### Period Of Awakening

Most economic as well as a majority of political observers believe that the President's blunt handling of the steel price hike triggered the current market decline, a good portion of these same sources figure that the underlying causes were there

all along. The market in general had lost touch with reality when it came to corporate expectations. Fantastic prices were being paid with a record of one to two per cent earnings-in some case practically none. Back of this were some other factors. George Humphrey, secretary of the Treasury under President Eisenhower, frequently talked of the great awakening that was around the corner when we discovered that we could no longer sell almost any-

thing anywhere in the world at the asking

price. If wages and prices kept going up

at the expense of the consumer, the awakening was bound to come, he said.

And there is good reason to believe that he was right. The attrition on our gold reserves is one evidence, and the stiffer and stiffer international market competition is another. The Common Market may even accelerate the trend.

Perhaps the time has come when we awaken to this reality, that the slowing or stalling of inflation is not without its jolts, and that dulcet reassurances or bitter resentments will not move the economic tides. That can be done by rolling up collective sleeves and going to work in the realization that every segment and every group has an equal obligation to sacrifice in the interest of our free and vigorous society

Soviet Union. A "stalemate" is really new in effect. Will it develop into one of those long periods of peace in world history based on the maintenance of a "balance of power" without a big war?

THUS, IT IS obvious that Premier Khrushchev, without signing an agreement with this country, and President Kennedy, without signing an agreement with Moscow, have both come separately to the conclusion that Red China's possession of nuclear weapons could lead to a nuclear war which might destroy everybody. If nuclear arms are to be withheld from Red China by Russia, isn't it logical then for the United States, as a balancing factor, to withhold nuclear weapons from France or any other country hereafter? Back of this unwritten understanding emerges, as always in diplomacy, a powerful reason why a given policy makes sense from the standpoint of both sides.

Red China could be an irresponsible wielder of nuclear weapons. This could lead to a nuclear war that could destroy Russia as well as other areas of the world. Hence Moscow is unwilling to build up Red China as a nuclear power,

FRANCE, OF course, wouldn't be irresponsible or go counter to American desires, but if the United States distributes nuclear data and equipment and helps build up other nations allied with it, the Soviet Union couldn't logically withhold nuclear knowledge and weapons from Red China.

Now this doesn't mean that America intends to reduce in any way its nuclear power. Nor is there to be any hesitation about using nuclear weapons if circumstances ever roquire it. What is planned is to concentrate nuclear power inside the NATO alliance for defensive purposes in Europe and leave the main control to the United States because the truly big missile bases are in this country.

A MOST SIGNIFICANT address on the subject was delivered last Saturday by Secretary of Defense McNamara, It was prepared after the most intensive study by Secretary of State Rusk and officials of all departments concerned, as well as by President Kennedy. There was no mention of France, but the speech was aimed at answering General De Gaulle's argument for a separate national nuclear force of his own. Mr. McNamara, without referring to the Soviet relationship to Red China, made this statement which applies to both sides in the "cold war":

The creation of a single additional national nuclear force encourages the proliferation of nuclear power with all of its attendant dangers."

Controlling Nuclear Weapons WASHINGTON - Sometimes the obvi- to "grow by multiplying new parts in quick succession." If Red China gets numembers of the Communist bloc in Europe-Poland or Czechoslovakia-would demand them, too. And if West Germany had a nuclear force of her own, East Germany would want to be protected by some kind of nuclear strength. Even though these might be small forces in themselves, they could add up to an array of national units, any one of which could plunge the world into a nuclear war overnight. Secretary McNamara put it this

> "In short, then, limited nuclear capabilities, operating independently, are dangerous, expensive, prone to obsolescence. and lacking in credibility as a deterrent.

MR. McNAMARA mentioned that the United States during he coming fiscal year will spend close to \$15 billion on its nuclear weapons "to insure their adequacy." This is tantamount to saying that a severe economic drain would arise in any country that sought to become a nuclear power. And yet proficiency in nuclear warfare would not be attained.

Hence, the building of nuclear strength for military purposes by any power except the United States and the Soviet Union would be a costly, dangerous and, indeed, superfluous project. Even Great Britain is finding it an expensive undertaking. and her contributions hereafter will be largely supplementary and not independent of NATO. Secretary Rusk has gone to Paris to argue all this out with General De Gaulle, but the McNamara speech laid the main points on the line ahead of time.

PRESIDENT KENNEDY has, therefore, developed a sound policy, and since it happens by coincidence to be based on the very same kind of argument that appeals to the Soviet government in its relations with Red China, the world may hope for a period of "stalemate."

It goes without saying that the big task still is to avert a nuclear outbreak as between the Soviet Union and the United States. And this means that monkey business in and around Berlin has to be suspended by Mr. Khrushchev, and the 'crists' atmosphere avoided so that fears of a surprise attack on the nuclear side will be largely removed.

NOW THIS doesn't bar the building up by either side of conventional forcesordinary armies and navies. 

### Chaos Out Of Confusion

Early in the year 1931, Spain hopefully ended a long siege of revolution and anarchy stretching back to 1868. King Alphonso XIII abdicated, and Spain's Republican Party was elected by a land-

But Spain was not to be freed from its tragic heritage. Political elements made up of the army, the rich landowners, and the church opposed any form of democracy. Lined up against these were the now-ruling Republicans, along with such splinter parties as the Regionalists, Separatists, Socialists, New Industrialists, Extreme Leftists, Anarchists, and a scattering of intellectuals.

THE COMMUNISTS were unhappy over not having won seats in parliament, and immediately the country was plagued with strikes. The Republicans suppressed them. The constitution nevertheless was pro-

claimed and the inexperienced new government set out to implement its terms. It was one of the most democratic constitutions ever drawn up, including most of the freedoms guaranteed to American But it was not to be. Spain had inherited all the old problems, plus a slew of new troubles. Extreme factions went

to work and until 1936 kept the nation

constantly in turmoil. The economy, al-

ready hurt by the world-wide depression, was nearly ruined. Armed uprisings, mostly by extreme leftists, were bloodily smashed THE EXTREMISTS had hoped to win the elections of February, 1936. They did not. The people gave the Republicans another overwhelming mandate. The ex-

other. Strikes, bombings and assassinations were daily occurrences. There was a break between the moderate left and moderate right of the Re-

tremists went underground, fighting each

publican Party, and the extremists ... ploited the break with more violence. Finally, with the killing of the conservative parliamentary leader, the moderate rightists, no longer moderate, withdrew from the government.

A GENERAL RIGHTIST uprising was beaten down, except for a small pocket in the southwest led by a general named Franco. Nazi Germany and Mussolini's Italy sent troops and arms, and Moroccan mercenaries came from Africa. The democracies imposed an arms embargo on both sides, an act which succeeded only in hurting the Republicans. The Sovjet Union sent some arms supplies, international Communists sent volunteers and mercenaries-and thousands of non-Communist individuals went to fight for the Republic, Spain became a battleground between international extremist forces while the democracies stood idly by.

FOR A LONG TIME, extremists in the U. S. (both Communists and rightists) have been trying to put over the big lie that the Spanish Republican government was run by the Reds. They overlook the fact that the Republicans had beaten down Communist uprisings on many occasions and, upon' Franco's revolt, were forced to accept whatever help they could get. (Finland had to accept help from Hitler to beat off the Soviets just a few years later.)

PERHAPS THE BEST and most ironic illustration of the true nature of the Spanish Civil War may be seen in the last bitter days when all but Madrid had fallen to the Fascists, and the city itself was under siege. The Communists chose this time to attempt an uprising (creating a civil war within a civil war) while the Fascists looked on gleefully. The Republicans slaughtered the Reds, and then turned back to be slaughtered by the Fas--BOB SMITH

The three Kennedy brothers, Teddy, Bobby and the President, are in a boat that is sinking in midocean. Question: Who would be saved? The answer to this rudimentary conundrum

THOSE KNOWING from intimate firsthand knowledge the financial-business community not only in New York but across the country say that it would be impossible to exaggerate the resentment, the downright hatred, that is the prevailing attitude toward the President and his Administration. Anyone in the camp who ventures to question the view that the President is anti-business and that his policies have brought on the stock market slide, which reflects the lack of confidence of business, is looked on with

is: The country.

A personal survey of more than 50 leading bankers across the country brought the virtually unanimous view that the Kennedy policies were harmful to business and that as a consequence business would suffer. When a mild dissent was entered by rather more sophisticated New York bankers, who pointed out that there was little tangible evidence to support this view, it was considered as a heresy that had best be ignored.

UNDER SOME circumstances this might be put down as a fit of irrational petulance bound to pass as the economy made the adjustment to living without the threat of inflation. In calmer times several Presidents have feuded with business, and the sounds of battle have eventually died away without too much harm to the country.

But today so much turns on an effective cooperation between business and government. Above all, this is true with respect to the outflow of gold and dollars and the need to achieve an effective working relationship with the European Comfoon Market and the new tariff structure the market is beginning to erect.

"BURIED IN BAPTISM" The scriptures of God are not intended for refutation, nor exploitation. They are pure and real; the unimpeachable testimony of God's will to mankind. The scripture is not a text

book on science and yet it is scientifically correct; the Word of God is precise, clearcut and unerring. All of the abberation, laxity, mistake, heresy and misjudgment falls on the side of man. Man has bungled, and stumbled and slipped and tripped; he is so often led by mirages and

falsely impressed by his own self-deception. The divine remedy, which Jehovah has provided, known as the gospel, offers man to pardon and forgiveness of his sins at the point of his rising from a burial called "Baptism;" this is from a Greek word "Paptizo," meaning to plunge beneath, cover, submerge, overwhelm, dip or immerse. The scriptural proof of forgiveness at the point of baptism may be seen in Acts 2:38, Acts 22:16, Gal. 3:26-27, Mark 16:15-16, 1 Peter 3:21, John 3:3-5, Rom. 6:3-4, Col. 2:11-12 et al.

Compare Rom 6:4 and Col. 2:12 and note the term, "Buried with him by baptism" and that men are raised from baptism to "walk in the newness of life." This comprises the new creature spoken of in 11 Cor. 5:17:—if any man be in Christ he is a new creature." Note this is "in Christ;" But the Scripture declares that we are baptized into Christ, Gal. 3:27 "For as many of you as have been baptized into Christ have put on Christ". Man has no rationality, profundity nor caliber that will permit him to throw overboard this eternal truth!!

Sprinkling officially dates from the Roman Catholic Council of Ravenna, Using the word "officially" to mean the date, not official Authority from God! For God's word has not changed!! John Calvin, Presbyterian, attested baptism as a burial in these words, "The word baptize signifies to immerse. It is certain that immersion was the practice of the early church. Martin Luther said, "Baptism is a Greek word, and may be translated 'immerse.' I would have those who are to be baptized to be altogether dipped." John Wesley (Methodist): "Buried with him by baptism—alluding to the ancient manner of baptizing by immersion." "Rantize" is the Greek word for "Sprinkle". But even though you do not know about ord for "Sprinkle". But even though you do not know about "Baptizo" or "Rantizo" you may still read the Bible correctly and know to be "buried in baptism" for the divine reason and thus do God's will.



NEW YORK (AP) - Jacques Sarlie, financier and art connois seur described as a Wall Street associate of Edward M. Gilbert. who fled to Brazil, has been accused of fleeing to France and leaving a \$754,000 stock order

The Dutch-born Sarlie, 47, was sued in State Supreme Court Thursday by the brokerage firm of McDonnell and Co., Inc. The firm contended Sarlie fled to Paris June 9 or 10 to defraud creditors and to avoid payment for stock purchased during an attempt to gain control of Celotex

Gilbert, who flew to Brazil June 13, had been buying up Celotex stock and seeking a merger of Celotex with E. L. Bruce Co., the wood flooring concern of which he was president and a director. Gilbert faces claims arising from his admittedly unauthorized withdrawals of \$1,953,000 from E. L.

Sarlie, who came to America in 1940, amassed a personal fortune and, in 1960, collected \$1,203,160 from a London auction of 51 of his paintings, most of them Picassos. He said at the time he would use the money to encourage the

Orthodox economic doctrine is that expanding the supply of money and credit may trigger economic growth by making it easier for business to expand its activities or plant, but that in the long wage increase for some 10,000 He has repeatedly stated that he that the United States is entering supply leads to rising prices and

Treasury surpluses, on the con-trary, are held by orthodox econo-mists to deflate the supply of money and credit, to put a brake on runaway booms, even to invite recessions-since the Treasury is taking more out of the economy in tax collections than it is putting back by spending.

President Kennedy challenged this orthodox view in his speech at \$8.4 billion in 1948-didn't prevent

### PRICES UNHURT The President also points out

that Treasury deficits in the last few years-a peacetime record of \$12 billion in the 1959 fiscal yearleft wholesale prices unscathed while retail prices rose very little. Orthodox economists hold the real reason was that much industrial capacity was idle, and what was in operation faced fierce competition, holding prices down at the expense of contracting profit margins.

A few more Treasury deficits, the President says, could help the economy expand faster and in time mean higher tax collections, bringing the budget back into bal-

Also, he charges that the formal budget in use shows a deficit because it includes as current spending loans which will be repaid, so that what looks like a deficit may be only a bookkeeping one. He further says that worry over the size of the federal debt is overdone, since it is now much less in proportion to the total national output than it was 17 years ago. JUST EXCUSE

His opponents charge that such reasoning is just an excuse for more government spending. They think the best way to pep up the economic growth rate would be to cut both taxes and spending and get the budget back in balance— or even better to run a surplus so as to cut down the burden of the record federal debt. They say this would stimulate both business and consumer spending and do the economic growth job much better than the government can.
