Commissioner Race Highlights Runoff

Parmer County Democrats will hold their second primary (runoff) election on Saturday, June 5, with nomination of two county commissioners highlighting the voting day.

For the first time in a number of years, the voters in both county precincts which are electing new commissioners will go back to the polls to decide nominees for the positions.

Raymond Euler and Ernest Anthony square off for the Precinct 1 nomination, while in Precinct 3, former judge Archie Tarter and Wendol Christian seek the nod.

County Democratic chairman Hollis Horton this week sounded a reminder as to who is eligible to

"Only those voters who voted in the Democratic primary on May 1, or those who did not vote in either primary may vote in the June 5

election," Horton pointed out. Those voting in the Republican primary are not eligible to cast ballots in the Democratic runoff.

'We thought it important to call this to the voters' attention, due to the larger than usual turnout of voters in the May 1 Republican primary," Horton said. A total of 323 persons voted in the GOP primary in Parmer County, 164 of them at Friona.

Horton pointed out that a person casting an illegal ballot could be subject to a Class A misdemeanor charge, which could bring up to a \$2,000 fine, and-or a year in jail. In case of a contested race, such illegal voters would probably be spotted, Horton said.

"We are not out to deny anyone a vote, but we wanted to call attention to voters as to the law on the subject," Horton said.

The County Democratic chairman said that all eight county voting boxes would once again be open from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. on election day.

Horton said he personally was expecting around 60 per cent of the number who voted in the May 1 primary to vote in the runoff, which

around 1345 in the county.

Anthony and Euler, the survivors of a four-way fight for the nomination for commissioner after the May I primary, will settle the issue next Saturday.

In the first primary, Anthony led the four-man ticket with 282 votes, 29.2 per cent of the total. Euler had 234 votes, or 24.2 per cent. Lloyd Rector had 217 votes, or 22.3, and W.L. (Preach) Edelmon had 215

votes, also 22.3 per cent. The results of the second primary apparently will depend upon which of the two runoff candidates gets the most of his supporters back to the polls, and which picks up the most support from those who voted for one of the defeated candidates, or voters who did not vote at all on

During the campaign, Euler has stressed that he would work for better roads for Precinct 1, will oppose union control of government, and says he will oppose land use reform.

"Farmers have been hurt in some areas where farmland adjoins city property, by having to pay higher taxes-enough to seriously hamper their operations," Euler said in explanation of the land reform item.

Euler also has stressed the fact that he is running "on his own hook with no ties," and has financed his campaign completely on his own.

"I am in a position to devote all the time to the job that will be necessary, since I have leased my farm. If elected, I want the people to feel free to come and talk to me about any problems they have in regard to county business," Euler

Anthony likewise voiced his concern for roads, said he would attempt to hold the line on taxes, and would work with the other commissioners for the betterment of the county.

In addition to the commissioner's race, runoff voters will cast their ballots for two statewide races.

Seeking the railroad commissioner's nomination are Jon Newton and Jerry Sadler. Newton was probably the least known of the eight candidates who started the original campaign, but utilizing a large advertising budget, he made his name known. He says he will

Sadler's record as a public official has been questioned on several occasions, and his private affairs also have put him in the news at times.

Evans Injured In Car-Truck Mishap

Milton Evans of Friona was injured Wednesday following a freakish two-vehicle accident just east of Friona.

A large truck driven by a Nebraska man jack-knifed across Highway 60, just after a cloudburst had dumped water onto the road and made it slick. Evans crashed into the truck.


The accident was reported at 3:55 Wednesday. Russell Dougherty of Fremont, Nebraska, was driving a 1974 Freightliner truck east, and was towing an empty "pot" semi-trailer. Hitting a slick spot in the road, the truck jack-knifed and slid sideways across the road.

Evans was headed toward Friona, driving a 1975 Buick. The Evans vehicle slammed into the trailer portion of the truck-trailer, striking a solid beam on the trailer

Evans was thrown into the windshield. He sustained cuts and abrasions, plus a fractured ankle. Evans was brought to Parmer County Community Hospital by Parsons-Ellis Ambulance, and later was transfered to Lubbock for treatment.

Highway patrolman Royce Keck investigated the accident, assisted by the Friona Police Department. Traffic had to be routed around the

truck until it could be moved. Keck said the area where the accident occurred must be an exceptionally slick area following a rain, as there have been three such wrecks this year in the same general area, each one following a shower of rain.

REMEMBERING...

Much has been written and even more has been said on the subject of the outhouse. Sometimes called a privy, toilet, or outdoor toilet, and of course other names we can't mention here, it has been the brunt of many jokes, pranks, and acts of downright meanness. But forget all that if you can and let's take a sober look at it in this brief narrative.

The outhouse for a standard household was usually a "two holer" measuring about 4' X 5' in floor space. The simple structure was usually of rough lumber. unpainted. There were four walls, a wood floor and a roof. There was only one door and no windows. Across the back wall was a bench with closed-in front, standing about 18" high. In the top of the bench were cut two round holes about 10" to 12" in diameter. Directly below the bench was the pit into which

wastes were deposited. The basic theory and construction were simple but most people added improvements as they could. For example, fold-down lids

were sometimes attached to cover the holes when they were not being used. When the lids were open they

served as back rests. Some of the structures were made of brick or stone and some came complete with fancy door knobs and hinges, some even had their own kerosene lanterns. Nails were sometimes driven into the walls to serve as coat hangers. Wire hangers were fastened to the wall over which the catalog was hung (real roll type toilet paper was not a readily available commodity but the mail order catalog was a tolerable substitute). I am told that some folks cut the cresent moon shape above or in the doors but I honestly never saw an outhouse with it.

Ash cans or lye containers were standard fixtures in many outhouses. The lye was used to chemically treat the wastes and cut down on the odor somewhat, a process much like that of chemical

"It is not easy for a farmer to keep up with all farm program regulations-but it pays him to do it," according to Prentice L. Mills, County Executive Director of the ASCS. "There were a number of farmers who lost money last year because they did not fully understand the program rules."

According to reports from Mills most farmers lost money because of failure to report crop damage in time to earn payments. Many of these unfortunate farmers plowed their damaged crops under before people from the ASCS (Agricultural Stabilization & Conservation Service) office had an opportunity

to inspect the crop damage. Mills stated that disaster payments are now based on each crop individually with credit being given to an overplanted crop from an underplanted crop. For example: Farm with 100 acre wheat allotment, 100 acre grain sorghum allotment, and 20 acre cotton

There are 120 acres of wheat and 100 acres of cotton planted on the farm. Both crops are completely hailed-out on June 15, just prior to wheat harvest and too late to plant cotton. Now, this farm would be eligible for disaster payment on the 120 acres of wheat and the 100 acres of cotton as no feed grain was planted and the underplanting of feed grain (190 acre allotment) can be credited to wheat and cotton.

Also eligible for disaster payments are dryland farms that have not received enough moisture to type of help falls under the

"prevented-planting" provisions of the disaster program.

Mills stated that if conditions are favorable, a farmer is expected to plant during the normal planting period for the crop in question; that is for Parmer County: Cotton-May 5 thru June 1; Grain Sorghum-April 1 thru June 20; Soybeans-April 20 thru July 1.

Any farmer who is confronted with a disaster situation should visit the ASCS office, report what happened and find out just where he stands program-wise. It can mean money to him and the people plant cotton or feed grains. This in his office will be pleased to explain the program to him.



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

GSPA Endorses Protection Bills

Officials of Grain Sorghum Producers Associa-May 21, in support of legislation which would protect the American farmer from the financial losses experienced during export curtailments.

GSPA executive director Elbert Harp of Abernathy, Texas and vice president Mabry Foreman of Felt, Okla. represented the national commodity organization which is based in Lubbock, Texas.

The regional hearings were conducted by Congressman Glenn English (D-Oklahoma), Keith Sebelius (R-Kansas) and Jack Hightower (D-Texas), all members of the House Agriculture Committee.

Under consideration were bills introduced by English (HR 11136) and Sebelius (HJ Res. 743). The English bill would provide 100 per cent parity loans to grain producers during any export sales suspension. Payments for storage of more than 20,000 bushels would be at 5 per cent of the parity prices.

Foreman pointed out that "last year when the embargo suddenly was placed upon our grain exports to Russia and later when the voluntary embargo was extended to Eastern Europe, the price of grain dropped immediately by as much as \$1 per hundred

pounds. 'This happened at a time when farmers had hoped to receive sufficient prices to cover the high cost of production for the year," Foreman continued. "The few years."

market well below the cost tion testified here Friday, of production and market prices still do not reflect the confidence of 'free trade.'

"Our future as grain producers actually rests in the hands of approximately seven men who make up the Agricultural Policy Committee of the White House. Only one of these men, the Secretary of Agriculture, is closely involved with the problems of farming and agricultural policy. Thereproblems of farming and fore, our fate ultimately rests in the hands of these few people who are not even agriculturally oriented. This group can make a decision without warning that will spell 'bankruptcy' to our producers," the GSPA offi-

cer continued. Endorsing both the English and Sebelius bills, the grain sorghum representatives pointed out that the price of grain should be maintained at the parity level in order for farmers to realize a fair return on their investment, labor, management and risk.

"There should never be any consideration of trade restrictions unless prices are well above parity and if there is an embargo, farmers need to be assured that prices will not go below

parity," Foreman said. "With the existing high cost of production, we cannot continue to produce with the roller coaster effect upon prices caused by dock strikes, embargoes and other trade restrictions that we have been seeing the last

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
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

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

(Editor's note: The following letter far exceeded the Star's policy on letters to the editor, of 250 words. It is being presented in this manner by the writer because he believes the points expressed need to be made public.)

Football is King--long live the King! Basketball is dead and no one has written an obituary.

Friona surely must be the record holder for the shortest modern basketball program in history. In March, 1976, a request was made for a sixth period basketball program to involve those boys who did not choose to play football. The School Board and administration concurred and such program was granted. Meanwhile, a head football coach has resigned, a new head coach has been hired and a new, "modern" program has been installed. To me it isn't a modern program at all, but smells just like all football-oriented programs I have been observing for the last 35 years.

Ten or 12 boys had signed up to go straight basketball with the understanding they would have the sixth period with a coach to supervise during that period. Immediately upon assuming power as head football coach and athletic director, Coach Phillips began to pressure certain boys in that group to play football. He even told them that if they chose to play basketball only that they were just specialists and if they wanted to be Chieftains then they must play football. This was done in a general meeting with all boys in athletics present. Seems rather a cruel and small way to belittle some boys who for one reason or another choose to concentrate on basketball rather than football.

Seems that all football coaches are afraid of Ken Cleveland's program at Dimmitt as Coach Phillips made the statement that of Dimmitt's basketball starters last year played football when the fact is that not one single basketball starter for Dimmitt last year participated in

In previous visits with our administration and especially Bob Owen, it seems they are so afraid of a program that is similar to Dimmitts', they want to avoid it like a plague. I asked Bob Owen what the problems were with Dimmitt's program and the only thing I could translate from his answer was that it had ruined their football program. I checked the records and find that during the past 10 years we have gone 4 won 6 lost in football and 5-16 in basketball with Dimmitt. During his 7 years as head football coach, Owen was 3-4 with Dimmitt. Doesn't seem that their programs are in too bad a condition.

I believe that much of the criticism of Ken Cleveland's program is professional jealousy He was one of the first basketball coaches in this area to dispose the axiom that you must play football to be an athlete. I have watched his program for years and I think the greatest thing about it is that a lot of his kids wouldn't ever amount to anything athletically if they didn't concentrate on basketball. He takes that type of youngster and beats most people most of the time.

During the past ten years our record of 5-16 in basketball with Dimmitt would probably be the best 10 year record in history. This was accomplished without benefit of a program, but due to the tenacity and hard word of Ray DeBord and Larry Dyess. In 1969 Friona somehow or

basketball coach in Ray DeBord.

to try to build a basketball program. As he began to have a little success in his program, jealous personalities began to try to close doors on him. Ray DeBord was one in a million in many ways and when someone closed a door on him he just

simply tried another door. He refused to be intimidated and quietly went about his business of building a basketball program without the help of the administration or athletic director. It has been hinted out of the side of mouths that much of his basketball success came at the expense of football. This is just simply not true. If you want to look at the 10 year 4-6 record with Dimmitt; during DeBord's five years as defensive coach. We

were 3-2 with Dimmitt in football. After five years of service in F.H.S., many hours spent with kids in the gym and in his home, Ray took his team to state and came out runner-up to Bowie. Many of us knew that he would have offers from larger schools but felt like our school would try to keep him if at all possible. After he had visited Hurst-Bell and received a good offer for advancement, he still would have liked to stay in Friona for numerous reasons. Upon a visit with the administration, he was told, "Friona doesn't have an incentive program." I know for a fact that for \$500.00 a year and a kind word we could have kept one of the finest basketball coaches and men in the state of Texas.

Even the "Football is King" mania has led to the gradual erosion of our girl's program in the last 10 years. Mel Williams. whose record in three years here compared to that of Baker Duggins, was fired in his third year. After he had been state runner-up and after he had tied for district with Floydada and was preparing for the playoff he was told he was fired. The only reason he was ever given was that he didn't communicate with the

football staff. F.G. Crofford, one of the top girls' coaches in the state, was hired to replace Mel Williams. He was hired with no football duties and was allowed to assist with Junior High girls basketball. After eight years of keeping the girls' program on a high plane, starting one of the first girls' track programs in the state, suddenly it became necessary that he be re-assigned to the football program. He simply did what anyone else would have done. He took a job that appealed

to him at a much higher salary. So now Larry Dyess, another basketball coach, has resigned. His is much the same story as the others-lack of a program and promise of even less. Seems that anyone who speaks out for any sort of basketball program had better move on. I know for a fact that of the five head (3 boys-2 girls) basketball coaches who have left in the past 10 years, most have left because of clashes with football coaches, lack of a program or a salary not in line with other head coaches in our

One doesn't need to have a crystal ball to see now where our basketball programs are headed We will hire the best football coach available to replace Coach

Dyess. He will be assigned to

don't we be honest like Olton and simply say that we aren't interested in anything but

It is hard for me to believe that our school board will continue to let us keep a program that was good enough 30 years ago, but will not fit under present conditions unless we are content to be mixed in mediocrity.

I wonder if our School Board is content to see our basketball teams continue to be victims of an unrealistic program. If we can't change with the times, then we are not giving our kids a chance to win but a small percentage of their games. Probably in 1976 Friona and Olton will be the only ones in our district without such a realistic program. If you don't have an equal opportunity to develop your skills and win, why

even play? I don't think there is any way that the School Board could justify the lack of a program in basketball when we go all out in football. Why don't we simply tell the 10 to 20 kids involved that they are second-class? At least Coach Phillips was honest with the kids in telling them that they weren't Chieftains unless they played football. What can we honestly tell Jeff Whiteside, John Jarecki, Sandy Peters, Mark Neill, Mike Hutson and others who would choose to spend their time and effort to develop their basketball skills instead of spending their time in football, which they dislike or maybe don't like enough to sacrifice anything in basketball?

What can we honestly tell boys Lawrence Fithen. Graham, Leslie White, Phillip Veazey, Roger Coffey, Fred Garza and others that might never excell at football but would like to work to excell in a sport that they would enjoy and possibly have a chance to play? Ken Cleveland would take a group of boys like those (only one who has played any varsity football), and win with them just as he has in Dimmitt if he had opportunity to work with them 45 minutes a day the year around.

Can the School Board justify sending 10-15 kids like the above to a P.E. class or to a football-related weight program that possibly could reduce their skills in basketball instead of increasing it? If we have to have a program of this sort to satisfy a football coach's ego, let's not try to camouflage it but tell it like it

I had been under the impression that our athletic programs were for the kids. It would appear that this is not any longer true, but instead for benefit of football

The band has one period each day to develop their skills so they might compete with other schools. Girls' basketball has one period each day the year around. It seems that the only second class students are those boys that choose to compete in basketball and not football. What does this make the young man who chooses to participate in band only or who chooses to participate in neither band or athletics?

I don't feel the situation in Friona will ever change until enough people demand it. If we
