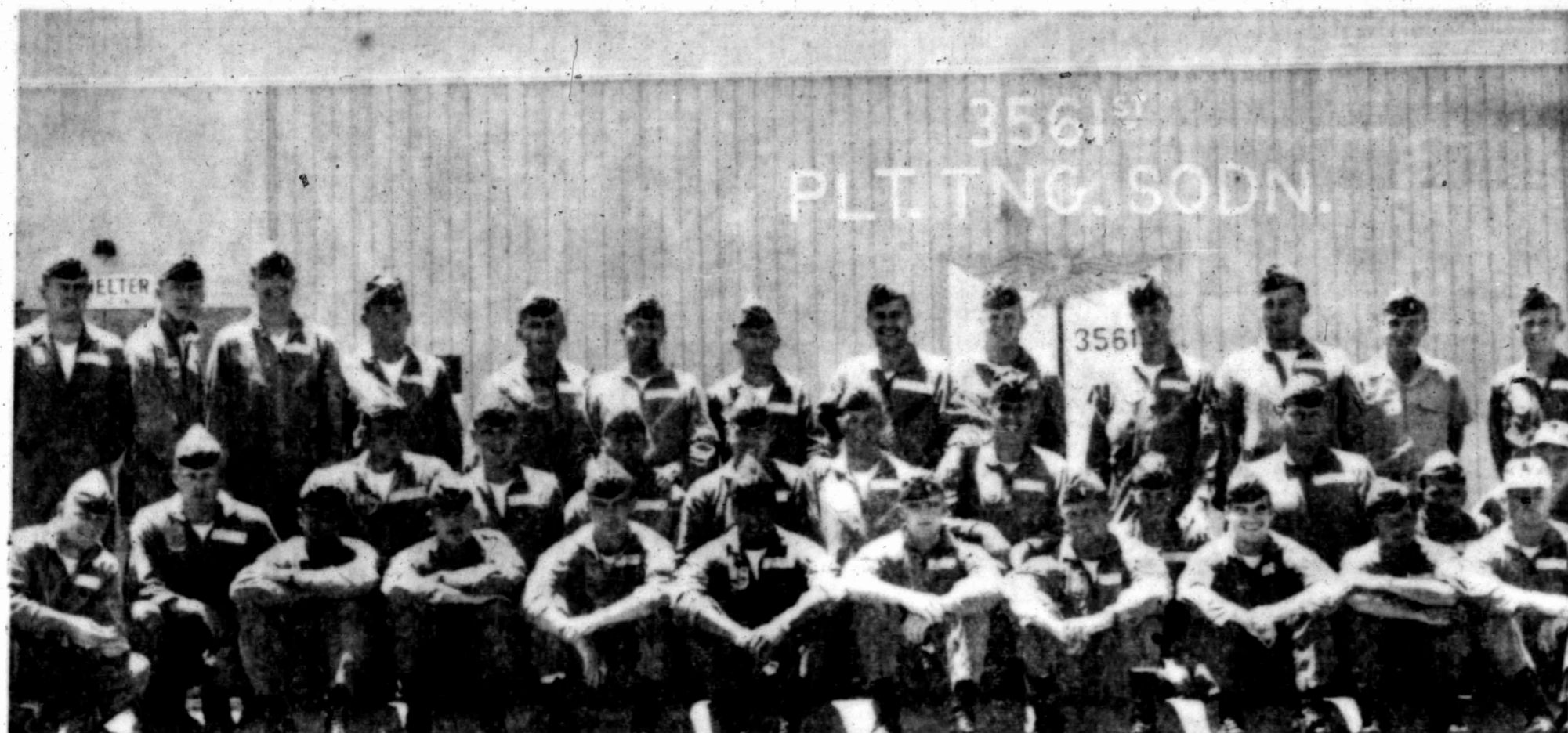

Britain, Israel In A Dispute Over Soblen

Issue Created By Order To Airline

LONDON (AP)—Britain instructed El Al Airline today to fly fugitive spy Dr. Robert Soblen to the United States and prison. The Israeli airline said it would not do so, the Home Office announced.

A spokesman for the Home Office — Soblen's official guardian while he is in Britain — said the airline stated it was acting on instructions from the Israeli government.

Home Office officials were trying to resolve the situation in talks with El Al representatives at London Airport. Attorneys for the 61-year-old psychiatrist moved at once to block any effort to fly him out on another airline. They said such transportation by another line would require issuance of a deportation order, which could be attacked in court.

Pan American Airways said Soblen would not be on its only remaining flight to New York tonight.

"We have been given to understand that Soblen cannot be carried on anything but a direct flight to New York," a spokesman said. "Our flight tonight puts down at Shannon, Ireland."

The El Al line brought Soblen to London, en route to New York, and nominally at least had the responsibility for completing his trip.

A diplomatic source said the Israeli government has appealed to Britain to relieve El Al of the responsibility.

The London office of El Al confirmed that it had received Home Secretary Henry Brooke's order directing it to carry Soblen to New York.

COLORADO CITY (SC)—Roy Spratt 16, son of Mr. and Mrs. James H. Spratt, Colorado City, was killed in an automobile accident five miles south of Colorado City about 1:10 p.m. Thursday when his car overturned.

Pipefitter Holds Panel At Gunpoint

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP)—An embittered pipefitter, incensed by discontinuance of his disability checks, held eight men at gunpoint for 12 1/2 hours in a state office before detectives disarmed him Thursday night.

Charles Elmer Milligan, 52, of Tempe, was subdued by Sgt. Earl Moore and detective Don Rodriguez, who gained entry to the barricaded office by posing as newsmen.

Moments earlier, Milligan had voluntarily released five of his prisoners. The drama began about 8 a.m. in a four-story state capitol annex housing offices of the Arizona Industrial Commission.

There for a hearing on his disability claim, Milligan whipped out a 22 caliber pistol and wounded his own attorney in a scuffle before taking command of the room.

He released his lawyer, Stephen S. Gorey, 46, who scooted out of the room on the seat of his pants and was hospitalized with a flesh wound in his left leg. Later, Gorey, from a hospital bed, conferred with Milligan by telephone and tried to talk him out of his gun-waving lecture to commission officials.

The gunpoint hearing was interrupted in its early stages by

Milligan's son, Charles, 28, who was promptly thrown out by his angered father.

By telephone, Milligan told Sgt. Seymour Nealist: "I damn near killed them all. He had to get past you to get in. You get him the hell out of this building."

Milligan suffered a back injury 18 months ago while working on the Glen Canyon Dam project on the Colorado River in northern Arizona. He drew disability compensation for a while, Gorey said, but the checks stopped in mid-March.

JUST WANTED TO TALK John B. Ryan, 63, a court reporter employed for the hearing and one of the hostages, said: "He just wanted to tell his story, and he did it, even though he repeated himself several times. When he finished, he finished and that was it."

At that point, Milligan released all hostages except Donald J. Morgan, 47, the commission's chief attorney, and the two pseudo-newsmen.

What he planned to do with those three wasn't explained. Whatever it was, it didn't come to pass.

Sgt. Moore got four glasses of water and the men began to talk. "Until then," said Moore, "Don and I had been no closer to him than 25 feet."

As Milligan turned his head to pick up a glass of water, Rodriguez leaped at him and grabbed the pistol. Moore joined his fellow officer to overpower the huffy pipefitter.

WASN'T A KILLER There was one wild shot from Milligan's gun, but Moore said, "I don't think he felt like killing anybody."

Reactions of the prisoners varied. C. Blaine Dunford, 59, employed in the commission's records department, emerged first. He was crying.

"I'm sorry," he said, "but I just can't help it." He described his fear as greater than what he experienced when he was employed in Honolulu during the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor.

Next was Dr. Leo L. Tuveson, 51, attending the hearing to testify against Milligan's disability claim. "All in a day's work," said the physician.

Also held was Loren G. Shelley, 33, a commission attorney. Said Shelley when he telephoned

his wife: "I'll be heading home shortly."

SAID NOTHING Milligan said nothing as he was led away. He was booked on charges of assault with a deadly weapon and investigation of sanity.

Only four commission officials and employees, plus Dr. Tuveson, were in the hearing room as Milligan opened the proceedings with himself as the only witness.

They were joined later by James M. Witt, 55, business agent for Milligan's union and an errand boy throughout the session. Witt came and went at Milligan's demand, bringing in such things as soft drinks and coffee.

Police quickly cleared other employees from halls and nearby offices on the third floor.

During the morning hours, Milligan talked frequently with police in adjacent offices. Once he asked that a bucket be sent into the hearing room for use as a toilet. This was done.

IRISH TRICK Later the pipefitter requested that newsmen be sent in Moore and Rodriguez removed their guns and posed as reporters. They entered the hearing room at 12:30 p.m.

Communication between Milligan and police became less frequent in the afternoon, but at 6:30 p.m. the pipefitter said by telephone:

"I'll stay here all night if necessary to get what I want." When the end came at 8:30 p.m., the handcuffed Milligan was whisked to a patrol car, hundreds of persons gathered outside the building began yelling. There was no incident, however.

U.S. Seizes Greater Part Of Thalidomide

WASHINGTON (AP)—The government announced today that all supplies of thalidomide it has been able to locate in doctors' hands in this country have been destroyed or impounded.

However, officials have not been able yet to locate 158 of the 1,231 U.S. doctors who are reported to have received the drug for investigational purposes. These doctors are either on vacation or have moved and efforts are being made to locate them.

The drug, a tranquilizer and sleeping pill which originated in Germany, is blamed for many deformations of babies both to women in West Germany and elsewhere who took the drug. It was never placed on the market in this country but doctors received it for experimentation.

Food Stamp Plan Expanded In 18 States

WASHINGTON (AP)—The food stamp program—a pilot plan designed to help needy persons in depressed areas—has been ordered extended to an additional 25 areas in 18 states.

President Kennedy directed the Agriculture Department on Thursday to carry out the extension as well as to continue the plan in the original eight pilot areas.

Through the extension, said Kennedy, an additional 22,000 persons will be aided in Arkansas, Oregon, Virginia, Pennsylvania, Minnesota, Missouri, Alabama, West Virginia, North Carolina, Oklahoma, Washington, Wisconsin, California, Indiana, Louisiana, Ohio, Tennessee and Kentucky.

The original eight pilot areas are in Franklin County, Ill.; Detroit, Mich.; the Virginia, Hibbing, Nashua area of Minnesota; Silver Bow County, Mont.; San Miguel County, N. M.; Fayette County, Pa.; McDowell County, W. Va.; and Floyd County, Ky.

Drug Victim Calls Others Into British Legal Battle

LONDON (AP)—A thalidomide mother announced plans today to fight a legal battle for compensation for hundreds of British babies deformed by the drug.

Pat Lane's 8-month-old daughter Julie escaped gross malformation. "I must be the luckiest of all the affected mothers," she said at her Bristol home.

Julie was born with a small, twisted right ear, no left ear, and a skin over her eyes. Surgery has given the baby her sight and she can hear partly on the right side.

Many thalidomide babies are born without arms and legs. The drug was withdrawn from the British market last year.

"I want other thalidomide mothers to write to me and to raise a fund to fight a test case against the firm marketing this drug, or the authorities to get compensation for the worst-hit babies and their parents," Mrs. Lane said.

She wrote to Health Minister Enoch Powell appealing for government help for the worst cases. Powell in reply offered deep concern and advised on available medical care. There was no word about compensation and the House of Commons was told later none would be given.

Mrs. Lane, 28, took two thalidomide tablets when she was five weeks pregnant. Doctors meanwhile issued a warning about another pill—an oral contraceptive.

After taking the synthetic hormone tablet, a young woman was reported to have developed phlebitis in the leg, with thrombosis. She died a week later from a clot in the lung.

The British Medical Journal reported she was one of four British cases known to have incurred thrombosis while taking the pill. The British journal reported that in the United States there have been a number of thrombosis deaths among women taking the same contraceptive pill.

The Vice President and Mrs. Johnson and Doherty will fly to Kingston, Jamaica, on a presidential plane on Aug. 5.

## Defrocked Priest Sues For Divorce

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Defrocked priest Walter Ryan, 37, whose departure from his New York state home seven years ago prompted a \$2.3 million suit brought by his wife Alice, against the Catholic Church, sued her for divorce Thursday.

He accused his attractive, 41-year-old wife of adultery, desertion and cruelty. Ryan married her in Baptist rites in Maryland 12 years ago under the assumed occupation of free lance writer. Shortly thereafter he left the church and became a real estate salesman.

Her suit in March of this year started a nationwide search that lasted two days, Ryan revealed his whereabouts in San Francisco to her.

She claimed he fathered her fourth daughter while on a brief visit to their Glen Head, N.Y., home in 1960 but a San Francisco Superior Court rejected her assertion in a June hearing.

She said in her suit against the

church that Ryan was abducted, given liquor and shifted around to various monasteries in different states. This was denied by both Ryan and church officials.

Ryan said in the divorce suit that he left his wife in 1955 because his wife "inflicted a course of extreme cruelty which necessitated his departure from the family dwelling place."

Ryan claims in the suit that Mrs. Ryan's fourth daughter was a result of adultery with an unnamed and unknown man.

ODESSA (AP)—Airman James Lane, 29, slain when Viet Nam rebels shot down a United States helicopter in Southeast Asia, will be buried here Saturday. His widow and three children and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. E. E. Lane of Odessa, survive.

## Nuclear Power For New York

BUCHANAN, N.Y. (AP)—A nuclear reactor was put into operation Thursday night by Consolidated Edison Co., promising

fission-generated electricity for millions of New Yorkers in about three weeks.

The company has been working on the Westchester County plant for 10 years and has spent \$120 million in developing it.

The station can generate 163,000 kilowatts of electricity. Oil-fired

superheaters will boost this capacity to 275,000 kilowatts—enough for the needs of one million New York City homes.

The plant is said to be the only atomic power station in the world to use the element thorium as a source of fuel to split uranium atoms.

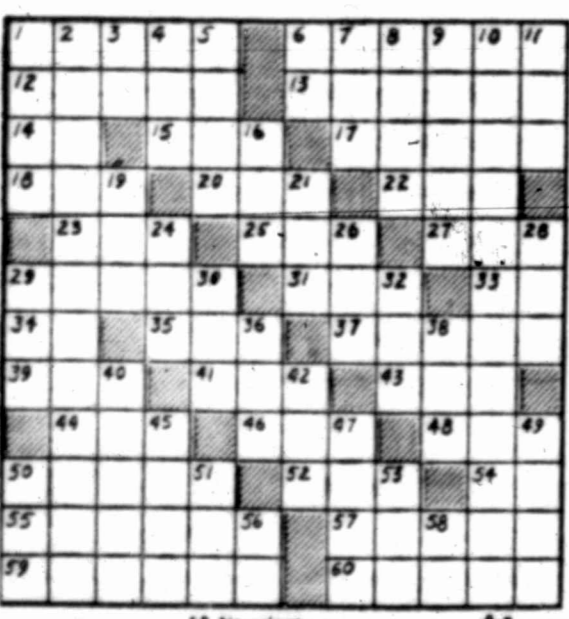

# Ruling Frees Gross Sales, Puts Kink In State's Tax

AUSTIN (AP)—The state's 11-month-old sales tax suffered a serious court reversal Thursday and it could throw Texas finances deeper in the red.

Dist. Judge Herman Jones held in a far-reaching decision that vendors must pay the state only what taxes they collect—not on gross receipts which may include untaxable sales.

As the tax now works, a store must pay the state 2 cents if it makes 10 sales of a dime candy bar, even though none of the 10 sales is taxed because the candy costs less than 25 cents.

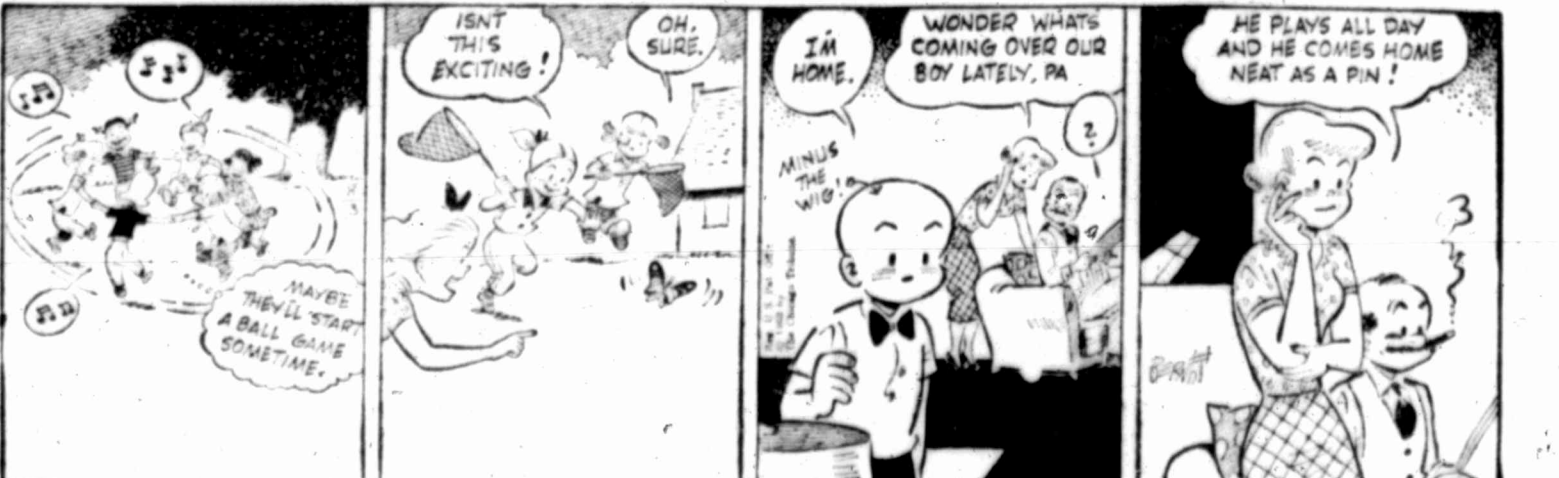
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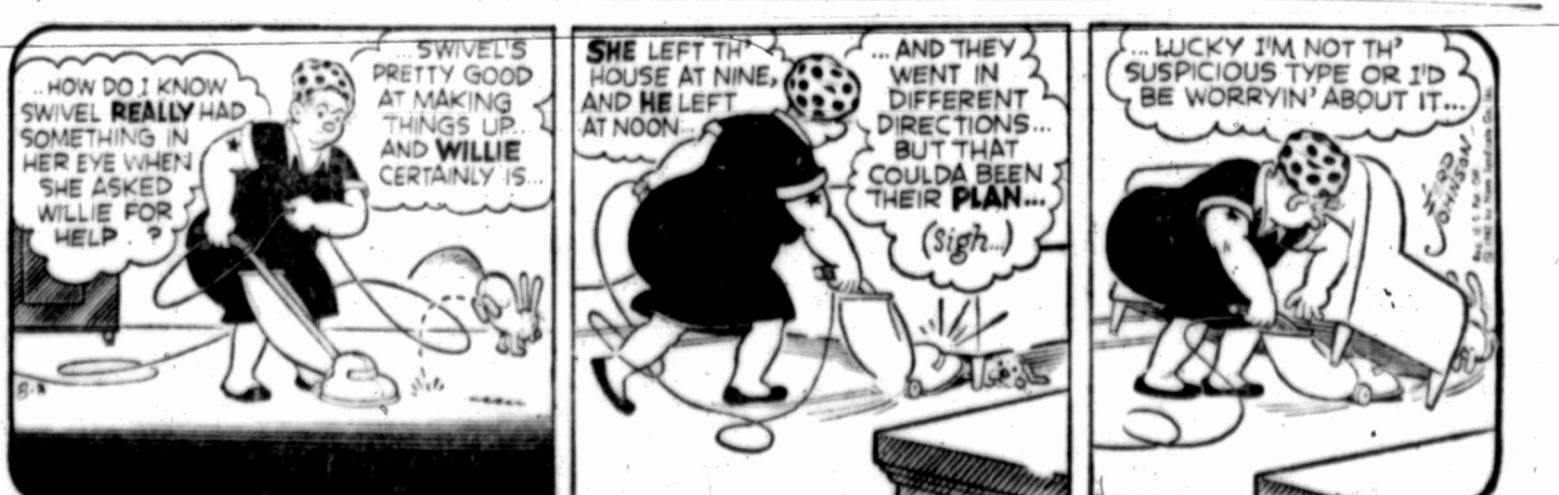

# T-38's First Students Here To Get Silver Wings Today

This is graduation day for 35 members of Class 63-A at Webb AFB, the first local class to complete Undergraduate Pilot Training in the T-38 Talon.

The exercises will be held in the Webb AFB Chapel, beginning at 7:30 p.m.

Col. Herman F. Smith, professor and head of the psychology department at the Air Force Academy, will be speaker for the graduation.

Following the ceremonies, a reception will be held for officials, students' families and friends in the Officer's Club. Col. Smith will be guest of honor.

The T-38 is a twin engine supersonic jet aircraft which replaced the more familiar T-33 Thunderbird earlier this year. The latter aircraft is no longer at Webb.

Col. Smith is a native of Port Matilda, Pa., and a graduate of George Washington University. He received his master's degree in psychology in 1948. During his 22 years of service, he has seen combat in World War II and taught at the U.S. Military Academy.

The colonel's combat awards include the Distinguished Flying

Cross with one oak leaf cluster, the Air Medal with one oak leaf cluster, and other service and combat ribbons. He has been awarded the Air Force Commendation Ribbon. During WW II Col. Smith took part in the first B-29 raid against Japan. He led several of the B-29 missions against the Japanese mainland, and his crew is credited with destroying five Japanese planes in aerial combat. He also flew radiological reconnaissance missions during the Bikini A-Bomb tests.

Col. Smith entered the Air Force in 1940 at Maxwell AFB, Ala., and was commissioned following completion of his training as a flying cadet. Prior to his arrival at the USAF Academy, he was assigned to the Educational Training Section of the Air Force Safety Division located at Norton Air Force Base, Calif.

Cooper is under a murder indictment returned by a grand jury in Lubbock in 1961. He was charged in connection with the death of a young Negro woman following an alleged abortion.



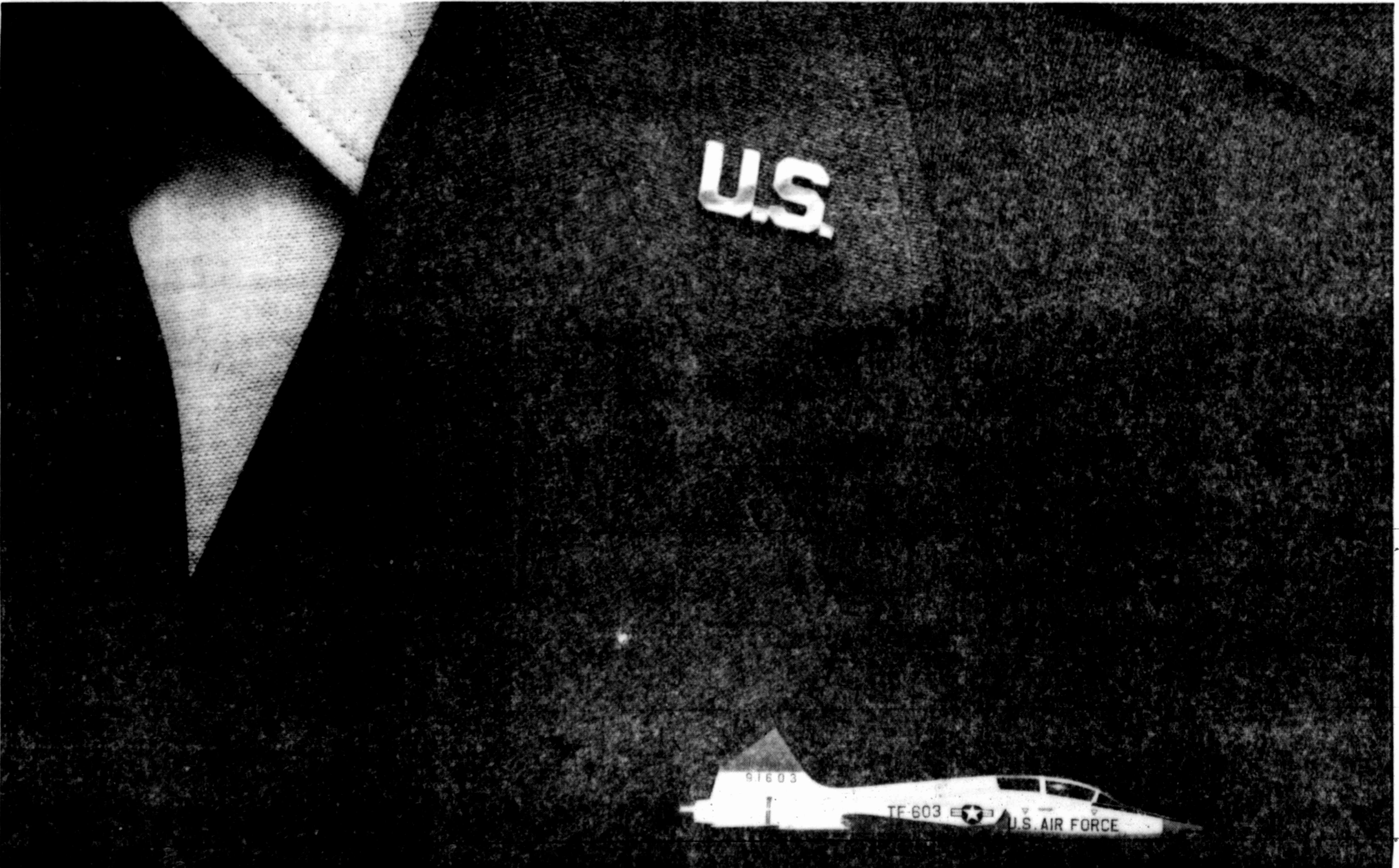

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# New Shopping Center To Have Sneak Preview

Several stores in the College Park Shopping Center, Big Spring's newest business addition, will open officially at 9 a.m. next Tuesday. A "sneak preview" will be held from 6 to 9 p.m. Monday to provide Big Spring and area residents, in family groups, an opportunity to visit stores and business houses and to meet managers and employees in advance of the opening.

Businesses to open at the center on Birdwell Lane and East Fourth are: Safeway Store, Grant's Junior Department Store, Lewis Variety Store, Pittsburg Plate Glass, College Park Barber Shop, College Park Cleaners, Smith and Cauley, optometrists.

A drug store, service station, dentist's office, women's ready-to-wear, cafeteria, book and gift shop and beauty shop, will open at later dates. John Little, in charge of building the center, said the drug store and book and gift shop, would be open soon while others would be ready in September.

**MAYOR**

The center will be officially opened at 8:30 a.m. Tuesday when Big Spring Mayor George Zachariah cuts the main ribbon in the

parking area in front of Grant's store. Individual ribbons will be cut in all stores opening around 9 a.m., with Chamber of Commerce representatives taking part. Some of the policies regarding operation of the center were discussed at a Thursday noon luncheon at Coker's Restaurant when store representatives heard discussions of opening and closing hours, traffic, parking, and other problems.

"I have invited you here to work out a coordinated effort and to get your thinking about the opening and operation of the College Park Center," Little said. "It has been our thinking that the center opening be held Tuesday and that a grand opening of College Park Shopping Center be held in about 90 days. Several new businesses, and possibly all, will be open by that time.

Little said that bicycle riding on the sidewalks under the canopy would not be permitted and urged each manager to take immediate steps to stop any riding as soon as a violation was discovered to prevent future riding and possibly serious accidents.

**DEFINITE HOURS**

The group present agreed that definite opening and closing hours

should be observed during the first two or three weeks of operation to determine what hours were best suited. It was the consensus that some places, like the grocery store, cleaning shop, and barber shop, might necessarily observe different hours for opening and closing. They agreed, however, that, when a positive program is worked out, the opening hours would be advertised and observed. All employees will park automobiles to the rear of their places of business and leave all available customer parking spaces open.

Little asked that the group agree on the hour for turning on parking area lights and the shopping center sign. The lights will be turned on at 7 p.m. and off at midnight for the present. The sign lights will remain on all night. Mercury vapor street lights are being installed from Birdwell to Tuians to add to the center's attractiveness.

**FOUNTAIN**

The fountain, in the garden on the southeast corner of the center, will be on during all shopping hours, with the colored lights to come on at the same time as the parking area lights. All representatives agreed that the fountain had attracted more night attention to the center than anything else to date.

"R. G. Farrell Co., contractor, has done an outstanding job on the center," Little said. "He is about ready to pull out and if any building problems have been encountered you should get in touch with him immediately."

Little said streamers might be used in front of stores if they did not stretch out over 50 feet.

A College Park Shopping Center Merchants' Association will be organized at a later date when all businesses have been opened, Little said.

"I believe that the operation of the center to the best advantage could be carried on with such an organization. It certainly could aid in solving problems," he told the group.

Discussion of an antique automobile show and a square dance festival on the parking area brought approval. Those present felt that holiday or Sunday use for such occasions would attract more people to the center.

## Sen. Russell Protests JFK Remarks On Albany

ALBANY, Ga. (AP)—U.S. Sen. Richard B. Russell of Georgia branded today as a political move President John F. Kennedy's comments about this city's racial problems.

Russell said the President's "stamp of approval upon the constant violation of the city laws is certain to encourage the importation of many other professionals and notoriety seekers and worsen an already bad situation."

The Democratic senator wired his criticism to Albany Herald editor James H. Gray, who also is state Democratic Party chairman.

The President said at his news conference that it was "wholly inexplicable" to him why Albany officials wouldn't sit down with Negro leaders to iron out problems.

Russell's telegram criticizing the President was only one of several coming into or going out of Albany in reference to the racial situation.

New York's Sen. Jacob Javits, a Republican sent a wire to a

Negro leader promising to come to Albany "without a moment's hesitation," if needed. Javits commended Kennedy for his comments in support of the integration effort.

Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. of Atlanta, in jail as a result of his Albany integration activities, and Dr. W. G. Anderson, president of the Albany Movement, both sent telegrams to the President thanking him for his comments and urging him to continue his support.

City officials have refused to negotiate with Negro leaders until King and other out-of-town integrationists leave Albany.

As the telegrams flew, a federal court hearing continued Thursday on the city's request for an injunction against mass demonstrations.

Anderson testified he believed decisions on obeying or disobeying what he called unjust laws are a matter of conscience. He said under questioning that he felt no compulsion to obey unjust laws

New York has scarcely a year and a half to go before opening a fair that is to cover a space nearly 10 times the 74 acres of the Seattle exposition...

ATLANTA is planning a fair in 1967 and the city hopes to obtain the seal of approval of the Bureau of International Expositions. Seattle got that seal while New York was denied it because its exposition came to come too soon after Century 21. Philadelphia has sent emissaries here in contemplation of an exposition in 1976 commemorating the 200th anniversary of the Declaration of Independence...

ONE LESSON from Seattle may be the economy of scale. Another equally important is the fact that the core of the exhibition was built as a permanent cultural and sports center for the city including an arts gallery, opera and concert halls and sports stadium. The city and state together put up nearly \$20,000,000. Congress appropriated \$9,900,000 for the science pavilion and the National Aeronautics and Space Agency came through with another million for a special space exhibit...

IT IS A MEASURE of the up-and-coming spirit of this region that the intention is to maintain the science pavilion after the fair closes as what has been called "the center of the city." The general manager of the exposition calls a "land of West Coast Smithsonian Institution." The idea is to join with the University of Washington and other centers to foster research that will, in turn, mean the development of industries in new fields such as electronics and space.

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# Episcopal Church Gives Ranch Style Flavor To Bible School

A Ranch Roundup is in the offing for youngsters at St. Mary's Episcopal Church Aug. 6-17. Roundup is a version of Vacation Bible School which originated with St. Christopher's Episcopal Church in Lubbock. It is geared to "round up" the young people of St. Mary's for a period of worship, fun and fellowship before regular Sunday school begins in September.

# Judah Conquered and Exiled

HOW A MAN OF GOD STANDS FIRM ON A DAY OF NATIONAL CALAMITY  
Scripture—II Kings 24-25; Jeremiah 40:1-6; 48:1-6.

THIS WEEK'S lesson deals directly with the actual fall of Jerusalem in 587-586 B.C. and with the vast deportation of her people to Babylon at that time.

This deportation was not at all unique in ancient times. For many years the Assyrians had practiced such a policy, transplanting people from conquered nations to sparsely settled areas in their own land. This policy apparently stemmed from the difficulty of maintaining control over another country, especially when that country was far from the seat of empire. Thus it follows that the leaders—the nobility, the craftsmen, the military men and the leading citizens—were the first to be carried off (as they were in Jehoiachin's reign). A side advantage of this policy of deportation was, of course, the building up of the

conquering country through the addition of such able settlers. These captive peoples were not treated cruelly, therefore. The despair of the captive Jews did not stem from maltreatment but from homesickness and low morale.

The attacks against Jerusalem throughout her history have been legion. After the destruction described here, it suffered under the Persians for years; Antiochus Epiphanes tried to Hellenize the area in 169 B.C.; he took the city, destroyed the walls, robbed the temple and built an altar to Zeus where God's had been. Only one other disaster, however, was comparable to this destruction by Nebuchadnezzar—that which occurred in 70 A.D., when the Roman emperor Vespasian sent his son, Titus, to

conquer the city. Although 30 thousand is the figure scholars suggest, Nebuchadnezzar established the new capital of the country in Mizpat, a town eight miles north of Jerusalem; there he set up his government, Gedaliah. This town was famous in Biblical history. It was on a high ridge in Benjamin, on the boundary between the northern and southern kingdoms. An ancient site, it had apparently been a place of sacrifice for centuries.

Here it was that Samuel assembled the people to confess their sins during the Philistine invasions (I Samuel 7:5), and here it was that Saul was proclaimed king of Israel (I Samuel 10:17). It was also apparently the place (called Nob) from which the Assyrian tyrant Sennacherib looked down on the city before his attack (in 701 B.C.) and the height from which Titus got his first glimpse of the city he was to destroy.

It is stated of John Wesley in 'Universal Knowledge,' Vol. 9, p. 540, 'I wish the name 'Methodist' might never be mentioned, but lost in eternal oblivion.' Dr. P. S. Renshaw, Baptist in the 'General Convention of Baptist Churches at Cleveland, Ohio, May 19, 1904, is declared to have said, 'I sometimes feel sorry that the word 'Baptist,' which was flung at us by our enemies and stuck, should be our name. Perhaps yet we will go back to the name 'Christian'."

My friend the majority of professed followers of Christ this very hour stand in prejudiced regimented denominations with their backs to the cross of Christ — they are marching not together but away from their fellows with the denominational leaders beating out the music to the tune of denominational prejudice.

Reader, what of yourself — your reading and study of the Bible — your own obedience to the Gospel — do you think independently of sectarianism — does God's words hold supreme place in your life?

Student nurses from Odessa Junior College will begin coming to Big Spring for a part of their training Sept. 13, according to Mrs. Ollie Jolley, R.N., director of nursing service at the Big Spring State Hospital.  
Final arrangements have been made to give the students nine weeks of instruction here in psychiatric nursing. Sixteen or 17 students will be in the initial class. They will be accompanied by two instructors from the college, Josephine Lamb, R.N., Austin, supervisor of psychiatric nursing, was here Tuesday through Thursday to help finalize plans. She will return Sept. 19 for a day or two to check on the program's progress.  
Psychiatric nursing instruction is a necessary part of nurse training. The Odessa Junior College has a two-year program which allows nurses to graduate with an

associate degree. They take the psychiatric training at the beginning of their second year at school.  
"The girls have already had some clinical training, but here they will get practical experience in the field," Mrs. Jolley said.  
The students will follow a patient through much of the hospitalization. They will pick up a patient on admission if possible and follow him through intensive treatment and rehabilitation.  
Among other things, their tasks will include assisting with medications, giving inoculations and entertaining patients on the wards. They will become acquainted with the history of patients and will make a study of their assigned patients, charting progress and making an analysis of the problem and success of treatment.

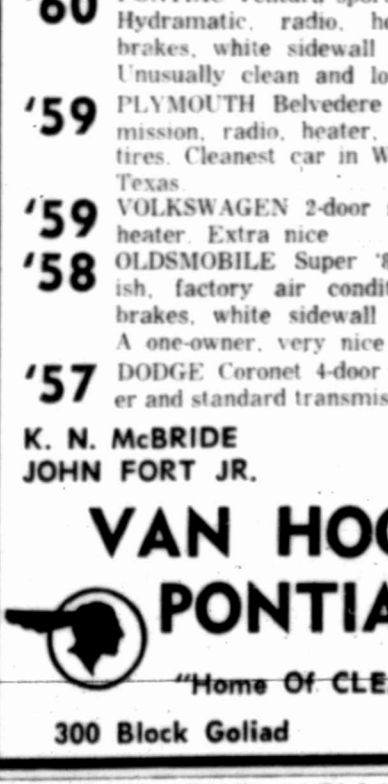

# Clement Wins In Tennessee, 2 Pro-Kennedy Men Appear In

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP)—Tennessee Democrats endorsed ex-Gov. Frank Clement for a third term as governor Thursday and apparently unseated two veteran congressmen who opposed much of President Kennedy's program.

Clement scored an impressive victory over Chattanooga Mayor P. R. Oigati and Memphis City Commissioner William W. Farris. Rep. James B. Frazier, bidding for an eighth term, and Rep. J. Carlton Loser, trying for a fourth term, appeared to have been beaten in races so close the winners probably won't be known for certain until the official count. Their opponents endorsed Kennedy's New Frontier legislation and had heavy support of organized labor.

Nearly complete returns showed Clement 42 swept six of Tennessee's nine congressional districts. His share of the vote stood at 40

per cent, enough for victory in this state that has no runoff primary. It virtually assured him of election in November since Republicans seldom offer serious competition.

With returns from 2,488 of the state's 2,688 precincts, the vote today was Clement 278,734, Oigati 180,259 and Farris 194,190.

In the Third District of south-east Tennessee, Frazier was edged out by Wilkes T. Thrasher Jr., 41. The unofficial vote from the 11-county district that includes Chattanooga was Thrasher 35,267, Frazier 35,177. Raymond Prater had 2,685 votes.

Loser staged a nip-and-tuck battle in the Fifth (Nashville) District with former State Sen. Richard Fulton, making his third try for the congressional seat.

Final unofficial returns gave Fulton 30,670 votes, Loser 30,767

Clement, the "boy wonder" of Tennessee politics when he was first elected governor 10 years ago, called his victory a mandate for another "four years" of hard work and earnest effort to make a greater Tennessee.

He appeared briefly before a crowd outside his campaign headquarters after his opponents conceded early today.

"The people spoke," he said. "They endorsed our six years of service."

Clement made his record as governor from 1953-59 the chief issue of the campaign and invited Oigati and Farris to inspect it. He said his election would mean further advances in education, public welfare, roads and industrial expansion.

Oigati and Farris accused Clement of misrepresenting his record and called for him to explain his association with Billie Sol Estes, the indicted Texas financier who was a colonel on Clement's staff. Clement declined to discuss Estes.

Rep. Clifford Davis, the only other incumbent congressman with opposition, easily won re-nomination for the Ninth Memphis District seat he has held for 22 years.

In the Republican First District of Upper East Tennessee, State Rep. James Quillen of Kingsport defeated four rivals in the GOP primary for the seat being vacated by Louise Goff Reece, widow of the late Rep. B. Carroll Reece.

Z. Alexander Looby, a Negro city councilman at Nashville, failed in his bid to become the first member of his race to win a seat on the Tennessee Supreme Court.

### Local Television Has New Name

Change in call letters has been announced by the local television station operating on Channel 4.

It is now identified as KWAB-TV, the result of a contest conducted by the station. The change became effective last night after approval of the Federal Communications Commission.

In the contest, there were several entries listing KWAB-TV in recognition of Webb A. Faroe Rose, but the earliest post-marked was that of J. R. Piper, 2002 Johnson, it was announced by station manager Bill Edgar. Piper receives a \$50 award.

## ON THE SHELF

**TRAVELS WITH CHARLEY.** By John Steinbeck. Viking, \$4.95.

In the autumn of 1960 a poodle named Charley made a tour around America in a pickup truck that had been fitted with a camper top.

This redoubtable beast was accompanied by Steinbeck, who as an observer and reporter has the fine advantage of virtually total recall of everything he has seen and heard.

Charley's purpose was to have a good time. Steinbeck's was to "try to rediscover this monster land," because after 25 years of wandering around the world he had lost touch with America's scenes and people.

This is no study in depth of the country's geography or the beliefs and opinions of its citizens. The author doesn't claim that it is. He just took to the road and soaked up impressions and conversations. His account makes interesting reading, flavored by the writer's own personality.

Steinbeck sampled the taciturn reactions of the people in down-east Maine, marvelled at the nature of turnpike travel and the lives of long distance truckers, and fell in love with "the calm of the mountains and rolling grasslands" of Montana. He paid a nostalgic visit to his old stamping grounds in California and ruefully concluded "you can't go home again."

He ate chili and turkey with millionaires in Texas and had a shuddering look at the school integration battle in New Orleans. He met some likable characters, not the least of which was an old actor on the loose. He also met a vitriolic, almost psychotic Southerner who screamed "nigger-lover" at him.

Occasionally he interrupted his camping to stop at a motel or hotel, and one of the most interesting chapters is about his detective work in a hotel room that had just been vacated.

Charley is an important and delightful part of the story. With Steinbeck's salty observations and wry humor, this becomes a pleasant volume to read.

### Independent Oil Men Urge No Import Hike

WASHINGTON (AP)—Independent oil operators told the Senate Finance Committee that their industry is in serious trouble. They urged that the administration's trade expansion bill be amended to bar further increases in oil imports.

Harold Decker of Houston, president of the Independent Petroleum Association of America, asked that imports by the giant oil companies be rolled back.

Decker proposed that the bill be amended to limit oil imports, excluding residual fuel oil, to 14 per cent of domestic crude production.

This was the relationship in 1956, he said, adding that the health and vigor of the domestic industry had been declining ever since.

Such an amendment he said, would mean a cut of 250,000 barrels a day in the 1,300,000 barrels of daily imports, not counting residual, coming into the United States in the first half of this year.

"The domestic oil producing industry is in serious economic difficulties," Decker testified. "The industry has suffered a continuous decline since 1956."

"The national economy during this time has increased almost 25 per cent. Crude oil production, however, has been static."

Robert Force of Dallas, appearing for the Texas Independent Producers and Royalty Owners Association, said present oil imports limitation program as managed by the executive branch of the government is ineffective.

"We are presently importing more than 700,000 barrels each day than we did in the year 1954, and the ratio with domestic production has jumped from 16.6 to in excess of 26 per cent," he said.

Domestic production during the same period has been almost static so that foreign oil "has enjoyed virtually the total growth in the U.S. market," Force said.

About 90 per cent of these imports are brought in by the handful of large international American oil companies," he testified.
