Followers of Ben Bella, a radical already claiming control of western Algeria and some points in the east, were reported preparing to try to take over Algiers and impose their authority on the newly independent nation.

Former Deputy Premier Mohammed Khider is due in Algiers today from Ben Bella's headquarters in Oran, the chief city of western Algeria, as the vanguard of the National Liberation Front's seven-man Political Bureau.

This is a Ben Bella-dominated group which plans to take control of the government. Khider said the other members will head in



Our Foes Take The Big Risks

A recent magazine article has uncovered the fact that Hitler almost had a rocket-firing submarine-and had we not bombed the German testing grounds at Peenemunde, and had not the Nazi heirarchy been riddled with incompetence, Adolf probably would have had the world's first Polaris.

As it turned out, the same famous German scientists who had actually testfired small rockets from Nazi U-boats, were the ones who went to work for Uncle Sam after the war. One of these was Dr. Wernher von Braun.

THERE ARE A lot of other unsettling facts that have come out of the wreckage of World War II. For instance, it has been made public but few have noted the fact that Hitler also had an atomic bomb project going-and that he was several months ahead of us. Again, it was our intelligence system plus waves of heavy bombers that blew up Hitler's plans for a secret weapon.

Even so, one secret weapon did get through, in spite of the bombing of the German rocket center. The V-2, in a few short months, wreaked more havoc on London that had the entire Luftwaffe in the three years of the London Blitz.

THE HAIR-RAISER here is what might have happened had we not destroyed or slowed down these Nazi pro-

jects. Imagine, if you dare, an Allied army in France suddenly assaulted by V-2 rockets with nuclear warheads, and the crowded military installations in England atomized by smaller nuclear rockets launched from submarines. Or, for that matter, similar rockets doing to our East Coast cities what we did to Hiroshima, In fact, Hitler once sent a fleet of subs toward the U.S. Atlantic coast with non-atomic rocket bombs, but the subs were intercepted, thanks again to our espionage system.

TODAY, WE ARE in a similar and even more perilous position and do not even seem to realize it. The Russians have enough of a head start into space that they may well beat us to the moon, even so far as establishing the first permanent lunar bases and manned satellites.

If this day dawns, communism will be triumphant, for we have no defense against what could be tossed down upon us from space, and none is possible. We would have no alternative but surrender.

THE GERMANS and Russians both have forged ahead partly because they are willing to take almost any risks. We avoid all risk even in face of the fact that our astronauts are willing to take

David Lawrence Kennedy Moves In On Military

WASHINGTON - Does President Kennedy's appointment of General Maxwell D. Taylor to be chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff represent a renewed emphasis on ground forces? This question is a vital one now as the far-reaching development of missiles and nuclear weapons balance of power so far as major wars

ONE SCHOOL of thought nowadays as-

defense policy has been neglected. General Taylor holds that view. He has been intimately identified in recent months with the build-up of forces in Berlin and in dealing with the "guerrilla" warfare problem in Southeast Asia. There are, however, fundamental differences of opinion here as to what constitutes the safer strategy for the United States. The rivalry between the armed services has by no means been adjourned

GENERAL TAYLOR, like a good many other men of positive views in the armed services has been a controversial figure He voluntarily retired as Chief of Staff of the Army in 1959 after he found himself in a one-to-three position versus the heads of the Navy and the Air Force and the chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff who repeatedly sided against him. He felt that President Eisenhower, being an Army man, should have supported his views on. building up conventional forces. After retiring. General Taylor wrote a book. The Uncertain Trumpet," which caused a lot of discussion as he reiterated the views he had unsuccessfully advocated in the

meetings of the Joint Chiefs. MR. KENNEDY was very much impressed with the book and used it as ammunition on the political stump in many campaign speeches. It was the basis on which the Democratic presidential nominee criticized President Eisenhower for having failed to increase and modernize conventional forces, for having relied too much on the "massive deterent" policy, and for setting budget ceilings on national de-

When General Taylor was selected as shortly after the Cuban "invasion" fiasco, many high officers in the armed services

were a bit perturbed. Some of them felt that, since he was to be at the President's side constantly, it meant that the Joint Chiefs of Staff would be virtually subordinated to General Taylor. For that reason, some of the top officers in the Navy and Air Force said this week that they feel it seems to be bringing about a stalemate or is much better for General Taylor to have the full responsibility as chairman of the Joint Chiefs than to be exercising influence on military matters at the White House as a personal assistant to the Presi-

> THE COMMENT among various officers in the armed services is that General Taylor was himself not a team player when he was a member of the Joint Chiefs. It is said that he didn't feel boand to support decisions with which he had disagreed. At the same time, some of these same officers recall that General Taylor used to say that a chairman of the Joint Chiefs shouldn't be bossy or attempt to override his associates. There is speculation now whether he will adopt the same view if he encounters differences of opinion among his fellow staff officers. Congress, of course, and particularly

> chairmen of the military affairs committees in both houses, will continue to show a sensitiveness to interservice conflicts and differences. General Taylor is no stranger to these committees, and some strong words of praise were spoken in his behalf on Capitol Hill the other day when he was appointed

> INCIDENTALLY, General Lyman L. Lemnitzer, who was appointed to succeed General Lauris Norstad at NATO, has passed the voluntary retirement age of 62. His departure will be mandatory next year when he is 64 unless Congress passes a special act to retain him in that post. He is not unfamiliar with NATO, since, as Chief of Staff of the Army, he has had to deal with its problems. Also, in the 1940's he was instrumental in formulating the original plans for the NATO operation.

> THE BIG QUESTION mark, however, is whether General Taylor's appointment as head of the Joint Chiefs means the beginning of an effort on his part, with the co-operation of Secretary of Defense McNamara and President Kennedy, to centralize control of the armed services. In his book, he advocated that the Joint Chiefs of Staff be dissolved and replaced by a single Defense Chief of Staff and an advisory board, with the service chiefs of staff operating their/individual military services.
