## Kennedy Signs Aid Bill, Cites Its Importance

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Kennedy signed today the \$4,672,000,000 foreign aid authorization bill, and said he could not emphasize too strongly how important it is.

The measure includes a four-year \$2.4-billion Alliance for Progress program in Latin America.

#### **ENVOY TO FRANCE RESIGNS**

WASHINGTON (AP)-James M. Gavin has resigned as am bassador to France, the White House announced today.

Gavin is returning to private life. President Kennedy assured him that he did so with "my warmest personal wishes and my hearty thanks."

Government officials said that Gavin's desire to end some personal and financial problems was the compelling reason for the resignation, rather than any policy differences.

There have been reports, nevertheless, that Gavin did not see eye-to-eye with the Kennedy administration on the question of France's aspirations to become a nuclear power.

Faubus, who in 1957-58 became a symbol of resistance to the U.S. Supreme Court's desegregation order, said his re-election proved Arkansas does not want an extremist in the governor's chair.

The role of moderate was a new one for Faubus who courted segregationist votes and got them in waves in 1958 and 1960

In this campaign he handed the segregationist banner to Rep. Dale Alford and pinned an integrationist label on former Gov. Sid McMath Alford and McMath waged a spirited but meaningless battle for second place among Faubus' five opponents.

Returns from 2.029 of 2.348 precincts gave Faubus 152,332 votes to 134.041 for the combined opposition Alford got 57.450, McMath 55.817. businessman Vernon Whitten 14.636 attorney Kenneth Coffelt 4.409 and farmer David A.





## Mauled Tax Bill Approved

WASHINGTON (AP) After veeks of hearings, the Senate Fi nance Committee has approved a mauled version of President Kennedy's tax revision bill. But Chairman Harry F. Byrd, D-Va., said he would carry to the floor his fight against its key provision.

The Virginian said today he would try to knock out the investment credit provision, designed as an incentive to American business

equipment. Byrd plans to use as one of his main arguments the contention that the bill as it cleared the committee will cost the Treasury an estimated \$750 million a year. As it passed the House, the bill was figured to provide a \$120 mil-

lion surplus Byrd succeeded during his committee's consideration of the bill in knocking out the biggest revenueproducing provision in it-a tax withholding plan on dividends and

The Treasury had estimated this would pick up at least \$650 million

The administration's chances of restoring this on the floor ar peared slim

The committee also softened the President's proposals to tighten up on the expense account deductions and to increase levies sharply on foreign incomes of U.S. corpora tions. Kennedy's backers believe they have a chance to win stiffer provisions in a floor fight



## Around The Rim

#### A Matter Of High Interest

My most recent study of high finance was stimulated by the inquiry of a colleague on the rate of interest he would pay using a special kind of credit offered him. Some years having passed since I last looked into the matter, I considered it again to refresh my memory. It proved to be a matter of high interest.

These low, low interest rates one pays just aren't so low

TAKE, FOR INSTANCE, a purchase where the clerk cheerfully invites you to put an item on the convenient installment plan.

"You pay only a flat 10 per cent," you are told. "None of these extra carrying

So you buy an item costing \$120 and pay it out in one year. Ten per cent added to that makes the purchase \$132. But. the 10 per cent is really more than 15 per cent interest. You have borrowed the first \$10 for only one month, yet you paid a year's interest for it. The second month's payment was borrowed for only two months, with interest for one year paid on it. You end up paying \$10 interest when at 10 per cent on the balance each month would have resulted in \$6.47 interest paid. A rate of 15 per cent on the balance, without interest on the interest secrued, would result in \$9.78 paid.

CONSIDER ANOTHER favorite account -the revolving account where interest is paid at the rate of 112 per cent on the

remaining balance at the end of each

Should you accept credit of \$100 on such an account and pay it out regularly, 11 payments later you would have paid back the original \$100 plus \$7.42. The interest on borrowed money is really 18 per cent per annum plus 18 per cent interest on the

interest accrued. But, most of us don't open an account and faithfully pay it out. After all, why have one of those accounts you can add to freely if you don't use it. And most of us keep that type of account plunged to the hilt. So what does that account look like after one year?

FOR EASE in figuring, use a \$100 account. If you pay on it faithfully each month and somehow manage to find an item or items each month which total \$9.81. The sales tax brings it to an even

\$10 to match the payment. After having made 12 payments of \$10 and 12 purchases, your account would new total \$119.64. You would have accrued \$18 interest and \$1.64 interest on the interest. And you would have actually burrowed \$100 for one full year. Not really a cheap interest rate when you look closely at it.

IT DOES NOT take many of the \$100 revolving accourts to add up to a free one-if you don't use them in the first place Perhaps I'm miserly, but these interest rates don't appear so interesting.

IT WAS RAINING when we started off in our caravan of samlors a passengerthe four grave persons being pedaled down Vietiane's bumpy main street we'd been joined at the last minute by two more curious chaps: one would have thought that we were all hurrying to the bedside of a very sick friend. We jounced along through the puddles behind our tireless samfor boys until we got to our destination, which was a modest dwelling reached through a confusing succession of twisting

WE WERE MET at the door by an ancient, dignified Chinese, who had been told to expect us. He conducted us to a back room, almost wholly occupied by a low platform on which a handsome, middle-aged Chinese woman sat cross-legged. She was busy preparing the opium, a process that is slow and painstaking, and she had a look of tremendous concentration on her face. The opium, refined and re-fined until it was said to be the finest obtainable, was

VIENTIANE Laos-Ever since Thom- a thick, tarry paste. The woman dipped lamp until a ball about the size of a pea had formed This was then placed in the bowl of the pipe, which was then inverted over the spirit lamp to keep the optum alight. Then the pipe was ready for the first smoker

> WHEN IT CAME my turn to smoke I lay, down on the platform, resting my head on a wooden "pillow" covered with clean terry cloth It was unexpectedly comfortable. Smoking an opium pipe takes some practice. It isn't like smoking tobacco, where one inhales of he inhales at ail only a puff at a time. With opium the object is to inhale the whole pipe at one draught, so to speak, which means inhaling very slowly for a long, long breath, directly to the lungs from the

Some people can't abide the taste of opium smoke: indeed, it makes many novice smokers violently ill I didn't find the flavor unpleasant, however, although I despaired of ever being able to describe it Burnt caramel is as close as I can come to how it tastes, and that is not really very near the mark

I DIDN'T DO VERY well on my first pipe It took me two tries before I'd finished it and it was plain that the Chinese woman didn't consider me a very apt pupil. But I did much better on my second pipe and by the time I'd had a third only a paroxysm of carrying tricycle, and to have looked at coughing prevented me from earning a cluck of approval from the lady on the other side of the spirit lamp

The effect of smoking the opium was curious and subtle. All of us decided that a gentle euphoria was the only sensation we'd experienced It was pleasant enough, a feeling of well-being and goodfellowmanship, but two martinis will probably do more for you. Two martinis, moreover, will not produce the thumping headache I had the next morning, nor will they make food repellent for 24 hours, which the opium did.

I'VE NO DOUBT opium addiction is a vile disease just as all the moralizing authorities claim, but it's plain that it takes more than one casual seance to entrap a smoker, all Dr. Fu-Manchu's devil ish record notwithstanding.
