1960. The Senate finance committee described it as a program of federal assistance providing, through the cooperation of the states, an expanded program of medical care for persons aged 65 and over. . . Under this proposal the federal share of existing old age assistance plans will be substantially increased to encourage states to strengthen their medical program for these people or to initiate new programs. In addition, federal money will be made available on a generous matching formula, to assist the states in aiding those aged persons, many of them otherwise self-sufficient, who need help only in meeting the costs of medical

It has been argued that only recipients of old age assistance are eligible under the Kerr-Mills Act, but this is not so. Besides providing increased funds for those

The fight over the medicare bill is aptly on old age assistance, the act makes it possible for states to set up programs covering an estimated 10 million more in the 65-year and over bracket. It is flexible enough to be extended beyond that, for each would set standards of eligibility and the range of care.

In Texas, \$8.68 per month has been paid to Blue Cross for medical coverage for 220,000 on old age assistance. In turn, some 4.5 million dollars has been paid in treatment and hospitalization. By constitutional amendment, the coverage could he extended. This would mean the state would pay one-fourth of the estimated 36 million dollar annual cost of coverage by Blue Cross or some similar agency for the additional 350,000 Texans over 65.

One of the arguments for putting medical aid under Social Security is that it will avoid "humiliation" of asking for aid under some other program. There is nothing humiliating about medical and hospitalization coverage by Blue Cross or some similar service. Moreover, as we have said before, Social Security already is overloaded, and another log, let alone a straw, could break or bow the camel's

#### Crux Of The Matter

It is inevitable that such a julcy and notorious affair as the rise and fall of the Billie Sol Estes empire would find its way into politics. Indeed, some of it had its roots in politics, and in that it is not distinguished from hundreds of other en-

The investigations, and the investigators, however, at times seem more interested in jockeying for partisan position than in pursuit of the truth. There seems to be a contest to see who can "leak" the most facets of the inquiry for the sake of a new lead.

This side circus, if sustained by an

insatiatable yen for headlines, could in the end dull if not defeat the purpose of the probes. Ultimately, the public could weary of the whole spectacle.

The issues are simple: Was there wrong doing, where, how and by whom? Can responsibility be fixed and faced. What lessons are to be learned? What can and should be done to minimize the possibility of a recurrence of such a bizarre and costly episode? These are questions more important than when the situation spawned, flourished and floundered.

### Tax Reduction And Politics

WASHINGTON - Small wonder that many businessmen fear that a severe crisis in our economic life may come in the next several months. The administration evidently is determined that "spending as usual" by government for all manner of projects must go on, and that "wage increases as usual" likewise must force in the economy is being prevented from operating under the rules of sound economics. Business management is still threatened with reprisals from the government if it tries to raise its prices to cover increasing wage costs and also to earn a fair profit. A free economy cannot operate very long that way.

THE PROMISE by the President of a tax cut is likely to aggravate rather than remedy the situation. Already the demagogues in Congress are articulate. They say they oppose any reduction in the higher brackets and wish to confine all the benefits to the lower-income groups; It's the same old story hereabouts-politics supersedes economics all around, Similarly, there is already an antagonism in Congress among the Democrats to any reduction in the corporate tax rates, which now are at a 52 per cent level.

MR. KENNEDY promises a tax cut "across-the-board" effective next January. The bill, however, may not be passed until March or April of 1963, or even later. It will take Congress that long to debate the highly complicated tax measure which will be forthcoming. For the law isn't to be devoted just to rate changes. The gimmick now is to close "loopholes" and thus theoretically to increase tax revenues to offset the socalled relief to be given by the drop of a few percentage points in the rates in all income brackets. Already some of the senators on the Democratic side have pointed out that a drop of one percentage point in the upper brackets involves tens of thousands of dollars for an individual, while a drop of a point to a man of low income means only a few dollars in savings. Hence, it is argued that the whole saving should be given to the people in the lower brackets.

WHAT IS WRONG with this theory, of course, is that the individuals to whom the nation looks for funds to finance industry's expansion aren't getting enough money now after taxes to help the freeenterprise system expand as it should,

Nor will they be getting it under the proposed tax changes if the demagogues have their way. Companies, moreover, which would like to earn enough surplus each year to save up for rainy days-and for brighter days when there is need for funds for expansion of plant and equipment-aren't able to do so today because of the narrow profit margin. The proposed change in the tax rate will not help them much, if at all.

What has been lost sight of is that a private-enterprise system cannot function effectively very long if the government interferes with its operation. President Kennedy has damaged severely the normal processes of the American enterprise system and shows no sign of withdrawing his threat to interfere with price-making, while refraining from any action that would keep down wage in-

THIS SITUATION cannot drift on much longer without causing a bigger breakdown in the economy than has been witnessed. Business is not going to construe the type of tax revision promised by the administration as likely in any way to go to the heart of the problem that is today frustrating the American economy.

Job creation is essential to national growth. There's plenty of talk here about stimulating national output, but no practical measures are being proposed that, in the aggregate, will bring that growth An increase in consumer spending will not do it-though it may temporarily cause a fever of inflation. The real need, of course, is for encouragement of the heavy-goods industries, which are seriously depressed today.

THE ADMINISTRATION vaguely promises to revise the rules of tax depreciation, as if this alone would do the job. But these are highly technical changes that may take the managers of American business in various industries two or three years to absorb. The real difficulty is that the per cent of profit to sales is not high enough and that surpluses aren't being built up to enable companies to finance a large part of their own requirements for the future.

Meanwhile, the administration - although claiming it wishes to bring back more dividends from abroad-has proposed changes in taxing American plants overseas, which actually can cause a stoppage of the flow of dividend money to America, and hence a drop in tax revenue. This could have an adverse affect on the balance of international payments, which is causing so much apprehension about the future gold value of the dol-

THUS, THE administration has failed to support the sound principles that permit a fair margin of profit to be earned. Unless this tide is reversed soon, the discouragement now prevalent will result in a depression-perhaps not as severe as in the 1930's but in some respects of the same intensity. Yet President Kennedy still seems unaware of what his continued indifference to the labor-cost problem is doing to the economy. (Copyright, 1962, New York Herald Tribune, Inc.)

Recently McGraw - Hill Publishing Company's economics department made a study of the practice of tipping. They querried their correspondents around the country and around the world. Conformists who wish to maintain peace between them and the waiters, bellboys, masseurs, sky caps, check girls and maitres d' may be interested in some of the find-

THE RANGE for tips to waiters range from five per cent in some sections of the South to a robust 30 per cent in the Northwest for special service. Things have changed since the days when Emily Post advocated "not less than a 25-cent tip in a restaurant with a tablecloth."

New York falls in line with the general picture of 15 to 20 per cent: the Northwest rates a 20 per cent trend with special service going up to 30 per cent. Large gratuities spoil the help, Southerners contend, and the range is five to 10 per cent. The West Coast, excluding the movie colony, runs from 15-20 per cent. Central and Mid-Western states average around 15 per cent, but Cleveland and Milwaukee are reported holding the 10 per cent line. Texas is producing a mild revolution in cutting back from 20 to 15 per cent and many of its night clubs have substituted a 12-15 per cent service charge

American metropolitan points are fraught with opportunities to grease the palm of the maitre d' and captain (anywhere from \$1 to \$10), 25 to 50 cents per round for those who are setting 'em up, a couple of dollars for the orchestra leader, a handful of change to the hatcheck girl, cig-

arette girl and washroom attendant. Those travelling abroad may be governed by local customs, by the 10-15 per cent range on waiters, cabbies, etc., but in Britain the cabbies look askance on extra emoluments less than 30 per cent. Noble lads of Tokyo and New Delhi expect no tips on the average but are grateful for a small reward for special duty on a stormy night.

Attempts to abolish tipping have been made (and some go on stubbornly on a personal basis), but the most constructive, and perhaps unique-is the club known as Tippers Anonymous with some 1,800 members. With each tip - or occasionally with no tip - goes a card explaining the patron's purpose and rating the services - 20 per cent for excellent, 15 per cent for good, 10 per cent for fair, and just a card for poor. If the Internal Revenue Service ever ruled that tipping was not a deductible business item, ranks of this club might swell, and there would be more trays or palm receiving cards proclaiming "happy hunting!"

#### President Reads Society Pages

WASHINGTON - If the society editors and newswomen who cover social news at the White House have recently been put under wraps-for the first time in history-there is still considerable balm in Gilead for them.

Despite the fact the Executive Mansion has ruled that these talented women must strangle professional instincts at a White House party and behave like guests and not reporters, they can hug to their assorted bosoms the warm and welcome news that the President of the United States is one of their devoted and, constant

EVEN AS THE velvet boom was being lowered, the President, at a White House reception, was cornering two of Washington's most knowledgeable and important society editors, both old friends of the Chief Executive. To their delight, he freely confessed that the first thing he reads n any newspaper is not the front-page headlines, the editorials or the stock

market tables, but the women's pages. In Washington, he continued, these pages, including the shrewd and acute society columns, give him a clearer picture of what is actually going on in the capital than any other section of the newspaper. In the women's section, the Chief Executive feels he gets the real lowdown and-or scuttlebutt.

A GREAT MANY persons in Washington will agree with Mr. Kennedy. The art of society reporting as practiced here is no namby-pamby recital of floral decor or real Dior. It is a gutsy mixture of social and political insight, sly prophecy and hard news that turns out to be half-Winchell, half-Drew Pearson, half-Lippmann and half-nelson.

Since the White House recently can celled it subscriptions to the New York Herald Tribune, a fine, old liberal Republican paper, there has been a good bit of discussion in the profession of what

makes a newspaper acceptable at the White House. There has been unhappy speculation that allegiance to Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller (R., N.Y.), as charged against the Herald Tribune, is, for example, one way of being scrubbed from the White House list.

UP TO THIS point, no editor of my acquaintance has ever thought that the way of a newspaper to the White House breakfast or tea table is via the women's pages. With Mr. Kennedy's self-confessed addiction to these pages and to the society columns, the obvious answer is bigger and better women's pages and more sharp reporting and hard news in the society section.

The President's devotion to these pages will endear him to every women's editor not too much to predict that he will carry every vote in these departments in 1964, whether or not Mrs. Kennedy ever pours another cup of political tea.

TOO OFTEN the women's and the society editors are apt to feel unloved, even as the "prophet is not without honor save in his own country and in his own house." But with a friend in the White

House, what more can they ask? As for Washington's powerful society editors, even under White House wraps, they are doing splendidly. No one, not even the President or the First Lady, can keep the capital's politicians and their ladies from seeking out these editors and talking their-the editors'-heads off.

THE WOMEN reporters who cover White House social events may be stopped from interviewing Arthur Miller and Andre Malraux, but who can keep the Linus Paulings and government officials from telling all the minute they enter the East Room and spot these women, especially now that their readership can be guaranteed on the highest plane? ### Republican Charm School

WASHINGTON - California Congressman Bob Wilson, chairman of the Republican Congressional Committee in charge of electing GOP Representatives, is a round-faced, jolly extrovert - and conducts his job accordingly,

IT'S WILSON'S theory that voters appreciate attractive personalities: just as play-goers and club-joiners do. When Wilson buckets about the country, visiting fellow Republican leaders in their home districts, he urges them to go out and round up Republican candidates who are young, personable, fetching, and friendly. Never mind the delicate tints of their ideologies, says Wilson. If these aspirants are reasonably anti - Democratic, that makes them sufficiently Republican. Charm conquers all.

Well, the Wilson system is a good one It reminds me of a horse dealer I used to know. He would throw a blanket over the animal and study its head and eyes to see if it had "the look of eagles" in it. Then, afterwards, he would inspect the horse's legs, which is where most inspec-

WILSON'S THEORIES worked so well in 1960, that the GOP landed 44 freshmen in the House of Representatives, despite Kennedy's presidential win. Of these 44, twenty-one represented a net gain in that they replaced Democrats. And those Republicans brought with them things like freckles, boyish grins, infectious good humor - and an average age that was below that of the youthful President-elect.

YOU MIGHT SAY the Republican image of the fat, stodgy economic royalist is an anachronism that is fading with the "Ev and Charlie" show. Under Wilson's charm school, Republicans began to blossom in the Democratic south. Virginia recently added a Republican legislator. South Carolina acquired two Republican legislators for the first time since the Reconstruction. Republicans scored in local elections in Georgia, Alabama, Texas and North Carolina, There were some close losses in Arizona, Michigan and New York. But overall, in the special House elections 1961-62, House candidates ran 15 per cent ahead of the Republican records in 1960.

IN THE SPATE of Republican primary elections which took place during May and June, and in States where Republican

candidates are already known, the Wilson formula is working so well that he is confident of gaining more than the 44 new seats which would give the GOP control of the House. For example, Wilson's own brother Dick won his primary in San Diego.. Two Republican mayors in Democratic territory will be House candidates in November and are given excellent chances to oust Democrats. The GOP contestants are Mayor Jack Seale of Amarillo, Texas, and Mayor Arthur Sellend of Fresno. California.

Also in the new Republican image is Wilson's fellow extrovert and charmer, Rogers Morton, brother of the Kentucky Senator, but running for Congress from the Eastern Shore of Maryland. In the new Miami District, the Republicans have a fortyish, former FBI agent, Bob Peterson, going against ex-Senator Pepper, a good twenty years older.

WILSON IS naturally exurberant and optimistic, and these qualities are contagious enough to make his gloomy interviewer believe that, after all, the very important factor of political opposition is not quite dead in this country. The House of Representatives has recently replaced the Senate as the place where many radical and extravagant programs are decapitated. The country would be lucky to have a House in Republican hands as a counterbalance against the expanding ambition and power of the reigning Kennedy

It would make Mr. Kennedy a better President if the American electorate votes in a Republican House just as a reminder of the importance of divided authority under the American Constitution, Bob Wilson is going to make it as pleasant as possible for the electorate to do just that.
