

West Texas Feels Its Oats

Political observers have been so preoccupied with conjecture over distribution of conservative, moderate, liberal votes, and over possible combinations of these along with Republican and Democratic division in November, that they have missed one of the significant developments in the recent Democratic primaries.

This is the power that West Texas can and is bound to exert in state politics. For a long time, West Texas has been a sort of step - child, or a Johnny - come. lately at best, in state governmental affairs. The redistricting in 1953 for the

1960 census afforded this area a greaer degree of justice. But it remained for the primaries to demonstrate what the area can do. Consider this: Both the Democratic nominees for lieutenant governor (Preston Smith)

1950 census and again this year for the

and attorney general (Waggoner Carr) are from Lubbock. Both are accounted moderate to conservative in their political thinking, which fits fairly well into the area pattern. Carr likely would have won handily without solid regional support, but it was the great West Texas vote that swept him into office, and which enabled Smith to stage an upset in winning his nomination. The governatorial nominee (John Connally), whose Fort Worth residence could qualify him as a West Texan, also garnered a substantial West Texas

Moreover, the chairman of the state Democratic executive committee, Ed Connally, is from Abilene.

Even the GOP is in on the act, for its governor nominee, Jack Cox, is from Breckenridge. Hence, this region is beginning to asset itself politically.

Marquis Childs Personnel Problems Of Diplomacy

WASHINGTON - The conduct of diplomacy by the free-wheeling government of a democracy of divided powers presents a chief executive with grim and seemingly irreconcilable contradictions. He is the captain, in theory, of a boat in which every separate oarsman reserves the right to pull in his own separate di-

NOTHING COULD illustrate this more strikingly than the adoption by the Senate of an amendment (later somewhat tempered) denying any aid to Communist or Marxist - dominated countries. If this were allowed to stand the President would have no latitude in dealing with the intricacies of the Communist bloc and the divisions existing within that bloc.

But even in day-to-day details of diplomacy - the selection of ambassadors and how they conduct their embassies - rival oarsmen are apt to try to set the boat off on another course. These rivalries are particularly awkward at a time when revolutionary changes are occurring in every department of life and the diplomacy of the past seems more often than not pitifully inadequate to the fierce demands of the

BY A PROVISION of the law granting a special 12 per cent retirement bonus to foreign service officers announcing their departure by a July 1 deadline the Department of State is losing the services of 212 officers, including 107 in the four highest grades and 17 with the rank of minister or ambassador. This in itself is a small revolution with both advantages and disadvantages in the Kennedy Administration's effort to reshape and sharpen the tools of diplomacy for the difficult tasks of the 'sixties and after.

SOME OF THE retirees are so completely in the stereotype of the past-the diplomacy of high tea and striped pantsthat they are considered in the category of dead wood. Others would still have a useful contribution to make if it were not for the exigencies of the retirement provisions and the attraction of an extra \$1,680 to make an annuity of \$15,680 for retiring career ambassadors. And the State Department wants the Senate Foreign Relations Committee to put through an exemption which would permit 10 Class 1 officers to stay on and still get

the bonus. As he is often reminded, President Kennedy said in the campaign that he meant to get the very best men to serve in each important post. Yet he has had many of the same difficulties that his predecessors had in staffing top jobs.

RECENTLY THE news leaked out that he was appointing his close friend, William Battle, 41 years old, to be Ambassador to Australia. Battle served with Kennedy during the war in the Pacific and he managed his campaign in 1960 in Vir-

The opposition press in Australia criticized the appointment on the score that Battle was an amateur from a segregationist state, But the President told the Australian ambassador, Sir Howard Beale, that he was sending one of his closest friends whom he regarded most highly. The Australian government is said to be happy about the choice. Beale is a former Cabinet minister who would himself rank as an amateur diplomat.

AS PAST experience has proved, distinguished non-career men often make able and effective ambassadors in situations in which a career man would be inadequate, This has been true in India where a succession of non-career diplomats have distinguished themselves in a sensitive assignment.

The other side of this coin is the faithful fat cat who has served the party well and opened his checkbook generously. He is rewarded with an ambassadorial post for which he has no visible qualification and in which, more often than not, he is not especially happy. The Administration is sending Matthew McCloskey, of Philadelphia, long treasurer of the Democratic party, to Ireland, a reward in the past for the seserving and a friendly and undemanding post.

THE PRESIDENT made his good friend, General James Gavin, ambassador to France although Gavin had no diplomatic or political experience. Gavin's critics say he has identified himself so closely with President De Gaulle that he has become almost the principal advocate of the French claim to American nuclear knowhow and nuclear weapons.

The current rating is 68 career to 28 non-career ambassadors, with four vacancies. Of the 28 four are businessmen, which has been the commonest category for the political ambassador, and the others are from teaching, the law, journalism and other professions. This ratio-68 to 28 is about par for the past decade. In only two recent periods was the career percentage higher and these came with an impending change of administration when the fat cat would have no motive to take a post for a short time.

THE REALLY tough search now on is for a successor to Llewellyn Thompson who has served for four and a half years as ambassador to Moscow. That is a long stretch in a hardship post and Thompson wants out. The successor should speak Russian fluently so he can talk with Premier Khrushchev in his own language. And he must meet a number of other exacting requirements. It is a melancholy commentary on the field, career and non - career, that no candidate seems immediately evident. 

The Threshing Season

I saw a big combine trundling down the highway and it reminded me how things have changed since I was a kid in high

About this season each spring, soon as school closed down, we used to hit the road looking for jobs in the wheat harvest.

Combines may have been in use then but not in our part of the country. The wheat was still cut by binder, threshed by a thresher and carted away to the grain elevators in wagons. Such operations required small armies of workers.

IF A KID was lucky, he might line up with some outfit and follow the harvest right on north. By the end of the summer he would have enough money in his pocket to get him through another year at school.

Sometimes fellows who stayed with such crews terminated their summer's work in Canada, Others contented themselves with local outfits. Their travels were not so extensive as their comrades but, they also had no expense getting back home, once the season had ended.

PAY FOR THE WORK varied, of

course, from season to season depending

on the economic situation. In my part of the country, we usually got about \$5 a day plus room and board. Room, that is, if we were working on a wheat farm shocking grain. If we were

with a thresher, the room usually consisted of a couple of blankets, which we spread out beside a wheat shock in If you were lucky you signed up with an outfit which believed that hands were human beings. Such outfits fed well, and

that toiling with heavy grain shocks un-

der a burning summer sun was rough If you were real lucky and hit an old-

fashioned German community, you were in for a treat.

I WORKED ONE summer in such a community. We started off the day around 5 a.m. with a breakfast which would com-

pare with an average banquet. At 10:30 a.m. the women on the farm would come out to the thresher loaded down with baskets and pitchers. The boss would signal to the machinery to shut down. We'd gather around in the shade of the machine and the women would spread out a light repast-fried chicken. potatoes, ham, boiled eggs, green beans, coffee, tea, cake, pie and other light items. We'd go back to work and, at noon, knock off again for another feast.

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In midafternoon, out would come the women again with a "tea" for us hard working hands. At dark (when it got too late to see the shocks) we'd call it a day and after the teams had been taken care of tramp off to eat our fifth big meal of the day.

SOMETIMES, THOUGH, things weren't

I hit one such place one season. The food would have caused a revolt in a county jail; the boss didn't like for anyone to sleep later than 3:30 a.m. and he didn't call time for dinner until the workers began to grumble so loud he had to stop. Half an hour, he felt, was time enough to eat (and it was, too, with the horrible slop he served us) and we went back to work. We quit when it was dark -so dark we had to feed the stock by lantern. The supper we had was the worst

meal of the day. That was the only time in my life when I organized a revolt. I personally promoted a strike and happily led the walk-out that followed. And I looked back in delight at the thresher and its idle wagons in the middle of a four section wheat

About Those White House Parties

WASHINGTON-Julie Harris is often called the best young American actress on or off Broadway. But here she is being called a variety of other things by the women reporters who cover social activities at the White House.

It is said that Miss Harris blew the whistle on this competent and formidable group of newswomen, thereby creating the most awesome skirmish to date on the New Frontier, including taxes, Medicare and Billie Sol Estes.

AFTER A DINNER and reception at which she was a White House guest, the actress is alleged to have complained that the women reporters monopolized (interviewed) her to such an extent that she did not get to shake the hand of Vice-President Lyndon Johnson or that of other celebrities on the scene.

There followed the most famous secret meeting at the White House since the formation of the Manhattan Project-and one that has caused a good bit more fallout. Washington's powerful society editors and a handful of other women reporters were asked, at this conclave, to remember that they were guests, NOT reporters, at White House social func-

IN A CAPITAL where social ambitions often far outrace political aspirations and where the Lippmanns, Alsops, Restons and Fleesons are not so assiduously courted as are the society editors, that was a stunning ukase. This reminden from the First Lady's staff, which consists of Letitia Baldrige, her social secretary, and Pamela Turnure, her press secretary, remained secret and classified, as was intended by the White House, only long enough for the ladies of the press to disperse.

"THERE HAVE BEEN more garbled accounts of what went on at the meeting than will ever be corrected," said one

of the newswomen present-an old friend with whom I occasionally covered social events at the White House in the Roosevelt Administration

"In the first place, we have not been muzzled or handicapped. It is not true, as reported, that we were told to stand behind pillars or to put up our notebooks or pencils," she continued. "If we had not been foolishly pledged to secrecy about the meeting, and hence unable to write what actually happened, none of these silly and untrue stories would

"THE WHITE HOUSE had a legitimate point and a reasonable request when it asked us not to turn a party into a mass press conference, and that is what had been happening in the past. It is a temptation to do that when the White House is filled with guests such as the Nobel laureates or Andre Malraux.

"I think it was reasonable to ask us, under ordinary circumstances, not to use the parties as a springboard for news stories or the creation of such stories. We were told that if a party, by chance, fell on the evening of a day that produced a steel crisis or a Cuban fiasco, the new rules were off and we were expected to act like newspaperwomen.

"THE REQUEST that amused us the most, and about which we kept a straight face until we left the White House, was that we not monopolize the President, and thus permit him a chance to visit with other guests?

"The truth is that the President is apt to talk more to the reporters, to monopolize us and keep us from other toothsome personages, than vice versa, Most of us have known him since he was a young Senator and he seems to enjoy yakking with us. We don't surround him; he surrounds us!" (Copyright, 1982, United Feature Syndicate, Inc.)

What About American Mettle?

WASHINGTON - CAll it a sesquicentennial of sorts. It was 150 years ago that "warhawks" in Congress (somewhat like certain Senators today) were driving the milksop Madison Administration toward a fight for the freedom of the seas. Although disastrous in many ways, the War of 1812 did force Britain and France to quit picking on our young republic. The war created in Clay, Calhoun, Jackson and others the leadership of the half century to follow.

WATCHING SUCH Senators as Goldwater whose new book is called "Why Not Victory?" Dodd who constantly urges that we lean on the enemy, Thurmond who calls Mr. Kennedy's excessive caution a "No Win" policy, any historyminded observer is bound to see a similarity with the situation of a century and

NOT THAT the modern Warhawks are demanding war. They are only demanding that we dismiss our fear of war. They are not against peace, but against peaceat-any-price. Goldwater has lampooned the Democratic tip-toe tactics by charging that our old maxims have been revised, to wit: "Forget the Alamo!" "Don't give up the ship - we've only begun to negotiate!" and so on. Not actually warmongers, these Senators, like their 1812 counterparts, are striving to arouse the Administration to carry the fight to an enemy which blocks what could be called the modern equivalent of freedom of the seasthat is, freedom of movement in the realm of ideas - and, of course, an enemy which threatens our national interests in many ways.

THESE SENATORS, and all who support them, are right in what they are doing. Soviet theoreticians admit that there can never be any coexistence or live-andlet-live in the rival ideologies of Communism and the West. Their side can nevtoward absolutism and aetheism. By try's best friends. their nature, the Communists are enemies

with whom reconciliation is unthinkable. In their forthcoming book called "The New Frontier of War," William Kintner and Joseph Kornfeder have a chapter on Communist vulnerabilities. It should be required reading among the pacifist bloc of the Kennedy Administration. Here are some vital weaknesses at which an aggressive American policy should be direct-

1. MARXIST AND Leninist literature. revolutionary in nature, is subtly preparing the Russian people to revolt against their dictatorship.

2. Imperialism, denounced daily by Communist leaders, is practiced by the Communist system on a grand scale, and inhumanity within Communist countries is untempered by a working system of law and justice.

3. As Khrushchev ages, and when he dies, the scramble for succession will put the Soviet system in jeopardy.

4. A SOVIET leader who involved his people in a shooting war would risk both popular revolt and military mutiny.

BUT SOFT TALK to the Communists, and the coddling of our fear of war, should be of grave concern to all who love this country. What is this fearfulness doing to our American mettle? What is it doing to our Allies and the neutralist nations where it is common knowledge that if the U.S.A doesn't stand up to World Communism, nobody else will do so? An influential newspaper in Zurich, Switzerland, recently ran a long editorial deploring American flirtation with appeasement. The last paragraph reads (translated from the German):

"The Cold War has not yet found its Master of Strategy. In his inaugural speech, President Kennedy made the impression that he was this strategist. Per-

The U.S. Treasury will close its fiscal books June 30 with a deficit. And if new spending proposed to pep up the economy, and tax cuts envisioned for next year, take final form the chances for deficit financing in the next fiscal year are strong.

Many fear this will fire up another round of inflation. To the ordinary citizen this means that the cost of living goes up because the market place value of the dollar goes down.

Others, including many of the President's close advisers, insist that the deficit spending will so pep up the economy that in following years there will be Treasury surpluses, strengthening the dollar in the long run.

The idea is only part of the administration's feeling that the government can't stand aside when the growth of the U.S. economy is at stake.
