This is interpreted as a part of a campaign of pressure to oust Western garrisons from West Berlin. There will be other devices, and pressure can well increase.

We made it plain before that we are in Berlin because we have a right to be in Berlin. If Russia is probing for signs of softening then it is time to make it clear again that we are going to stay there so long as there is need for us to do so to protect our rights and those of our allies This calls for a stubborn resoluteness on our part no matter how ticklish the situ ation may get.

TEMPORARY PAVING projects are certainly not the best way to spend money, but this street needs paving of some kind. If permanent paving is unobtainable, then temporary paving is the next best thing.

So far, since World War II, all official efforts toward civil defense have resulted in a feeble and farcical boondoggle. Since the last major Berlin crisis a year ago, where there was another sudden flurry about shelters for the faceless taxpayer, we have mercifully been spared the

usual, ineffective civil defense yak out of

Washington and various state capitals.

IN THE INTERLUDE, we taxpayers have gone about the business of earning a living and ponying up taxes for nuclear warfare. We have been-or, at least, I have been-grateful that officialdom has stopped its long and futile twin policy of wringing its hands over the fate of us civilians and doing nothing about usdoing nothing except releasing horrifying statistics and prophecies about the mass-slaughter capabilities love that word 'capabilities' of multi-megaton bombs That, plus the difficulty and the frightful expense of saving civilians.

A, least we taxpayers haven't had to listen to all that monotonous old clatter in recent months. And my tired ears had begun to perk up.

BUT THE PEACE that passeth under-Armed Services Committee. Hanna Company which sold nickel to the U. S. government at huge profits during the Korean War rearmament.

ESTES IS A GRAIN specular who made-and lost-a lot of money by playing fast and loose with government regulations in the Agriculture Department. probably with the connivance of federal

Both men enriched themselves because the government was trying to stockpile minerals and food, and because the contact between free enterprise producers and government purchasers lends itself toprofiteering. Humphrey seems to be well within his legal rights. Estes is under several indictments for fraud. Regardless of what happens to these men, there is something very wrong with a system which permits large sums of money to move from the pockets of the taxpavers into the pockets of clever and greedy

THERE IS ANOTHER phase of these investigations-the political phase. 


