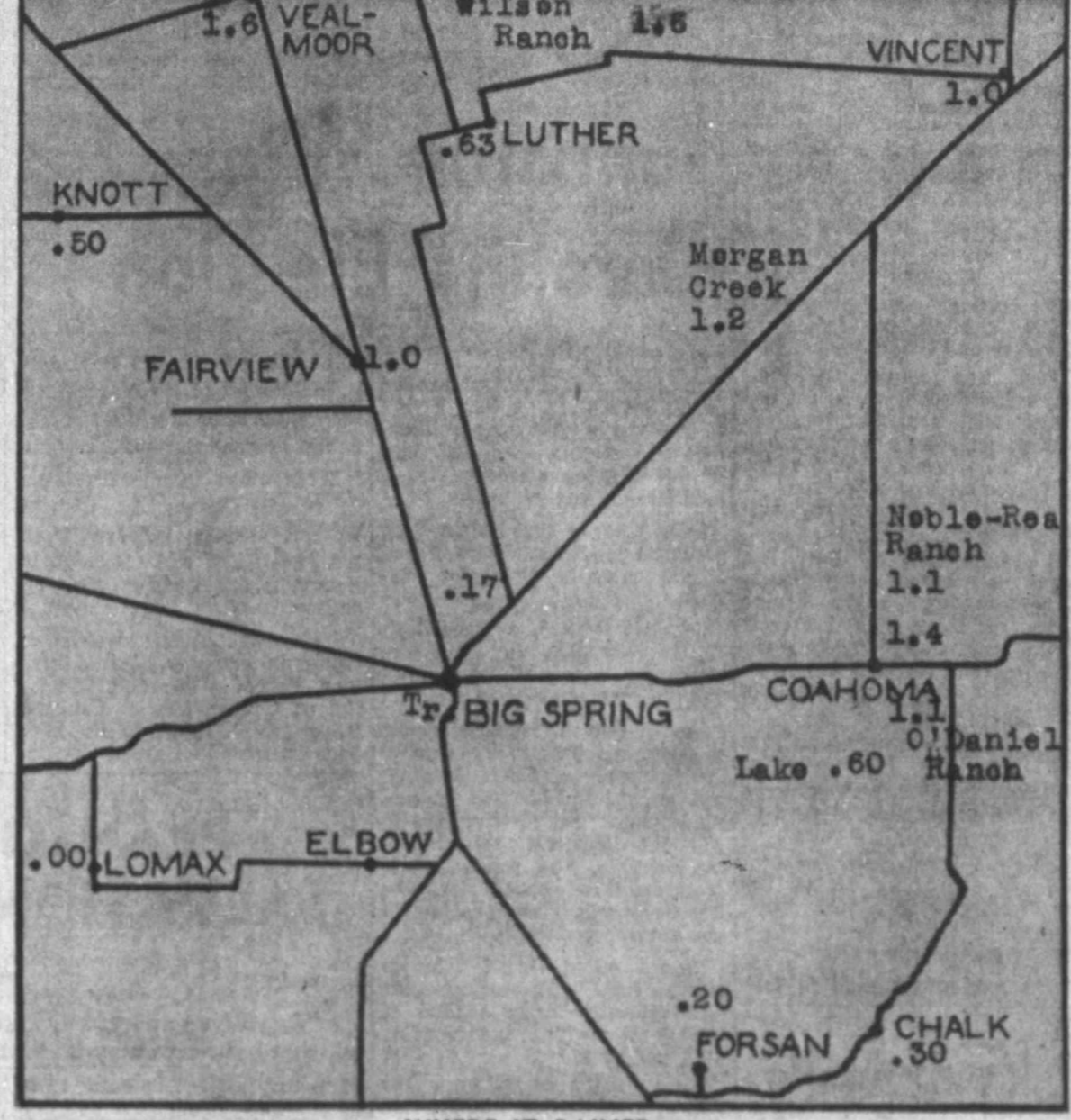

Soldiers Downed In Beer Bout

By EDDY GILMORE LONDON (AP)—The world's oldest military regiment has been defeated in a beer-drinking contest by the Young Men's Christian Association. And the YMCA team included a girl.

The humiliating defeat took place Monday at the Old Southwork Fair, staged for charity in Shakespeare's part of London.

In the semifinals of what was advertised as the world's beer-drinking championship, members of the Honorable Artillery crossed tankards with a team from the Central YMCA.

Teams of three—drinking a pint each in relays—faced one another to decide the championship. The YMCA team included a girl named Sue Flynn, the wife of the Y's team captain, Michael Flynn.

The Y team downed their pints in 15 seconds, four seconds faster than the soldiers. This put them in the finals and the Honorable Artillery in a sudsy doghouse. In the finals, the YMCA team was defeated by a rugby football

team called the Newts. But the Newts won on a technicality.

After both teams had finished twice in a dead heat, one of the Newts pointed to a wet spot on the shirt front of a YMCA drinker named Tiger Martin.

The referee exonerated Martin of deliberate spillage, but he awarded the championship to the Newts when he spotted a few drops of beer in the bottom of Martin's glass.

The Honorable Artillery bases its claim to being the world's oldest regiment on its charter granted by Henry VIII on Aug. 25, 1537. The wording of the charter implies that it existed as a fighting outfit long before. Artillery in those days meant archers.

Among its many offshoots is the Ancient and Honorable Artillery of Boston, Mass.

Judge Seeks To Halt Inquiry

HOUSTON (AP)—Judge Clem McClelland has asked for an injunction to block a court of inquiry into the handling of estates in his probate court.

The judge charged in a six-page petition that the "so-called court of inquiry" would violate his constitutional rights.

Dist. Judge Wilmer B. Hunt set a hearing on a temporary injunction for 2 p.m. today. The court of inquiry is to begin at 10 a.m. tomorrow.

The inquiry was requested last week by Dist. Atty. Frank Briscoe who told Justice of the Peace W. C. Ragan who called the court, that he had "good cause to believe that offenses have been committed against the laws of this state."

Last night, County Clerk R. E. (Bob) Turrentine said probate court records of an entire estate are missing from the probate records room of the Civil Courts Building.



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Case Settled For \$3,750

J. C. Morren was awarded \$3,750 in a judgment against Travelers' Insurance Co. filed in the 118th District Court. The compensation suit was filed by Morren following an injury he allegedly received while employed with the West Texas Sand and Gravel Company Oct. 1, 1959.

Morren was seeking \$14,035 compensation, plus interest. On March 15 a jury awarded Morren \$35 a week for 30 weeks and \$6.32 a week for 300 weeks. A motion for new trial was filed March 26. The case was settled May 23 out of court for \$3,750 and by agreement the motion for a new trial was granted so the case could be brought before the court for rendering the judgment.

In the case of Bill Henkel, doing business as Permian Basin Distributing Co. vs. E. L. Flippen, doing business as Lillie's Drive In, Henkel was awarded \$2,669.89 plus six per cent interest from Jan. 1, 1962 and \$600 attorney's fee.

The case of Bobby Dove vs. TAT Supply, Inc. was dismissed. It involved damages in a collision which occurred Nov. 19, 1959 near Bossier City, La. between Dove and a motor vehicle owned by TAT and driven by Grady Sudberry.

Tornadoes Skip Over Wide Areas

To nobody's surprise, tornadoes skipped over widely separated Texas areas Tuesday night and bristling thunderstorms held on into the morning.

It was the 10th straight day of threatening weather somewhere in the state.

The only twister damage reported was close to the manned flight center the National Aeronautics and Space Administration is building outside Houston, and it was minor. Whirling half a mile on the ground, this tornado upset two cars and felled 11 utility poles.

Wind estimated by a fishing camp operator at 75 miles per hour tore the cabin off a small boat tied up near the NASA laboratory. Hard rains fell north of Houston.

Funnel clouds which stayed in the air appeared over Farmers Branch at the edge of Dallas, near Keith's Lake between Port Arthur and Sabine Pass, and close to Hobart, just across the Oklahoma line from the Texas Panhandle.

A near cloudburst drenched

part of Sherman in North Texas with an estimated 3 to 4 inches of rain.

Thunderstorm activity as usual was widespread. At one time Weather Bureau radar tracked thunderstorms in an area embracing Wichita Falls, Denton, Fort Worth and Tyler.

Near daylight a few thunderstorms rumbled across the South Plains in West Texas and in the southeast edge of North Central Texas.

Youth Withdraws Assault Charge Against Murphy

LOS ANGELES (AP)—A teenager is withdrawing his assault complaint against actor Audie Murphy, 37, America's most decorated hero of World War II.

Edward L. Mayer, 18, whom Murphy admitted striking, refused to sign a complaint Tuesday.

Murphy told police that Mayer and another youth were sitting in their parked car when he questioned them about lewd phone calls and literature which had been annoying a woman friend.

The actor said they became abusive, so he gave Mayer a "little punch in the face" when Mayer slapped at Murphy's flashlight.

Truman Leery Of Short Week

KANSAS CITY (AP)—Harry S. Truman has expressed some doubt of the value of a four-day, 30-hour work week.

He did not flatly oppose such a proposal pending before the Office Employees International Union, however.

The former president addressed 300 delegates to a five-day convention of the union Tuesday.

On the four-day week resolution proposed by Howard A. Coughlin of New York, union president, Truman commented: "I don't think you get enough time to work."

"I work 14 to 15 hours a day and I believe the more a man works the better. The more work a man does, the less likely he is to get into devilment."

U. S. To Snoop Red Atom Tests

WASHINGTON (AP)—With Russia expected to resume atmospheric nuclear testing soon, American experts reportedly are preparing to do a little snooping of their own.

The Russians have four instrument ships posted around Christmas and Johnston Islands in the Pacific to gather information about the American test series which began April 25 and now has reached about the midway point. There is every reason to believe the Russians have collected considerable data in the weeks their ships have been there.

Although neither of the great nuclear powers says anything publicly about its own snooping operations, each has kept close check on what the other has been doing in nuclear test blasts over the years of the atomic weapons race.

AT ANY TIME

The new Soviet series could come at any time in view of Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev's recent declaration that the American experiments have "forced us to renew our tests."

The Russians normally test in remote regions or deep in the heart of the Soviet Union.

This makes it more difficult to get a reasonably close look, but there is clear evidence this has not hampered the United States in obtaining solid scientific information about Soviet test results.

On the basis of this knowledge, President Kennedy was able to tell the nation last March that the Soviet series in late 1961 "reflected a highly sophisticated technology," that many of those tests were aimed at improving Soviet defenses against missiles, and that one Russian device was exploded more than 100 miles aloft. The Russian tests last fall, it is known, were conducted above un-

inhabited Novaya Zemlya, a crescent-shaped island on the edge of the Arctic.

CAN USE SUBS

So far as is known, the United States does not have the kind of instrument ships being used by the Soviets to spy on U.S. tests in the Pacific.

But it is believed U.S. nuclear submarines—which have proved their ability to operate in the Arctic even in winter—may have had a grandstand seat for the last Russian tests.

The most modern American subs carry advanced radar gear and supersensitive underwater listening equipment.

This radar can spot cloud formations—and that could include atomic and hydrogen mushroom clouds—from as much as 200 miles away.

Sound-detecting devices can pick up shock waves, of the sort a nuclear blast might send through water.

A watching sub might mark the precise time of a nuclear explosion—a factor important in later analysis of the airborne debris drifting across the world.

TIME LAG

Certain elements thrown off in a nuclear blast decay over varying periods of time. In studying air samples, scientists compute the time lag between the blasts and the pickup of the samples. This helps account for missing elements or the degree of decay of elements found present.

The U.S. technique of using high-flying aircraft to capture samples from Soviet explosions dates back about 13 years, to a time when the Russians held their first atomic tests. The United States follows this same technique in studying its own test results.

Much of the air sampling in the

wake of Russian tests is done in the Alaskan areas, which lie in the path of the radioactive debris moving with prevailing winds.

American aircraft fly into these air masses, then open nose ports which trap atomic particles flowing inside. These particles are brought back to laboratories and are subjected to microscopic, chemical and spectrochemical analysis.

All this tells American scientists what materials went into the bomb, warhead or device and how efficient it was.

The 18th nuclear device of the current U.S. Pacific series was detonated Tuesday following an aerial drop near Christmas Island. The Atomic Energy Commission and the Defense Department said it was in the intermediate-range, meaning it had an explosive force of between 20,000 and 1 million tons of TNT.

A vivid description of two nuclear blasts in the U.S. series has come from Charles Ernst, of Lancaster, Pa., who is employed at the Christmas Island base.

DESCRIPTION

In a letter published in the Lancaster New Era, he said of one shot:

"What looked like a half grape fruit in brilliant orange and green appeared... for a split second we were hot from the heat... shock rippled and danced from the center of light... the sound shocks began to hit like cannon next to your ear. The ground vibrated and heaved."

Telling of a second shot, he wrote that a myriad of colors appeared in the mushroom cloud and "There were reds, blues, greens and purples, and the top... of the mushroom... turned a gorgeous pink like the unfolding of a huge rose, turning a darker and darker red until it was a living, breathing thing of matchless beauty."

He added, "All of us stood silent. There was nothing to say, but all of us were silently praying that this thing of power and beauty would not be used for anything but peace."

Joe Leach, program and physical director, is urging more sign ups for tennis and golf classes which began Monday. Tennis instructions, which are given by Jerry Caddell, are scheduled for Wednesday mornings at 7:30, but if enough people register, the class will be broken into several sessions. The Y plans a city-wide meet for later in the summer and hopes to have junior high and high school students participating in it as well as adults.

John Berry is instructor for golf classes which are set for Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 1 to 3 p.m. Monday and Friday are youth days and Wednesday is devoted to adult instruction. A tournament at the municipal golf course will be held during the summer.

Persons interested in registering for these or other classes may do so at the YMCA.

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Singer Eddie Fisher leaves today for London—his first visit to Europe since the breakup in Rome of his marriage to Elizabeth Taylor.

A spokesman said Fisher would discuss business with Frank Sinatra in London but would not visit any other city. Miss Taylor is now filming "Cleopatra" in Rome.

Later this summer Fisher is to open at the Cal-Neva Lodge at Lake Tahoe, Nev. He will appear July 24 at the Desert Inn in Las Vegas. Sinatra is an owner of the Lake Tahoe resort.

The six weeks of engagements in Nevada will permit Fisher to file for divorce there against Miss Taylor.

Miss Taylor then is expected to counterfile against Fisher's suit and win the divorce decree.

Fisher recently has been dating dancer Julie Prowse, who once was engaged to Sinatra.

Space Capsule Test Successful

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP)—A full-

scale model of the Mercury space capsule used by America's astronauts was successfully parachuted into Trinity Bay here Tuesday.

National Aeronautics and Space Administration named space

craft center crews directed the operation, designed to improve the parachute system of the capsule.

Spokesmen said a model of the improved Mercury capsule will be dropped in about 20 days and the

remodeled capsule itself will be tested in about a month.

The new capsule will use retro rockets instead of a parachute to lessen the impact.

SCIENCE AT WORK

Bird and bee navigation secrets, balloons for scientists, and a space jaywalker are topics in science news:

Birds And Bees

Humans have made great progress in developing guidance systems for space vehicles, but "it will take 100 years for electronics to catch up with the sophisticated guidance and sensory systems of the birds and the bees," says John L. Burns, former president of Radio Corporation of America.

"Evidence now at hand suggests that in flight the bat finds his way by bouncing ultrasonic waves off solid objects; the pigeon homes on the magnetic lines of the earth; a bird flies thousands of miles from the tree branch in your backyard, and returns to the same branch, through stellar navigation."

"The eye and brain of the hungry frog filter out all discordant information except the movement of the fly his palate craves—a superb example of image recognition and interpretation.

"If we could only translate this characteristic into a mathematical formula—and then into hardware—we could endow an earth satellite with a similarly adaptable 'eye' that would select the precise information it was sent aloft to obtain."

Floating Lab

Scientists are getting their own special balloon flight station, to be set up this summer at Palestine, Texas.

From this base, they can re-

lease balloons lofting up instruments for high altitude study of the atmosphere and weather phenomena, for astronomical studies above the clouding effects of the earth's air, and for capturing primary cosmic rays.

Long planned, the balloon facility will be built and operated by the National Center for Atmospheric Research at Boulder, Colo. with the tab paid by the National Science Foundation. It is part of the Center's scientific balloon program, designed to spur improvement in balloon technology for scientific research.

Space Jaywalker

Hermes is the name of one of the sun's minor planets, a chunk of rock about a mile in diameter, weighing perhaps three billion tons.

Unlike other minor planets that follow orderly paths between Mars and Jupiter, Hermes has an eccentric orbit, and can actually come within about 200,000 miles of the earth, closer than the moon itself, and a near miss, cosmically speaking.

But the chance that it or similar bodies would ever collide with the earth with devastating effects is infinitesimally small, says John W. Macevey in Space Digest magazine.

Perhaps, he suggests, men in space ships one day might be able to rendezvous with one of the minor planets possessing a wide-ranging orbit, equip it with transmitters, and let it send back data on the reaches of space it visits.

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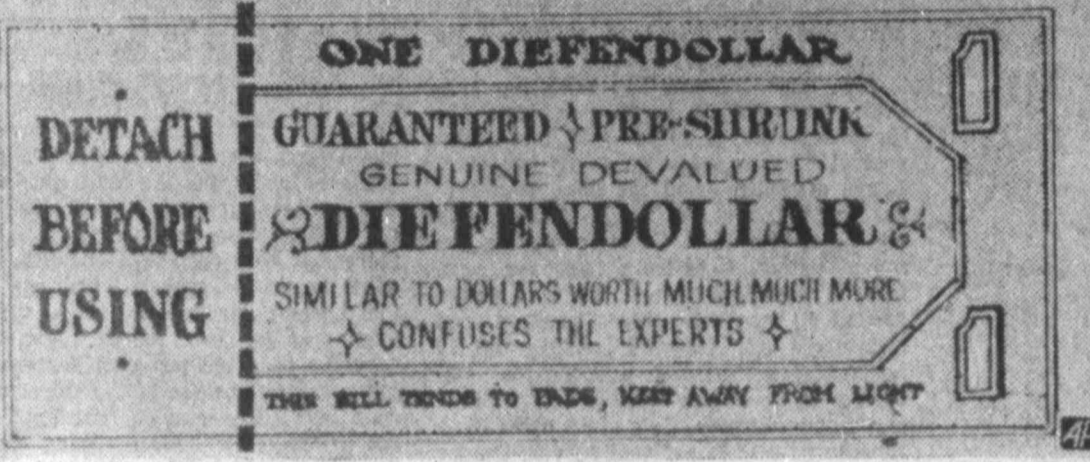

For Want Of A Cotter Pin--95 Lives Lost?

WASHINGTON (AP)—A mechanic's oversight, a tiny cotter pin and a bolt less than an inch long could have been the ingredients of disaster in the New York crash of a jet airliner, the Federal Aviation Agency says.

Ninety-five people were killed when the American Airlines Boeing 707 plunged into Jamaica Bay on March 1, seconds after taking off from Idlewild Airport.

The FAA said the bolt, part of a complex rudder mechanism, may have slipped out of place when a nut securing it fell off for lack of the little cotter pin.

The agency wired airlines and other organizations that fly 707 jets Tuesday, warning them of the potential danger spot. One such warning went to the Military Air Transport Service, which operates the Boeing jets used by President Kennedy and other government leaders.

George C. Prill, director of the FAA flight standards service, said the New York crash "could have been the result of an installation mistake by one man on one aircraft."

"We do not see this as a possible explanation for any other 707 crash about which we have any information," he said. "But it would not be the first time that an airplane crashed because a

mechanic left a cotter pin out of a bolt.

"You cannot say this is it—we can never prove it happened even though it could have happened."

Prill said the civil aeronautics board still is investigating the New York crash and will make the final decision on the probable cause.

In his wire to 10 U.S. airlines, eight foreign lines and other operators of nearly 400 of the big jets, Prill said investigations indicate the plane may have gone into a left roll, induced by malfunction of the rudder boost system.

Prill said information on the speed and altitude of the flight re-

But he said the wreckage that might prove it—the rudder boost assembly itself—apparently is at the bottom of Jamaica Bay.

Independence Day Changed

MANILA, Philippines (AP)—The Philippines celebrated independence on a new date Tuesday, commemorating a declaration made by revolutionaries in 1898 rather than the granting of independence by the United States in 1946.

"We have at last placed in its true and glorious perspective, for this generation and all the generations to come, the heritage of freedom of the Filipino people," said President Diosdado Macapagal in a special message.

The happiest of all the 27 million Filipinos was Gen. Emilio Aguinaldo, 93, who proclaimed independence from Spain 64 years ago only to surrender to American forces three years later. He had long campaigned for recognition of June 12 as Independence Day.

Oil Executive Dies Of Bullet Wound

NEW YORK (AP)—Taylor S. Gay, 890,000-a-year oil company executive, has died of a bullet wound inflicted by the strict and protective brother of his spinster secretary whom he had been dating.

"This was no love affair," moaned the secretary, Mary Mullooly, 42, who has walked with a limp since childhood. "The most I ever did was kiss him on occasion."

"Our relationship was only a

platonic friendship," she said when word came that Gay, 55, had died Tuesday at Beekman-Downtown Hospital 20 hours after he was shot.

Gay's wife, Berta, 45, from whom he had been legally separated for five years, said just before he died: "They tell me that there's not very much to hope but I'm praying for him. As for his relationship with Miss Mullooly, there is no relationship."

"Taylor Gay isn't that kind of man. He's always been a very chivalrous man. So he took a girl out to dinner—is that so terrible?"

Miss Mullooly's brother James—41 years old, 6 feet 4 and 260 pounds—has been quoted by police as saying: "The man needed killing. I took it upon myself. I'm a religious man. I didn't like the idea of a married man going around with my sister."

Miss Mullooly told newsmen about her life with her father who was a strict disciplinarian and with her brother who took over after the father died.

Gay, a vice president of the Phillips Petroleum Co. and head of its New York operations, was on the operating table at the hospital for five hours but doctors were unable to remove the .25-caliber bullet from his stomach. He was given 43 pints of blood.

His wife and their daughter, Georgette, 19, who live in Manhasset on Long Island, were at the hospital when he died.

Peace Corps Plan Outlined

The Peace Corps has accepted an invitation from the Government of Brazil to send 163 volunteers to assist the Sao Francisco Valley Commission in the development of the 2,000-mile-long river valley. This program will affect 5 1/2 million people who live in the valley.

Volunteers will be assigned to agricultural extension work, rural community development, rural electrification, irrigation, health education, sanitation and social work.

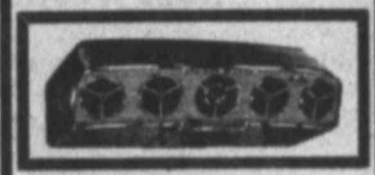
Training of persons selected will begin about July 30 and will include instruction in the language and culture of Brazil. Prior knowledge of Portuguese, although helpful, is not required.

Volunteers must be American citizens at least 18 years old. The basic educational requirement is high school. — More formal training or experience is required for some positions. Married couples are eligible if both husband and wife qualify and they have no dependents under 18.

Volunteers receive an allowance for food, clothing, housing, medical care, transportation and incidentals, plus a termination payment of \$1,800, based on \$75 for each month of service.

Applications may be obtained from local post offices, county agents, Peace Corps Liaison officers at colleges and universities, or from the Peace Corps, Washington 25, D. C.

Cotton told officers he fired four shots in an attempt to defend himself from another man, Amos Sims, former husband of his wife.

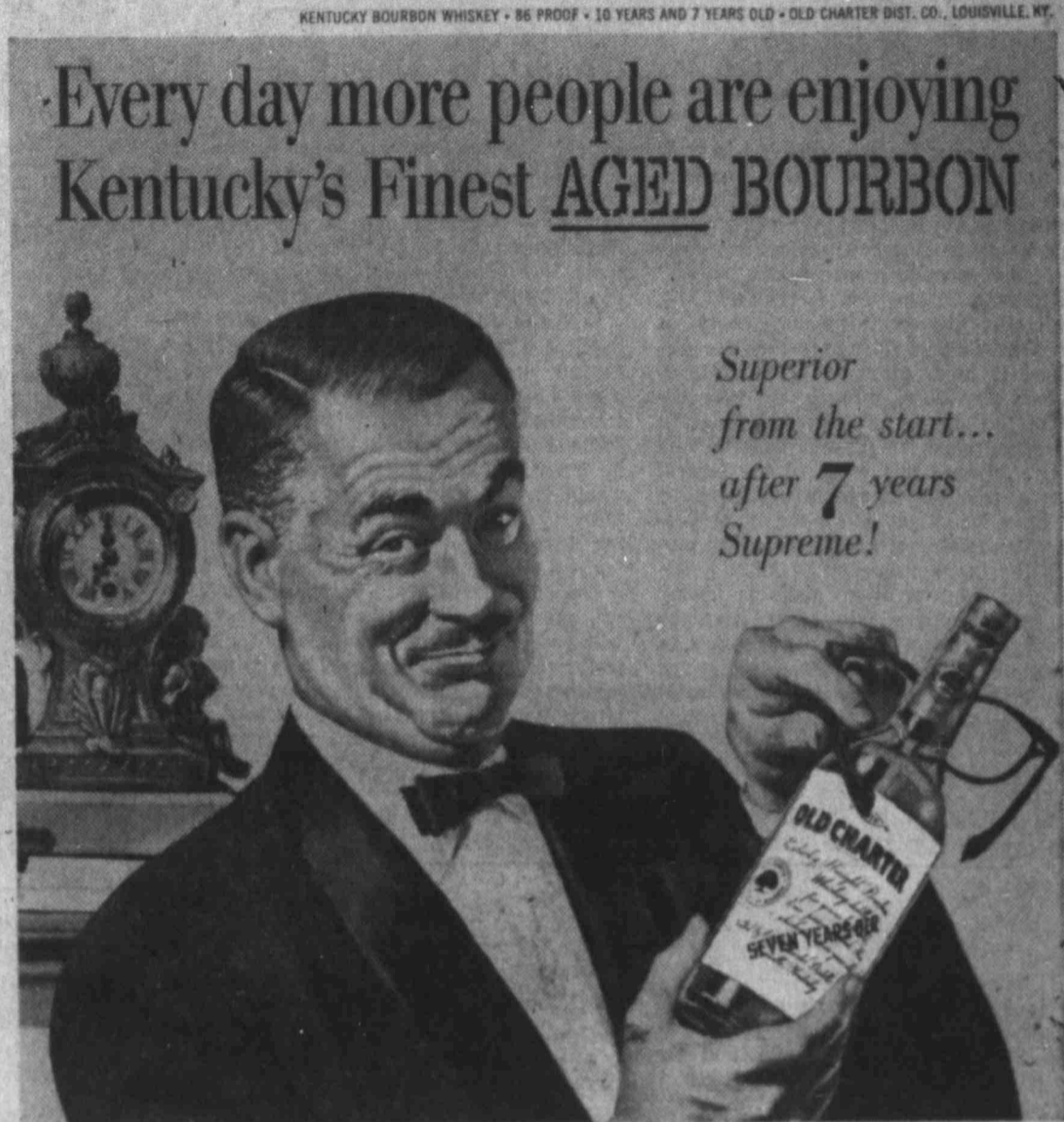
Pleads Innocent On Morals Charge

The act prohibits transportation in interstate commerce of females for immoral purposes.

Rice did not set a trial date, but Dunn cannot be tried before July 2 when the district court begins its criminal docket. Dunn is free on bond pending the trial.

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Horse Racing Still In Air?

A surprising number of Texas voters did not take a stand on the horse race gambling issue in the May 5 primary elections. More than one-fourth of all those voting in both Democratic and Republican primaries did not cast a vote for or against the parimutuel racing referendum.

Statewide in the Democratic primary, both Propositions 1 and 2 failed to carry by margins of more than 100,000 votes. The totals, by latest available figures, looked this way:

Proposition 1 For: 491,440
 Against: 601,837

Proposition 2 For: 447,716
 Against: 581,539

Proposition 1 concerned a constitutional amendment to authorize parimutuel betting while Proposition 2 called for state legislation to legalize parimutuel betting.

“DIDN'T VOTE”

Since there were at least 1,445,772 votes cast for governor it is obvious that at least 942,405 voters didn't see or chose to ignore the matter of parimutuel racing.

The business leaders and racing enthusiasts who supported the racing issues feel now that they have lost a battle but not a war. They are particularly encouraged at the third of a million people who don't appear to have been aware of racing being on the ballot. At least those folks may very well not be against it. If they had been "anti" votes, most likely they would have voted so.

Arthur Seeligson, Jr., San Antonio businessman who helped push the racing issue to success in his part of the state, felt that inadequate "campaigning time" worked against the pro-racing forces.

"We were too little with too late, to start from scratch as we did," Seeligson said. "Yet we carried 11 of the state's 32 senatorial areas. And nearly 460,000

people didn't vote on it (racing) at all."

LOCATION

He attributed this in part to the location of the two racing propositions on various voting machines. On some they were positioned in the upper corners of machines and on others at the bottom.

"It's easy to confuse people with something like this," Seeligson said, "and there are always many who don't take the trouble to read such things completely."

The narrow margin of the vote—combined with the conviction that Texans want and need major league horse racing—is prompting the pro-racing group to establish a permanent headquarters.

"It will either be in Dallas or Austin or Houston, most likely," he said, "and we're planning another meeting in July."

Obviously irked by the campaign tactics of the religious groups opposing parimutuel wagering, Seeligson said that "the economic lies that were put out can easily be dispersed."

COMMUNITY COSTS

By "economic lie" he said he was referring to the charge made by some groups that racing would cost a community more in terms of policing than the sport would attract, in dollars and cents.

The southern part of Texas, by and large, went for the racing referendum more widely than the northern or eastern portions. Seeligson said that both San Antonio and Corpus Christi carried the measures roughly 5 to 3, as did most of the Rio Grande Valley counties.

Some West Texas counties—such as the El Paso area, adjacent to New Mexico's Sunland Park track—also approved it.

The state's largest county, Harris, saw the vote split oddly. Proposition 1, considered a constitutional amendment on racing, failed in Harris County by 446 votes out of 123,884 cast. Yet Proposition 2, concerning the approval of racing by the Legislature, passed by 198 votes out of 117,726 cast.

As in other counties, many voters in Harris didn't take a stand on racing. While 154,937 voted for governor, 31,453 voters did not vote on Proposition 1 and 37,211 failed to vote on number 2.

THE DIFFERENCE

Houston auto dealer Lester Goodson, one of the leading figures in the pro-racing faction, felt those votes were the ones that would have made the difference.

"If everybody had voted, the issues would have carried," he said.

Goodson also expressed the view that whatever else the racing vote may have accomplished, it proved once and for all that a substantial number of Texans—at least 1,000,000—want horse racing, and will eventually get it.

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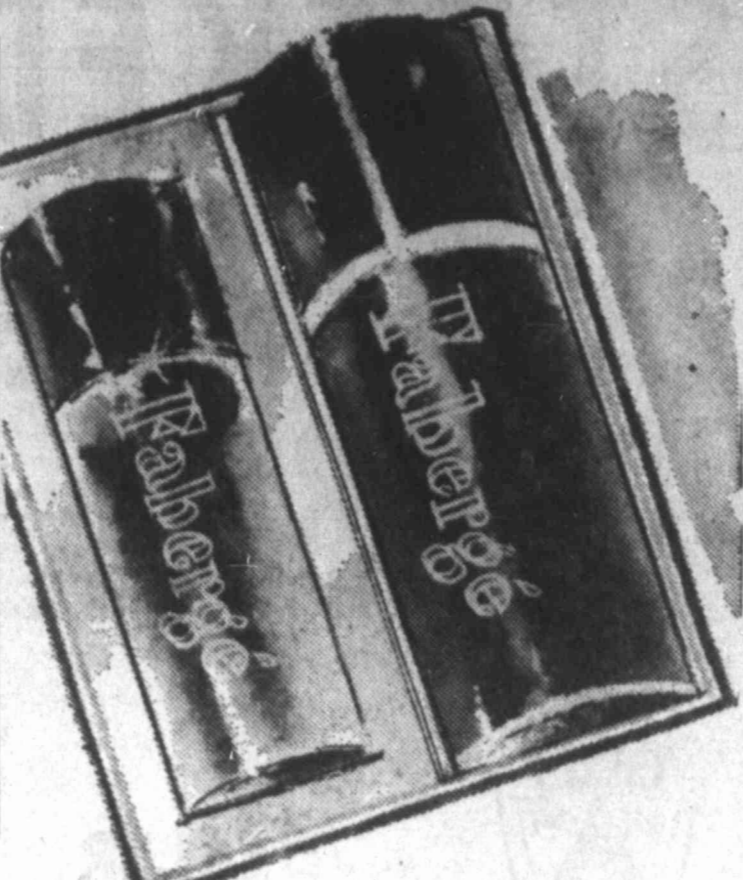

Shrine For Relic Of First Nuclear Blast

SOCORRO, N.M. (AP)—A 70-ton metal cylinder (called Jumbo) lies half buried by desert sand near the site of the world's first atomic explosion today but soon will be the featured attraction in this city's planned atomic park.

cover the active material if the device was a dud. Jumbo was the answer.

Then, as now, a nuclear explosion was triggered by conventional explosives. The charge planned for that first one was several thousand pounds.

R. W. Carlson was assigned to design a vessel that could contain the force of that much conventional explosive and prevent the bomb's plutonium from being scattered across the desert in a misfire.

Carlson came up with the bottle-like Jumbo. It measured 25 feet long and 12 feet in diameter, with walls of steel 15 inches thick.

A scientist who was there, Dr. Marvin H. Wilkening, now head of the physics and geophysics department at New Mexico Institute of Mining and Technology, said that, after Jumbo was built and delivered, it was decided there was a better than 50-50 chance of producing an explosion. Jumbo was out of a starring role but still in the picture.

Just to see what an atomic blast would do to it, Jumbo was hung inside an open steel tower 800 yards from ground zero.

The tower was crumpled by the explosion, but Jumbo suffered no damage.

Jumbo's misadventures didn't end with the world's first A-blast July 16, 1945. In April 1946, in an experiment intended to eliminate Jumbo from the scene, eight 500-pound demolition charges were detonated inside Jumbo.

But the explosives were incorrectly placed and only Jumbo's two ends were blown off. In 1947, without ceremony, a trench was bulldozed and Jumbo was buried. In 1951 it was disinterred for other experiments but found unsuitable and again abandoned, this time for nine years.

Last summer the Socorro Chamber of Commerce asked for Jumbo for use as a tourist attraction. It lies just outside the fence that circles ground zero and has become a point of interest for visitors.

The range gave it to the city on the condition that the city pay for the moving—a job roughly estimated to cost \$2,000. Once in Socorro, Jumbo will be placed on a concrete pad at an additional cost of a few hundred dollars.

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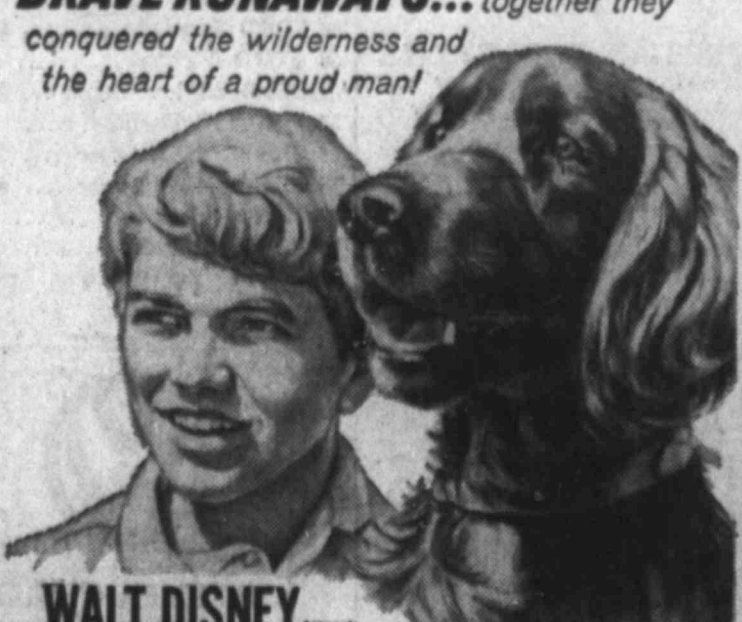
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
