AT A TIME WHEN virtually everyone in our immediate area is finding it tough to make a living, and many would be pleased to come out "in the black" at the end of the year, it becomes hard to drum up much sympathy for the striking members of the National Football League.

We don't blame anyone for wanting to make as much money as they possibly can, and particularly to get their pay scale up to the point that they feel they are being paid "what they are worth," but the idea of a strike which could ruin most people's favorite pasttime, goes against the

In the first place, one needs to be reminded that in many cases union demands, and hard-nosed approaches are many times the reasons for certain industries to just close up shop and cease to exist.

The union has been inbedded into the auto industry for a number of years, and while you can't lay the woes of this industry completely at the union's feet, there are no doubt many arguments for the fact that the unions have not helped the plight faced in Detroit and many other industrial cities.

We don't see how the players can expect to have their salaries escalated to the point that every player is in the super-salary bracket.

Professional football is bound to be like every other business today, beset by high prices and inflation on every hand, and there must be a limit as to what they can pay out in salaries. The owners deserve to be able to make this determination, and to deal with each player on an individual basis, according to that player's ability.

It will be interesting to see what develops, in the event that the strike is representatives of the players and the owners prior to this weekend's schedule (which begins on Thursday,

At least some of the owners feel that they are in the business to provide football for the fans who shell out their hard-earned money to see the professional games, and that even if they have to hire some guys working in parking lots, or bring up all the rookies who had been cut from training camps, they should play the scheduled games.

This point is undoubtedly one that may not find agreement by every team in the league, but it might cause the striking players to call off their treasure hunt, or at least settle at a more reasonable level, if they see some rinky-dink taking their place on Sunday (and especially if the substitute should happen to stand

Somehow, it's hard to visualize the Dallas Cowboys taking the field with a lineup which would not include the likes of Danny White, Tony Dorsett, Drew Pearson and company.

But on the other hand, the owners have an investment and an obligation to fulfill. As Lamar Hunt, Dallas owner of the Kansas City Chiefs said "There's bound to be a number of players out there who want to play and will if offered the opportunity."

Hunt knows his business. In fact, if it were not for Hunt, there would be no Dallas Cowboys team, no Oakland Raiders, San Diego, Denver, Kansas City, New York Jets, and several others. He helped start the American Football League in 1960. (Yes, we know the Cowboys weren't in the AFL--but the NFL finally agreed to a team in Dallas, just to

oppose Hunt's venture.) Which brings up another point. The players would like to have 55 per cent of the teams' gross receipts. Where were the players when the teams were being formed? It was the owner, or owner groups, who risked their money, and took out giant loans at variable interest, or passed bond issues, to get multi-million dollar stadiums built, to house the superstuds.

Pro football has been practically a golden idol in our country, maybe even the goose that each week lays golden eggs. The players need to take care that they don't kill the goose.

Roger Fields Is **Contest Winner**

Roger Fields was the winner in the third week's competition in the Friona Star's football contest, which turned out to be the toughest yet, if scores are any indication.

The week's slate included the first tie game of the season, the Clemson-Boston College game, giving every contestant an automatic miss, since it is technically possible (though rare) to pick a tie.

Fields' other misses included Dumas over Dalhart; Rice over Tulane; Air Force over Tech; Rams over Detroit; and 49ers over Denver.

Mears' misses included Michigan over Notre Dame; San Diego over Kansas City; Chicago over New Orleans; Rams over Detroit and 49ers over Denver

Seright missed Muleshoe over Floydada; Lazbuddie over Sundown; Cleveland over Philadelphia; Chicago over New Orleans and Rams over Detroit. Of the contestants picking 15 or 16, Melton was the only one to correctly pick all eight of the professional games.

In the race for grand prize, Seright's 16 gave him first place for the week with a score of 47.

Mears' 16 elevated him into a second-place tie with Eddie Mann with a score of 45.

Johnson's 15 enabled him to forge a four-way tie for third with Martha Clements, David George and David Hough, all with 44 points.

And Fields' winning 16 moved him up a few notches, into a tie with Troy Bass, Leroy Berend, Ron Cain of Corpus Christi, Jack Clark, Brent Gatlin, David Gowens, Billie Manuel and Mike Maynard with scores of 43.

If the pro games are not played this weekend, they will not be considered in the current week's slate of games. The professional games are also being omitted for the slate of games for the weekend of September 30, October 1-

David Barnett is to serve as general chairman of the show. Those wishing to enter are asked to call 247-2784. An entry fee of \$15 per head will be charged, and should be mailed to Parmer County Prospect Show, 421 Euclid Avenue, Friona, 79035.

The show is limited to showmen living in Parmer County. Juding the show will be Ike Trimble, vocational agriculture instructor at Dumas.

Randy Vogel of Hereford, a college student who exhibited the Grand Champion Steer at Houston in 1981, will put on a showmanship exhibition during the show, for the benefit of the young showmen.

All steers and heifers must be checked in by 10 a.m., with the show to begin at 3 Saturday afternoon.

"We have collected a number of

donations from local merchants to help with the expenses of the show, and we appreciate their help very much," said a spokesman for the

The prize money will depend upon the number of entries. Organizers are expecting from 40 to 50 animals in the entire show.

Reason for holding the show is to give these showmen an extra opportunity to show their animals. "Once is just not enough practice for this size animal," said one of the organizers.

This type of show has been held in other communities, so it was decided to try one on the local level, to see what the results will be.

4 Arrested In Burglary

The arrest of four young Friona men last Saturday has apparently cleared up recent burglaries, in which over \$3,000 worth of radio and electronic equipment was taken.

Arrested were Jesse Nava, 19, Valentine Castillo, 17, Luis Ruiz, 19 and Richard Dimas, 17. The four were charged with burglary after the Friona Police Department found over \$3,000 in stolen merchandise in the attic at the home of Nava, 409 Cleveland.

Included in the haul was approximately \$1800 in goods which had been reported as stolen from Dodson Body Shop on September 16. The items included a radio-stereo, five CB radios, two large speakers and other items. Dodson also reported that burglars took \$300 in cash from the shop.

Some \$1500 in merchandise had been allegedly stolen from Ag-Chem Farm Services about two weeks earlier. This included two two-way radios, some CBs and a sprayer monitor

The foursome was arraigned before Justice of the Peace Blackie Smith this week at Farwell. Smith set bond at \$5,000 for each one. They were bound over to action by the Parmer County Grand Jury.

Assistant Chief Rex Williams said the entire Friona Police Department was involved in the case. "We ran some investigations and did some checking, and it paid off," he said.

Williams said the department had some leads on other burglaries which are currently under investigation.

School Gives '83 Budget, Tax Rate

The board of trustees of Friona Independent School District has adopted its budget for the 1982-83 school year, and adopted a tax rate calling for an increase of ten cents per \$100 evaluation.

The school taxes will go from 87 cents per \$100 evaluation in 1982, to 97 cents per \$100 evaluation in 1983. This is an increase of 11.49 per cent in the tax rate, although property values may also have been adjusted in some cases by the Parmer County Tax Appraisal Board.

budget for 1983 calling for expenditures of \$3,281,757. This compares to a budget of \$3,077,648 a year earlier, or a 6.3 per cent increase in expenditures.

Superintendent Tom Jarboe said that while the school's food service is now a budgeted item, it is omitted from the 1983 budget figures so that an equitable comparison can be

Due to the fact that feedlot cattle and farm machinery have been exempt for ad valorem tax purposes beginning in 1983, the school district lost approximately \$13.5 million in tax evaluations from those sectors of the economy. But on the other hand, Jarboe

points out that values for the school district are 3 to 4 million more for 1983 than they were for 1982, so the increased evaluation almost washed out the taxes lost to new exemptions.

"We would not have had to raise taxes, if we had had the same tax base as we ordinarily would have had," Jarboe said.

The original budget presented for consideration of the board was trimmed considerably, and includes basically a "maintenance" situation for 1983. The main capital outlay item is one new school bus, which will cost between \$22,000 and \$23,000. It is the first time in three or four years for a new bus to be purchased by the district.

"I feel we have a very conservative school board, and they are doing everything in their power to hold down taxes and overall expenses," Jarboe concluded.

50 YEARS AGO-SEPT. 30, 1932

T.J. Crawford has been designated by Wilbur C. Hawk, president of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, to serve as Governor R.S. Sterling's representative in the preparation and submission of Parmer County's application for funds out of the \$300,000,000 provided by the Federal Emergency Relief and Construction

Act of 1932. The district school tax assessorcollector has been instructed by the board of trustees that another cut of ten per cent in the valuation of property within the district has been made, which will make quite an appreciable reduction in the current taxes.

40 YEARS AGO--OCTOBER 2, 1942 Full mobilization of manpower on the small farms of Parmer County for increased food production is needed to win the war, Earl L. Fine, rural rehabilitation supervisor for the Farm Security Administration, believes. "Unless our small farm operators can produce greater quantities of food," said Mr. Fine, "our country will be compelled to ration almost all foods and there is no assurance that we can maintain nutrition needs of our civilians.

Looking ahead to agricultural wartime production for 1943, the Texas USDA War Board already is conducting a survey on transportation facilities for farm labor.





rate has risen 131%. He has done nothing to attack crime in a substantial way. In fact, he has fought stronger anti-crime measures. He openly opposed the new wiretapping law de signed to catch drug dealers. He openly opposed the Governor's anti-crime package by putting it in a legislative com-mittee run by a hostile Senator. who promptly bottled it up. Much of the package passed anyway and now Mr. Hobby has the gall to go around the state taking credit for it!

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

Friona Defeats Shallowater In Thrilling Defensive Bout

The Friona Chieftains edged the four state-ranked Shallowater Mustangs, 7-3 last Friday night in one of the most exciting games played at Chieftain Field in many a year.

In a game dominated by the defensive teams of the two schools, it became one of breaks in the latter stages, and the Chiefs were the recipients of one on each end of the

But a pair of goal-line stands, one just before halftime and one at the end of the game by the Chieftains will stand out as highlights of the game to the fans. In both cases, the red-clad Friona team flatly refused to allow their goal-line to be crossed.

Both teams were able to move the ball fairly well between the 20 yard lines, but when it got down in the vital territory, the going became considerably tougher. And it took a dipsy-doodle play by Friona to register the game's only touchdown.

Trailing 3-0 after a third quarter field goal, Friona was facing a fourth down situation from the Shallowater 20. Bruce Patterson faded to pass and lofted the ball in the direction of Mike Neill

A Shallowater defender hit the ball, knocking it right into the waiting arms of Max Perea, the other Chieftain receiver on the play, and he cradled the ball and ran it into the end zone for the winning touchdown.

But that play was preceded and followed by a lot of exciting football.

Friona held the highly-rated Mustangs to one first down on their first possession and took the ball following a punt. The Chiefs picked up two first downs, one on a 28 yard

But Shallowater proved they could play defense, forcing a fumble at this point, to stop the Friona scoring bid.

The next time Friona had the ball, Perea ripped off a 14-yard gain, and Charlie Morgan followed with a 17yarder, to advance to the Mustang 29. But Alfredo Mata, straining for an extra yard, had the ball knocked out of his grasp, and Friona again lost

The weather became a factor midway through the opening period. Friona had chosen to defend the south goal, taking a slight south breeze, when a 40 mile-per-hour wind, carrying a cold front through the area hit.

This affected punts and passes somewhat the rest of the game. It almost cost Friona dearly near the end of the opening half, when the ball was centered over punter Mark Montoya's head, and Shallowater recovered at the Friona five.

This set the stage for goal-line stand number one for the Chieftains. Two passes were incomplete during the series, which came in the last minute before halftime. On second down, speedy halfback Kevin Taylor was stopped for a three-yard loss, and on fourth down, quarterback Rod Burgett was smothered behind the line of scrimmage.

That defensive gem allowed the game to remain a scoreless tie at

Fumblitis continued to plague the Chieftains to start the second half, as Friona lost the ball at their 27 on the second play from scrimmage. Again the defense responded, though, and Shallowater, facing fourth and goal from the nine, decided to go for a field goal.

One kick was good, but offsetting penalties caused the play to go over. The second kick looked like a dying quail in a hailstorm, but managed to wobble over the goal-post by about a foot and a half, giving Shallowater

the first points and a 3-0 lead with 9:34 to play in the third quarter.

Friona came back with a vengeance. Morgan got around right end and appeared headed for a 64yard touchdown romp. But the Mustangs found a speedy back to run Charlie down at the Shallowater 22, after a 42-yard gain.

And then, disaster struck the Chieftain cause once again. On second down, from the Shallowater 18, Patterson was rushed on a pass play, and his floating pass was intercepted at the enemy six yard line.

Friona held and forced a punt, and the Mustangs got a break from the high wind, as the ball bounced and rolled 66 yards to the Chieftain 25, getting the visitors out of the hole.

A few minutes later, with the teams shifted for the fourth quarter, Mark Montoya returned the favor with a punt that bounced out of bounds at the Shallowater seven. That great punt set up Friona's winning score.

The Chieftains held and forced the Mustangs to punt from their own 17. This time, with the ball going into the wind, the kick netted only 20 yards.

Patterson gave the team a first down with an option keeper to the Shallowater 27. From there, three plays gained only six yards, and set up the play of the game for Friona.

That's when Patterson's pass was tipped to Perea for the TD. Montoya's kick gave Friona the lead at 7-3, with 5:53 left in the game.

"We've told everyone that we had been working on that tipped pass play all week," said Chieftain head coach Tommy Moss, who quickly remembered that a similar play that went against the Chieftains was the difference in the team's loss to Muleshoe last year.

But the touchdown didn't settle things--not by a long shot.

Shallowater threw a scare by moving 65 yards in only seven plays. Passes accounted for most of the yardage as the Mustangs moved quickly to the Friona 15, with just over three minutes to play.

Taylor then gave his team a first and goal with ten yards in two tries, and the Chieftain defense was again challenged as Shallowater had a first and goal from the Friona five.

Taylor was stopped for no gain on first down. Burgett was caught for a yard loss, and then the Mustangs gained to the Friona 11/2 yard line, facing fourth down.

Shallowater called a pass play. Burgett lofted one that was caught by one of his receivers and Friona fans held their breath. Then, officials following the play signaled that the receiver was out of the end zone. The Chieftains had kept the Mustangs from scoring for a second time after they had a first and goal at the Friona five.

After a pair of 15-yard unsportsmanlike conduct penalties against Shallowater, the Chieftains were able to run out the clock and preserve the win.

"It was a great win. We should have scored more points, but we kept stopping ourselves on the fumbles. We thought Mike Neill, Carl Jackson, Juan Sammarron and Max Perea stood out in the great defensive effort," Coach Moss said.




