Jamaica Pledges U.S. Friendship

KINGSTON, Jamaica AP—If the United States ever needs a military base in a newly independent Jamaica, it can establish one without commitments Prime Minister Sir Alexander Bustamante said Tuesday night.

Bustamante told a news conference the United States has not asked for such a base nor should his statement be construed as an invitation to Washington to set one up on this Caribbean island 90 miles south of Cuba.

Bustamante said the United States and Jamaica "are friendly nations and the United States can come in when and if it pleases." The United States maintained bases in Jamaica during World War II under the destroyers-for-bases deal made by the United States and Great Britain. The bases were returned after the war.

Views Differ On Time Senate Will Finish

WASHINGTON (AP)—Senate Republican leader Everett M. Dirksen of Illinois said today Congress still will be here in October if President Kennedy pushes a "must" legislative program.

Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey of Minnesota, the deputy Democratic leader, has outlined a 10-point program discussed at a White House meeting Tuesday. He has said Congress can pass it and wind up its work by Sept. 15.

"Is he kidding?" Dirksen asked in an interview. "The Senate won't even get the trade expansion bill until after Labor Day. The Democratic leaders are holding up the tax revision bill until after that. If Congress does all the things Sen. Humphrey says the President wants done, we'll still be here in October."

CAMPAIGN TIME

Dirksen and other candidates for re-election in the Senate and House are anxious to end the session and get home to campaign. In that situation, the Republican leader said there is likely to be "quite a bit of wreckage from the Kennedy program left behind" when Congress adjourns.

Besides the trade and tax bills, Dirksen said he thinks Kennedy probably will get the communications satellite drug control and U.S. bond measures Humphrey mentioned. He said youth employment and mass immunization bills have little chance.

He indicated he doesn't believe Kennedy will get any of the tight controls he wants in any farm bill that may be passed. He said there will be a "further attack" in the House on Senate-passed authority for the President to initiate public works projects in a threatened recession.

NO PREDICTIONS

Dirksen made no predictions about the fate of a committee-approved mass transportation bill. The Democratic policy committee did not act on it Tuesday when it cleared the drug and farm bills for later Senate consideration.

Democratic leader Mike Mansfield of Montana said he hopes to take on the farm bill next week if the Senate can act by then on the communications satellite measure, which will return from the Foreign Relations Committee Friday noon. He said Saturday Senate meetings will be the order of the day for the rest of the session.

Mansfield said the drug bill will follow the farm bill. He would not go beyond that in scheduling any measures.

AMENDMENTS

The Senate Judiciary Committee which is working on drug legislation is considering a number of tightening amendments proposed this week by Kennedy.

Two of the President's recommendations for further safeguarding the public against dangerous drugs were approved Tuesday. One would permit the immediate

STOCKHOLM AP—A Swedish-American team sent up a second rocket for scientific observations Tuesday night at Vidussel in northern Sweden.

A powder charge in the capsule of the 4-foot-7-inch American-Arcas rocket exploded and formed an artificial cloud for study of the winds of the upper atmosphere. American experts said the weather was perfect and the launching was a complete success.

Earlier Tuesday the team sent up an American Nike-Cajun rocket with instruments for study of clouds and the northern lights.

Romney Unopposed For GOP Nomination

Former automaker George Romney was Michigan's biggest vote-getter Tuesday as he ran unopposed for the Republican gubernatorial nomination.

In other primary elections Tuesday, Sens. Frank Carlson and James B. Pearson won Republican nominations in Kansas and

Sen. Edward V. Long, usually a backer of the Kennedy administration, won Democratic nomination in Missouri.

Romney, former president of American Motors, had tallied 390,540 votes with 4,516 of the state's 5,199 precincts counted while Democratic Gov. John B. Swainson, also unopposed, had 266,066 votes.

As expected, Swainson ran ahead in the normally Democratic stronghold of Detroit and Wayne County, while Romney mentioned as a possible GOP presidential candidate was tempered by memories. Five straight times, beginning in 1948, Republicans polled more votes in the primary election only to see a Democratic candidate win in November. Romney himself said in a statement Tuesday night that "any attempt to apply the vote totals to the statewide campaign for governor would be misleading."

Vote turnouts were light in all three states with most candidates for major offices having little or no opposition.

In Michigan, Alvin Bentley, a former representative, won the Republican nomination for congressman at-large without opposition. Democratic state chairman Neil Staebler, also unopposed, won his party's nomination. Bentley, like Romney, ran well ahead.

In the only major test of political figures, Sen. Pearson decisively defeated former Gov. Edward Arn of Kansas. Pearson, appointed to the Senate, earlier this

year after the death of Sen. Andrew Schoepel, seeks election to the remaining four years of the term. Opposing him in November will be Democrat Paul Ayward.

Carlson easily won renomination over former Joe Corpstein. K. L. Smith was running well ahead of Joseph J. Poizner for the Democratic nomination to oppose Carlson this fall.

Also winning Republican nomination to a second term in Kansas was Gov. John Anderson, who defeated teacher Harvey F. Crouch. State Rep. Dale Saffels was ahead of former state treasurer George Hart for the Democratic gubernatorial nomination.

The only incumbent Kansas House member with a contest, Republican Rep. George McVey, was losing. Joe Skubitz, former administrative assistant to Sen. Schoepel, held a narrow lead over McVey with only a handful of precincts not reported in the 5th District.

Sen. Long coasted to an easy victory in the Missouri Democratic senatorial primary over two little-known opponents. A former Democrat, Kansas City banker Crosby Kemper, defeated four opponents for the Republican nomination to oppose Long in November.

Heat Keeps Up Siege

Searing heat is keeping up its severest siege so far this summer in Texas, and broad stretches of the state are getting dryer and dryer.

Except for a few patches of low clouds which developed about dawn, skies remained clear in all areas Wednesday. The weatherman predicted no change.

In South Texas, Gonzales recorded an unofficial high of 110 straight days of marks hitting 100 or higher. It also was Gonzales' 30th day in a row without rain.

Drought was hurting even the normally damp Houston area, and concern rose for a multi-million-dollar cattle industry in that coastal sector.

Houston received just .07 inch of rain in July and none so far in August. Since Jan. 1 it has measured 16.81 inches of moisture, compared to 37.55 at this point last year.

"The grass has stopped growing," Harris County farm agent Rayford G. Kay said in Houston. "If it doesn't rain soon, we may not get the regrowth needed to go into the winter months. Two more weeks and the situation will get critical."

Tuesday's top temperature at Gonzales matched the official high of 110 recorded at Presidio, the Big Bend hot spot on the Mexican border. Galveston was the state's coolest spot with a maximum of 91.

Wichita Falls had an afternoon high of 107. Laredo, San Angelo and Wink 106. Lufkin 105. Junction 104. Childress, Collette Station, Midland and Waco 103. San Antonio 102. Abilene, Austin, Beaumont, El Paso and Houston 101 and Dallas and Fort Worth 101.

Bad Drivers Hurt By Present Rates

AUSTIN (AP)—Bad drivers and teen-agers may have trouble buying auto policies if Texas keeps its new insurance rates, was told Tuesday.

The Texas Association of Insurance Agents said that unless the board gives safe drivers a 5 per cent credit, insurance companies will begin offering dividends to accident-free drivers and refusing to insure drivers with accidents on their records.

Under the new rates, companies are making plans to give 15-20 per cent dividends to good drivers. John Boyce Jr. of

Amarillo, association spokesman, told the board.

"We are worried about the market for two and three-pointers," he said.

He referred to persons who were assessed penalty points under the old safe driving plan. The board threw out the plan last month after 2½ years and set new rates, based only on auto class and territory, to take effect Aug. 1.

Boyce asked the board to give drivers 5 per cent credit after one year of accident-free driving, 10 per cent after two years and 15 per cent after three years of safe driving.

He said the companies' plans to give good drivers lower premiums indicate the association's proposal would not bring a general increase.

Carl Hunt of Dallas, association president, said public reaction to reviving a safe driving plan would be favorable.

"The customers are demanding a difference in rates for better drivers," Hunt said. "We think that after one year under this plan it will be backed up by your figures. If you make a mistake, you won't be very wrong."

Board chairman Ned Price said the board is obligated to make a thorough study before adopting a new plan and a study is in progress.

Angry Englishmen Tear Up Fascist Encampment

LONDON (AP)—Angry villagers led by the local publican stormed a Nazi camp in the English countryside Tuesday night in search of George Lincoln Rockwell.

They leveled the camp and routed the jack-booted Fascists but found no trace of the self-styled American fuhrer.

The vigilantes from the Gloucestershire village of Guiting Power launched their attack in a woodland area known as Dead and Bury Hollow a few hours after the British government ordered the leader of the American Nazi party deported.

Scotland Yard was ordered to find Rockwell, but the Home Office said today he still had not been located.

Rockwell slipped into the country over the weekend to attend a Fascist rally at the camp organized by Colin Jordan's British National Socialist Movement in the

rolling Cotswold Hills. Then Rockwell disappeared.

The villagers, however, wanted to see for themselves that Rockwell had not returned to the camp. Walter Morley, burly landlord of the village pub, led the assault. At his side was Clement Timmons, 57, champion badger catcher of the Cotswolds. Behind them came 100 more villagers.

The invaders punched their way past cudge-swinging guards and began tearing down tents. Fights broke out.

A shotgun blast shredded a big swastika flag fluttering above the camp. A villager ripped the flag down and carried it off as a battle souvenir.

The outnumbered Nazis, about 50 in all, fled into nearby woods and fields.

The arrival of 70 policemen broke off the fight.

Marilyn Still Loved Life In Last Interview

When I saw Marilyn Monroe for the last time, she had the figure of a starlet, but the unmistakable aura of a star.

It was two months ago on the set of "Something's Got to Give" and she gave one of her last interviews.

Actually it was more like a conversation with an old friend, for she was warm and witty. She was still glowing from her tumultuous reception at President Kennedy's birthday celebration in Madison Square Garden.

She looked great. Gone was the pot tummy that she had displayed in recent movies. She had dropped 15 pounds and I asked her how she did it.

WHO NEEDS FAT? "It helps to have a bad gall bladder," said Marilyn who had hers removed a year ago.

She talked gaily of her forthcoming 36th birthday and said, "I like celebrating birthdays. I enjoy knowing that I'm alive."

She was doing a scene with two child actors who were playing her children in the film. Her concern for them was strangely touching.

The boy was shivering after a swimming scene and she wouldn't continue until an electric heater was installed to warm him.

Between scenes her conversation was punctuated with high laughter. Despite her exhilaration, there was an undertone of the trouble that lay ahead.

I mentioned that the studio was unhappy with her absence because she went to the President's birthday party especially since she had been out of the picture many days with illness.

BIG HONOR "I told the studio six weeks ago I consider it an honor to appear before the President of the United States."

It was shortly afterward that relations with the studio erupted with her firing and the hurling of threats and lawsuits. Marilyn dropped into seclusion.

Everyone has his own memories of Marilyn Monroe. My own go back to her early days on the same lot when she was a young and eager starlet. She seemed little different from the throng of starlets in the talent factories of that era, except perhaps that she gave a better interview.

And when you saw her on the screen for the first time—slithering on a couch as Louis Calhern's mistress in "Asphalt Jungle"—you knew that she had that quality that separates stars from starlets.

There were other times when she appeared at an awards banquet in a clinging, eye-popping metallic gown and emcee Jerry Lewis expressed the thought of everyone: "Is she for real?" When she slinked into another dinner late and luscious, and evoked a tirade from Joan Crawford for "poor taste."

NO MORE There was the time a tearful Marilyn appeared on the arm of Jerry Giesler before the Beverly Hills home she shared no more with Joe DiMaggio. A happier time one Halloween at her New York apartment when she was married to Arthur Miller. Kids came by to play "trick or treat" and she didn't understand—she had never played such things as a child.

There were other places, other times, but there won't be any more. The Marilyn Monroe story is over.

It will long be debated whether she was an actress. No one will ever doubt that she was a star.

Students, Profs To End Summer Stay In Capital

WASHINGTON (AP)—Texas college students and professors who have spent the summer here soon will be heading back to resume the academic life.

And, the same for some public school marms.

Prof. Robert Miller, Ph.D., newly appointed head of the Baylor University political science department, will return to Waco with first-hand knowledge of how the federal government operates.

Miller, on leave from the Baylor faculty, has spent the past year on the staff of Rep. W. R. Poague, D-Tex. He got an insight not only into the practical workings of a typical congressional office, but into the practical working relationship between all branches of government, especially between the legislative and the executive.

Returning to Texas with Miller will be his wife, the former Ann Yardaman of Dallas, who teaches English at Baylor. Both attended Baylor as students—they met when she took a course under him when he began teaching after World War II Navy service. They have two children, Robert Jr., 9, and Laurie Anne, 8.

Another Baylor faculty member who has spent much of the summer here is William Toland, assistant professor of philosophy. He has been with the Peace Corps temporarily helping out its training program, spending some time in Albuquerque and in New York City.

Also returning to the Baylor campus, to enter law school, will be Coke Mills Jr., Waco, who has spent the past year here by Poague's recommendation working in the House chamber. He received his bachelor's degree at Baylor after two years at SMTU.

Teaching political science at Texas Tech next semester will be David M. Welborn, a 27-year-old Ph.D., who has been here under a congressional fellowship awarded by the American Political Science Association.

A native of Driscoll, near Corpus Christi, Welborn attended public schools in Paris, Paris Junior College and the University of Texas.

Ft. Hood Aids Texas Economy

FT HOOD (AP)—This military post in Central Texas is an \$84.5 million annual industry for the area.

That amount will be the payroll for 1962 for the civilians and military personnel, Ft. Hood authorities estimate.

They estimate this is about \$25 million above last year.

Civilian pay will amount to \$12.5 million in 1962 and military pay equals \$7.2 million.

Military personnel is approximately 40,000 and their dependents are 25,000.

Civilian workers total more than 2,000.

Navy Releases Shelter Volunteer

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Navy released Thursday one of the 100 volunteers taking part in an underground shelter test after he began to show signs of heat exhaustion.

The man was treated at the Navy's hospital in Bethesda, Md., where the shelter is located.

Temperature within the shelter during the last 24 hours has averaged 91 degrees, with a high point of 92.5.

Two of three young Texas public school teachers will soon be returning to classrooms. The third likes Washington so well she plans to stay.

The trio, all teaching in Houston area's Spring Branch school, are Linda McMahan, Martha Hill and Ann Pender. They came here with no assurances of getting jobs, but they figured they'd soon find something. They did.

First to win employment was Ann, from Denton and a 1959 graduate of North Texas State College, who went with the Labor Department. She plans to stay.

Linda, a '59 Baylor graduate

originally from Dallas, works for Sen. John Tower, R-Tex. She will teach 10th grade speech and drama at Richardson High School, near Dallas, next semester. Martha, also Baylor '59 and formerly from Port Arthur, got a job here with the General Services Administration. She plans to return to Spring Branch.

Carolyn Kellam of Austin, sophomore at the U. of T. next semester, has worked this summer in Vice President Lyndon Johnson's office.

Other Texas college students who have spent the summer here and soon will go back include Katy Cox of Fort Worth, who has been on Yarborough's staff, a junior next semester at Austin College in Sherman, and Margaret Schuler of Waco, returning to Baylor after a summer job at the Agriculture Department.

Joe Cheavens, May graduate of Baylor, has been working as a doorman in the House chamber. He will go to Harvard next month as a law student. Joe is a son of Dave Cheavens, long time head of the Associated Press Bureau in Austin, who now heads the Baylor U. Journalism department.

South African Censorship Gets Wilder

By RICHARD KASISCHKE JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP)—"His words cannot go into print."

So said a headline in the Johannesburg Star. It appeared over a story about a court case involving Leon Levy and the story said in part:

"After the charge had been placed, Magistrate D. J. Bosman asked, 'What do you plead?'"

"Levy: (He did plead but his words cannot be published.)"

Levy's name is on a list of 102 South Africans whose spoken words and writings must not be published.

In this way the government of Prime Minister Hendrik Verwoerd seeks to crack down on those it calls subversives and Communists.

George Peake, whose name appears on the list of the censored, is a member of the City Council of Cape Town. A South African Press Association report about a council meeting went this way:

"Mr. Peake spoke during the debate on whether the chairman of the markets and licenses committee should accompany the di-

rector of the market on a tour of outside market production areas.

"In terms of the general law amendment bill, Mr. Peake's speech may not be reported."

The general law amendments act is called the antisabotage law. It rolled through the last Parliament despite opposition from liberals.

The liberals charged it is a weapon forged by Verwoerd's regime to hold on to its policies of

strict segregation of Negroes and other nonwhites from whites.

On the list is Albert Luthuli, the African leader and winner of the Nobel Peace Prize for his fight against segregation. Before the antisabotage bill, Luthuli wrote a column for a Johannesburg newspaper but it was dropped long ago in anticipation of the crackdown.

Under the law, newspapers could publish Luthuli's obituary but if a banned person orates at his funeral—not a word of that can be published.

Is Kennedy Anti-Business?

EDITOR'S NOTE—In general, the American business community distrusts the Kennedy administration. What are the reasons? What do administration spokesmen say in reply? Associated Press reporter Reisman Morin presents the arguments from both sides in this third of five articles on Kennedy at midterm.

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Kennedy has tried to convince businessmen that he is not "anti-business."

He meets them in groups. He exchanges letters with David Rockefeller, president of Chase Manhattan Bank, New York, outlining his economic policy and philosophy. Or he invites the individual businessmen to the White House, seats him on the long sofa in his office, and says, "I'd like to hear what you think I should do."

But the impact on the business community as a whole has not been notably deep. In many quarters, the belief persists that he is "anti-business."

INSTINCT AT WORK
In some cases, the motivation is visceral. An instinctive feeling that Democratic presidents are unsympathetic to business. The more specific reasons that emerge in conversations with businessmen go like this—

1. "I don't have any confidence in him." He says one thing but does another.

2. "He never had to meet a payroll, so he doesn't know the value of the dollar."

3. "Kennedy may be all right but I'm scared stiff by some of the wild-eyed theorists around him."

4. "I don't hold any brief for the way Roger Blough (chairman of the board of U.S. Steel) handled the price increase. But Kennedy's reaction was bound to frighten business."

5. He played mighty rough with management in the steel case, but I don't believe he will play rough with labor."

6. He says a budget deficit is just a "myth" (a reference to the President's speech at Yale, last June 11).

THE ANSWERS

And these are the answers of government officials—

1. Business had confidence in presidents Herbert Hoover and Dwight D. Eisenhower, but four recessions developed during their administrations. Business confidence is based, in fact, on the ability of the economy to invest, produce and consume.

2. Kennedy expresses concern over the outflow of gold and deficits in the balance of payments. He says the dollar will not be devaluated. And he recently gave business a tax break—long in the works—which was estimated at \$1.5 billion, on depreciation of plant equipment. A Cabinet officer points out, "that break could have been given at any time in the past 10 years."

3. Policy advisors advise, but policy is made in the deliberations of many men who would not be described as "wild-eyed."

4. In the steel case, Kennedy considered the competitive position of American steel and the impact of steel prices on the prices of other commodities. He calculated that the increase would take \$3 billion from the economy. He also felt a "question of good

MEXICO CITY (AP)—A spokesman for Mexico's private enterprise has called for "greater participation" of foreign capital in this country's business to achieve faster economic development.

Speaking before the Rotarian Club of Mexico, Juan Sanchez Navarro, president of the Mexican Federation of Industrial Chambers and of the Modelo Brewery, said foreign investment can be considered, "anywhere in the world," as one of the true instruments to achieve economic progress.

Settles Renovating Nearing Completion, Crawford Next

Lloyd A. Sifford Jr., whose home is in Atlanta, Ga., and who is a hotel consultant by profession, is leaving Big Spring Friday after nearly a year's residence here.

He has been directing the renovation of Hotel Settles—a job which he estimates is now about 90 per cent complete.

"We still have to redecorate the ballroom," he said, "and there are some other odds and ends to be cleared away. In general, however, the job is about done—enough so that I can go back home."

He has an assignment to overhaul another hotel and will get on that job in a few weeks.

In the meantime, he said, plans for the remodeling of the old Crawford Hotel into an apartment building are rapidly shaping. Contracts, Sifford said, will be awarded in the near future for the job. The Crawford Hotel has been for the most part vacant since last autumn.

Sifford said that the Hotel Settles remodeling job involved a complete paint job inside and all wood exteriors. Carpets were placed in all rooms where needed.

All halls were given new floor covering.

Furniture in the rooms, for the most part, has been replaced.

Not in place, but to be installed soon will be television-radio combinations for each room. Pictures are also being ordered.

Ceiling in all shops on the main floor have been lowered and equipped with new lighting. The building has been air conditioned and the lobby has been redone completely.

Sifford is pleased, he said, that the renovation has been carried out with so little interference with the operation of the hotel.

"We have enjoyed good business," he said, "throughout the time the work has been under way."

A number of new special facilities have been provided which will increase the comfort and convenience of the hotel for guests.

Sifford said he had enjoyed his sojourn in Big Spring and would probably be coming back on a visit later on.

U.N. Signs

MEXICO CITY (AP)—International highway signs designed by the United Nations will be introduced on all Mexican roads.

Sources close to the Ministry of Communications said the old system of highway signs will be made to conform with the U.N.-approved series, both within and outside the main cities of Mexico, and along all the national roads.

Japanese Want Room in Telstar

TOKYO (AP)—Japan's postal affairs ministry said Tuesday the Japanese plan to open negotiations soon for use of U.S.-launched Telstar satellites.

The postal affairs ministry said Japan wants to sign an agreement similar to those West Germany, France, Britain, Italy and Brazil had signed with the U.S. National Aeronautics and Space Agency.

Local Water System Wins Merit Award

Roy Hester, superintendent of the Big Spring water filter plant, has been notified by the Southwest Section of American Water Works Association, that an Award of Merit is being sent to the Big Spring department. Hester is a member of the association.

"I am proud and pleased to send you an Award of Merit for your excellent safety record in the operation of your water works system for the year 1961," L. A. Jackson, secretary-treasurer of the Southwest Section wrote Hester. "This award is made by the Southwest Section of the AWWA, comprising members in the four states of Arkansas, Louisiana, Oklahoma and Texas."

Hester said his department had been accident-free for much longer than a year and that safety was one of the main features practiced in daily work.

The contributions bring to \$266,375 the total received to finance tests costing \$1,000 to \$1,500.

The fund now has a balance of \$63,375 which will pay for 50 to 60 more tests in the field. Four survey crews began operations today after a four-day weekend. They had surveyed 89 crooked wells as of Thursday.

Three crews worked in the nearby Hawkins Field, where five wells have been found deviated to take oil from neighboring leases.

Wilson's office said state agencies coordinating the investigations will hold a monthly work conference Wednesday.

'El Cid' Is Based On Old Legends

Squadrons of cavalry, an armada, the women of whole villages, the smiths and forges of a giant foundry, jewelers, antiquarians, painters, and virtually every able-bodied man in a 50-mile stretch of Spanish Mediterranean coastline took part in the making of "El Cid."

The spectacular Samuel Bronston Super Technirama Technicolor presentation starring Charlton Heston and Sophia Loren begins a special engagement at the State Theater Wednesday after extended runs as a roadshow across the country.

Heston plays the lusty medieval warrior hero of the title, which means "The Lord," or "Leader," and Miss Loren, the Lady Chimene, who after plotting the great knight's death was to become his wife and fight beside him in one of the most celebrated love stories of history.

More than 12,000 people of Spain alone, where most of "El Cid" was filmed, flung their energies and talents into the creation of this cinematic retelling of a mighty drama directed by Anthony Mann.

The movie story of El Cid is not entirely accurate from an historical viewpoint, but this could not be helped. The real man and the legend that made him into Spain's national hero were not the same by any means, and if Bronston was to receive the full cooperation of the Spanish government and people in his costly undertaking, it behooved him to tell the story as the Spaniards themselves have been telling it for the past 900 years.

The historical background is correct and highly colorful, but the movie's plot departs from what is known of the real "hero."

THE REAL MAN
El Cid was really a warrior who got bested in the game of political intrigue, and turned to banditry as a result. His raids and his military prowess, however, carved him out a tiny kingdom of his own, and he played the part of pawn between the Spaniards, the Moors, and the invading North Africans. But it was a pawn with terrible power.

In the movie version, El Cid is depicted as victorious in the final scene over the invaders, a fantastic new set of Moslems who were foes both to Spaniards and Moors. In historical fact, El Cid died rather ingloriously, beaten by the invaders, he retired from his active life and died apparently of shame.

A MAN'S MAN
Still, El Cid was enough of a man's man to inspire his fellow countrymen. After his death, Spain did to him what France did to Roland and Charlemagne, weaving legend into the brighter historical facts and forgetting the more embarrassing aspects. Legend gave rise to ballad, ballad gave rise to epic—and finally, two great dramas culminated the legend of El Cid.

These works were "The Youth of the Cid" by De Castro, and "The Cid" by Corneille, both dramas adding romantic conflict to the old epic and taking other literary and dramatic license.

DRAMATIC SOURCES

It was from these sources that the motion picture version of "El Cid" was drawn. Thus, even though the viewer does not see the real person depicted on the screen, he may be sure that he is seeing a reasonable facsimile, for El Cid was a giant of a man.

Spain profited by the visitation by Bronston and his movie-makers, since they restored many of the crumbling castles used in "El Cid," and to the people of Penedas, on the Mediterranean coast, Bronston presented the great Moorish gates he had caused to be wrought and set into the walls of the ancient city where he re-staged, first, the siege, and then the defense of Valencia by El Cid's forces.

The filming of these scenes consumed five weeks. It was for them that the Spanish Army left its cavalry, Madrid sent 300 riders of her famed Municipal Honor Guard, and every able-bodied man "call went out, and commercial ships were converted into a black-sailed Moslem armada."

COLORFUL CASTLES

North of there, the company moved to the faded castle country of Valladolid, and at two of the most colorful castles director Mann shot the scenes of El Cid's young manhood.

One of the most beautiful works of Gothic architecture in all Europe is the castle of Belmonte, overlooking the province of La Mancha, stamping ground of Don Quixote himself. This became the setting for the jousting tournament of Calahorra, in which El Cid slays the giant champion of Castile.

Bronston did not merely restore and use old Spanish structures. One of the largest sets ever built, the Cathedral of Burgos, rose on the back lot at Sevilla Studios, Madrid, and was used for only three scenes—the wedding of El Cid and Chimene, the coronation in which El Cid forces King Alfonso to swear his innocence of his brother's death, and the scene of the hero's prayer as he leaves Burgos for exile.

ARMORY TASK

The task of arming the film's 7,000 Christian and Moslem knights went to the Garrido Foundry of Toledo, makers of some of the world's most finely tempered steel, whose craftsmen took three months turning out the broadswords, maces, scimitars, battle axes, lances, and daggers.

More than 10,000 new costumes were created for "El Cid," including some 700 dazzling garments of velvet and brocade, made by Italy's Peruzzi & Cerrattini.

Research on El Cid's times took antiquarians all the way from the archives of Spain's Escorial to the museums and open Moorish tombs of Sicily, a Moslem stronghold until the 16th Century.
