to depend on hand shaking."

Owens served four years as a county judge and a like number as district attorney, three years as assistant attorney general and nine years as district judge before setting up private practice of law at Amarillo.

He recalled how he first got into state politics when he revolted at the Court of Criminal Appeals opinion written by Justice Beauchamp in which a man convicted of murder was freed because the allegation of drowning did not specify the victim was drowned in water.

Rumors Confirmed—Liz And Eddie Will Seek Divorce

NEW YORK (AP)—Rumor has become fact. The three-year marriage of Elizabeth Taylor and Eddie Fisher is broken, and they will obtain a divorce to make the split permanent.

The world got the news through a crisp, businesslike announcement Monday night by Louis Nizer, an attorney famed for handling major divorces of the past, hours after the beautiful Liz had summoned him to Rome.

"Elizabeth and Eddie Fisher announce that they have mutually agreed to part," the announcement said. "Divorce proceedings will be instituted soon."

The announcement brought crashing down a mountain of suspense built up in recent weeks by Miss Taylor's interest in her "Cleopatra" costar Richard Burton, and Fisher's desperation in denying that a break was imminent.

Now there remain other suspenseful questions: Will Burton, 36, become the 30-year-old actress' fifth husband? What of his wife, Sybil, and their two chil-

dren, now sitting in seclusion in London?

There were reports that Mrs. Burton would fight any divorce action by her husband, and that she had pleaded with him through mutual intimates to give up Elizabeth.

Burton, British actor who as Marc Antony makes love to Miss Taylor in her film role of Cleopatra, has been openly escorting her in public during filming of the epic of the Nile. Several mornings ago they were seen holding hands and kissing in a Rome night club.

Monday night, they attended a small, private cocktail party. Burton later spent two hours in Miss Taylor's luxury villa on Via Pignatelli.

Fisher, 33, appeared resigned to the breakup as he left for a Broadway show shortly before Nizer read the long-anticipated announcement, approved in advance by both parties.

He was grinning broadly when photographers took his picture hugging actress Shelley Winters backstage following a perform-

ance of Tennessee Williams' "The Night of the Iguana."

The boyish-looking singer said he would be in New York only a short time before going to Hollywood.

"I've got to see my kids," he said. "They gotta see me." Fisher's reference was to his daughter and son by his marriage to actress Debbie Reynolds, a marriage that ended in 1959 after Eddie became enamored with the widowed Liz.

Debbie, now married to shoe magnate Harry Karl, had no comment on the divorce announcement.

Liz and Eddie were married 14 months after Miss Taylor's third husband, producer Mike Todd, died in a New Mexico plane crash. She was to have gone with Todd on the flight, but was ill at the time.

Fisher had been best man at the Todd-Taylor wedding. When Mike was killed, he rushed to Liz' side in what he described as a gesture of friendship.



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
