IN THE SPRING, a young man's fancy usually turns to a number of things, hardly ever including school work.

Some years, the interest lies in yo-yos. Recently, it has been the "string fad," where string figures are constructed. Kids have also gone through the spinning top fad a number of times.

This year, apparently the "new fad" is marbles, since our junior high son has had to come up with a bag of marbles, and isn't ready for school unless he has his marble collection along with his books and other paraphenalia.

Now, we don't want to shatter the kids' fun in the least, but we're here to tell them that marbles have been around for a good spell. We can personally guarantee they were popular during the last generation, and according to what we can read and hear, they have been around for a lot longer than that.

When we were about "junior high" age, we prided ourselves in being a pretty fair marble player. When you got to be a salty shooter, you usually got into a game of 'keeps,' where all the players put the marbles they want to risk into a ring (or onto the ground, and make the ring size accordingly), and then take turns seeing who can come out with the most of everyone's

marbles. It took a lot of work to develop your style, and to come up with a 'shooter," also referred to as a "taw." A good "taw" is drastically important to the marbles player. It's just like a gun to a hunter. It has to be chosen with tender, loving care, and not just by accident or chance. Your whole success as a marbles player may depend upon selecting the proper "taw."

Down in Bailey County, and southern Pamer County, we played "Rolley Holey," a game consisting of four holes. Three were in a line, with the fourth at a right angle to the end hole. After you made all the holes with your taw, you were "poison," and could set out after the other players' taws, and put them out of the game by shooting their marbles.

You also gained the privilege of using a "hand span" before your shot after reaching a certain hole, usually the fourth one. This allowed you to get closer to a player's taw so you could pop him one.

Before you were poison, the players who were "shot" had to return to the first hole and start the sequence over. If our memory doesn't fail, you were given the privilege of skipping the next hole as prize for sending someone back to the starting line.

WE ALSO PLAYED chase-ums, otherwise known as "chasies," and this was just what the name implies. You took your favorite taw, and after your opponent shot, tried to hit his marble, or come as close to it as you could. If you hit it, he had to chase you.

During the height of our marble-playing days, we always had an indentation on our right thumb nail from "shooting" so much. We're surprised it isn't still

There are a number of game variations, according to the part of the country you are from.

The types of marbles used also varies. Certain marbles are becoming collector's items. We have a goodly number that we still keep in an old battered sack, that

games of "keeps," or in our various moves. If Stanley or Richard ever show any promise as a marbles player, perhaps we will divide them out-not to take to school, but to put up, so someday they can show their friends what a

100-year-old marble looks like. Among marbles, there are the "agates," or "aggles," made from marble or agate, the "immies," which were made of painted, glazed or fired clay, "glassies," made of glass, and "steelies," naturally made from steel.

You always shuddered when some player chose a "steelie," for his taw, and aimed at your favorite 'agate." Getting a chip in your taw brought on the same remorse as getting that first dent in a new car. The game of marbles goes back

School, City **Elections Set**

Saturday, April 3 is election day in Friona, with contested races slated for the Friona City Council

and the Friona school board. The Friona Fire Station will be the polling place for the combined election. Polls are to be open from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m.

Absentee voting ended on Tuesday for two elections, and more than average interest was indicated, especially in the school board race.

Superintendent of Schools Tom Jarboe said that a total of 35 people cast absentee ballots in the board race, while 18 had voted absentee at City Hall. The number of absentee voters in the school election was about twice the number which had cast absentee

ballots a year earlier. Biggest slate of candidates will appear on the school board ballot, where eight candidates have filed for three positions which are expiring on the board.

Garrison asked to be relieved effective April 9, so as to help with spring training at his new post. In addition to coaching football and track, he had taught three sections of world history at Friona High

Candidates are Floyd S. Reeve, Joe Allen, Gary Snead, M.C. Osborn, Gaylord Maurer, Dr. Jon Mack Roden, George Frye and

Teddy Fangman. Reeve is the lone incumbent from among the school board candidates. The holders of the other two seats on the board which are expiring, Doyle Elliott and Floyd Schueler, did not seek re-election. On the City Council, Mayor R.L.

Fleming is unopposed for re-elec-

tion to a new two-year term. Four candidates are seeking the two places on the city council which

expire this month. Seeking alderman posts are B.K. Buske, Jerry Loflin, H. Ray White and Bill Stephens. Loflin is seeking election to his second term on the city council. Incumbent Troy Young, finishing a third term, did not choose to seek re-election.

TO CEMETERY

Fund Started To Pave Road

A fund drive to raise the money to pave the road to Friona Cemetery has been kicked off, following a series of meetings at which the project was discussed at length.

Glen Herring, chairman of a committee appointed to look into the prospects of paving the road, reported at a meeting last week that two bids had been received on the project, which measures one and one-half miles.

Boswell & Crafton Construction Co., who built State Highway 214 from Friona to Hub, has bid \$45,360, providing the project can be started before they have to move their men and equipment.

Jake Diel Pavers of Hereford submitted a bid of just over \$50,000. Herring said the bids were based on putting down a 24-foot caliche base and a 22-foot blacktop from the "Wells Corner" on U.S. Highway 60 to a mile north. The half-mile east to the cemetery would feature a 20-foot base and an 18-foot wide pavement.

It was pointed out that Highway 214 north of Friona is a 20-foot pavement, in order to visualize the type of pavement being talked about

The one-half mile east-west pavement would be carried the length of the cemetery, or to the east side.

The committee has set May I as the deadline for raising the needed money to do the project. It is needed by this date if the low

bidder, Boswell, is used. An account has been established at Friona State Bank for all those wishing to contribute to the project. Those wanting to have a part in the paving may either send the money to the bank, or contact the Friona Cemetery Association. C.L. Vestal

is president. If the total amount needed is not raised, all money donated will be refunded, Herring stated.

It was brought out that the Cemetery Assn. has a fund which might be used for the paving.

Boswell & Crafton Construction Co. indicated that the job could be done in a relatively short time, if they are selected to do the work.

CONDITION STABLE

Brookfield Injured In Drilling Mishap

Floyd Brookfield was in stable condition at press time, having undergone emergency surgery in Amarillo Wednesday afternoon.

Brookfield, owner of Brookfield Drilling, was injured at about 11 a.m. Wednesday at a drilling site about four miles north of Black.

According to reports, a piece of metal fell from the top of the drilling rig, striking Brookfield on the head. Two of Brookfield's employees were at the site with from Parsons-Ellis Ambulance Service, and Brookfield was brought to Parmer County Community Hospital, where he received emergency treatment.

The longtime Friona businessman was transfered to Amarillo where he underwent surgery at St. Anthony's Hospital Wednesday afternoon. Brookfield sustained a cracked skull from the blow on the head.

A spokesman for the family said Thursday that Brookfield was responding well from surgery, and

James Ray Stevick, 20, escaped injury Wednesday morning when he jumped clear of a ditching machine that he was unloading west of Friona.

Reports indicated that Stevick, an employee of Stevick Ditching Co., was backing the ditcher off a trailer on the Sloan Osborn place west of town when he became aware that something was locked and the machine began to fall.

Young Stevick jumped off the

machine backwards and landed flat on his back. The machine toppled off the trailer and landed on its side, but missed Stevick.

A brother, Ronnie Stevick was at the scene, and he used his CB radio to summon an ambulance, and cautioned James not to move.

Stevick was taken to Parmer County Community Hosptial for X-Rays, and was kept in the hospital awhile for observation. The X-Rays revealed no broken

Marbles are melted by manufacturers to create fiberglas. They are used as agitators in aerosol cans; they are inserted in road signs as reflectors, in oil filters, and even by mausoleums where they are used to slide caskets into wall crypts.

If an infected animal is found in any herd, the herd will be quarantined on the owners premise until such cattle have been tested to meet the requirements for quarantine release. Herd owners will have the right to supplemental tests. Reactor cattle will not be branded and condemned to slaughter until results of such supplemental tests (if requested) are ascertained.

Regarding calf vaccinations, the proposed regulations call for all female beef calves to be vaccinated between the ages of three and eight months.

The proposed regulations on brucellosis control and eradication also provide specific definitions and procedures in classifying cattle, obtaining and maintaining certification status, and qualifying methods and

standards. 

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

Project Child Find Seeks Handicapped

A local drive has been instituted to locate handicapped children who are not enrolled in school, who may be eligible for assistance from the

When the Sixty-First Legislature unanimously passed Senate Bill 230, this provided public special education for all handicapped children in Texas. On the basis of pilot projects in the state it is estimated there are roughly 10,000 or more handicapped children not in school.

It is the goal of Texas Education Agency, in line with directives from the legislature, to be serving the needs of all handicapped children in the state by 1980.

The Child Find Project is financed by a grant to the Texas Education Agency by the U. S. Office of Education, Bureau of Education for the Handicapped. The funds are disbursed to the twenty Regional Service Centers to implement locating these children. Region 16 Service Center in

Amarillo serves Parmer County.

If a child is located that needs additional services that the local school or Texas Education Agency cannot provide-then Child Find

serves as a coordinator, matching available services and resources to the individual child's needs.

Texas is presently serving more than 300,000 students through special education programs. By 1980 this number is expected to be near 450,000 special education students.

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
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






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Nettie Mai Collier Dies In Amarillo
