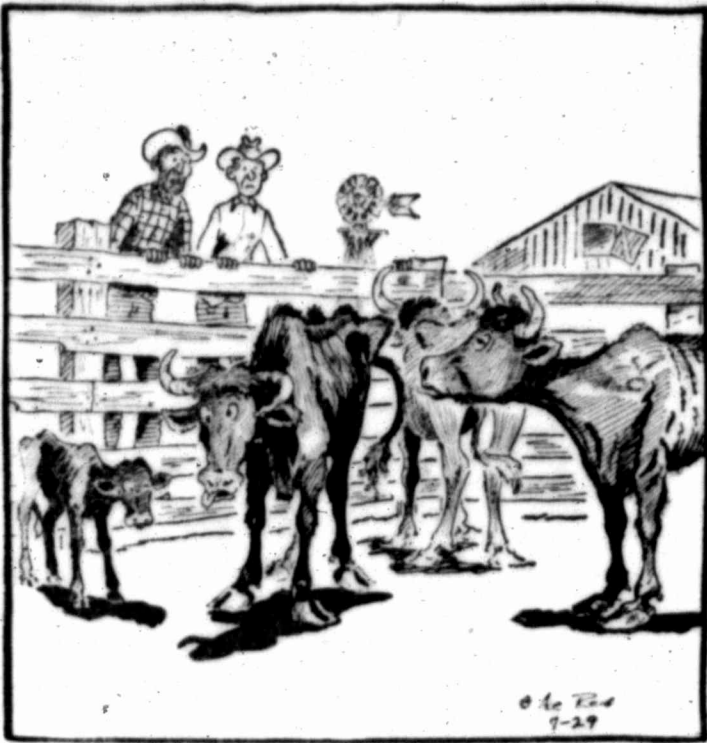

The May figures, as hefty as they were, did not constitute a peak for the year. That came in April when farmers were pouring on the water for pre-planting moisture. Cap Rock bought 10,039,560 KWH and sold 9,176,163 that month.

At the end of June there were 2,332 miles of line energized in the system, a gain of five miles for the month. There were 4,974 members connected, an increase of 56.

### Aerial Nuclear Blast In Nevada

CAMP MERCURY, Nev. (AP) — A nuclear device was detonated in the air Saturday above the Atomic Energy Commission's Nevada test site.

It was the second atmospheric nuclear test in the continental United States since a 1953 moratorium. The first such test was a week ago, also at the Camp Mercury test range.

It was described as a low-yield device which means it was in the range of 20 kilotons or less. A kiloton is the equivalent of 1,000 tons of TNT.

Saturday's shot was originally scheduled for Friday, but was delayed because of unfavorable weather conditions.

An underground shot 44th such test in the current series was fired Friday at the test site. Other tests are pending, including one in which troops will be deployed beyond reach of the blast for military maneuvers.

### Earns Place On NMSU Honor List

### Telstar Sends Royal Picture

NEW YORK (AP)—A picture of England's Princess Anne was successfully transmitted from Britain to the United States Friday night by way of outer space.

The relay took the shape of an inverted "V" as the electronic picture signals were bounced off Telstar, this nation's first communications satellite.

The switchboard in the sky received and then retransmitted the picture of the curly-haired English princess, shown as she debarked from a ship at Southampton after a trip to France.

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## American Officer Dies In Viet Cong Ambush

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP) — Nearly 300 Communist guerrillas ambushed a government convoy 40 miles north of Saigon Saturday and killed a U.S. Army captain and 23 Vietnamese soldiers in a fierce battle that was over in minutes.

The captain was the seventh American serviceman killed in combat since December, when the United States began a massive support and training program here.

to save South Viet Nam from gradual Communist conquest. Sixteen other Americans have been killed in accidents.

The captain, whose name was not announced, pending notification to his family, was traveling with a 15-vehicle convoy when it was attacked.

The Viet Cong guerrillas were hidden in dense bushes for more than a mile along the smooth, straight road which runs 30 miles north from Saigon to the Cambodian border.

They disabled the leading vehicles with mines and riddled the rest of the convoy with heavy and light machine gun, rocket, rifle and mortar fire.

The 290-man convoy lost 23 wounded and four more missing, besides its 23 dead. A jeep was destroyed and two heavy trucks badly shot up.

Within an hour an infantry group of 120 men arrived and two companies of paratroopers dropped on the scene but found only handstamps and other signs of casualties, where the guerrillas had been. The attackers had carried off the dead and wounded.

Parade of the guerrillas continued. Spotted planes saw the Viet Cong force retreating through dense forest, and air strikes were made up to 3 p.m. when contact was lost.

The government convoy was headed north on the trip if the attack, to pick up employees of an engineering firm working on an outpost. Several U.S. liaison troops are working on a road project along Viet Nam's frontier with Laos and Cambodia.

The ambush was similar to one on June 16 on the same road in which two U.S. officers were killed. It was a nearly the same spot at which Spec 4 George F. Fryer Jr., Long Beach, Calif., was released by the Viet Cong June 24 after six months captivity.

The Communists have been increasing the frequency and size of ambush operations in the last two months. Out of fear, local residents seldom report the presence of an ambush to government forces.

In addition to the ambush, the Communists aimed out a successful attack against an outpost. Ba

Binh, 80 miles west of Saigon. A commune said the post was destroyed and the fate of its 12 soldiers and 100 men unknown. Two armored river boats rushed to the scene.

These Communist moves overshadowed a series of air strikes reported by the government last week in which 164 Viet Cong were reported killed by strafing in a raid 130 miles north of Saigon and in other attacks farther north near the North Viet Nam border.

Sixteen guerrillas also were reported killed in ground operations in the Mekong delta.

### Rivers Bring Rafters Down

NEW ORLEANS (AP)—A 1,076-mile 10-week raft trip down the Red and Mississippi rivers ended for nine teenage Texas boys and two camp counselors here Friday.

The youths, who started their trip from near Denison, pulled into shore near the Hey P. Long Mississippi River Bridge and said they would stay over until today, returning home by bus.

Three said they would be willing to make a similar trip again. The others said "never in a million years."

The adventurers pitched camp and cooked their own meals during the entire trip. They resupplied only once at Shreveport. They said they had only one can of sauerkraut left when they reached New Orleans.

The boys from the Dallas Salesmanship Boys' Camp near Hawkins reported no trouble on the trip.

### Smith Dockets 29 Cases For Trial

## Capital News Aids Market Recovery

NEW YORK (AP)—Boosted by encouraging news from Washington, the stock market last week strung out its recovery through the third straight week.

Stocks advanced on three items from the nation's capital.

1. The Federal Reserve Board reduced the margin requirements for stock market credit to 30 percent from 70 percent in effect, ending one to buy \$100 worth of stock for \$30, with the rest borrowed.

2. The Senate Finance Committee voted to eliminate the proposed 20 per cent tax withholding provision on income from interest and dividends.

3. The Treasury revised depreciation rules for business with the administration estimating this would have the effect of cutting corporate taxes by \$1.5 billion in the first year.

In addition, good news about some of the biggest companies boosted their stocks. American Telephone, most widely-held issue of all, was bought heavily on news of the success of its Telstar communications satellite. International Business Machines reported record earnings for a six-month period. General Electric reported record first-half sales and a big jump in profits.

Stocks advanced substantially every day but Friday, when there

was a mild, irregular decline as profits were taken to the weakened stock market. Advances had advanced in 10 of the past 12 sessions.

The ability of stock prices to respond to good news seemed to reflect a rebirth of confidence on Wall Street, brokers said. At the same time, some market participants warned that the pronounced recovery was not as solid as last week's progress, and that it would be healthier to the list to consolidate at a less hectic pace.

The Dow Jones industrial average closed at 1192.19, up 19.75 from 1172.44. The Standard & Poor's average of 40 stocks advanced 4.90 to 219.80.

Volume was 23,073,400 shares, compared with 19,820,190 in the holiday-shortened week before. It compared with 25,774,760 in the full "five-day" trading week ended June 30.

Government and corporate bond prices rose, with governments leading the way and corporates making the lesser gains. The picture was almost the reverse of the previous week when government bonds fell sharply and corporates followed behind at a slower pace.

Volume of corporate trading on the New York Stock Exchange rose to \$5.42 billion from \$2.1 billion par value in the previous, holiday-shortened week.

# Cleveland Mayor Gets Cabinet Post

HYANNIS PORT, Mass. (AP)—He wanted him for the Cabinet search Saturday for a 1962 administration to head the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare by naming the 49-year-old Cleveland mayor, Robert R. Taylor, as J. Celebrezze.

"It came as a great surprise to me," Celebrezze said in Cleveland.

It came also as a surprise to just about everyone else. Even Kennedy didn't know for sure until Saturday morning that Celebrezze was his man to succeed Abraham A. Ribicoff, the first person named to his Cabinet and the first to resign.

Ribicoff, former governor of Connecticut, set in his resignation Thursday to campaign for the Democratic Senate nomination in that state.

Associates of the President said a key factor in his choice of Celebrezze was the mayor's reputation as a good administrator.

Kennedy made up his mind to offer the job to Celebrezze only Friday. He reached the mayor who was on a fishing trip to Canada, by telephone and told him

# Lamesa Has Bright Mid-Year Reports

LAMESA (SC)—The mid-year economic picture in Dawson County is exceptionally bright with slight declines noted in some aspects and big advances made in others, from a year ago.

In instances where declines were reported at the end of June, future prospects appeared sufficient to erase the dip by the end of the year.

Although farmers are crossing their fingers for more timely rains, the general agricultural outlook is good. The year's business thus far reflects the 213,217 bales of cotton ginned by Dawson County farmers last year.

Banks reported good business during the first half, utility connections increased, postal receipts gained, oil activity showed tremendous potential and capital improvements continued at a hot pace.

Construction—Building during the first half was down \$268,475 from last year but projected construction, including two new churches, should boost the 1962 total beyond last year's near record. Permits for the year amount to \$1,096,675 compared to \$1,367,150 for the same period of last year.

Oil potential—Potential was up from 4,000 barrels of new oil to 10,850 barrels through June. The opening of new fields and continued drilling in the Ackerly area was responsible for the gain.

Banks—Deposits in all three financial institutions was up \$11,666,253 over last year with totals on June 30 pegged at \$38,760,932—just short of the all-time record. Loans were up from \$29,071,439 to \$23,684,450.

Postal receipts—An increase of \$3,294 was noted with reporting periods of 1962 totaling \$86,649.

Water consumption—The City of Lamesa showed 4,581 users on June 30 and had metered 346,712,000 gallons in the first six months of 1962. In June of last year there were 4,436 customers and six months consumption was 291,422,000 gallons.

Telephone—General Telephone Co. in the past year passed a milestone by adding its 1,000th number here. The figure is now well over 5,000 compared to 4,361 in April of last year.

Electricity—Texas Electric Service Co. gained from 4,189 to 4,383 meters.

Natural gas—Company-wide in Dawson County, Pioneer Natural Gas Co. showed a four per cent increase in meters. In the city limits the increase was from 3,351 in 1961 to 4,159 at the end of last month.

Capital improvements—First-half improvements in 1962 amounted to \$53,529. This year the figure has been increased to \$119,972. A sewage disposal plant remains to be constructed this year.

Estimated population has increased from 12,438 (in 1960 census) to an estimated 13,164. Records of 1961 expected to fall in-clude: the \$28,940,000 retail sales mark; the \$43,319,508 agricultural income high; the \$40,756,000 output of goods and services; and the record bank deposit figure of \$40,345,400.

Blue Law Hits Discount Store

DALLAS (AP)—Dist. Judge Clarence Guittard has issued a temporary restraining order against the Sessions Discount Stores, banning sale of prohibited articles on both Saturday and Sunday.

Under the state's new "Blue Law," retailers may sell any item on one of the weekend days, but not both. The law which went into effect Nov. 7, 1961, allows sales of food, medicine and other necessities but bars more general items.

The temporary restraining order was requested by Dist. Atty. Henry Wade.

San Antonio Radio TV, Newspaper Deal Completed

Approval of transfer of license of radio station KENS and KFSN-TV in San Antonio was announced Friday by the Federal Communications Commission.

Transfer is to the Harte-Hanks interests, which operate eight radio stations in Texas and means they will take over the San Antonio Express and News since these powers have originated an-ownership with the radio and TV station.

It has been announced that the newspaper's management will change on July 19.

Harte-Hanks syndicate has sold KENS-TV to Texas Star Broadcasting Co. owned by Roy Harbort of Houston, vice-president and the as-signment of that license also was approved by the FCC.

The San Antonio properties have been owned by Frank H. Huntress and others.

BERLIN (AP)—A U.S. Army court martial Friday sentenced Robert Clements, 24, of Midland, Tex., to two years hard labor on charges of participating in the rape of a young West Berlin woman.

He was also sentenced to a half year in prison and forfeiture of pay. The conviction and sentence are subject to review.

Clements was stationed at Bitburg, West Germany. While visiting Berlin he was alleged to have raped three soldiers in the rape. One has already been convicted and two are awaiting trial.

Clements was acquitted of participating in the robbery of the woman, 20.

Repossessed Homes On Block

FORT WORTH (AP)—The Federal Housing Administration has started a campaign to dispose of 1,200 repossessed homes in the Fort Worth area.

Many houses are being offered to real estate firms on a bid basis.

Adrian Henderson, district FHA director said that loss of em-ployment, economic conditions generally, and the high number of present day homeowners were responsible for the repossessions.

The value of the dwellings mostly in the \$7,000-\$11,000 range was placed at \$11 million.

CLEVELAND (AP)—A pickup truck overturned about 5 miles from here Friday night, killing Robert Lee Taylor, 37, carpenter of Corsicana and Clyde Henley, 61, an Abilene carpenter.

# Historical Homes To Be Recognized At Odessa Confab

Acting Lt. Gov. Culp Krueger, state senator from El Campo, will speak before several Chamber of Commerce committees and members of the Texas Permian Historical Society at a breakfast meeting in the Lincoln Hotel Ballroom in Odessa, at 7:30 a.m. Tuesday, according to Odessa chamber president John Ben Shepperd.

Sen. Krueger will announce and award a Texas Historical Building Medalion at the breakfast to Mr. and Mrs. John O'Neal of Odessa and Mr. and Mrs. Jay McGee of Crane. These medalions are part of the Texas Tourist Program and will be the first such medalions to be presented in this immediate area.

The O'Neal Medalion Home is located at 620 East Fifth Street and is believed to have been built by John D. O'Neal in the late 1890's and probably one of the oldest in Odessa.

The McGee Medalion Home in Crane is a home constructed on land homesteaded by R. B. McGee in 1906 and has been in possession of the family since that time. 23 years before Crane County was organized. # 2 Farm Officials Are Suspended

COLLEGE STATION (AP)—The state Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee (ASC) confirmed Saturday that two more Brazoria County farm officials have been suspended.

Ralph Price, state chairman, said the two were suspended because of irregularities which have been found in the administration of the rice acreage allotment and marketing quota program in Brazoria County.

The Agriculture Department in Washington had said only that the men were suspended because they refused to make sworn statements concerning allotment difficulties in their county.

Price said, "Their suspension was based on preliminary reports and until the state committee receives the final investigation report for review, no further action can be taken in the matter."

The men are J. W. Adams Jr., of Angleton, chairman of the Brazoria ASC committee, and Clarence Zwahr of Dansbury, a member.

Price said no charges are pending.

"We don't have any information

that they had any knowledge of any irregularities in the county," said Price.

Zwahr told the Houston Post he had not made a statement because "I'm not going to swear to something until I am satisfied that I know what was going on. I haven't said I wouldn't make a statement."

Adams said he has made at least two statements to investigators.

Earlier, David Stephens, ASC office manager in Brazoria County, and T. C. Thornhill, ASC office manager in Waller County, were suspended by the department during investigations of rice allotments.

The rice case became known to the Agriculture Department June 7, four days after the death of Carl Lively, committee manager in Matagorda County.

A woman clerk in Lively's office told the new office manager Stephens had offered her money to continue arrangements he was reported to have had with Lively.

The Agriculture Department spokesman said. The FBI was called into the case.

# U.S. Slaps MCA With Antitrust Suit

LOS ANGELES (AP)—The federal government, to the surprise of few, has filed an antitrust suit against MCA, Inc., the nation's largest talent agency and filmed television show producer.

The complaint accuses the firm of tying in its two businesses, forcing producers to buy items they didn't want in order to obtain actors and programs that were in demand.

The government in filing the suit Friday also obtained a court order blocking MCA from divesting itself of any assets.

The 18-page complaint, submitted to U.S. District Court here seeks to strip MCA of its talent agency branch, MCA Artists, Ltd.

The company announced earlier last week that it would give up the agency, which handles top entertainment stars including Gregory Peck, Ingrid Bergman and Jack Benny.

The government charged that MCA's acquisition last June 18 of Decca Records Inc. and its subsidiary, Universal Pictures Inc., violated the Celler-Kefauver Anti-Merger Act. It asked the court to divest MCA of those firms.

The civil suit was announced in Washington, D.C., by Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy. He signed the complaint, along with Lee Loevinger, assistant attorney general in charge of the antitrust division, and U.S. Atty. Frances C. Whelan of Los Angeles.

The complaint also charged violation of Sherman Antitrust Act provisions against conspiracy to restrain trade and monopolize business.

MCA officials declined comment until they study the suit.

# Church Of Christ Marks Golden Anniversary Today

Members of the Main Street Church of Christ today will turn back the pages of time with "dinner on the ground," a common practice when the congregation was established 50 years ago.

Services today will mark the beginning of a week's meeting commemorating the Golden Anniversary of the church's ministry in Big Spring.

Melvin Wise, Atlanta, Ga., who served the church as local evangelist here 30 years ago, will be preaching all week at the church.

Although there had been many members in Big Spring and Howard County for a number of years, it remained for John W. Sharron to weld the local group into an active church. When he arrived the first of August in 1912 his first act was to survey the community that week and the following Sunday, seven assembled themselves into a congregation.

The old Presbyterian structure at 424 E. 3rd served as the first meeting place until it was purchased by the new East Third (now Fourth) Baptist congregation. For a time members met in the courthouse until they secured lots at 211 W. 4th and raised a tabernacle in 1924. Four

years later property was acquired at 14th and Main and a new brick house of worship was erected.

Fire damaged the sanctuary severely, and about 11 years ago a new auditorium accommodating over 600 was erected. At the same time the old sanctuary was converted into Bible School facilities. Recently, a new wing on the south, has been completed for Bible School use and for offices. A master plan provides for its enlargement also.

that of the sanctuary. Where the congregation had a couple of lots on the corner, it now has an entire half block with adjoining parking. Properties are valued at more than \$375,000.

Instead of the faithful seven, which included Mrs. Bess Sharron Powers who is still a member, there are now over 600 on the rolls. Approximately 600 attend the Bible School classes each Sunday.

The church has long been a supporter of other activities and sustains a full time missionary—Walter Kridel and family—in Brazil. It also has supported work in Germany, Italy and France as well as in Latin American countries.

Regular support is given eight orphan homes as well as a home for older people.

As the congregation gathers today—with a goal of 600 in Bible School—there will be much talk about the early days when Mr. Sharron had gathered the small group, and when there were such stalwarts as D. C. Riley, Perry Smith, the Castles, Shockleys and Merricks.

# Week's Fines Total \$827

A total of \$827 in fines was assessed in Corporation Court during the past week. Large source of income came from fines and bond forfeitures of persons charged with being drunk.

Twenty-one persons pleaded guilty as charged, and 20 received fines of \$25 while another was fined \$30. One bond of \$25 was forfeited. One person pleaded not guilty and his case was set for July 20.

Persons driving without a valid license accounted for \$80 of the fines assessed as three persons paid fines of \$20 and two were levied \$15 each.

Speeders paid in \$60, and one case was set for July 20. Two persons were fined \$6 each for vagrancy. All other fines were for violations of automobile regulations.

Passing without sufficient clearance cost one motorist \$10, and another was fined \$10 for failure to have an inspection sticker on his car. Improper starts from a parking position cost one driver \$10 and another \$5. Two persons were fined \$10 each and another \$15 for failure to yield right of way.

Other fines were \$5 for operating a car without a driver license in possession, \$15 for allowing an unauthorized person to operate a vehicle, \$10 for passing in a prohibited zone and \$10 for following too closely.

LONDON — Britain has opened a school for pregnant schoolgirls.

Last year over 700 schoolgirls—none older than 15—became pregnant. They had no husbands.

The 700 were the registered cases. The authorities admit there were probably many others—girls who for one reason or another never applied for help.

The maternity school for schoolgirls is located in a London suburb.

It's been operating discreetly for almost a year.

Behind it are the Salvation Army, the London County Council and the National Council for the Unmarried Mother.

But the uniform is different. It is a maternity smock.

The curriculum is somewhat different, too. In addition to the regular subjects, the students study mothercraft and knitting.

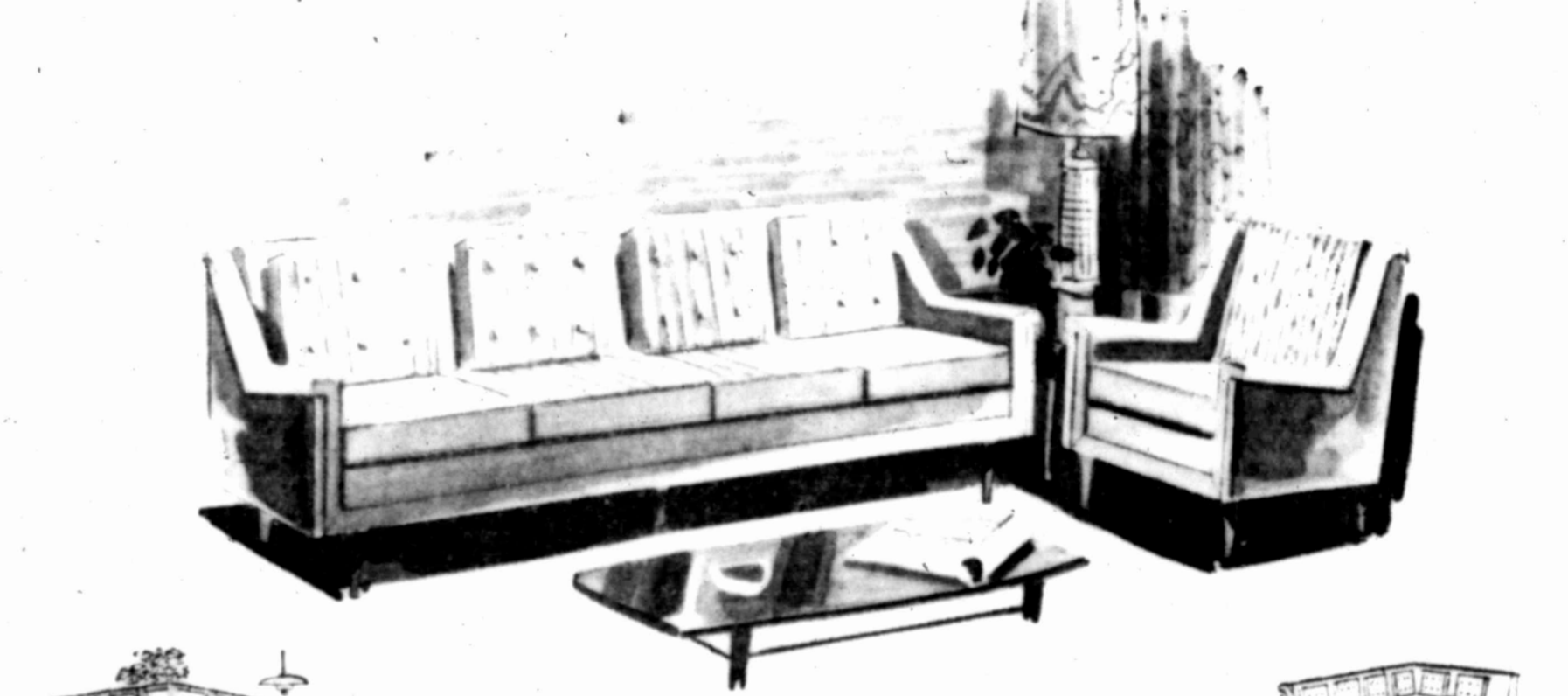

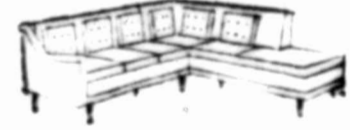
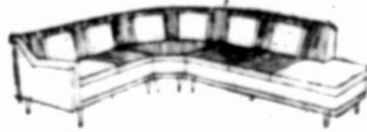

# WAAF Active Woman At Soldiers' Home

WASHINGTON (AP) — Mona Schatz watches television alone in the room where Abraham Lincoln drafted the Emancipation Proclamation.

She sunbathes on the same wide veranda where the Civil War president sat on summer evenings and gazed pensively across the miles to the White House in its steamy mosquito-infested swamp.

When she feels like a game of poker or pinocle she crosses her well-kept lawn studded with four cannons to towering Scott Building, where a game is nearly always in progress in the basement card room of the dormitory-mess hall. There Mona pulls up a chair, parks her big straw handbag on the floor and joins in the bidding with the boys.

Mona Schatz, 51, a WAAF (Women's Auxiliary Air Force) in World War II, is the only active woman resident among 2,200 men in the National Soldiers' Home.

"It's a paradise," she calls her unusual life. "This is the best home I've ever had. If I was a millionaire I couldn't live any-

nicer than I am right now. It's like a country club."

She shakes her short, straight, auburn hair, held back with a ribbon, and says earnestly: "I consider myself the luckiest girl in the world to be here, considering I can't be at home."

Home is Franklin Square, Long Island, where several of her four brothers and four sisters still live. She visits them two or three times a year.

Technically, Mona isn't the only woman resident of the home. But of the others—three WACs—Norma Demaux and Erma Gorman are hospitalized patients. Regina Jones, the first woman to arrive four years ago, is on indefinite leave.

Consequently Mona is the only woman to eat in the regular mess hall with the men, attend the four movies a week, shown at the home, pile in the big bus along with the fellows for sightseeing tours or the Senators' home baseball games.

"I'd rather be with this many men than this many women," she volunteers. "Some of the old Army men who don't like women sort of resent me. But on the

whole I think I'm pretty well liked."

Gen. W. H. Haislip, the home's governor, agrees, but adds: "The men are quite set in their ways and don't want any queen of the campus."

He explains that to get into the home a regular Army or Air Force man or woman must have 20 years in service, or have been disabled in line of duty, or have wartime service and a physical condition that prevents making a living.

The 300-acre home, on the site of Washington's first park, doesn't cost the taxpayer a cent. It's maintained by small deductions taken from the regulars' pay since about 1850.

Mona, who served nearly 2 1/2 years stateside during the war, finished nurses' training after leaving service, but a bad back condition sent her first to a VA hospital and then to the home.

She lives alone in the women's side of the Anderson Cottage, which boasts a plaque: "Summer House President Lincoln, 1862, 1863, 1864."

# Duties Are First In Life Of Meter Maid

The heat is on - weather wise and otherwise - when Big Spring's meter maid, Lucille Thomas, patrols the downtown streets armed with parking tickets and perseverance. Even her husband, Alden, a longtime employee of the Postal Department, has found his car marked with tickets placed there by his wife.

Seven years of working the town's meter beat has not dulled Mrs. Thomas' interest in meeting and knowing people, although she has contributed to their unhappiness at times. Her interest in people plus the fact that she has no children were her primary motives for seeking the meter maid position with the Big Spring Police Department. Added to this, she loves the outdoors and the exercise.

Exercise is something which Mrs. Thomas gets plenty of, frequently more than desired. The distance she walks each day depends on the volume of downtown traffic. Her beat includes an area of six blocks which she patrols eight hours each day. In 15-day periods, she alternates with another meter maid, working the east and west sides of the town. During the month of June, Mrs. Thomas bought five pairs of shoes. She explained that she has difficulty in finding shoes that are comfortable for walking and at the same time durable.

Always attractively uniformed, Lucille's summer attire is a dark brown shirt, trimly tailored beige skirt, belted with brown leather, and a beige cap. Her shirt is marked with a regulation patch of the police department. Winter months will find her appearing more formal in a heavier skirt, long sleeved shirt and brown tie for warmth. Over this she dons a leather jacket, a practical and stylish garment for West Texas winters.

Uniforms aren't always comfortable when there is extremely cold or warm weather. Lucille re-

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# Lake Has Many Depots For Supplies

The high popularity of Lake J. B. Thomas as a recreational area has produced the need for adequate centers where supplies for the funseekers could be obtained.

The lake management has leased out a number of sites to commercial enterprises to meet this need and the visitor at the big lake finds adequate supplies for all his needs. Food, bait, fuel, fishing and boating supplies, gasoline, boat storage facilities, as well as supplies in which to live are available.

The Lake Thomas Lodge, in operation since 1954 is the oldest of these commercial projects at the lake. Owned by Mrs. Ned Sanders, the lodge is near the lake and is centered well in the area of most activity for the lake. Mrs. Sanders and her five children established the lodge and operate it as one of the more popular of the area. The lodge has a restaurant, club

rooms, boats for rent, storage space for boats, a trailer camp, grocery store, bait and fishing tackle and all other needs the recreationist may need.

Ray Mengus is operator of the Shady Grove lodge located at the west end of the lake. He stocks groceries, bait and fishing supplies and has a boat rental service. Nearby are camp-ground facilities. Mengus is successfully endeavoring to utilize a heavy growth of mesquite in the area to improve his location.

Claude Holnett's Sportsman's Paradise on the south side of the lake is another of the older and better known centers. He offers similar services to the lake visitor afforded at the other places.

Several of the places have fishing houses where the angler who likes to do his fishing the easy and comfortable way can be served. In these fishing houses, the fisherman sits in an air-conditioned room, built over the water in comfortable chairs and fishes in open water before him.

Another high popular and well developed enterprise is Boyd's Lodge on the Bull Creek Channel, Raymond Boyd and Jewe Boyd are the operators of the well patronized establishment.

Other places operating on the lake property and near by for the convenience of the fishermen, boaters, cabin owners and picnickers include:

Lem's Bait House, operated by Lem Gresham, located on the north side, Lake View Grocery, adjacent to the lake property on the south side, Brown's Lake Side Grocery, and Jenkins Grocery.

Facilities at each of the places listed are similar.

Commercial operators on the lake property pay the URMWD a franchise fee.

## Proper Maintenance Keeps Boat Motors In Good Shape

The boating bug is a habit that each year gets to very many enthusiasts. And outboard motors are the mainstay of the sport throughout the country, are being used and required to keep their boating equipment ready during the season.

Take a little time to take your outboard motor in for a check-up. You may want to leave this to the expert, a qualified marine mechanic, or if you are like many boaters, you may do more satisfaction and enjoyment from doing it yourself. If the latter is the case, here are some tips from Bill Smoak, chief engineer at Lybrand Motors, that will help you do the job correctly.

First of all, remove the spark plugs and leave them out until you have finished working on the motor. This is a safety precaution.

### Recreation Here Outlined In Chamber Brochure

A source of information on things to do and places to see in the lake area is the Chamber of Commerce's Big Spring Chamber of Commerce's Recreation Brochure. We get many inquiries from visitors to the lake area who are looking for something to do. We try to give them all the information we can on a person's basis.

The Chamber has information compiled into a brochure of outside facilities in and around Big Spring. Other information is available upon request.

A history of Big Spring is set along with the brochure so that the persons can realize the impact of each spot in the development of the city. In addition, a map is sent along with the brochure.

Inspect the plugs for excessive burning, fouling or cracks. If they appear to be in good condition, they can be cleaned, recapped and reused. But if you suspect they are bad, throw them out and install new plugs, making sure they are the type recommended by the manufacturer. Also check the rubber insulators. If cracked or worn, they should be replaced.

The fuel system is the next step. If you neglected to drain all fuel from the motor last fall, gum deposits may have formed in the sediment bowl. Remove the bowl and wash both the bowl and the filter in neutral spirits or clean gasoline. If the filter is badly clogged, replace it. If a carburetor is used, replace the float valve, each spring, check all fuel lines for leaks or cracks.

Test and adjust all linkages. Make sure the throttle cables are not worn and the parts are not loose. Also check the shift mechanism. If you find a shift lever or remote control, take care to remove the cables and adjust the internal parts. The cables should be checked to see that the cables are adjusted properly.

If you do not plan to use the motor, give it a good check and tune it up now and after each fifty hours of use. If water is not

al chips are detected in the drain oil, have a qualified marine dealer inspect the motor. Retail with only the type of lubricant the manufacturer recommends.

At various fittings, should be inspected for proper adjustment and checked periodically throughout the season. If the motor is used in salt water, more frequent lubrication is necessary.

Never use fuel that has been left in the tank over the winter. Very possibly gum deposits have formed and using the fuel may cause the filter and carburetor to become clogged. If the tank was completely drained last fall, it may be necessary to scrub it out with acetone or lacquer thinner to remove gum deposits. If it is badly gummed, this is best done by a qualified dealer.

According to Smoak, top performance can be achieved only when the propeller is in good condition and properly matched to the boat and boat combination. A propeller with visible damage, whether it is bent, nicked or broken, should be repaired or replaced. And even if damage is not apparent, the propeller may be enough to reduce seriously affect the performance of the boat. A marine mechanic should check and true a propeller on a pitch block. While you are checking the prop — to

blocate the propeller shaft and check the drive pin for wear.

As a final step, give the motor a thorough visual inspection. Look for loose screws, nuts and bolts, as well as damaged parts. Pull the starter rope slowly to make sure the powerhead is not obstructed. When you are satisfied that everything is shipshape, replace the spark plugs. Proper spark plug torquing is important and since most people do not have a torque wrench readily available, the engineer offers this rule of thumb: Turn the plugs in until they are finger tight. Then, with a spark plug wrench, tighten them an additional three-quarters of a turn.

It doesn't take long to keep your outboard motor in shape.

## Hundreds Visit Lake For Weekend Picnics

Hundreds of West Texans go to Lake J. B. Thomas for weekends and picnics. These visitors make steady use of some 50 picnic and camping shelters which the lake officials have built at five choice locations along the lake shore.

R. A. Schoaling, superintendent at the lake, said additional picnic shelters will be built this winter. Constant improvements are being made in the areas where these shelters are now built and better roads and other facilities are being provided as rapidly as possible.

No charge is made for the use of the shelters. Overnight camping is permissible and many camp out in the areas each weekend. However, it was stressed that the camper must adhere to the strict rules on sanitation which apply at the lake.

And if the campers or picnickers want to fish, boat or otherwise enjoy themselves they must buy a recreation permit. The permits cost \$5 per person for a full year, and to the yearly permits, permits for one day can be purchased.

No firewood or drinking water is available at the picnic sites. The camper must hustle his own

fuel and bring his own water. Water from the lake should not be drunk.

The shelters are located near the lake shore and offer excellent bases of operation for weekend fishermen and boaters.

One cluster of shelters is located near Lake Thomas Lodge. Another is near Sportsman's Paradise on the south side and a third near Shady Grove on the upper end of the lake. There are two groups of picnic shelters on the north end of the lake. One is near Lem's Bait House and the other is at the north end of the dam.

Schoaling says there are a number of other excellent sites for additional shelters and that these are to be erected as rapidly as funds are available.

He pointed out that the entire recreational program at the lake is financed by the money paid in for recreation permits.

The assorted funds — including annual lease-fee on cabin sites — provide the lake with about \$60,000 annually.

Salaries for Schoaling and his staff of five full time employees is paid out of this money. The improvements made in picnic shelters, roads, boating docks and other facilities comes out of the remainder.

He pointed out the more use made of the recreational facilities and the more permits sold, the greater the assortment of additional facilities there will be provided.

## Texas Safety Rules Concern All Boaters

Texas' Water Safety Law concerns every person who owns a boat, whether the boat falls into the registering class or not.

The law gives the state a record of the ownership of the boat, and the size motor used, with identifying numbers on the craft for identification.

The fee for registering a boat with the state is:  
For boats under 16 feet, \$1;  
boats 16 to 26 feet, \$5; boats 26 feet to 40 feet, \$10; and boats 40 feet and over, \$12.50.

The license is good for three years.

When you sell your boat, or it is destroyed or abandoned, an owner is required to notify the Texas Highway Department and surrender the certificate number.

Each new owner of a boat must re-register the craft with the state agency.

The certificate must be kept with the owner or on the boat. A lost certificate can be replaced for \$1.

The safety provisions of the Water Safety Law are designed for the protection of the owner and boat passengers.

All boats 16 to 26 feet in length must have a white light aft, visible from all directions. Also bow lights, green on the starboard and red on the port side are required.

Every boat, regardless of the size or make, shall have aboard one Coast Guard approved life preserver, buoyant vest, ring buoy or buoyant cushion for each person aboard.

## Three Golf Courses Lure Linksters Outdoors Here

Probably no city of comparable size in the Southwest offers better golf facilities than Big Spring. Linksters make use of three courses here and two of the courses are 18 holes each.

The Municipal course, situated over rolling hills in spacious City Park, is one of the 18-hole layouts and its facilities are being taxed as never before.

The front nine of the 6,375-yard public course, which has a par 72, has a complete irrigation system. Naturally, it is the nine most used.

However, the back nine — measuring 3,126 yards — gets its share of play and proves quite a challenge to the weekend golfer because of its uneven terrain, deceptive greens and natural hazards like trees and bushes.

G. F. Shorty, Gordon has

served as manager of the Muni course for many years and has the layout playing better than at any time in its history.

The 18-hole Country Club course is the scene of the annual Big Spring Invitational tournament, timed to end on Labor Day, each year. A total of 325 players entered last year's tournament here, as many that part of the early rounds in the lower flights had to be played at the Muni course.

The meet was won by a Baylor student from Odessa who is studying to be a lawyer, Raymond Stoker. The winner was determined through medal play — in the past the meet has always resorted to match play to decide its champion.

The Country Club, of course, also hosts the annual Fourth of July tournament, open to club

members only, at least one program and such other meets as partnership and ringer tournaments.

From the long tees, the Country Club layout measures 6,940 feet. The longest hole from tee to green extends 558 yards, the shortest 189 yards.

Par is 35-36-71.

The Country Club pro is popular Jerry Green, who is assisted by his brother, Wendy.

The course has an irrigation system and workmen have fought a hard battle this summer trying to keep the grass on the fairways alive. The drought has complicated matters for the course and its personnel.

One of the prettiest courses in all of West Texas is located at Webb AFB. The layout has only nine greens but it plays as an 18-

hole course because of the location of its tee boxes.

The Webb layout is irrigated and is regarded by all who see it as a thing of beauty.

Its length varies from 6,650 to 7,000 yards, dependent upon which tees are used.

Water traps were recently added to the third, sixth and ninth fairways, which naturally complicates the linksters' problems.

Because of the heavy demand on its facilities, only military personnel and civilians working at the base are allowed to use the course.

Reservations are now being accepted by the club pro, W. O. Maxwell Jr., on weekends because of the heavy run of players.

A new shelter and rest room recently was constructed near the three-way tee on the course, Nos. 2, 4 and 7, for the convenience of the players. The course also has an excellent clubhouse.

South of the "spring" there is another section which has been eroded by water which has passed over it for thousands of years and fossils are available by the handful. It is often frequented by persons out for a scenic stroll where the earth and its exposed formations are of chief interest.

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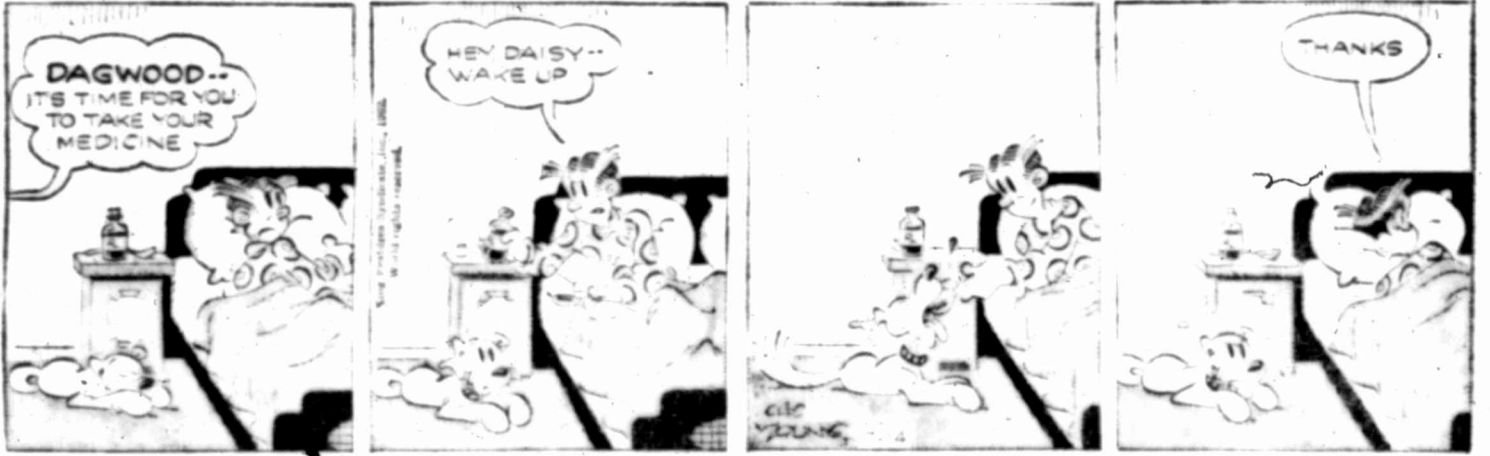
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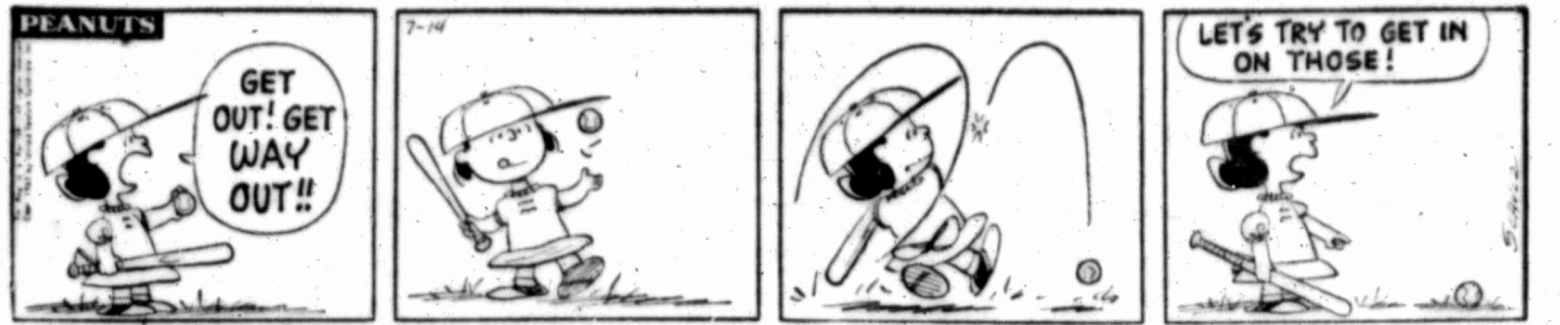
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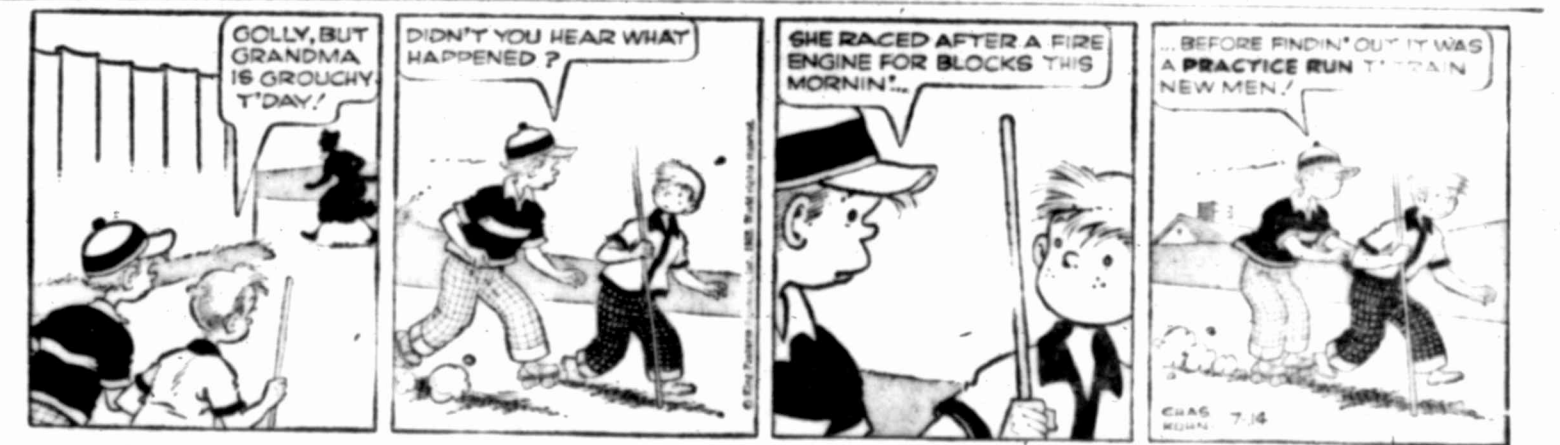

## Compere To Visit Realtors Here Tuesday

## Delinquency Is Spotlited

If present trends continue in the United States and Canada as many as five million youths will be brought before courts in the next 10 years. One third will be repeat offenders.

Each year about two million youngsters commit known acts of juvenile delinquency. About one fourth of these get to court.

These two statements help put into perspective the problem facing society in dealing with youths deviating from normal social patterns.

The YMCA has secured a supply of a pamphlet entitled "JD"—what it means to you and your family, what you can do about it. These are available for the asking, said Francis Flint, general secretary of the Y.

Done concisely, the pamphlet seeks to answer tersely such questions about the seriousness of trends in juvenile delinquency as: more pervasiveness in big cities or small towns; what are the most likely years of delinquency; whether poverty or riches determine delinquency; adult attitudes toward delinquency, etc.

This brief paper offers seven suggestions to parents for helping prevent juvenile delinquency. They are: know where your children are at all times; meet their companions; know what they are doing; make sure they keep regular and reasonable hours; know about their finances; make it clear to parents and school authorities that the parents' full support, use firm but fair discipline at all times.

One final tip: encourage youngsters to keep busy at all times.
