## Loyalist Plans Resistance Unit In Algeria

**ALGIERS (AP)** — Belkacem Krim returned to Algiers today from his Berber stronghold in the Kabylie Mountains and announced he is forming a committee to defend the revolution against the power play of Ahmed Ben Bella.

Both are deputy premiers in the paralyzed provisional government of moderate Premier Ben Youssef Ben Khedda with Ben Bella in militant opposition to that regime and Krim in vigorous support.

We are not thinking of civil war, Krim told newsmen as troops nominally loyal to Ben Khedda labored to perfect defenses on the outskirts of the capital. "We are thinking of defense and unity."

**DICTATORSHIP**  
 Followers of Ben Bella, a radical already claiming control of western Algeria and some points in the east were reported preparing to try to take over Algiers and impose their authority on the newly independent nation.

Former Deputy Premier Mohammed Khider is due in Algiers today from Ben Bella's headquarters in Oran, the chief city of western Algeria, as the vanguard of the National Liberation Front's seven-man Political Bureau.

This is a Ben Bella-dominated group which plans to take control of the government Khider said the other members will head in later.

After 48 hours of work among his Berber followers, Krim pulled up in front of the Aletti Hotel here in a black limousine. He was escorted by two bodyguards in camouflage uniforms.

Krim said he intended to discuss with Ben Khedda the formation of a defense committee. Though he offered no elaboration of the plan, the fact he would consult the premier indicated he was not planning to set up another rival regime in Algeria already divided by tribal and personality clashes.

**NO ONE ALLOWED**  
 In any case, Krim told newsmen Zone 3 will not let anybody penetrate its territory.

Zone 3 covers a vast mountain region east of Algiers. It is Krim's native area and is solidly opposed to Ben Bella and his followers.

Ben Khedda was almost alone in the government building in Algiers, but he appeared calm. He and his arms minister, Abdelhafid Boussouf, expressed confidence that "everything will be arranged." Boussouf left Algiers briefly Thursday, possibly on a peacekeeping mission, and on his return declared, "The crisis will soon be over."

## Third Failure Casts Doubt On Test Series

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — A third failure to explode a U.S. nuclear device high over the Pacific has raised the question whether the test series will be brought to a halt.

The fizzle Wednesday night at Johnston Island led Thursday to an hours-long conference of Defense Department and Atomic Energy Commission officials.

The subjects discussed and any agreements that may have been reached were kept secret. But, clearly, the United States is in the process of deciding what nuclear step to take next.

An official said later he doubted the meeting was held to decide whether to end the test series. But, he also said: "Any decision to halt the series would have to come from the White House. President Kennedy has been watching this series very closely."

In any event, it will take weeks before another test could be conducted at Johnston Island. The destruction of a Thor missile on the island's only launch pad Wednesday night caused damage that a broadcast from Johnston Island would take at least four weeks to repair. Officials here declined comment on the damage.

## Satellite Bill Is Blocked

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — Democratic liberals lighting the administration's communications satellite bill appeared today to have Senate leaders in a parliamentary corner.

With opponents uncorking filibuster tactics usually associated with Southern stands against civil rights measures, the Senate was called into session two hours earlier than usual.

A stretch-out of Senate sessions was the chief countermove in sight at the moment, although Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield of Montana said he had no plans for round-the-clock sessions.

The bill, on a list of measures President Kennedy wants Congress to pass before adjournment, would create a private, government-regulated corporation to own and operate the U.S. portion of a global space communications network.

Half of the corporation's stock would be sold to the general public and half to communications companies like the American Telephone & Telegraph Co. Three of the 15 directors would be appointed by the President.

Sen. Wayne Morse, D-Ore., who has joined Sen. Estes, Kefauver, D-Tenn., and other liberal Democrats in sponsoring a government ownership bill, initiated maneuvers Thursday to block action.

By offering amendments to the journal of the previous day's proceedings and other devices, he kept the satellite bill from being made the pending business before the Senate quit for the day to attend the funeral for Sen. Henry C. Dworshak, R-Idaho, who died Monday night.

Agreement was reached that the parliamentary situation at the start of today's session would pick up just where it was broken off.

Morse said he and others associated with him were fighting to prevent a vote on the bill, unless passed by the House, until after the November elections.

"We ought to take this issue to the people for final judgment before we have a final vote in the Senate," he declared.

When Thursday's session started, Morse forced a reading of the previous day's journal by objecting to the customary unanimous consent request to dispense with this formality.

Then when Mansfield moved to take up the bill, after a time-consuming quorum call, Morse raised a point of order that senators had not had an opportunity to offer amendments to the journal.

Sen. Lee Metcalf, D-Mont., who was presiding, sustained Morse's point over Mansfield's protest. Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen of Illinois, siding with Mansfield, appealed the chair's ruling.

Such an appeal is decided by majority vote but it also is subject to debate and Morse still was debating it when the Senate quit.

**JFK Lends Eyes**  
 WASHINGTON (AP)—Twenty-four blind students from Los Angeles got a description of the White House grounds and nearby monuments from President Kennedy today.

The companies were fined a total of \$1,926,000 and seven individuals were sentenced to 30 days in jail.

"After carefully analyzing government purchases and after extensive negotiations," Kennedy said, "we and TVA believe the lump sum figure of \$747 million from General Electric represents an equitable settlement for the United States."

The settlement is intended to cover excessive payments made by the government and TVA to General Electric as a result of purchases during the period of the conspiracy.

**WILSON PREDICTS BIG DIGGINGS**  
**Testimony Hints Estes Buried Treasure In Grave**  
**AMARILLO (AP)**—Texas Atty Gen Will Wilson said "the biggest digging Texas ever had" is about to start after an associate of Billie Sol Estes speculated that the promoter may have hidden millions in cash in a pauper's grave.

Wilson made the statement in a telephone interview with the Amarillo Globe-News and added, "It's my judgment that Estes has a lot of money stashed somewhere."

The testimony about a pauper's grave came from Harold F. Orr yesterday at a Texas court of inquiry under way here.

Orr said Estes' enterprises received about \$3.5 million that can't be accounted for.

Today Orr told of an all-night session when he and another associate, Ruel Alexander, wrote a complete new cash book for Superior Manufacturing Co. of Amarillo of which both were officials.

After writing the book, Orr said he and Alexander tried to make the book appear old and used.

"We'd walk on it and throw it against the wall to make it look old," testified Orr.

Orr said their faking of the book was so good that an auditor from a lending company audited it and it checked perfectly.

Superior Manufacturing made fertilizer tanks for Estes. Federal officials charge Estes and others obtained about \$22 million by selling mortgage papers to loan companies secured by fertilizer tanks most of which do not exist.

Orr, 31, blonde and running to obesity, testified in a calm, matter-of-fact voice, outwardly unconcerned about the nature of his statements.

Orr, Alexander and Harold McSpadden pleaded guilty to federal fraud charges in indictments which also named Estes. Estes pleaded innocent.

Orr testified several finance companies and some Commercial Solvents personnel knew Estes was dealing in fictitious paper on non-existent fertilizer tanks.

One company he named on this point was Pacific Finance Corp. of Los Angeles and two of its employees, George Harkavey and Stan Krikac, he said Harkavey and Krikac told him they knew about the bogus paper.

Orr said they made such a statement to him and others Feb. 17, 1961, when he and Alexander conferred all day in an Amarillo motel with the Pacific Finance men.

The occasion for the meeting was that the loan company men were demanding that Orr and Alexander sign personal guarantees backing the paper which had

## Studies Begin On Test Ban

How Far Does U.S. Scale Down Its Demands?

**WASHINGTON (AP)**—President Kennedy conferred with his top disarmament advisers today on how far to scale down the U.S. demands for safeguards against cheating in a nuclear test ban treaty with the Soviet Union.

Secretary of State Dean Rusk, Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara and other Cabinet-level advisers were reportedly recommending to Kennedy that the amount of inspection which the U.S.S.R. would have to agree to should be reduced substantially.

There was disagreement among the policymakers, however, about whether the demand for permanent, internationally manned control posts on Soviet territory could be abandoned.

Informants said that the majority opinion in a meeting Thursday of policymakers at the State Department was against dropping the control post requirement at this time, although some presiden-

tial advisers reportedly favored such action.

It was also reported that the President's advisers agreed that inspection arrangements at this stage should include both the guaranteed right of on-site inspections in various parts of the Soviet Union where secret atomic tests might be held and internationally manned control posts on Soviet territory.

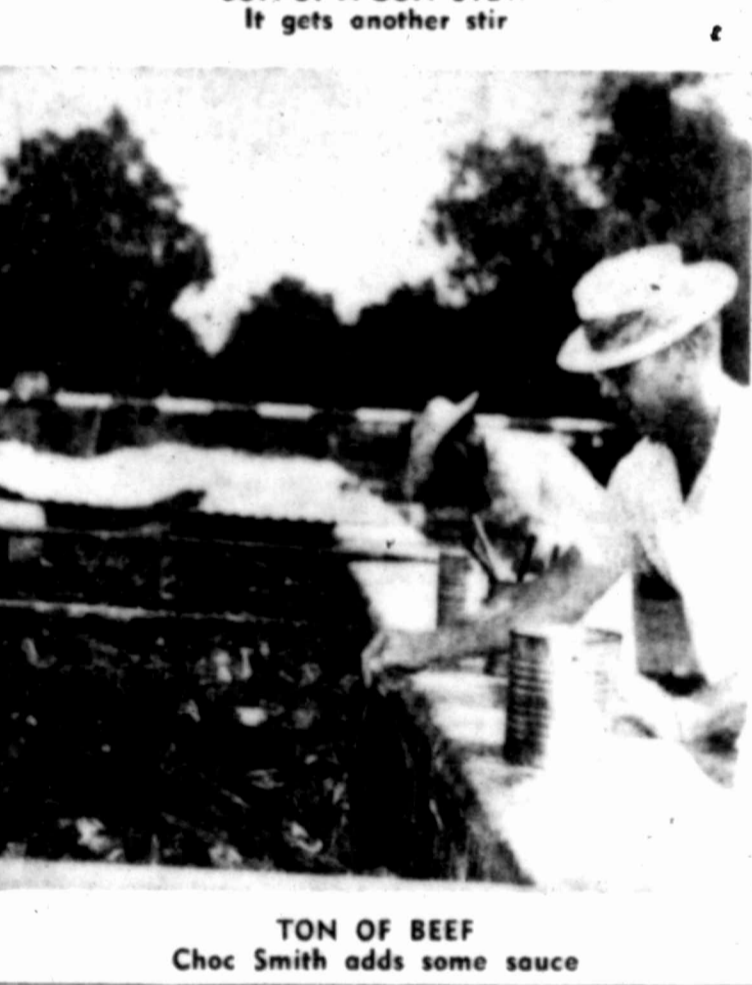
The administration's obvious hope—however slender it may be—is that the new U.S. safeguard proposals to be made shortly at the disarmament conference at Geneva, will interest the Soviet government in entering into serious negotiations once again for a ban on the testing of nuclear weapons.

But since such a development is regarded as highly unlikely at the present stage of the arms race, the alternative aim is to demonstrate this country's interest in obtaining a test ban, even at the cost of what would appear

to be new concessions to Soviet opposition to inspection.

Wide differences of opinion within the administration were reported on just how far the United States should go in its new proposals. Some members of Kennedy's White House staff were said to favor eliminating the demand for internationally staffed control posts on Soviet territory and to rely instead on more distant scientific installations to detect any sneak atomic explosions once the ban was in effect. However, informants said this view was not supported at Thursday's meeting of the policy advisers and thus would not constitute one of the recommendations to the President.

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — The White House announced today the temporary recall of the U.S. representative at the Geneva disarmament conference, Arthur H. Dean, to consult on new scientific data on detecting atomic tests.

## GE Settles Damage Suits

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — General Electric Co. has agreed to pay a record \$747 million to settle damage suits that followed conviction of the company in a price-fixing case, the Justice Department announced today.

The settlement applies only to damage suits brought by the federal government.

Atty Gen Robert F. Kennedy said the settlement includes payment of \$647 million to the Tennessee Valley Authority in damages for inflated prices paid to GE as a result of the price-fixing conspiracy.

Another million will go to the government for purchases from General Electric by other government agencies, Kennedy said.

Justice Department officials said the previous record settlement in a case of this type was \$44,000 from the Ward Baking Co. last May.

General Electric was one of 19 defendants in 11 civil damage

## W. G. Wilson Dies At Marshall

**W. G. Wilson**, long-time employee of Texas and Pacific Railroad here, died at 8 a.m. today in the T & P Employees Hospital at Marshall, Tex. Funeral services are set at 4 p.m. Saturday at Texarkana, and he will be buried in a Texarkana cemetery.

Mr. Wilson was born in Texarkana and went to work with T & P in 1915. In October, 1961, he was appointed storekeeper here.

He was an Elder in the local Presbyterian church and was a member of the Texarkana Masonic Lodge No. 341, as well as a member of the Brotherhood of Railway Clerks No. 465.

Survivors include his widow and one son, Billy Wilson, both of Big Spring.

## Stock Market Moves Higher

**NEW YORK (AP)**—Savings and loan holding companies spurred on favorable news and the stock market moved irregularly higher late this afternoon in dull trading.

Volume for the day was estimated at 2.6 billion shares, compared with 2.79 billion Thursday.

Movements of key stocks were fractional but a scattering was considerably wider.

## Annexation Case Nears Jury Stage

A district court jury will begin deliberating late today the verdict in the annexation case brought by the Gay Hill Center Point schools against the Howard County School board.

The decision of the defendant to rest its case after presenting only one witness came as a surprise to the plaintiff and brought the hearing which continued all week in 11th District Court suddenly near to its climax.

Judge Ralph Caton excused the jury at 11 a.m. with instructions to report to court again at 2 p.m. He and the attorneys for the litigants devoted the interval to preparation of the charge.

**CHARGE, ARGUMENTS**  
 The court told the jurors the charge will be read at 2 p.m. and that argument by the attorneys in the case will follow.

Attorneys indicated they would want at least an hour to the suff for argument. Prospects were that the jury will get the case sometime around 5 p.m.

The nine women and three men in the box will then decide whether the action of the Howard County School board in annexing the two districts to Big Spring district was a valid and legal action.

Only witness used by the defendant county school board was Sam Anderson, superintendent of the Big Spring city schools, who told the court that he had 30 years' experience as an educator and school administrator.

**FORMER TRUSTEE**

## MAYBE THE OLD FLYING DUTCHMAN HAS REAPPEARED

**PORTLAND (AP)**—An old sea story of a ghost ship flew along a waterfront today following the departure of the German freighter Carl Fritzen.

The master of the ship ill and despondent, hanged himself in his cabin at San Pedro Calif. 10 days ago.

The steward found him. Two days later the steward suffered a heart attack and had to be relieved.

Then the chief engineer died.

The chief mate had to be relieved of his duties. No reason was given.

The boatswain suffered a heart attack.

A new master and chief engineer were flown from Germany, and the steamship sailed for Portland to load a cargo of grain at Astoria, where the ship entered the Columbia River to head for Portland, the second officer had to be relieved of his duties. As was the case of the chief mate, there was no explanation.

By that time a new chief mate had arrived from Germany. He joined the ship at Astoria and made the journey 100 miles upstream to Portland.

But Portland turned out to be the wrong port. The mistake was not explained but the ship was told to turn around and sail for Seattle, where the ship's 11,000-ton load of grain was waiting.

So the Carl Fritzen headed back out of Portland Thursday night.

The new officers professed to be undisturbed by it all. They did not discuss a jinx.

## Fallout Shelter Program Stymied

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — A presidential request for \$68,755,000 to start an extensive fallout shelter construction program drew a "no" today from the House Appropriations Committee.

In a report accompanying an \$11,501,141,000 appropriation bill, the committee said it believes that before the nation embarks on a program that would cost billions of dollars, more study and research should be applied to the vast and complex problems involved.

### Young People Conduct Summer Missionary Work

### Rail Strike Is Threatened On Work Rules

CHICAGO AP—A strike has been threatened by the 200,000 union men who man the nation's trains in an attempt to keep railroads from revamping work rules which would eliminate thousands of jobs. In a suit filed Thursday in U.S. District Court, the unions stated their intent to strike unless the railroads drop plans to enforce the work changes Aug. 17. The suit, filed by unions of engineers, trainmen, conductors, brakemen, firemen and switchmen, requests the court to declare the carriers' proposed changes a violation of the Railway Labor Act.

**INJUNCTION**  
The suit also applied for a permanent injunction to keep the railroads from adopting new rules recommended in February by a presidential commission. The suit stated the unions "will be forced to resist said revisions by asking those they represent to withdraw from service until they have proposed the changes. The work rules changes the railroads contend are aimed at eliminating what they call "featherbedding"—keeping on the payroll personnel whose jobs are unnecessary. The unions say the jobs are needed for safe and efficient operation.

One of the first effects of the changes—announced July 17 by the railroads—would be dropping of the jobs of 13,000 firemen employed on diesel locomotives. Some 27,000 other firemen working as second men in cabs and freight yard service would retain their positions. The proposed job cuts also do not affect firemen occupying second cab posts in diesel used in passenger service. In taking the preventive action, the unions were compelled to oppose favorable terms of the work changes. These included recommended pay increases for some 75 per cent of the operating employees.

**JOINED IN ACTION**  
Unions joined in the legal action are the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Engineers, Order of Railway Conductors and Brakemen, Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen and Switchmen's Union of North America.

# Big Question: Should All Businessmen Be Republicans?

NEW YORK (AP)—Some thoughtful friends of the business-man-in-politics movement recall from the notion that businessmen all should cluster under the banner of the Republican party. Similarly they feel it is unhealthy for labor unions unduly to dominate the Democratic party. "It would be a great mistake if the Republican party should ever become the party of business and the Democratic party, the party of labor," said James C. Worthy in his book, *Big Business and Free Men*, published in 1959. Worthy, then a vice president of Sears Roebuck & Co., said each party if so dominated, would tend to take extreme positions, and moderating influences within each would be beaten down.

**FRESH DEBATE**  
The whole question of the businessman-in-politics is being freshly debated since the showdown fight between big steel and the government last April and the urging of such leading Republicans as former President Dwight D. Eisenhower that businessmen employ, George Kuhn, is mayor of suburban Berkeley. He is deeply involved in a fight against the city of Detroit's new income tax, as head of a committee of suburban mayors.

**JUST WAITING**  
"I'm just waiting for somebody to call me up and object," Reid said. "Under our policy, what ne-

either major party to be the party of any segment of the economy or our society." Within the business community there are many divergent views of what—if anything—business should do on political, economic and social questions.

**FIELD NARROWED**  
Thus, in taking positions as a corporation on political issues, Ford has limited itself to questions directly affecting business operations, shielded away from those like medical care for the aged and federal aid to education. "It's not ours, it's the people's matter," Reid said of medical care. "We realize it would cost a good deal more in Social Security taxes. We talked about it a long while and decided against taking a position."

**PULLED OUT**  
Democratic Gov. John B. Swainson, beneficiary of Scholle's support in the 1960 election and for re-election this year, dissociated himself from the attack. Political organization leaders in several states have endorsed the fund-raising effort, including Neil Staebler, a Democratic national committeeman from Michigan. **NO RIGHT**  
Farley, the Coca-Cola Export Co. chairman, says an executive has no right to try to force his political thinking on employees. And when a business man first goes into politics, Farley says he must drop his accustomed role as chief. He also must adjust his thinking otherwise. "In business, a decision can be made, and you have the satisfaction of seeing it implemented. In politics, all is compromise. The doctrine that 'half a loaf is better than none' is fundamental," he said in an interview.

### Weather Fair In Most Areas

Fair weather for the most part dominated the country's weather map Friday. ## GOP Strategy To Center On Slow Economy

WASHINGTON (AP)—Republicans have come up with the theory that if they can hang the blame for a sluggish economy on President Kennedy the voters will take it out on Democratic congressional candidates.

This theory is based—as Sen. Barry Goldwater, R-Ariz., put it in a National Press Club speech Thursday—on the belief that “the sins of the President will be visited on the Congress.”

For Goldwater, who heads the Republican Senatorial Campaign Committee, Kennedy’s “sins” include the sending of “far-fetched and ridiculous” proposals to Congress, “indecision and uncertainty” over what to do about the economy and loss of confidence among purchasers and investors.

To this Sen. Clifford P. Case, R-N.J., added the indictment on a CBS radio program that Kennedy is failing in his leadership of Congress, particularly with respect to recommending a tax cut Case said would spur the economy.

The administration has not given the leadership in this field that it should,” Case said. “There are indications the President has been persuaded that a tax cut is necessary but he is reported wondering if it would be passed by Congress. This reflects a lack of confidence in his own ability to lead Congress.”

Goldwater, a spokesman for GOP conservatives, disagreed with Case, who labels himself a liberal, on whether a tax reduction would benefit the economy. Goldwater said it would.

But the two Republicans demonstrated a rare political togetherness in blaming Kennedy for most of the country’s domestic ills. They have referred repeatedly to his Senate Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen of Illinois and House Republican Leader Charles A. Halleck of Indiana—to the contention of former President Dwight D. Eisenhower that the Kennedy administration is “founded on domestic matters.”

In taking their stand the Republicans apparently are discounting national polls which indicate Kennedy’s popularity remains at a high level.

Their belief is that Kennedy won’t be able to transfer this popularity to Democratic candidates in a year in which he is not running.

## AF Worried Missile Failures Hurt Image

WASHINGTON (AP)—Air Force officers are convinced that U.S. war missiles are highly reliable. But they are concerned that three Thor mishaps in the Pacific nuclear test series have given an opposite impression.

The Air Force claims better than 90 per cent reliability for the war-rocket version of the Thor.

The Thors used in the high altitude tests at Johnston Island are basically 1,500-mile-range, ballistic missiles but they have been modified in significant ways to suit their special scientific mission.

Two of the mishaps were traced to these modifications. In the first failure on June 4, the trouble was in the tracking system. The second on June 19 was caused by an instrument package fastened to the outside of the rocket.

There has been no official explanation of the reason for the deliberate destruction of a third Thor on its launch pad Wednesday night. But one report said it was caused by “human error” on the part of a civilian technician during pre-launch preparations.

The only high altitude blast achieved so far in the series was on July 9.

The Thors used to loft nuclear devices high over the Pacific are guided and tracked by radio.

The war version of the Thor is equipped with inertial guidance, which is not subject to the kind of technical difficulties that can and do occur in the radio guidance system.

Inertial guidance—which is incorporated into all of the most advanced U.S. intercontinental ballistic missiles—involves a built-in computer and gyros which work together to keep the rocket on course automatically.

A combat Thor would never have attached to it the instrument package which created an turbulence around the rocket during the June 19 shot and caused part of the Thor’s skin to collapse from overheating.

The Air Force is aiming for—and expects to achieve—at least 90 per cent reliability for the Minuteman ICBM, which soon will become the mainstay of the U.S. nuclear striking force. Eight hundred of these 3,000-mile-range solid-fuel missiles are due to be employed in underground launch bases.

The Atlas ICBM, another 3,000-mile-range weapon, has racked up 12 successful shots out of 13 combat-type launches from Vandenberg Air Force Base in California.

These Atlases were fired by Strategic Air Command combat crews who went into practice action with the type of notice they would get in event an order came to shoot at an enemy target instead of the open Pacific.

The Titan, another liquid-fuel missile more powerful than the Atlas has only recently become operational. But Air Force experts are sure it will measure up in reliability on the basis of only four failures in 56 test shots.

Equally important, the Air Force has no doubts about the accuracy of its missiles. An Atlas which was test fired with President Kennedy watching some time ago landed less than a mile from its target—close enough to shatter any city size objective with a hydrogen warhead.

Both reliability and accuracy have been sharpened over the years long process of development and test.

Back in 1964 the Air Force thought in terms of dropping an ICBM within five miles of the target point. Five years ago, the Air Force would have had 80 per cent missile reliability was good.

From the early test stage to combat ready status, a period covering several years, Air Force experience has shown the curve of missile reliability rises steeply.

## 'Double Life' Victim Will Keep Her Sons

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP)—Raising her two young sons is the primary concern of Lillian Linda Herfkens Cobb, the other woman in the double life of North Carolina Republican Chairman William E. Cobb.

“I am going to keep my children regardless of the circumstances, sunk or swum,” she said Thursday. “It is inevitable that there will be a change but no plans have been made at present.”

The fireworks which Linda fully expected exploded Wednesday night when Cobb admitted to newsmen he was living with her at Roanoke, Va., and with his wife and adopted son at Morganton, N.C.

**NORMAL AND QUIET** Linda, a pretty blonde divorcee of 33, said she lived a “quiet and normal life” in Roanoke. Two sons, aged 20 months and two months, were born to her and Cobb here.

Tension crept into the home recently when Time magazine published a story of young Republican leaders in the South. Included was a picture of Cobb.

She and Cobb, an ex-Marine pilot who reputedly has political activities with a lucrative lumber business, became concerned that his true identity would be revealed as a result of the picture.

“We knew something would happen,” Linda said. “I was expecting some fireworks, and I had all intentions of evacuating, but was not fast enough.”

Linda would discuss the situation only with reporters from the Raleigh News & Observer. She formerly lived and worked here.

Linda said she moved to Roanoke in August, 1960, and has lived here ever since as a housewife, mother and as Mrs. W. Edward Cobb.

Her neighbors described her as a nice person and “one of the best mothers I’ve ever known.”

She said Cobb visited the Roanoke home in a fashionable neighborhood, once or twice a week.

**Admission Of New Nations Voted**

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — The Security Council unanimously recommended Thursday night that the General Assembly admit the Republic of Rwanda and the Kingdom of Burundi to the United Nations.

The recommendation followed a three-hour debate marked by a Soviet demand that Belgium unconditionally withdraw any troops it may still have in the two small East African countries, which formerly made up the Belgian U.N. Trust Territory of Ruanda-Urundi. The trusteeship ended and the countries became independent July 1.

The General Assembly is expected to vote Rwanda and Burundi into U.N. membership when it starts its 17th annual session Sept. 18. They will become the 105th and 106th members respectively.

**Former Congressman Held As Link With Counterfeiters**

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — A former U.S. congressman has been arrested in connection with a \$250,000 counterfeiting ring, federal agents say they think is centered in this East Tennessee city.

Pat Sutton, 47, of Lawrenceburg, Tenn., who served in Congress from 1949 to 1955, was charged Thursday with conspiracy and transporting phony bills.

Eleven others, including Sutton's brother, have been charged as a result of an investigation started in March when a bogus note turned up at a Tazewell, Tenn., bank. Secret Service agents have seized \$25,000 and expect more arrests.

Sutton, a candidate for Lawrence County sheriff, said he received — unaware — six counterfeit \$50s in campaign contributions.

"I think the people of this county know me well enough to know

I wouldn't be involved with any counterfeit ring," he said. Paul Doster, Secret Service agent from Nashville, said an estimated \$200,000 in phony bills have been manufactured. Knoxville appears to be the hub of the operation, he said.

The same type of bills have turned up in Kentucky, Arkansas, New York, Alabama, North and South Carolina and Pennsylvania, Doster said.

The agent said one source of the bills is John Calvin Smith, 39, Knoxville electrician, arrested Wednesday night with \$20,000 in phony \$50's and \$100's.

The press which turned out the bills has not been found. Smith was jailed in lieu of \$57,000 bond. Sutton was released under \$7,500 bond pending a preliminary hearing Aug. 9.

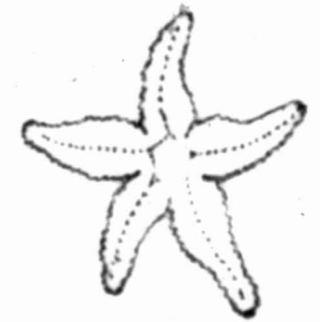
The first person arrested in the investigation was Mrs. Jimmie Hale, a 40-year-old grandmother. Agents said she tried to pass

bogus money June 26 at a Greyhound racing track in West Memphis, Ark.

She had the same type bills — that green color pool — printed, production and identical serial numbers — as others subsequently charged in the case. She has been indicted by a federal grand jury on charges of possessing the bills.

Sutton's mother, Henry C. Sutton of Shelbyville, Tenn., and Walter B. Milam of Lawrenceburg, Tenn., were arraigned earlier this month on charges of possessing counterfeit money.

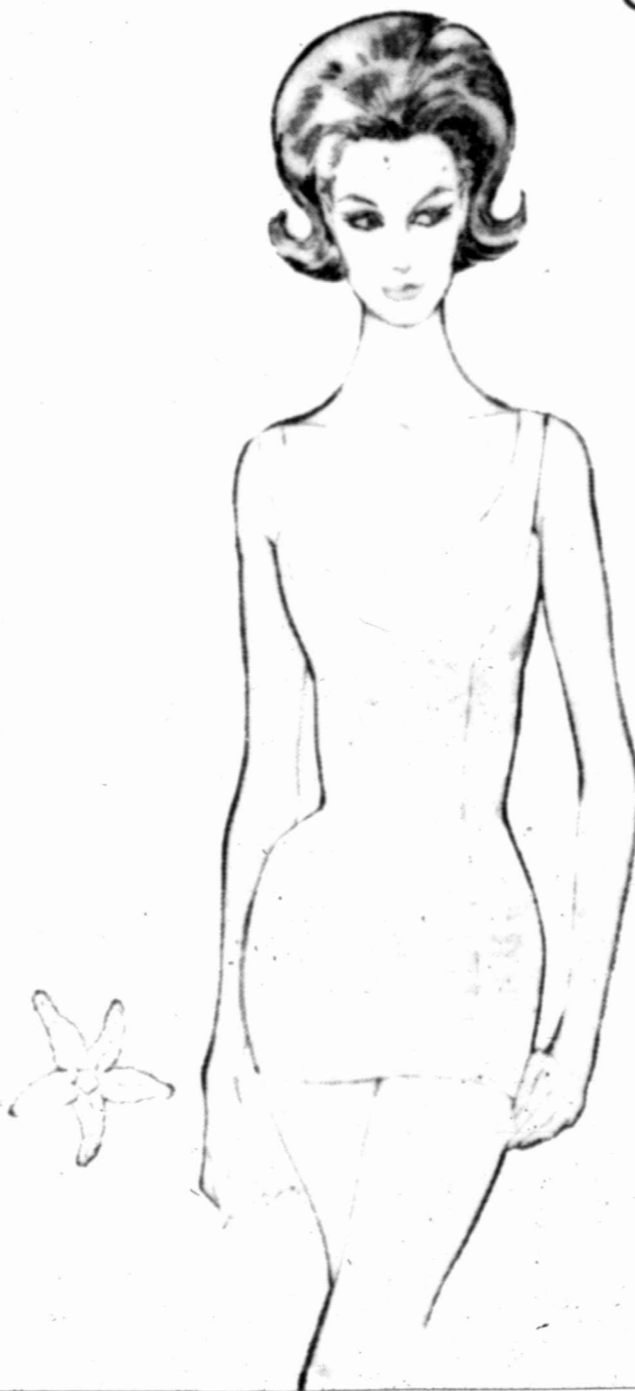

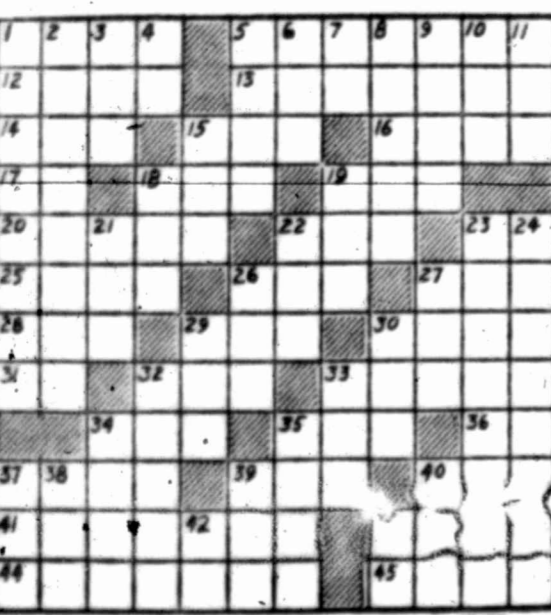

## Spahn Seeking 20 Wins Again

MILWAUKEE, Wis. (AP)—Milwaukee southpaw wonder Warren Spahn set his sights on another 20-victory campaign Thursday—mindful of a tough job ahead.

After defeating the hapless New York Mets 6-1 for his 10th triumph, Spahn, 41, said: "What I've done in April, May, June and July, I've got to do in two months."

With only 60 games left on the Braves' schedule, Spahn admitted his immediate goal is eight more victories. That would enable him to go ahead of Eddie Plank as baseball's winningest left-hander with 327.

"However, I'm shooting for 20, too," the \$80,000-a-year veteran said. "I think I'm paid to win 20 and I won't quit trying to reach that mark until it's impossible. I think I've got a good shot."

Spahn moved into seventh place among all-time strikeout kings by fanning five Mets for a career total of 2,274. He passed Lefty Grove, a Hall of Fame member, who had 2,271.

Despite Spahn's record of 10 victories and 11 losses, which include five one-run setbacks, he is ahead of last year's pace when he posted a 21-13 mark. He won his 10th game on July 30th, triggering a string of 10 straight triumphs, in 1961.

## Kubek Problem Faced By Yankee Manager

Manager Ralph Houk of the New York Yankees has a problem that would be welcomed by every other manager in the major leagues.

What's he gonna do with Tony Kubek?

The versatile Kubek, the Yanks' regular shortstop last season and rated by many of his teammates as the best outfielder on the team, is scheduled to be released from military duty Wednesday and re-join the American League leaders a week from today.

And he's going to be a problem. He's much too good to be kept off the team, but it's going to be difficult to find a spot for him. It's all the fault of Tom Tresh and Hector Lopez.

The switch-hitting Tresh, who won Kubek's vacated shortstop job after a friendly battle with Phil Linz, is performing afield in a fashion that makes him a top contender for rookie of the year honors. He's currently hitting .279 and has a 16-game hitting string going.

The veteran Lopez suddenly has taken hold in left field, long a trouble spot for the Yanks, has

snapped out of the batting slump that plagued him last season and is showing rapid improvement in his defensive play. He's hitting .284.

Each continued his hot hitting in Thursday's 13-5 rout of the Boston Red Sox, Tresh contributing his ninth homer of the season and a single while Lopez dove in two runs with a double and a single.

Chicago gained fifth place with a 7-1 victory over Washington in the only other game scheduled.

The Yanks knocked off the Red Sox Gene Conley with an eight-run third inning and built their American League lead to three full games over idle Los Angeles. Clete Boyer's two-run homer chimed the big inning. Conley (9-10) forced in two runs with bases loaded, walks and gave up two-run doubles to Elton Howard and Dale Long.

Leprosy work in Liberia West Africa is the ministry of the Rev. and Mrs. Joseph Judah.

Rev. Judah, under appointment with the Foreign Missions Department of the Assemblies of God, will speak July 29 at the First Assembly of God Church, Fourth and Lancaster.

New Hope Leprosy Mission, where the Judahs were stationed in Liberia, ministers to hundreds of patients. Founded in 1947 by Missionary Florence Steele, the mission is a village where over 700 men, women and children suffering from Hansen's disease, leprosy, live and are cared for.

Prior to his appointment to New Hope Town, Rev. Judah was an evangelist and assistant pastor in the southeastern states and a building contractor in Phoenix, Ala., and Columbus, Ga. He also did youth and evangelistic work in the Bahama Islands under approval of the Foreign Missions Department.

Mrs. Judah served in South Newport, Ga., under appointment of the Home Missions Department of the Assemblies of God. She taught nursing at South-Eastern Bible College from 1952 to 1953, and came to her marriage, was appointed to Liberia, where she did evangelistic work and nursing at New Hope Town.

On her furlough from Liberia, she married Rev. Judah, and together they served one term at the leprosy mission.

Both Rev. and Mrs. Judah were graduated from South-Eastern Bible College, Lakeland, Fla. Mrs. Judah received further instruction at Barrett School of Nursing, Augusta, Ga., and was awarded a BS in science at Florida Southern College, Lakeland.

The Judahs have one son, Bryan Douglas, one-year old.

## Jeremiah Sees Hope

A MESSAGE OF HOPE FOR THE PEOPLE OF JUDAH IN A TIME OF DEFEAT AND DISCOURAGEMENT

Scripture—11 Kings 24:1-16; Jeremiah 29:1-4; 30:18-24; 31:32-36-38; 33:14-26.

By N. SPEER JONES

IN THIS week's lesson we have a fine illustration of the way God moves in apparently evil ways, only to purify us and draw us closer to Him. The subject matter here is the early deportation to Babylon and God's promise of a new covenant with His people.

This early deportation occurred in 587 B.C. A rebellion under Jehoakim against Babylon had been quelled, and the country somewhat ravaged (11 Kings 24:1-4). The next king, Jehoiachin, his son, was 18 years old, and his reign lasted only three months. During that time Jerusalem was besieged and the young king, along with all the nobles and important people—some 10 thousand in all—was taken to Babylon. Jeho-

them peace of mind—a peace of mind without which they cannot rediscover their God. Instead of harboring rancor against their captors, and restlessly plotting their return, they are to "turn their captivity" to their advantage. They are to build permanent homes there and begin new lives, for Jeremiah knows from God Himself that they are destined to remain not a few years, but 70.

He reminds them that their captivity is God's doing, and they must seek the provocation for it in no one but themselves. Then Jeremiah gives the captives two more prophecies. One is very dire: all those remaining in Jerusalem, supposedly better off than the captives, will meet with the direst catastrophe as the city is totally destroyed. With war, with plague and with famine, they will be destroyed. These two prophecies are a reference to the parable of the baskets of figs.

The other prophecy is by sharpest contrast, one of the most glorious on record. When the scattered Israelites "shall search for Me with all your heart," God will be found by them, and will return them to their own land and to their heritage.

Then we come to the prediction of the new covenant which God promises His people—one in which the human soul shall be righteous without rules and regulations (Jeremiah 31:31-37, 32:38-42). We also have the apt high priest, respectively, of Christ the Branch of Righteousness, which will grow up unto David (Jeremiah 33:15).

Jeremiah's message to the captives is designed to bring back to them the hope of the future.

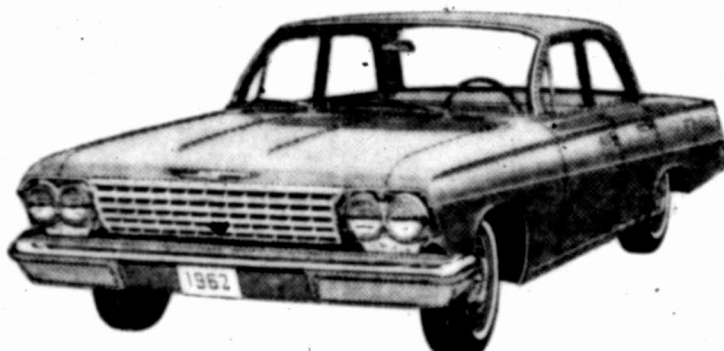

### German Measles Virus Identified

WASHINGTON (AP) — Identification of the virus that causes German measles was announced Thursday by the U.S. Public Health Service, raising hopes for development of an immunization program.  
 And more rain was forecast Friday for the northern reaches of the state. Meanwhile, the southern half of Texas was partly cloudy and hot.  
 At Mesquite near Dallas, police dispatcher Van Clifton said early Friday that numerous cars were stalled and water up to six inches deep was reported in some homes.  
 Weather Bureau radar showed that a band of thundershowers about 60 miles wide from about 20 miles southeast of Longview to 50 miles north of Abilene early in the day. Mineral Wells had a heavy thundershower while other points received less rain.  
 Isolated thundershowers were reported in Southwest Texas and in the Panhandle.  
 Forecasts called for considerable cloudiness and scattered thundershowers over Northwest and North Central Texas. The remainder of the state was expected to be generally partly cloudy with a few widely scattered thundershowers.  
 Up to eight inches of rain fell in some areas Thursday causing blocked streets and some injuries. Lightning accompanied the storms and was responsible for a number of fires in the Dallas-Fort Worth area.  
 A B58 bomber ran off the end of the North-South runway at Carswell Air Force Base after landing during a rain. The plane lodged in the soft ground and large cranes were unable to pull it free immediately. There were no injuries.  
 At Wichita Falls, Sandra Brodie, 24, suffered minor injuries after she was swept from her feet and carried more than two and a half blocks by swift water running in streets after a three-inch rain.  
 Early Friday the temperature range was from 65 at Lubbock to 83 at Palacios and Galveston.

**X15 Pilot Tests Manual Controls**  
 EDWARDS AIR FORCE BASE, Calif. (AP)—An X15 pilot, streaking a mile a second, switched off his rocket plane's electronic controls Thursday to see what would happen if the same failure occurred in a ship returning from space.  
 Nosing over above the atmosphere, space agency pilot Neil Armstrong plunged downward in a series of roller-coaster hops—doing manually the tasks usually performed by the X15's electronic brain.  
 Engineers said the little research plane sped 3,984 miles an hour during the mission and climbed to 100,000 feet.  
 Armstrong landed here safely at 10:45 a.m. after an 11-minute flight from a point over Mud Lake Nev. 200 miles north, where the X15 was air-launched from a B52 mother ship.  
 The space agency said the purpose of the flight was to simulate emergencies that could arise during re-entry into the atmosphere.

### Pig's In Pogo, And Out Of Papers

TOKYO (AP)—The pig that looks like Nikita Khrushchev is back in "Pogo" again, and once more fans in Japan are denied Walt Kelly's popular American comic strip.  
 The Russian-speaking pig first appeared in May and the Asahi Evening News, Japan's only subscriber to "Pogo," dropped the strip after the Soviet Embassy pointed out the resemblance to the Soviet premier. When the pig departed, the strip returned to the paper.  
 Today the paper appeared again without "Pogo," and the editor said Kelly was once again featuring the pig.
