THE STORY RELEASED this week by the Associated Press which termed the state's cotton crop as the worst since 1975 comes as no great surprise to area farmers.

In fact, most local observers probably felt that the current crop was even worse than the figures indicated. The story said that cotton production in Texas for 1982 would amount to only 2.5 million bales.

This is a drop of 56 per cent from the production figures of 1981. It breaks down to a cash loss of \$758 million to producers, and an overall loss to the economy of \$2.2 billion, considering losses to cotton-related industries.

The slack production for 1982 is due to the adverse weather of the spring, when hail wiped out thousands of acres of cotton on the High Plains and South Plains.

This crop failure is expected to have a severe impact on communities which depend on the cotton crop as its main cash crop. And, even in Farmer County, where cotton only ranks third or fourth among agricultural crops, it means a big blow, especially when agriculture is already in a depressed condition.

A number of cotton farmers replanted their lost acreage to soybeans, and soybeans reached a record 28.6 million bushels in the state this year—about three times the usual production. Naturally, the price for soybeans has not been too good, due to the record production.

Hon. Arley L. Outland was appointed District Deputy to the Grand Master of Texas Masons at the 147th annual convention of Texas Masons in Waco December 4. The Hon. J.D. (Buddy) Baccus of Houston was elected to the highest office, Grand Master of Texas Masons.

Over 4,000 Texas Masons attended the two-day convention, including Grand Masters from the states of Massachusetts, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Arkansas.

Outland will represent the 100th Masonic District of Texas, which includes the Lodges of Vega, Hereford, Dimmitt, Farwell-Bovina and Friona, for the calendar year 1983.

The new state Masonic officer served 21 years as an officer in the U.S. Army, retiring as Lieutenant Colonel, and retired last January after serving 21 years as City Manager for the City of Friona.

He has served as president and secretary of the Friona Evening Lions Club; served as secretary for two Lions' District governors for District 2T-1; is a Past Master of Friona Masonic Lodge, served ten years (intermittently) as secretary of the local lodge.

He is a dual member of Army Lodge 1105 in San Antonio and Friona Lodge 1332. Outland also is a member of Friona Methodist Church.

He assumes his new duties from the Hon. W.L. (Bill) Bradley of Hereford, past District Deputy of the 100th District.

Residents who experience problems with stray dogs on their property may contact the City office, and one of the traps will be checked out and left with the property owner.

Due to icy roads and wintry conditions, Friona school officials, after canvassing the schools involved, decided to cancel the local basketball tournament, which was scheduled this weekend.

When a dog is found in the trap, the city will be notified, at which time an animal control officer will come and retrieve the dog for impounding.

The traps are actually wire cages. The dog will trip the door when he goes in to get food left inside as bait. They are approved by the Society for Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, and used by the Parks and Wildlife Department.

"We spend a lot of time, effort and money answering dog complaint calls. And many times, when the dogcatcher arrives, the dog has left the scene. This should be a more effective, as well as a much safer approach to the problem," says Friona City Manager Jerry Lewis.

There will be no charge to property owners for using the traps, but they will be required to sign a release assuming responsibility for the traps while they are on their property.

"If we catch a dog which is properly licensed, we will check the record and notify the owner. Otherwise, they will go to the pound," Lewis says.

The trap system is intended to supplement the city's animal control system, and will be an ongoing program. City officials hope it will be a simple, inexpensive method of combating the stray dog problem, and ask residents to give it a try when needed.

City Works To Cure Problems

During the past week, some residents of Friona have been bothered by sewer stoppages. City employees worked over the weekend to solve the problem.

"Most of the stoppages seemed to be tree roots growing into the sewer, probably due to the prolonged dry spell," said City Manager Jerry Lewis.

Lewis asked that residents experiencing such problems to call the city office, 247-2761, or on weekends, to call the police department, 247-2711, and the dispatcher will route the problem to the proper source.

In the event of a break in a water line, Lewis said a resident should not attempt to cut the water off at the meter, lest they break the meter. "Call the city and let us come out and cut the water off until repairs can be made. There is no charge for cut-offs for maintenance and repairs," he emphasized.

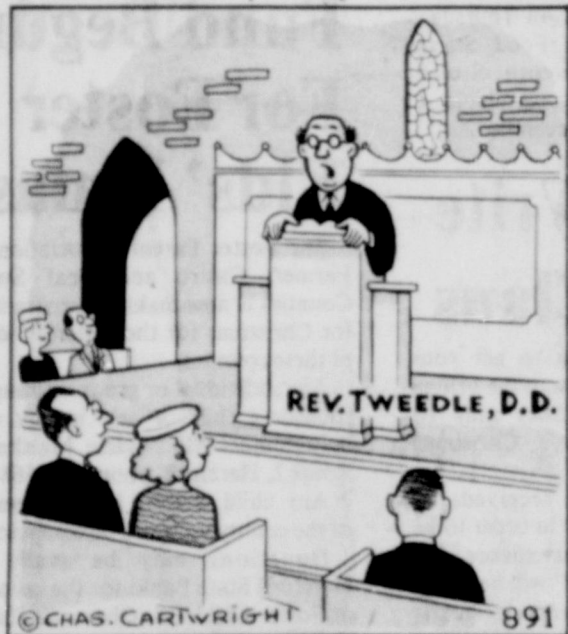

Around The House In Parmer County

The holidays are fast approaching and you may be trying to find some new recipes to try for families and friends. The following recipes are quick to fix and would ship well if you mail gifts. In pretty containers, they would also make nice gifts.

These are basically, seasoned nuts, and would be good to have around the house anytime. Remember, nuts provide protein and are worthwhile sources of magnesium.

CARMELIZED ALMONDS
1 cup slivered almonds
¼ cup sugar

Combine nuts and sugar in small skillet. Stir constantly and rapidly as the sugar begins to turn color. Remove from heat when almonds are

caramel-colored and spread on greased cookie sheet. Break apart when crisp.

BARBECUED PECANS
1 tablespoon butter or margarine
1/3 teaspoon tabasco sauce
2 cups pecans

½ cup worcestershire sauce
¼ teaspoon garlic salt

Heat butter over low heat; add pecans and parch slightly; adding 1 tablespoon sauce and salt mixture slowly until completely parched.

ORANGE PECANS
1 tablespoon grated orange rind

¼ cup orange juice
¼ cup sugar
2 cups pecans

Combine orange rind, juice, and sugar in saucepan. Bring to a rapid boil. Add pecans and stir constantly over high heat until all syrup

is absorbed. Remove from heat and stir until pecans have separated. Turn out onto cookie sheet to cool.

SUGAR & SPICE NUTS
1 tablespoon butter or margarine, melted

1 egg white, slightly beaten
2 cups unroasted almonds, English walnuts and/or pecans

1 cup sugar
½ teaspoon salt
1½ teaspoons cinnamon

¼ teaspoon nutmeg
¼ teaspoon allspice

Preheat oven to 300 degrees. Slowly stir melted fat into beaten egg white. Stir in nuts. Mix sugar and spices. Spread about ¼ of the sugar mixture in a 10x15 inch shallow baking pan. Coat a few nuts at a time in remaining sugar mixture, and arrange in the pan. Sprinkle rest of sugar mixture over nuts. Bake 15 to 20 minutes, or until nuts are lightly browned. Remove nuts from oven; stir gently to separate nuts. Cool. Store in tightly closed container.

PARMESAN PEANUTS

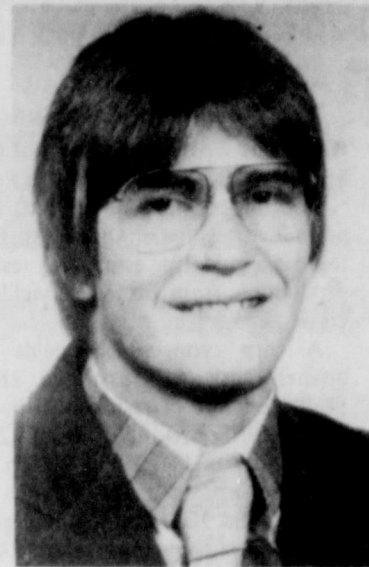
2 tablespoons salad oil
1 pound salted peanuts
1 teaspoon garlic salt

2 tablespoons grated Parmesan cheese

Heat oil in flat baking pan in 350 degree oven about 5 minutes. Remove from oven, add peanuts and stir until coated with hot oil. Return to oven for about 5 minutes. Remove from oven, sprinkle with Parmesan cheese and garlic salt and stir to coat with cheese. Cool and serve.

By properly managing crop residues through simple tillage operations, the sustained use of cropland can be continued without deterioration to the soils.

It is important to leave adequate crop residue on the soil surface to protect the soil from water and wind erosion. By decreasing the erosion occurring with crop residues, the finer, more easily erodible soil particles remain in the field where needed instead of blown along fence rows or washed into creek beds.

Crop residues left on the soil surface not only help prevent erosion but improve the soil tilth by increasing the organic matter content of the soil. By increasing the organic matter content, the soil is capable of taking in greater amounts of rainfall and reducing runoff. Also crop

residues left on the soil surface shade the ground and help prevent the evaporation of the moisture in the soil which can make the difference between a following crop emerging or not.

Most of the cropland in Parmer County should be maintained with approximately 1000 and 1750 pounds of residue on the soil surface of clay loam and fine sandy loam soils, respectively, until the seedbed for the next crop is prepared. Residues can be maintained on the surface by using tillage equipment such as a chisel, field cultivator, or tandem disk which covers only about 20-25 per cent of the residues with each tillage operation. One way disk, offset disk, moldboard plow, and listers should not be used until preparation for a clean-till seedbed is needed because 50-90 per cent of the

residue is covered by each tillage operation with these implements.

In order to maintain 1000 to 1750 pounds of residue on the soil surface, there is a guide for estimating residue production from projected yields of crops.

A corn crop which yields 200 bushels/acre will produce about 14,400 pounds of residue; 20 bushel wheat will produce about 2000 pounds of residue; 1 bale cotton will produce about 1500 pounds of residue; and 3000 pounds/acre grain sorghum will produce about 4050 pounds of residue/acre.

Why travel over your field with a rotary hoe or sand fighter, wasting fuel, trying to stop the soil from blowing, when all you had to do was keep adequate residue from the previous crop on the soil surface instead of plowing it under or burning it?

Postmaster Offers Tips For Christmas Mailing

With the Christmas mailing season just ahead, the Postmaster is offering tips for customers to assure that their cards and packages arrive on time and in good shape.

In addition to shopping and mailing early, customers are urged to properly address cards and packages with the name, house number and street (or post office box number), and the city, state and ZIP Code reserved for the last line.

It is also a good idea to put a slip of paper with the recipient's name and address and your return address inside parcels, and be sure the addressing on the outside of the parcel includes your return address and ZIP Code.

Customers are also reminded to check the size of their envelopes before mailing Christmas and other holiday cards. Letter size standards require that envelopes be at least 3 1/2 inches high and 5 inches long to be accepted for mailing.

The Postal Service is also asking customers to put an ounce of extra

care into preparing parcel post and other packages for mailing. Parcels will arrive at their intended destination in good shape if mailers will follow a few simple suggestions:

CUSHION: Make sure contents are well cushioned and there is no empty space in the box. Use crumpled newspaper around the item--including all sides, top and bottom. Commercially available foam shells or air-pocket padding also make good cushioning materials.

DON'T OVERWRAP: Just use your carton. Brown paper and twine cord are not necessary. Paper can rip, and twine can become entangled in processing equipment.

SEAL PROPERLY: Close your parcel with one of the three recommended types of tape: pressure sensitive, nylon-reinforced kraft paper, or glass-reinforced pressure sensitive.

AVOID SMUDGES: Use smudge-proof ink for your addressing.

POSITION ADDRESSES PROPERLY: Put the recipient's address in the lower right portion of the

container. Put your return address in the upper left hand corner. Remove all other labels from the box.

USE ZIP CODES: Be sure to include the ZIP Code in both the recipient's and your return address.

TIME IT RIGHT: Mail early in the month and early in the day.

USE THE RIGHT SERVICE: Irreplaceable items, such as cash and other valuables, should be sent by registered mail.

IF YOU RUN OUT OF TIME: Priority Mail affords First-Class handling for packages weighing over 12 ounces and up to 70 pounds. Priority Mail can be sent from any post office, station or branch or through rural carriers to any address in the U.S. Delivery of Priority Mail is accomplished in two to three days anywhere in the country. Priority Mail can even be used for foreign mailings. The service is available with insurance, return receipt, COD, certificates of mailing and special delivery. Customers interested in Priority Mail should contact the post office for details.

Stamp Collecting Items Available At Post Office

Postmaster Bill Wells has invited holiday shoppers to consider several stamp collecting items available at the post office for their gift-giving lists.

The Postmaster said that the post office has the ninth edition of *The Postal Service Guide to U.S. Stamps*, as well as the 1982 Mint Set which contains all 29 commemorative and special stamps issued during the year.

The 280-page *The Postal Service Guide to U.S. Stamps* is priced at \$3.50 (the same as last year) and contains full-color reproductions of all U.S. stamp issues and the most current values assigned to each one. The book, designed to provide

interesting philatelic information for both the novice and the experienced stamp collector, also includes many stories and philatelic articles about the stamp subjects and designs.

The 1982 Mint Set, priced at \$6.50, is the latest in a series of annual sets of commemorative and special stamps released by the Postal Service each year prior to the holiday season. The cover of the colorful set features a montage of artwork related to the stamps inside.

The Postmaster said this year the Mint Set is designed to be used as an album. Individual plastic mounts are included for mounting and protecting each stamp issue.

Deregulation of your telephone ...how will it affect you

Deregulation. What does it mean to the nation's telephone industry — and the customers it serves? All of the hows, whys and maybes are not determined, but here are answers to some often-asked questions.

Q. What is deregulation?

A. Simply, it's the process of removing state and federal controls from many services provided by the telecommunications industry. It means customers can select equipment and services in a competitive market without regulation by a regulatory commission.

Q. When does it happen?

A. Deregulation isn't new. Federal Communications Commission rulings over the past three decades have allowed some competition in terminal equipment (telephones, multi-line systems, etc.) and in long-distance services. But deregulation surfaced as a major public issue when the FCC mandated total deregulation of new terminal equipment, effective January 1, 1983.

Q. Why does the FCC want the telephone industry to be deregulated?

A. The FCC believes competitive markets are most efficient. Deregulation — and competition — will encourage new services and open more options to customers.

Actually, the FCC is but one of the driving forces behind deregulation. Congress, the Justice Department and the Reagan Administration (like others before it) all are eager to deregulate the American telephone business.

Q. What is GTE's position regarding deregulation?

A. GTE feels that deregulation ultimately will benefit all concerned. Competition is the American way and GTE expects to compete aggressively.

Q. Just what services will continue under regulation?

A. After January 1, the basic local and long-distance switching networks will continue to be regulated. So will all in-place equipment on customer premises. New equipment will be excluded from regulation, as will "enhanced" services, which combine basic service with computer processing to provide additional, different or restructured information.

Q. How does this affect customers?

A. The big change is in lease and purchase arrangements for telephones, multi-line systems and other equipment in a customer's home or business.

After January 1, existing customers may continue to lease their phones from General Telephone. In addition, they have the option of purchasing phones — either from General Telephone or another supplier.

New customers also will be able to buy phones anywhere they choose (including General Telephone). Cost of equipment purchased by customers will be determined by the marketplace — not regulatory commissions. Lease options also will be available to new customers, but again will be determined by the marketplace — not the regulators.

There's another important point. By definition, anyone who alters existing service will be classified as a new customer. People who move from one residence to another — even though both are served by General Telephone — would be considered new customers under deregulation guidelines.

Q. Will all customers be affected by deregulation?

A. No. The FCC's order applies only to single-line service. Customers on multi-party lines may continue to lease phones from General Telephone with all the traditional services. For a period after deregulation begins, party line customers may have some options that will not be available after January 1, 1983 to single-line customers.

Q. Will it affect the cost of telephone service?

A. Deregulation will have an impact on virtually every aspect of the telephone industry — including cost. It should result in lower prices for some services and higher prices for others. The net effect of deregulation — and the competition it creates — is that each product or service provided by General Telephone must pay its own way, without subsidies from other segments of the business.

For example, revenues from various optional services have traditionally subsidized the cost of providing basic local service. That ensured basic telephone service was affordable to nearly everyone. But competition will force prices to more closely reflect the true cost of any service. Local rates probably will rise; others may decrease. Either way, customers will be asked to pay for the cost of the services they use.

Q. So what are the benefits to the consumer?

A. With deregulation comes competition. With competition comes the suppliers' desire to provide customers with what they want, when they want it, resulting in many options, introduction of new technology and keeping costs at the lowest possible level.

Q. Won't there be a lot of people who will be unable to afford a telephone?

A. GTE expects to help customers meet increases in telephone rates by phasing in certain options for flat rate pricing, including Usage Sensitive Service (USS) which is a measured service.
