
A combined community choir, under the direction of Sharon White,

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

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
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

2 Persons Injured

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 12 accidents on rural highways in Parmer County during the month of October, 1975, according to Sergeant W.E. Wells, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and 12 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first ten months of 1975 shows a total of 108 accidents resulting in one person killed and 65 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for October, 1975, shows a total of 543 accidents resulting in 18 persons killed and 283 persons injured, as compared to October, 1974, with 502 accidents resulting in 19 persons killed and 215 persons injured. This was 41 more accidents, one less killed, and 68 more injured in 1975 at the same period of

The traffic deaths (18) for the month of October, 1975, occurred in the following counties: five in Parker: Castro and Randall; and one each in Baylor, Crosby, 7-tfnc Armstrong and Motley.

Cancer Claims Big D' Writer

Paul Crume, front page columnist for the Dallas Morning News and former resident of the Oklahoma Lane-Lariat community, died Sunday at Dallas. Services were held Monday afternoon at the Cochran Chapel United Methodist Church with burial in Hillcrest Memorial

Mr. Crume, 63, joined the staff of the Dallas newspaper in 1936. He had known of his terminal cancer for almost a year, but continued writing his "Big D" column until four days before his death.

His final column appeared Thursday and he wrote of death with his typical Crume humor.

"The courts continue their gradual enslavement of the people. The judge who has been trying the Karen Quinlan case up in New Jersey has now declared that nobody has a constitutional right to

"The question of the constitutionality of dying raises some interesting questions about basic law. We have searched the Constitution diligently and can find in it no constitutional right to be born. We are talking about the United States Constitution. Nobody can find anything in the Texas Constitution.

Mr. Crume was born in Alpena Pass, Ark. He moved with his family to Parmer County when he was 11. At the age of 12, he went to work part-time as a printer's devil, sweeper-outer and staff reporter for the State Line Tribune at Farwell.

He was graduated from the University of Texas at Austin in 1936 and joined the News staff in June of that same year. Except for four years as a U.S. Navy officer in World War II, Mr. Crume has worked for the News since that time.

Many of his columns concerned his boyhood in Parmer County and had the flavor of the Panhandle. In the early 1960s, he wrote of Lariat: "..it is about to progress me out of anything to write about. Lariat has matured. It has a population of two hundred. It has a tree, which gives it a gardened look...." And of the Panhandle: "I admit to the richness...of the Panhandle landscape generally now, but not to a

beauty superior to that I knew. For the landscape that moves a man most powerfully is the landscape in his mind..." Many of his thoughts on the Panhandle and his boyhood here are included in "A Texan at Bay," a collection of his columns published

Survivors include his wife, Marion; a son, Christopher Paul Crume of Dallas; a sister, Mrs. Mary Lou Taylor of Friona; seven brothers, Joe Crume of Denver, Hugh Crume of Freemont, Calif., Van Crume of Albuquerque, Vance Crume of Hereford, Charles Crume of Orlando, Fla., Barney Crume of Lubbock and Bill Crume of Dallas

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

Chieftain JVs Have "Stat" Lead

Friona's Junior Varsity Chieftains, who finished with an excellent season record of seven wins, one loss, compiled some good season statistics, it was revealed this week.

The statistics were kept and compiled by Patsy Bandy, who served as reporter for the Chieftain

The Chieftain JV held a wide lead in the rushing department, 1647 to 723. In total yardage, the Friona team led their eight season opponents, 1979 to 1080.

Friona outgained their opponents in first downs, 76-50, and outscored

the opponents, 195-70.

Sammy Felder was the team's leading rusher, with 564 yards gained on 107 carries, a 5.3

yards-per-carry average.
Five players gained over 100 yards for the team, including Kelwin King, who moved to the varsity after playing three games for the JV.

Edward Castillo was the leading scorer for the team, which had a fine balanced scoring attack.

Castillo scored six touchdowns and nine points after touchdown (seven kicks and two by running) for 45 points. Todd Bandy and Mark Lunday each scored 38 points.

McLellan and Castillo each scored three touchdowns on pass catches, and in addition, McLellan had a pass catch for two points.

Todd Bandy passed for four touchdowns; Clint Mears passed for three and Castillo passed for one.

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
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Cheryl Gohlke, Mimms Receive 4-H Awards

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
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


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
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
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
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


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Chiefs Suprise Tulia; Squaws Win, 56-53

The Friona Chieftains and Squaws started their 1975-76 basketball seasons off on the right foot here Tuesday. The Squaws scored a thrilling 56-53 win over the Hornettes, and then the Chiefs raised some eyebrows by popping the Hornets, 59-53.

The Chiefs, cast in a rebuilding year after losing all five starters from 1974-75, surprised the tall and talented Tulia team, which has been tabbed as one of the teams that might win District 4-AA.

The Hornets, with three-sport star Raymond Williams hitting 38 points, held the lead only during the early part of the game, and then briefly in the final quarter after the Chiefs hit a cold spell.

Roy Smith got the first basket of the season for a 2-0 Friona lead, and the teams swapped baskets for most of the opening period. Tulia finally forged ahead 8-6 on a shot by Williams with 3:40 left in the quarter, and a full-court pass to the Tulia star enabled him to sink a last-second basket for a 15-12 Tulia lead at the quarter mark.

The Hornets built a five-point lead, their longest, early in the second quarter on the shooting of their 6-3

However, David Barnett canned a layup shot 3:18 before halftime to put Friona back in the lead at 26-25. Keith Martin followed with a jumper, and then Barnett's tip-in made the score 31-25 inside two minutes. Jeff Whiteside connected on a shot from the side just before the halftime buzzer, and Friona had built a surprising nine-point lead, 35-26.

The Chiefs continued their hot shooting in the third quarter, when Smith hit four baskets and a pair of free shots to pace the team to a 13-point edge at 39-26, 41-28 and again at 47-34.

However, the Chieftains' scoring express derailed toward the end of the third quarter, and Friona didn't score for the first 3:43 of the final quarter, and their 13-point lead evaporated.

Before Barnett clicked on a jump shot from the side, Tulia had pulled to within one, 47-46. When Williams scored a pair of baskets within a minute, Tulia was in front, 51-49.

Mark Neill's layup tied the score at 51-all with 2:20 left, and Jimmy Murphree's jumper from the side gave Friona the lead to stay at 53-51.

The Friona Chieftains salvaged something for their season in the team's final game of the 1975 football season here last Friday, with an impressive 28-0 win over the Morton Indians.

The win enabled the Chieftains to place fourth in the final district standings, ahead of the Indians.

It was a super defensive effort for the Chieftains, who limited Morton to only 57 total yards, including just 14 for the second half. Friona's pass defense didn't allow the Indians to complete a single pass (out of 11 attempts), and intercepted four of the pass attempts.

For his part in the victory, senior linebacker Davy Carthel was named the "player of the week" for Class AA teams in this area by the Amarillo Globe-News. Carthel was credited with 15 unassisted and 15 assisted tackles during the game.

Sophomore fullback Glen London.

Sophomore fullback Glen London, who emerged as the team's leading rusher for the season in his first year on the varsity, had his second straight 113-yard game, and scored a pair of touchdowns.

The scores gave London three TDs in his last three games and 32 points for the season.

Friona turned a Morton gamble into their first touchdown drive. Morton faced fourth down and a yard to go on their own 40-yard line. The Chieftains rose up to stop Morton's quarterback for no gain, and had good field position at the Indian 40

Bobby Zetzsche gave the team a first down with a 15-yard run to the Morton 25, ran nine more yards to the 16, and London made the first down to the 14.

After getting first and goal at the four, London crashed in from the one with the game's first score with 7:15 left in the first half. The Chiefs were going to kick, but the snap went over everyone's head at about the 20-yard line. That left Friona with a 6-0 lead.

Friona forced a punt, then set sail on another drive. Keith Martin passed 11 yards to David Barnett and then ran eight yards on a keeper play to set Friona up first and goal at the five.

London then took a pitchout around the left side and went into the end zone untouched for his second score. Martin then ran a keeper play around the left side and easily went in for a two-point conversion to make Friona's lead 14-0 with 2:49

left in the half.

Friona threatened in the third quarter, following a pass intercep-

tion and return by Joe Bermea to the Morton 42. Carthel gave the team a first down on one of his few chances to carry the ball, and a few plays later, Martin hit Barnett again, on a great catch by Barnett giving Friona first and ten just outside the Morton 10.

Friona moved the ball down to the three, where a needless late hit caused Friona to be moved all the way back to the 30. On the next play, Martin was rushed and intercepted at the 15 to thwart the opportunity.

Bobby Zetzsche intercepted for Friona, then ran 15 yards from scrimmage as the Chiefs threatened again. He then ran for an apparent touchdown but Friona was flagged on the play and the score was erased. A 27-yard field goal attempt by Carthel fell just short.

After having several aborted scoring attempts during the half, the Chiefs finally kept a drive going late in the game. Wingback Zetzsche took charge of the drive. He raced 27 yards to the Morton 16 for a first down with 2:30 left in the game. Three plays later, the speedy back took a pitch and skirted right end for 20 yards and his seventh touchdown of the season.

Carthel added the point after with a perfect kick, and Friona had nailed down the game with a 21-0 lead as the clock showed 1:25 left in the season.

Morton had trouble fielding the low, bouncing kickoff, and the Chieftain defenders racked the ball carrier, causing a fumble, and Friona had the ball back at the Indian 13.

On the first play, Martin tossed a pass, and Barnett made a fine diving catch in the end zone for six points. It was the team's only touchdown on a pass for the entire season. Carthel's kick made the score 28-0. Only 12 seconds had elapsed since Friona's last TD.



In spite of posting only a 2-8 season record, the Friona Chieftains managed a statistical lead over their ten season opponents, it was revealed this week.

The Chiefs held a lead in team rushing, 2,285 yards to 1,925 yards, and in total offense, 2,563 yards to

The team's excellent showing in the season finale against Morton enabled them to hold the lead, after they had been close or leading for most of the season.

In individual stats, sophomore Glen London was the team's leading rusher, with 729 yards on 158 tries, a 4.6 yards-per-carry average.

London's totals may be an all-time record for a sophomore runningback. It certainly is the most for a sophomore at FHS in the past 14 years. The closest to that total was Clay Bandy's 456 yards as a sophomore in 1972.

Tony Perea, the all-time rushing leader for FHS, only had 276 yards as a sophomore. He came back with around 800 yards as a junior, then put it all together with a 1721-yard performance his senior year. Bobby Zetzsche was the team's


