Orphans May Get Chance To Stay Together

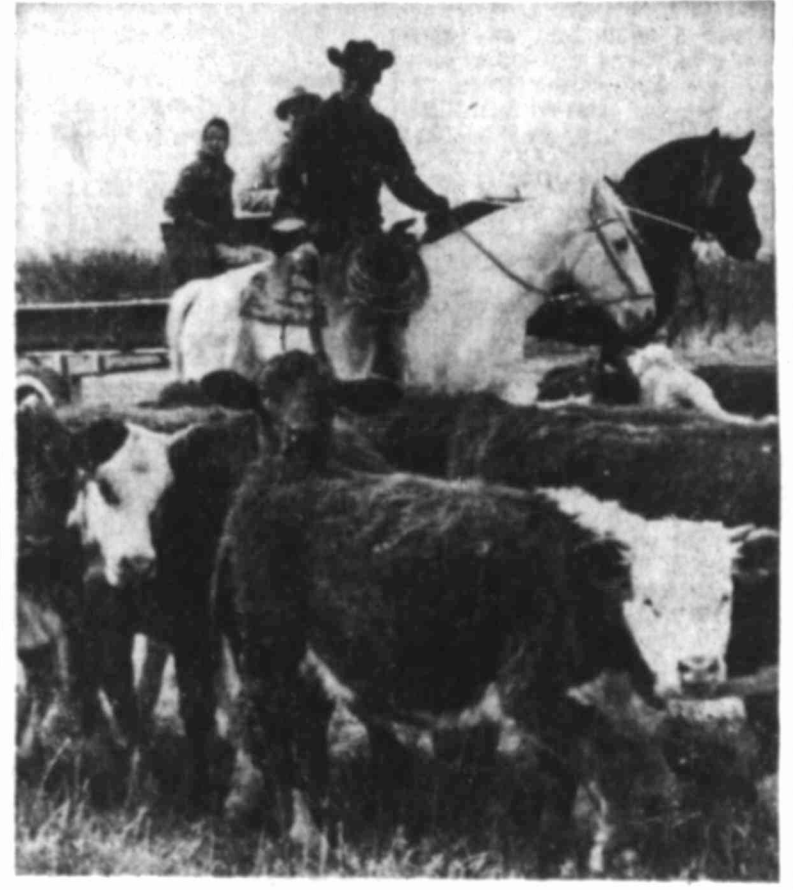

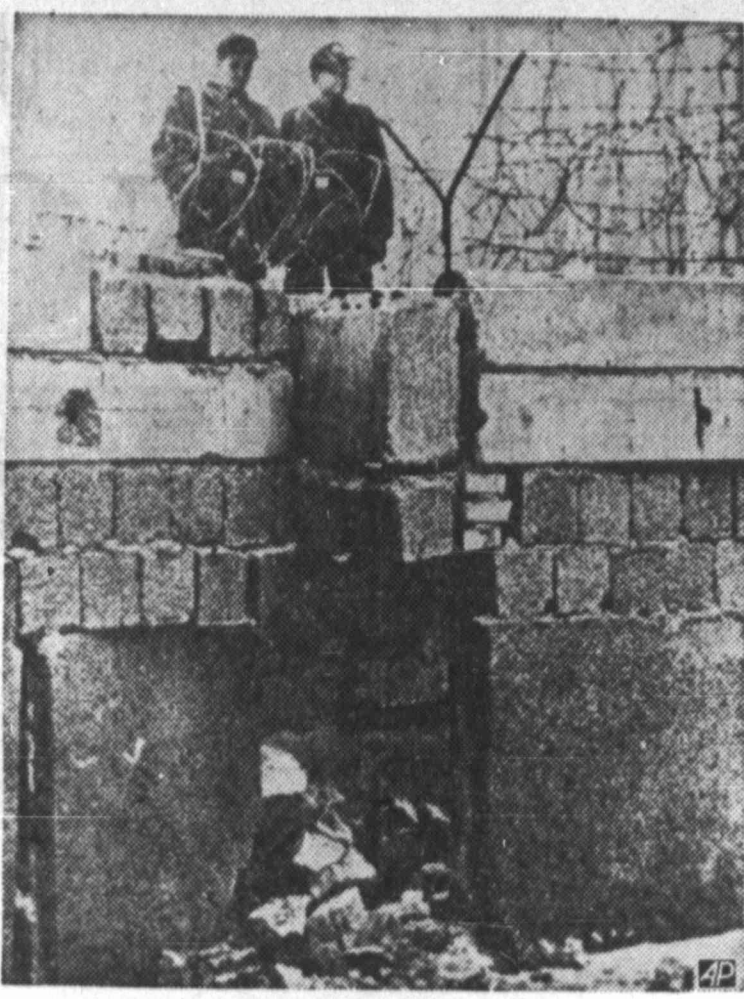

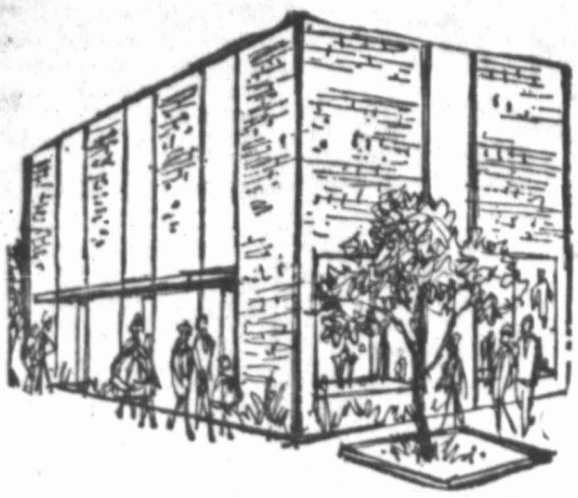

Stanton Employs Superintendent

STANTON—The city of Stanton has decided that a water superintendent is needed to take some of the load off the shoulders of G. B. Shelburne, who has handled these duties in addition to

his work as city treasurer and municipal judge. The new superintendent is John Arthur Preston, who had been with the city water department at Andrews. He is learning his new duties from Shelburne, and will take over as water superintendent March 31, when the fiscal year ends. Preston has a wife and two children. His wife, Nancy, is a nurse and is working at the local hospital-clinic.

Hollingsworth Will Present Audit Monday

Clyde Hollingsworth, certified public accountant, said Saturday that he will be ready Monday to present the Howard County Commissioners Court with his report on the audit of the books and records of the county's elective offices.

Hollingsworth and his aides have been working on the audit for several months. It is similar to those made each year—the commissioners court contracting with an independent accountant to go over the records and compile a report on its findings.

Lee Porter, now county auditor who is leaving his post Tuesday to become county judge, was especially eager to have all records of the county government checked out before he left his present post.

Porter will sit with the county commissioners Monday morning when Hollingsworth makes his report on the audit.

Hollingsworth said he has completed preparing his summary on the audit.

"We will be ready to submit the audit report Monday," said Hollingsworth.

The meeting Monday will be the final session for the present commissioners court. Tuesday, Ralph White, now a member, retires from the board, being replaced by Ray Nichols.

On the same date, Porter becomes county judge taking the seat of Ed Carpenter, who in his own turn, leaves to become a state legislator.

L. J. Davidson, re-elected, Rufus Stallings and Joe Hayden are the other members of the court.

One New Face At Court House

STANTON — The swearing in ceremonies for new Martin County office holders at 9 a.m. Jan. 2 will be an abbreviated affair. Only one new face will be seen around the court house, when M. D. Coggin replaces E. H. Morrow as county commissioner of Precinct Two.

Even this was not a contested election, as Morrow declined to seek the office again after a tenure of eight years. Coggin, the new commissioner, is a farmer and lives about two miles south of Stanton.

Monday, Judge Ed Carpenter, county court, sitting in his official capacity for the final time, will rule on a motion brought by the state for a new trial in a land condemnation case.

Peace officers have been tolerably busy but most of their work has been devoted to coping with misdemeanor offenders.

The court house will be open Monday and closed Tuesday. Wednesday will mark the begin-

ning of a new year with the general step-up of operations in all of the offices.

County taxpayers are warned the last day for payment of tax bills with a one per cent discount expires Monday. Effective Tuesday and through January, the tax bills will be payable in full amount. Starting Feb. 1, a penalty will be added to any unpaid taxes.

The only office to be operating Tuesday will be the sheriff's department where a skeleton crew will be on duty. All other offices will present closed doors.

These establishments will accept payment for the poll tax, fill out the requests and turn these over to the tax office. There they will be processed and the receipts mailed to the applicants. The operation is designed to make it easier for voters to qualify themselves to vote in 1963 and follows a plan used last year.

The nine establishments are the four Lewis 5-and-10 stores, the Coahoma Drug store, Thixton Motorcycle Shop, Recler Insurance Agency, Gound's Pharmacy, and the Bowen Jewelry store.

Mrs. LeFevre said the places selected make it easy for any resident to reach one of the stations with a minimum of effort. The deadline for payment of poll tax is Jan. 31.

All persons who are between the ages of 21 and 60 years, must have a poll tax receipt to vote in elections. A person who is 60 years of age before Jan. 1, 1962, can vote without a poll tax receipt. He must have an exemption certificate if he lives in Big Spring; if he lives in the rural areas, he does not have to have a certificate.

Younger voters who reached their 21st birthday after Jan. 1, 1962 and prior to any election in which they may want to vote are eligible to vote without a poll tax receipt.

Mrs. LeFevre said that only 1,066

poll tax receipts have been issued so far this year. She said that the cost of the receipt is \$1.75. Of this money, one dollar out of each payment goes to the schools of the county; 50 cents to the state; and 25 cents to the county.

A total of 6,641 poll tax receipts were issued through Jan. 31, 1962. There were also 1,529 exemption certificates issued. It is not thought that as many receipts and certificates will be issued in 1963—the year being what is termed an "off" political season with no major political developments expected.

New Library Near Complete

STANTON—The building for the Martin County Library is expected to be completed within the next few weeks, unless a shortage of building funds develops. The contract specified a 90-day building time, and the structure is already partially completed.

Since several people and organizations have made contribution pledges, this money must be collected before the library is completed. The officials say there will not likely be any trouble in collecting the money.

The new brick building is being constructed on the southwest corner of the lot where the water tower and city hall are located. The city donated the site and paid for half the paving. The county paid for the other half of the paving and gave the library \$1,000. Most of the other funds were to come from private sources.


Though no personnel plans have been made, it is thought that Mrs. Pat C. Hull, present librarian, will continue in that capacity.

14 Cars Derail

LAGRANGE, Tex. (AP)—Fourteen cars of a Missouri-Kansas-Texas freight train, en route from Kansas City to Houston, were derailed before dawn Saturday about 15 miles east of here.

The derailment closed a farm road between Ellinger and Fayetteville. No one was injured, but M-K-T officials said 36 to 48 hours will be needed to clean up the wreckage.

Know How In Role Of Secretary

Many qualities are expected of the top notch secretary. She should be personable, pleasant, poised. She should represent her employer tactfully, be discreet concerning business matters, function smoothly with her associates, be loyal in her thinking and speaking.

In addition, it goes without saying, she must keep her skills sharpened.

To all of this a local business man recently nodded in agreement and then commented succinctly, "and be able to read."

It seems he has had a succession of secretaries who type his letters without their minds on the meaning of words, or attention to the clarification needed by punctuation. The result, sadly enough, is that what he dictated comes out making no sense.

So his motto now is "more sense in sentences," and his instruction to the girls in his office is: "Think about what you are typing. Read it carefully and if it isn't clear, come back to the person who dictated."

SLIPS

Granted there's many a slip twixt the type and the lip. And sometimes punctuation is left out through sheer carelessness. But oh, what a difference a mere comma or semicolon can make.

Take as an example, an arbitrary notice which appeared not long ago in a small town newspaper stating that the deceased "was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Albert Smith never married." A semicolon between "Smith" and the word "never" would have saved the day.

In the excellent little booklet "One Letter May Be Worth \$1,000,000" it is stated: "Punctuation is a tool that any one can master who will devote a few hours to the study of any good manual of English composition. Most of the rules are obvious. Those that are not will for the most part become clear from attention to the practices of good authors."

CLARITY

Judgment and good taste are the best guides, the booklet continues, but warns against using any punctuation marks "that merely cumber the page and slows the reader." The purpose as defined by Webster is "to make the meaning more easily understood." When you apply this rule, you can't go far wrong.

Easy reading is immensely helped through the frequent use of the familiar period, thus shortening the sentence. My own English teacher used to battle mightily against long, involved sentences. A short sentence, he said, was more effective, adding: "Try it. It works."

Light And Heat Is Controlled

Both sheet and plate glass can be tinted. Most popular tints are gray, which roughly halves both light and solar heat transmission, and green, which cuts only 25 per cent of light but reduces heat transmission about 60 per cent.

Social Security Tax Gets A New Bite

Your paycheck for the first week in January and for each subsequent pay-period thereafter will be a little smaller than it was last year. Assuming, of course, that your boss did not give you a juicy pay boost as a Christmas present.

The reason your check is to be smaller is the increase in Social Security tax assessments which becomes effective Jan. 1.

The new deductions for Social Security from your paycheck will be increased one half of one per cent. If your pay is \$4,800 a year (the maximum on which Social Security taxes can be collected) your check will be \$2 per month smaller than in 1962. Instead of paying \$150 social security taxes, as you did in the year just ending, you will pay \$174. If your pay is less than \$4,800 annually, you will pay less in dollars but proportionally more Social Security taxes than you have been paying.

This is the ninth time the assessment for Social Security has been increased. The payment is levied against you and against your employer. The same increase and the same rate applies to both. If you happen to be a self-em-

ployed person, you will find the increase for Social Security raised from 4.7 per cent as it was in 1962 to 5.4 per cent. This applies against the first \$4,800 you earn and the maximum tax a self-employed person must pay under Social Security will increase from \$225.60 this past year to \$259.20 in 1963.

Nor is the end in sight. In 1966 (assuming the law remains as it is, the tax is to go up another one half of one per cent and still

another half of one per cent in 1968.

(If congress should pass the hospital care bill—which is slated for financing through Social Security taxes—the rate would have to be boosted to 9 1/4 per cent at once.)

Employees and employers will kick in \$2 billion annually under the raise which becomes effective this Jan. 1.

Ervin Fisher, head of the District Social Security office here, said that benefits have improved with the increases in Social Security Tax assessments. Back in the period 1940-49, the maximum an individual worker who retired at 65, could get was \$46.50 a month. The minimum retirement payment now is \$40 and the maximum is scheduled to reach \$127 in 1963.

However, Fisher warned there is a feature of the maximum allowance which is being overlooked by many. In order to receive the maximum of \$127 a month on retirement, the worker must have worked at least five years at \$4,800 per year.

The joker in the deck is that the five years have to be acquired in a period beginning in 1959. Hence only four years have elapsed under the plan and all of 1963 will have to be filled out before the maximum payments can be made to 65-year-old retirees. Individuals who have passed 65 years of age and still have not retired may benefit in 1963 by receiving the maximum payments under certain conditions.

Meantime, politicians and economists are wondering just where the tax assessments for Social Security can go without trouble. The rate, some feel, is already dangerously high and near the limits the taxpayer will tolerate. The tax rate, say observers, is already ponderous and is steadily increasing. There is bound to be a breaking point.

Meantime, it is argued that the payments to millions of retired workers through Social Security constitutes a vital prop to the nation's economy.

Odessa Survives Airplane Crash

WINK, Tex. (AP)—Odessa business man Lawrence Sperberg walked away from his Cessna 210 plane Thursday night after it crashed short of the Wink County airport.

The mishap occurred shortly before 10 p.m. after he radioed the Midland air terminal that he was low on gasoline and the weather was closing in.

Sperberg walked from the crash scene to the airport while a search was being organized.

Examination showed he had suffered back and leg fractures. He said he planned to continue flying.

Escape From East Berlin

With newspaper headlines telling of the often fatal attempts of East Berliners to escape to freedom in the West over, under and through the Berlin Wall, movie-

goers may now see a film version of what it is like in "Escape From East Berlin," Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer's drama depicting just such an escape on the part of a group of East Germans via a tunnel which they have dug under the infamous Wall.

The Walter Wood production, starring Don Murray and Christine Kaufmann, was inspired by an actual escape through the tunnel of 29 persons led by Erwin Becker on Jan. 25, 1962, and the film's producer and Director Robert Siodmak were able to give a rare authenticity and realism to their story by securing the services of Becker as technical adviser.

Don Murray enacts Karl Schroeder, chauffeur to an East German major, after seeing his friend killed in an attempt to drive a truck through the Wall, is persuaded by the latter's sister, Erika (Christine Kaufmann) and his family to engineer an escape attempt by digging a tunnel under the Wall, which is close to their home.

The efforts of the group to evade the suspicions of the East German police, their fear of betrayal by inquisitive neighbors, the exhaustion of the constant digging in relays in a race against time, a near fatal mishap in which an underground telephone wire is severed, are only a few of

the agonizing difficulties faced by the courageous group in sequences permeated with suspense. But it is the human touches which leave an impact on the spectator, conveyed by a cast centering not only on Schroeder and Erika, but also on such characters as the valiant mother of the family, the equally heroic Uncle Albrecht, a sister, a small brother and a young woman with a baby determined to stop at nothing in order to rejoin her husband on the other side of the Wall.

In the story's tense climax, the group is betrayed by Erika's father, in an attempt to reinstate himself with the Communist party, just as the diggers have broken through the Western wall of the tunnel.

Karl Schell, youngest of the famous Schell acting family, makes his American film debut in "Escape From East Berlin" in the role of the official employing Schroeder as a chauffeur. Werner Klemperer also has an important role as Brunner, who

The picture was filmed entirely in the Western Zone of Berlin under the very noses of the Communists across the Wall. An exact duplicate of a section of the Wall was constructed which in itself became a tourist attraction, with visitors often becoming so numerous they impeded the filming.

In the middle of September, 1962, not long after "Escape From East Berlin" was completed, newspapers announced the news of another successful escape through a tunnel under the Berlin Wall, this time achieved by a group of 29 East Berliners.

The book, "Four Missing Horse Players" by Alexander Rose, is the source for the screenplay of the new comedy in Technicolor and Panavision, "Who's Got The Action?" opening Monday at the Ritz Theatre.

The first in a series of stamps planned by the U.N. Postal Administration to help publicize the United Nations Development Decade will be issued on Feb. 4 to commemorate the U.N. Conference on the Application of Science and Technology for the Benefit of the Less Developed Areas. The conference will be held in Geneva from Feb. 4 to 20, 1963.

The stamp was designed by ARGENTINA and BRAZIL have issued stamps commemorating the 50th anniversary of the Postal Union of the Americas and Spain. The designs feature the emblem of this organization. The Argentine stamp is a 5.60 pesos blue, the Brazilian is 8 Cruzeiros red.

Collectors desiring first-day covers are reminded this far in advance to send their requests together with remittance to the U.N. Postal Administration, United Nations, N.Y.

Also from the United Nations: a new souvenir folder for all stamps issued by the United Nations in 1962 has been prepared by the U.N. Postal Administration. The folder may be purchased at the U.N. headquarters for \$1.25 each. Mail orders should be sent to the U.N. Postal Administration in New York. Return postage should have 12 cents for each folder. After Jan. 7, when the new postage rates will go into effect, the cost will be 15 cents for postage.

"When I ask these critics how Texas selects books, they usually don't know."

Krueger explained how Texas adopts textbooks. "The local school board has the final say on which book you use in school," Krueger said. "If the people writing the textbooks are Communists, then your local school boards are too because they select your book, and this is not true."
