Emigration Said Draining Britain

LONDON (AP) - A top-level group of British scientists said in a report published Wednesday night that emigration - especially to the United States-is draining Britain of its best scientific brains and hampering research.

The group said the United States is drawing off nearly 50 per cent of the highly qualified personnel who annually leave Britain for more money and better living. The report, based on a 10-year survey, said 1,539 holders of British Ph.D. degrees emigrated in the decade 1952-61.

Vast Mass Of Icy Air **On The Move**

By The Associated Press A vast mass of icy air, powered by brisk northerly winds, stung the nation's midsection today and headed into Eastern and Southern states.

Subzero cold spread from Montana across the north central region into Ohio. Temperatures plunged to nearly 30 degrees below zero in northern Minnesota. Subzero readings were reported in Montana, the Dakotas, Minnesota, Wisconsin, Iowa, Michigan, Illinois and Ohio

Gale winds and snow squalls in sections of New York state closed highways, stranded residents and caused hundreds of minor traffic accidents. The heaviest snowfall was six inches in western New York, which was lashed by wind gusts up to 51 m.p.h. off Lake Erie. Nearly 300 school children were stranded in western New York communities. The mercury edged to near zero in some areas, including Rochester and Buffalo. Blowing snow, with amounts light to moderate, heralded the advance of the cold air southwestward through Kentucky and parts of Tennessee. Light snow fell in parts of the Great Lakes region

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

HUNTSVILLE (P) - Dr. Everett D. Wilson has become a nutria fan

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m

Dr. Wilson, associate professor of biology at Sam Houston State Teachers College, is using the furry animals for laboratory experiments here, to find out as much as possible about their re productive physiology.

Captured in the Sheldon Reservoir near Houston, the animals are brought here where Dr. Wilson and five of his students are conducting tests.

Sam Houston's nutria population now numbers 18, including a baby born in captivity.

The baby, the only survivor of a litter of six, has become the unofficial mascot of the biology department. The animal follows Dr. Wilson or a student down the hall and sleeps in the professor's pocket while he is lecturing.

Dr. Wilson said full grown nu tria weigh an average of 25 pounds -or about the size of the biggest tomcats. They weigh about one-half pound at birth and are born in an advanced stage similar to a jackrabbit-that is, with all their hair and with their eyes open. He said a nutria would be able to fend for itself two or three days after birth.

Their forepaws are similar to a raccoon's, but their hind legs are webbed.

"They're ferocious eaters," Dr. Wilson explained. He feeds them several boxes of produce cuttings and spoiled vegetables a week

While there may be no immediate practical application for Dr. Wilson's research, definite possi bilities exist. After nutra research at Cambridge, England, Illinois and Huntsville, the tall young biologist has found that the nutria are better than rabbits as laboratory subjects in at least one important aspect.

"What we have in mind is reorganization for economy in state government," he said. Some reports circulated that as many as 19,000 state jobs would be stripped of civil service protection, but Rhodes termed the figure inaccurate and said there could be no estimate at this time.

While Rhodes and his firrance director, Richard L. Krabach, scan the state's billion-dollar a year financial program for spots where more cuts can be made, there is resentment from those who have been fired.

There were questions raised by non-political persons who learned that some state employes were rehired after it was discovered their work was essential.



Jubilant Jelly Log replete with symbolic hatchet and cherries adds a timely touch to your Washington's Birthday (Feb. 22), celebration. Either buy two jelly rolls or make your own, using your own favorite sponge, sheet cake recipe. When done remove from oven and top with jam or jelly of your own choice. 

Policy In Need Of Reconsideration

Tom Sealy, Midland attorney and former member of the University of Texas board of regents, has protested the regent's December decision jumping rates for pipeline rights of way.

The board arbitrarily fixed the rate at \$1.50 per lineal rod, three times what the customary rate has been. The mischief was compounded by making the terms 10 years, which means that at the end of each decade of an agreement it would have to be executed again.

Sealy, who was joined by Texas Electric Service Company, West Texas Uilities, Southern Union Gas Company (and now by the Colorado River Municipal Water District), pointed out that the rates might become so prohibitive that companies would have to abandon their gathering systems. He cited four companies

with combined line distance of over half a million rods. So the argument is not one over peanuts.

Another consideration is that the University is sort of a bellwether in establishing rates for pipeline and utility rights of way. It is well, also, to keep in mind that the price per rod is not by any means the total cost of obtaining a right of way. Invariably, damages to grass, crops, improvements go to make up the final fig-

Were it not for the untold wealth in oil and gas and other improvements, the University system today would be a relatively impoverished one. Gratitude, let alone an appreciation of the economic inportance of petroleum and other development to the state, ought to have some bearing on politics.

Action Will Say More Than Words



IF THE STORY of the man-made miracle for curing unemployment were at all typical, this country would really be "moving forward," in Kennedyian prose, "with vigor." But there are some appalling facts about the major industry of these parts, which is mining While the efficiency and safety of machinery rises on a steep curve, the willingness of people to keep an approximate pace shows a dismal dive.

THERE ARE ABOUT 460,000 persons at work in American mining, milling and reduction plants. But the actual time spent underground for the basic workers is only six hours a day. A recent survey of human efficiency in general manufacturing shows Americans putting out only 80 per cent of maximum effort. In underground mining this falls to 50 per cent. These are public institutional figures. When businessmen get together and sharpen the brass tacks, they discover far more sickening statistics. Pat Haggerty. President of Texas Instruments, after studying the operations of the best-managed U.S. firms, finds the overall effectiveness of American workers to be under 10 per cent of their potentials.

THE OLD TALE of Dr. Frankenstein's mechanical monster which overcame and destroyed its master is being retold here in mournful numbers. Martin K. Hannifan, manager of the Butte mines, says the main reason for the human decline is the lack of exposure to ordinary adversity. A whole generation since the New Deal has grown up in Montana without being forced to face realities. Their lives have been cushioned with high wages, paid holidays, life insurance, medical care pro-

products vanish from the world market, no matter how many liberalizing trade bills are passed. The Anaconda Company, which industrially dominates this area, is now, in effect, working for the Federal-State octopus. The latest complete figures (for 1961) show that the company paid \$43 million more in total taxes than it did for modernization of plant equipment. It paid \$41 million more in taxes than it paid its shareholders in dividends. The only foreseeable end result is that unproductive welfare for workers will continue to absorb jobs, initiative and investment from industries that make the country go.

EXCESSIVE legislation, state as well as federal, is the canker which denies industry its normal growth and development. In 1961 the Montana Legislature received 148 bills which interfered in varying ways with the state's chief industry of mining. The trend continues in 1963. One bill now in committee at Helena would hit the Anaconda Company with an \$18-million-a-day water tax on a new construction. It is against such ruinous forays by bureaucracy-building legislators that this company, and all companies, are forced to swell their own employment ranks with non-productive workers such as lawyers, public relationists and lobbyists. Between 1953-63, the price of copper has risen by less than 8 per cent, with labor costs rising 55 per cent and taxes over 200 per cent. No amount of mechanical efficiency can continue to make up the difference

IN THE END, humans must save humans. People's power must match mechanical power in productive output. The miracles are not all made in laboratories and test chambers. The need of the times is for Americans to pick up their tearsoaked pillows-and walk, not on physical fitness hikes, but to thousands of undone jobs

The U.N.'s Aid To Cuba

WASHINGTON-Officials of the United purposes which could defeat American foreign policies.

> THE POINT IS made in U.N. circles that if a declaration of war existed between Cuba and the United States, this would immediately interrupt any fundgiving or the operations of the U.N. in any belligerent country. No state of war has, of course, been proclaimed. But U.N. officials overlook the existence of a "cold war" and the fact that billions of dollars are being spent to try to defeat Communist aggression and that American lives are being lost around the world in places like Vietnam in an effort to check the military operations of the Communists. Also, in the last few weeks, there has been revealed a military build-up in Cuba by the Soviets as a forerunner of possible aggression in Latin America.

THE FACT remains that the Soviet government has taken over Cuba by conquest from within. A people for whom American soldiers and sailors died a few decades ago, to liberate the island from Spain, have lost their independence. A base has been established in Cuba to take over other Latin-American countries.

THE AMERICAN people perhaps have not given as much attention as they should to the constructive work that has been done by the special funds agency of the U.N., which indeed deserves encouragement. But the blunder in Cuba can only retard the continuance of such aid from the United States.

THE CONTROVERSY has not become a partisan matter in Congress. Spokesmen for both political parties have criticized the U.N. action. Sen. Frank Church of Idaho, Democrat. chairman of the subcommittee of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee which is investigating the controversial U.N. project, points out that Cuba is in arrears in its regular dues payments to the U.N. He says the United States should have protested vigorously against the U.N.'s new project. He declares Cuba is a "special case" for U.N. consideration, because it is being used as a military base by Russia "in violation of the spirit of the U.N. charter." 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
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
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
