

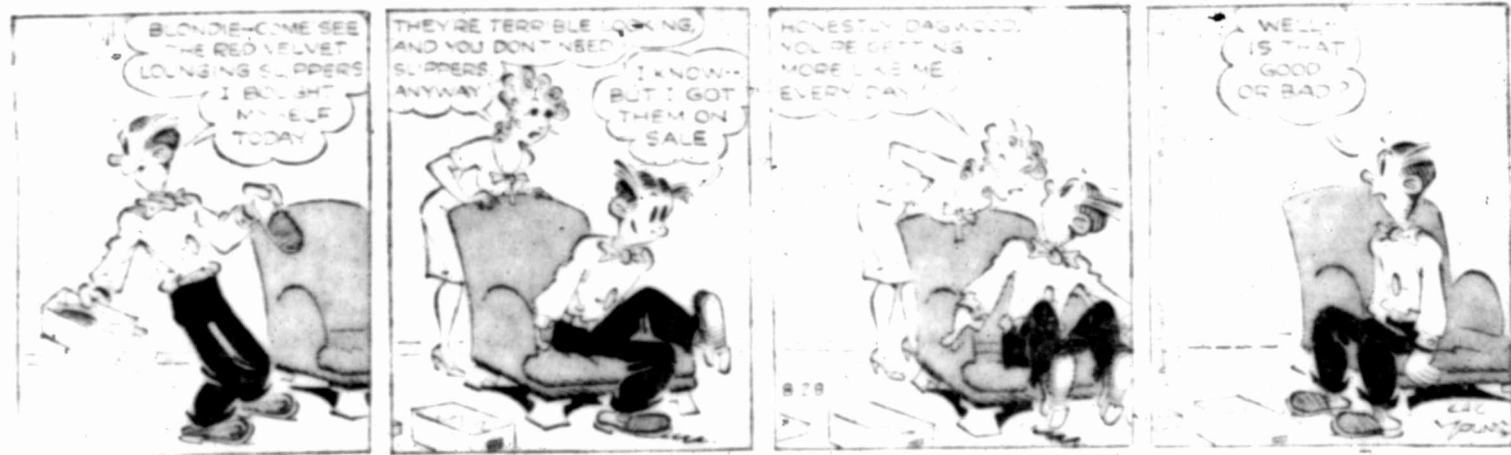

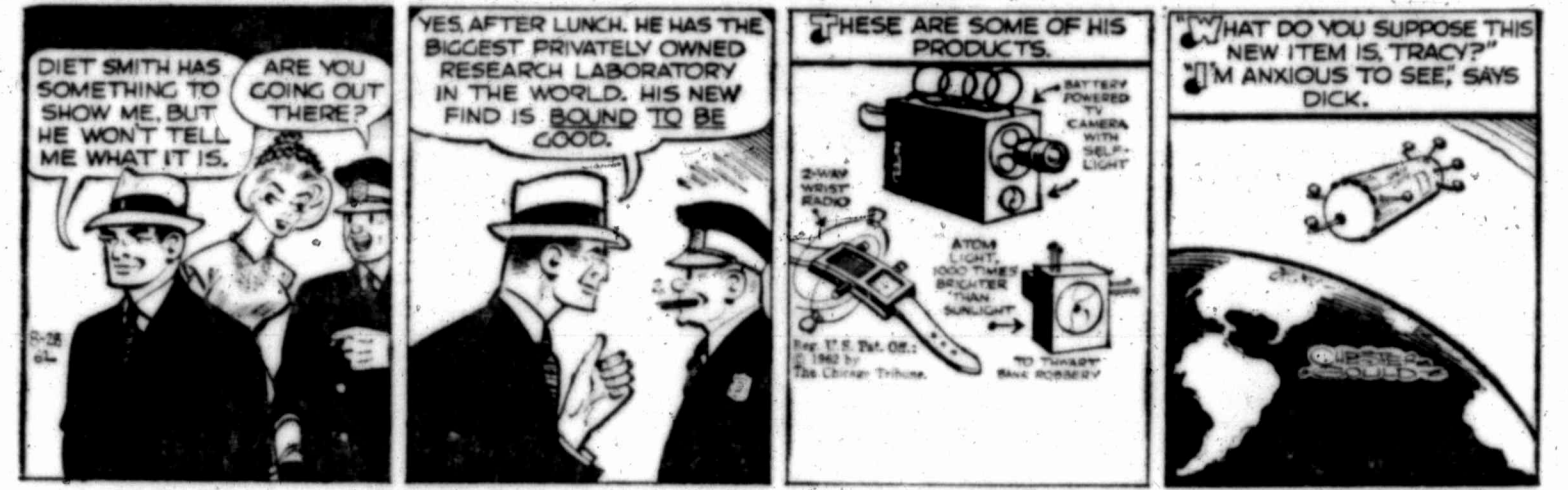

Congress Okays Satellite Bill, Sends It To Kennedy

WASHINGTON, AP—President Kennedy has on his desk today the communications satellite bill he wanted.

It sets up a private, profit-making corporation to run the U.S. portion of an eventual global network on space relay stations.

The House approved a Senate version of the bill 372 to 16 Monday, foreclosing any chance to another Senate filibuster.

A small group of House liberals argued again that the bill represents a giveaway of millions of taxpayers' dollars spent on space research that makes the revolutionary communications system possible.

Rep. William Springer, R-Ill., said, "If you say this is a giveaway bill, you're saying the President sent down a giveaway bill to the Congress of the United States." He added, "The prestige of this country is on the line with this bill."

Rep. Owen Harris, D-Ark., chairman of the House Commerce Committee, said, "Our nation needs it. It needs it now and without further delay."

Rep. W. R. Poage, D-Tex., who voted against the bill, said the corporation's board of directors would be dominated by the American Telephone & Telegraph Co.

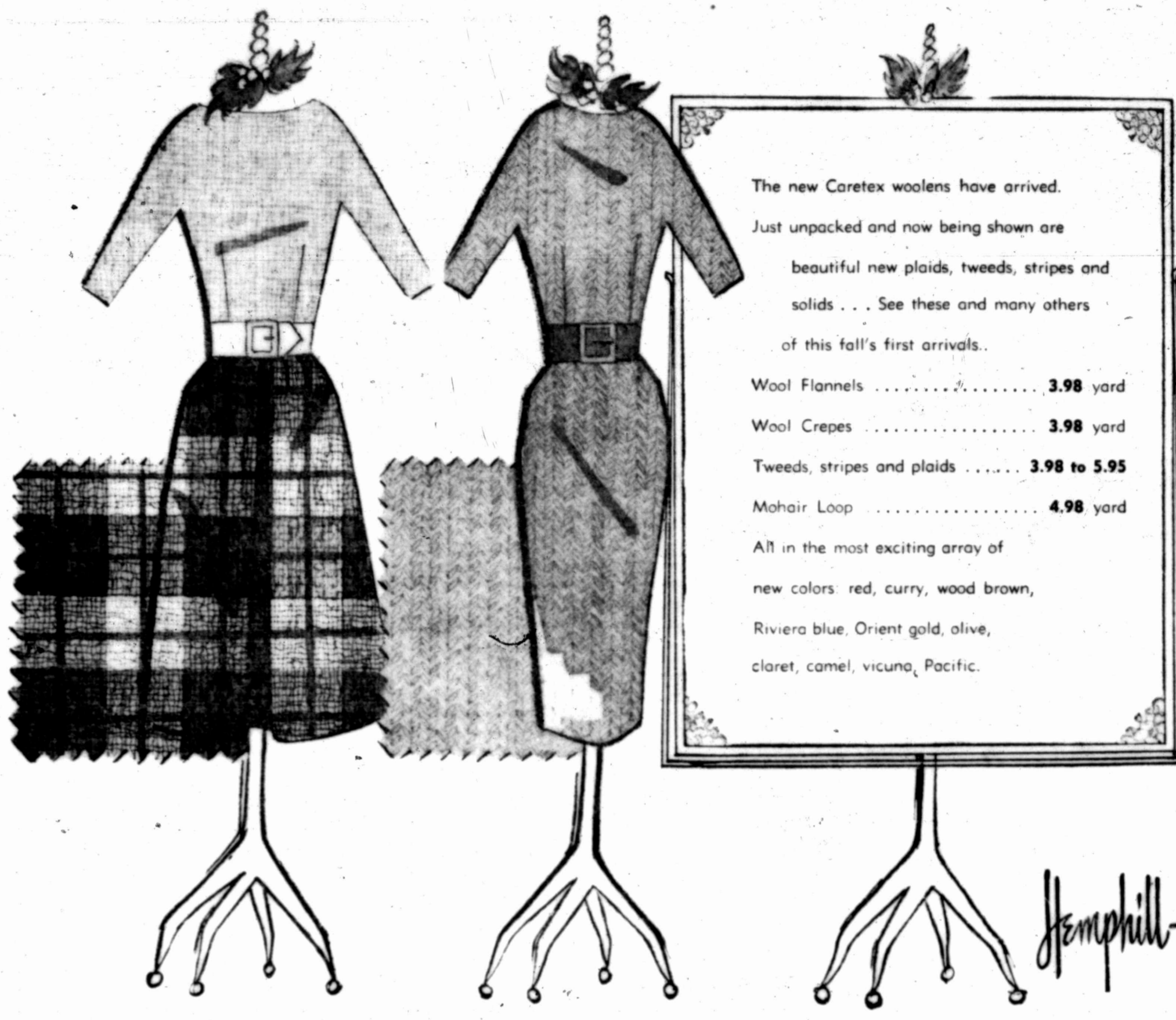

Small Motor Is Ace In Hole For Venus-Bound Vehicle

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP)—A small ace-in-the-hole motor weighing 37.3 pounds is the big key to America's attaining the world's most significant interplanetary achievement—shooting the Mariner 2 spacecraft on an exploratory mission past Venus.

If the complex space messenger sweeps within 10,000 miles of Venus in December as planned—after a 180-million mile trip—it would mark a major breakthrough for the United States in the race for space.

Information relayed by Mariner 2 could help scientists and astronomers unravel secrets concealed for centuries by the planet's constant cloud layers. It could determine whether life as we know it possibly could exist on the planet, something doubted by most scientists.

The spacecraft motor became all-important Monday when analysis of tracking data indicated an excellent chance Mariner 2 can be directed from the ground to the vicinity of Venus even though it is far off course.

The critical firing of the motor by ground signal is scheduled tentatively for next Tuesday, Sept. 4, after the flight path, alignment, speed and other factors have been carefully computed.

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration expressed much concern shortly after the launching when early tracking indicated the spacecraft trajectory was off by as much as 600,000 miles. That would have been too great for the midcourse motor.

which has a capability of correcting an error up to 300,000 miles. It is essential that the probe approach within 25,000 miles of Venus if it is to gather the desired measurements.

Several hours later, however, refinement of tracking signals revealed Mariner 2's error was only 250,000 miles. Project officials announced the "space craft is on a trajectory that can be corrected to make it fly by Venus within a distance of 10,000 miles as planned."

The trajectory error was caused by an unexplained rolling motion executed by the first stage of the Atlas-Agena B booster rocket. While appearing confident the experiment would succeed all the way to the December encounter with Venus, the officials pointed out that many important functions must take place before the signal to ignite the engine is beamed from the tracking station at Goldstone, Calif.

Ten gas jets which control alignment of the craft must operate properly; radio transmitters must continue to relay vital information; and a highly sensitive antenna must lock on the earth to stabilize Mariner 2 on its roll axis.

The pitch axis was stabilized one hour after launching when sensitive sensors zeroed in on the sun.

Once the vehicle is stabilized on two axes, Goldstone will transmit signals to gas jets to alter the roll and pitch so Mariner 2 is pointed at Venus. Then the midcourse motor will be commanded to ignite to accelerate speed by 80 miles an hour, enough in the vacuum of space to propel the spacecraft close to the target planet.

At the time of midcourse maneuver, Mariner 2 will be about one million miles from earth, traveling about 6,800 miles an hour.

At 2 a.m. today it had covered more than 200,000 miles of its planned 180-million mile trek across space.

From Recession Into Recovery

GALVESTON, AP—Secretary of Commerce Luther Hodges says the United States has changed a recession into an economic recovery.

Hodges spoke at an air power show here.

"If we can combine our wills and join together anew for action, this country will continue to move ahead. I'm sure that here in Texas where economic progress is more a habit than a goal, you understand that lesson well," Hodges said.

"All Americans have tasks before them. Tasks need to be strengthened in the United States."

The secretary said the gross national product has risen 10 percent in 18 months, and the Southwest—with twice the national average—has the highest rate of manufacturing growth of all the regions.

Space Center Work Is Normal

After 23 Years, Poll Tax Bill OK'd

WASHINGTON, AP—Capping a 23-year battle, Congress has approved a proposed constitutional amendment which would ban poll taxes in federal elections.

Now it's up to the states, which have seven years to make up their hands.

With 40 votes to spare, the House completed action Monday on a resolution submitting to the state legislatures the proposition of making a constitutional amendment to require payment of a poll tax to vote in elections for federal officials.

The vote was 295 to 86. A two-thirds majority was needed for approval. The winners included 163 Democrats and 132 Republicans. On the losing side were 71 Democrats and 15 Republicans.

Most of the dissenting Democrats were from the five states still having poll taxes: Arkansas, Alabama, Mississippi, Texas and Virginia.

The next move is up to the General Services Administration. That agency must certify the congressional action—approved last March by the Senate—to the governors of the 50 states. If three-fourths of the state legislatures—28 of them—ratify the proposed amendment within seven years it will become the law of the land.

The abolition proposal does not affect elections for state and local officials. It applies only to presidential and vice presidential elections and to voters for senators and United States representatives.

ON THE SHELF

MY LAND AND MY PEOPLE. By the Dalai Lama of Tibet. McGraw-Hill, \$5.95.

One of the most tragic developments of recent years has been the subjugation of a peaceful, pastoral people—the simple, devout inhabitants of Tibet. The Chinese Communists are erasing their benign form of Buddhism, nearly starving the people and submerging them under a flood of Chinese settlers who eventually might make the Tibetans a minority on the roof of the world.

The tragedy of Tibet is told quietly in an almost understated way, by the Dalai Lama. A young man whose serenity and spiritual quality impresses unbelievers, the Dalai Lama was the focus of all Tibetan life until he fled from Lhasa in 1959 to live in India.

His autobiography begins with the memories of a farm boy who was discovered to be the 14th incarnation of a compassionate aspect of the Lord Buddha. The compassion remains strong enough in him to doubt that Mao Tse-tung can know what his herds have done to Tibet.

"In the face of the destruction of many people and all that they live for," he writes, "I devote myself in exile to the only courses of action left to me to remind the world through the United Nations, and now through this book, of what has happened and is happening to Tibet, to care for some 75,000 Tibetans who have escaped with me to freedom, and to plan for the future."

The future is bleak. The suffering in Tibet will continue until Tibetans have ceased to exist as a race or as a religious community or until the Chinese leave. There is no prospect of the Chinese leaving.

The Dalai Lama could have been bitter in this book. He feels that Prime Minister Nehru of India let down Tibet by acquiescing in the Chinese claim to absolute jurisdiction there—a historically dubious claim. But it is not in the nature of the Dalai Lama to be bitter.

Instead, he writes in the detached manner that his religion instills. The tragedy speaks clearly for itself.
