CONGRATULATIONS to Jack Clark on winning the Star's annual Football Contest. Clark, one of the most faithful entrants in the contest for better than 20 years, had come close numerous times before, but had not won until this year.

He even had to battle adversity to stay in the 1982 contest, being hospitalized during the early part of the contest, but managed to get his entry blank filled out and turned in every week.

Clark's persistence finally paid off, and now Jack says after breaking his jinx, he's ready to try for crown number two.

The 1982 contest will be remembered as the one which we conducted "almost without the professional games." Due to the first strike in the NFL's history, we only were able to include the pro games in only four of the contest's 13 weeks.

That caused us to have to expand the number of high school and college games somewhat, and to include some games which were perhaps not as familiar to contestants as they otherwise might have been.

For instance, we accepted a dare from wife Carol and included the game involving Slippery Rock on one of the week's contests. A few of the contestants raised their eyebrows at this, but they took it in stride, picking Slippery Rock for the most part, and they won, so this wasn't so bad.

The problem in assembling the schedule of games to be picked, strike or no strike, is to get the right number of games, all of which are to be played that particular weekend.

The games ought not to be on Thursday, which would be an unfair advantage to some, due to the Friday afternoon deadline for contest entries. This eliminates Thanksgiving Day games, as well as some Lubbock and Amarillo games played Thursday night.

Picking this list of games is not always as easy as it might appear to the casual observer.

First, there is the problem of printing mistakes which may crop up on the various schedules. For the college and professional games, we use a magazine which has proven basically reliable through the years.

Then, we use a combination of schedules for the high school games, including the Top of Texas Football Magazine, along with the special football edition of the Amarillo Daily News, published pre-season.

We also have to throw in the TV Guide, because we like to include as many college and professional games as possible which will be televised each week—that is providing that the TV Guide is out in time. And since we do our games for the Star more than a week in advance, this is rarely the case.

However, the televising of games turns out to be one of the major problems in selecting games for the football contest.

What the networks do is select a number of games they want to televise, after the schedules have been made up, and then re-schedule the games for their own convenience. And this year there were three networks involved in the college games, the most in history.

They will not only change the starting time of a game from night-time to daytime, for example, but their favorite trick is to change the date on which the game was scheduled entirely. This is what drives us football contest promoters up the wall.

A few of the games which fell into this category include Army-Navy, Oklahoma-Nebraska, and Texas-Arkansas. The OU-Nebraska game, which would have been a great game for contestants to worry over, was played on Friday afternoon (of all times), Thanksgiving week.

The other two games mentioned were moved from prior scheduled weeks to this Saturday (December 4).

We agree with Arkansas coach Lou Holtz, who says the changes for television purposes should be made much further in advance than they are in some cases.

Pheasant Season Begins Dec. 11

The 1982 pheasant season will kick off next Saturday morning, December 11.

Once again, the season will be two weeks in duration, spanning three weekends. Final day of the season will be Sunday, December 26.

The bag limit will remain the same as in years past: two cocks per day and four in possession. Only the cock pheasants are legal game.

A good hunting season is anticipated. Jack Patterson, spokesman for the pheasant season, said he had seen a good number of pheasants in the Rhea community. Reports from other parts of the area have also been encouraging.

A large influx of hunters is expected for the opening weekend of the season next weekend.

A contest for the hunter turning in the longest tailfeather will be held sponsored by the Parmer County Game Management Association. Details on where to turn in the feather entries will be announced next week.

Texas followed the lead of its neighboring state, New Mexico, with the passage of House Bill 1421, which authorized the formation of Operation Game Thief. Concerned citizens may call a 24-hour toll-free number, 1-800-792-GAME, to report flagrant violations of Texas' wildlife and fish laws.

Since implementing its game thief program in 1976, New Mexico has collected over \$79,000 in fines and paid almost \$40,000 in rewards.

stiffened with HB 717 upping criminal trespassing from a Class C to a Class B misdemeanor. In addition, if the offender carries a deadly weapon, he can be charged with a Class A misdemeanor.

Notice has to be present before a person can commit criminal trespassing. Notice is given in three ways: (1) Oral or written communication by owner of property; (2) Presence of fencing to exclude intruders or contain livestock, or (3) Sign posted on property indicating entry is forbidden.

Under the Texas penal code, a Class C misdemeanor carries a maximum \$200 fine. However, trespassers convicted under the new law, under a Class B misdemeanor, will face a possible \$1,000 fine and/or 180 days in jail.

If the offender carries a deadly weapon, and most hunters do, the Class A misdemeanor can cost up to \$2,000 in fines and up to a year in jail.

No public funds will be used in the Operation Game Thief program. More than \$20,000 in donations from individuals and organizations have been received to get the program started.

Jack Clark Is Winner In Star's Football Contest

Jack Clark, the 1982 champion of the annual Friona Star football contest, is a good example of the old adage: "If at first you don't succeed, try, try again."

Clark has been entering the contest practically ever since it was started, and although he has been painfully close to winning the grand prize two or three other times, it eluded him until this year.

Then, thanks to a handful of upsets on the final weekend of the year, Clark thought he had "blown it again."

But he held on for the win, finishing with 203 total points, to an even 200 for three contestants who tied for runnerup honors: Clint Mears, Tom Johnson and Martha Clements.

Clark, who went into the final week of the contest with a razor-thin one-point lead, couldn't help but think back to the 1977 contest. In that one, he held a two-point lead over the field, only to see it evaporate when Jerry Hinkle and R.L. Blakely came from behind to tie for the grand prize.

More years than that ago, in 1962 to be exact, Clark went into the final week of the contest in a three-way tie

with Waymon Wilkins and C.H. Veazey for the lead. But he dropped a point to the leaders, and it took the tie-breaker scores to name Veazey as champion over Wilkins that year.

"It's hard for me to hold a lead. I'd rather be behind and having to pick upsets," said Clark, who did just that on the 12th week of the current year's contest, when he came from two points behind Clint Mears to take the lead.

But the 1982 contest had a much happier ending than some others

Clark could recall, and he happily accepted his check for \$100 as the 1982 champion. Oddly enough, he did not win any weekly prize money at all during the course of the contest, but his steady pace won out. Clark scored a 15 on the final week. He averaged 15.6 correct for the course of the contest.

In the final weekly contest, Elizabeth McLellan came through the tide of upsets least affected and claimed the weekly prize of \$10.00 cash. Mrs. McLellan was one of six contestants correctly picking 16 games. She won the prize by missing the Tampa Bay-Miami tie-breaker score by only seven points.

Two contestants, Jerry Hinkle and Kevin Beavers, tied for second and third places, and were awarded \$5.00 each. Both guessed the tie-breaker score at 28-21, Miami, missing by 13 points on the actual score.

Other 16s were registered by Martha Clements, who fell three points shy of the contest leader, Donnie McDonald of Lazbuddie and Randy Geris of Canyon.

Mrs. McLellan's misses were Post-Stamford, Alabama-Auburn, LSU-Tulane (these three games missed by virtually every contestant), Oklahoma State-San Diego State; Atlanta-Los Angeles and San Francisco-New Orleans.

As a matter of coincidence, Hinkle and Mrs. Clements missed exactly the same six games. McDonald, Beavers and Geris varied by correctly picking Auburn over Alabama, but missing the Vanderbilt-Tennessee game.

Contestants were given a "free ride" on three games on the final lineup. Texas vs A&M played on Thursday; Army-Navy plays this coming weekend, and the Arizona-San Diego game was listed in error.

Commission Has Routine Business

Mostly routine business was conducted by the Parmer County Commissioners at their regular meeting November 22.

A motion was passed to pay the boarding care bills for Parmer County's foster children, in the amount of \$1,147. This money will be re-imbursed the county.

Notation was made of a legislative briefing to be held in Amarillo on December 9, giving county officials an opportunity to visit with newly elected legislators.

A motion was passed approving payment of two doctor bills in the amount of \$25 and \$4 for two foster children.

Payment of the county's dues in the West Texas County Judge's and Commissioners Assn., in the amount of \$50, was approved.

Payment of a visiting district judge's expenses, in the amount of \$106.55, was also approved.

Friona State Bank had asked permission to substitute new securities for others pledged as securities which are maturing. A motion was passed approving the bank's substitution of \$100,000 in Fort Worth Independent School District bonds maturing March 1, 1984, to replace \$50,000 in Carrizo Springs ISD bonds and \$25,000 in Fort Worth ISD bonds, both of which matured December 1.

Approval was granted a county citizen for an easement to cross a county road with a water line in Precinct 2.

Laura Jacobs, county extension agent for Home Economics, reported on the County 4-H Food Show held November 20 with 52 4-H members participating. She also stated that the Christmas bazaar sponsored by the Parmer County Family Living Committee November 19-20 in Friona was a success, with 65 exhibitors and approximately 1500 guests registering.

Approval of a bill for \$355.90 by a visiting court reporter concluded the day's agenda.

Lions Set Pheasant Breakfast

The Friona Noon Lions will host their annual pheasant hunter's breakfast next Saturday, December 11, beginning at 5:30 a.m. at the Friona High School Cafeteria.

The menu will consist of eggs, bacon, sausage, biscuits, gravy and coffee. The price tag is "all you can eat for \$4.00."

Between 300 and 400 people are expected for the annual event.

Proceeds from the breakfast will benefit Girlstown, U.S.A. in some respect. Last year, funds went to help re-build the building destroyed by fire at Girlstown's Borger campus, and also to purchase a deep-freeze for storage of meat.

Everyone, hunters or not, is welcome to attend the breakfast.

United Way Nears Goal For 1982

The Friona Area United Way campaign was inching toward its goal, according to co-chairmen Mike Hanes and Keith Black.

As of Thursday morning, a total of \$11,500 had been turned in for the 1982 drive, which represented 93 per cent of the goal of \$12,350.

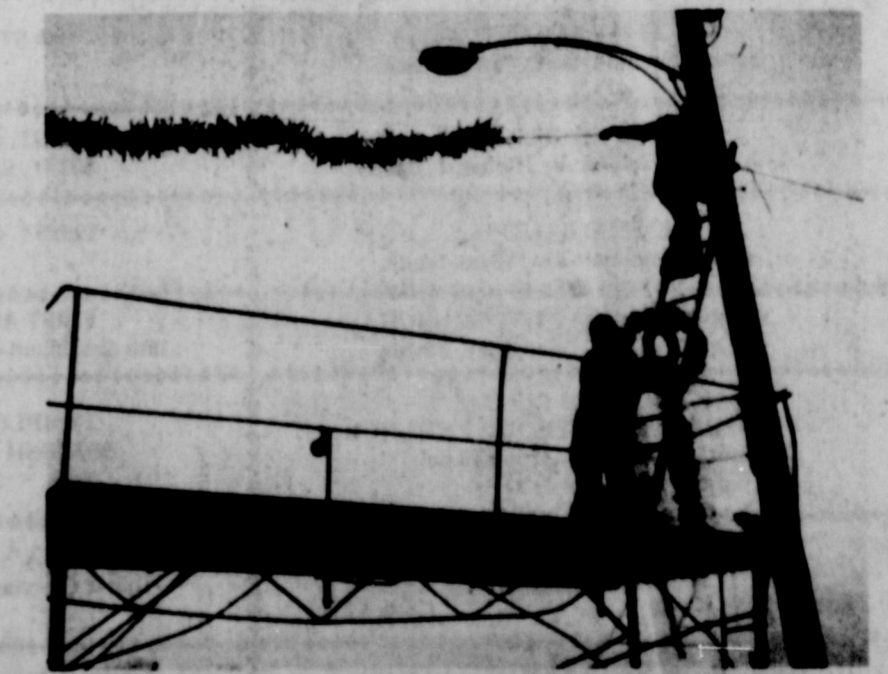
"We still have some commitments from companies whose main offices are out of town, and when these come in, we should be in pretty good shape," said Hanes.

Area Gets Snowfall Thanksgiving Week

The Friona area received a nice snowfall during Thanksgiving week; in fact two separate snows were received, along with rain and sleet.

It all added up to good moisture, which is expected to be a big help to the winter wheat crop, which was beginning to need some help.

Wednesday afternoon prior to Thanksgiving was the date of the first snow, when three to four inches of snow fell by nightfall. Very little accompanying wind allowed the snow to stack fairly level.

The earlier snow melted off for the most part Thursday and Friday, and then on Friday a light rain began to fall, turning into sleet late in the evening, and again on Saturday morning a nice "lazy" snow was falling, this time amounting to about two inches.

Although there is still some cotton in the fields, most farmers were ready for some beneficial moisture. It was the greatest amount of moisture received at any one time since back in the summer.

Lion's Tale

Tall tales seem to be the order of the day each year when the hunters gather to eat breakfast prepared at the Friona Noon Lions' Annual Pheasant Hunters Breakfast on the first day of the season (next Saturday). The following is but an excerpt of a "true" huntin' story overheard last year. The names have been deleted for obvious reasons.

The honorees and guests were welcomed by Delbert Smith, manager of the Lamb County Electric Co-



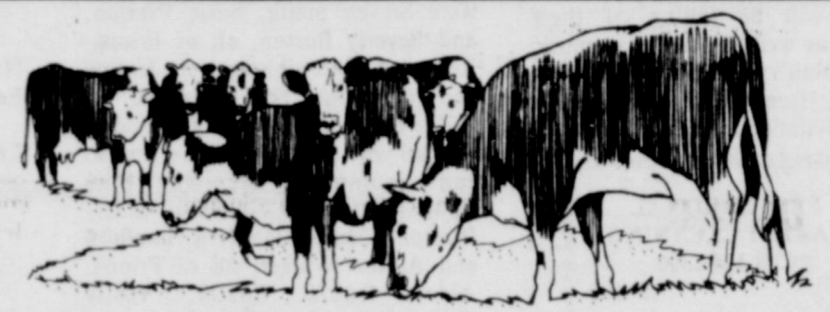
